Certain matches are not recognised as full internationals by certain football associations, while others count them. In such cases, the game has been counted, with a special mention in the facts.

The games have been split into three categories: 'UEFA European Football Championship', 'FIFA World Cup' and 'Others'. The first two categories include qualifying and final-round matches, while the third category refers to any other internationals including Olympic Games, when A national teams took part. The overall records only include results during normal playing time and extra-time; results of penalty shoot-outs are not counted.

Facts

- Austria's only competitive victory against their neighbours came at the 1978 World Cup, when legendary striker Hans Krankl scored twice in a famous 3-2 win
- Four years later the two teams took part in an infamous group match at the 1982 World Cup. Germany won 1-0 – a result that enabled both teams to progress to the second phase at the expense of Algeria, who had already completed their programme. The unsportsmanlike behaviour of both teams led to the widespread practice of staging final group matches simultaneously
- The last six meetings have all been friendlies, with Germany winning each of the last four – 5-1 in Vienna, 6-2 in Leverkusen, 3-1 in Vienna with a hat-trick from Kevin Kuranyi and 3-0 in Vienna thanks to goals from Thomas Hitzlsperger, Miroslav Klose and Mario Gómez, that latter victory coming on 6 February 2008
- Germany head coach Joachim Löw won the Austrian league title with Innsbruck club FC Wacker Tirol in 2001/02 and also coached in Vienna at FK Austria Wien

- The first official encounter came at EURO 96, in the quarter-final, where Germany prevailed in a physical encounter. Croatia were reduced to ten men after Igor Štimac's red card, and Germany scored the winner soon afterwards through Matthias Sammer, the 1996 Ballon d'Or winner
- Croatia got their revenge two years later at the 1998 World Cup, unexpectedly winning another quarter-final by a 3-0 margin – after a red card for German defender Christian Wörms had turned the contest in their favour. Robert Jarni, Goran Vlaović and Davor Šuker scored Croatia's goals
- Several members of the Croatia squad play their club football in the German Bundesliga, among them defenders Robert Kovač and Josip Šimunić, strikers Mladen Petrić and Ivica Olić, and rookie FC Schalke 04 midfielder Ivan Rakitić
- Croatia coach Slaven Bilić played in the German Bundesliga for Karlsruher SC before continuing his career in England

- Italy and France qualified together for EURO 2008 from Qualifying Group B. Although Italy won the group, France had the better of the two meetings, winning 3-1 at home and drawing 0-0 away
- The two teams contested the 2006 World Cup Final in Berlin, with Italy taking the title for the fourth time after a penalty shootout in which they converted all five of their penalties. The only player to miss from the spot was David Trezeguet, the man whose golden goal had defeated Italy in extra-time of the EURO 2000 final six years earlier
- The World Cup Final was infamous for the red card received in extra time by Zinedine Zidane for his headbutt on Italy defender Marco Materazzi. It was the last match of Zidane's career
- Penalty shootouts aside, France have not lost a match to Italy – competitive or friendly – since their first-round encounter at the 1978 World Cup
- Fabio Grosso, who scored the winning penalty in the 2006 World Cup Final, now plays in France with reigning champions Olympique Lyonnais

- The two countries also met in qualifying for EURO 2004. Each team registered an away victory, with Greece surprisingly topping the group and forcing Spain to qualify via the play-offs (at the expense of Norway)
- Two current Greek internationals play for Spanish clubs - Angelos Basinas (RCD Mallorca) and Giourkas Seitaridis (Club Atlético de Madrid)
- The two countries met in a friendly at the start of the current season in Thessaloniki. Spain won the match 3-2 thanks to a brace from Valencia CF midfielder David Silva, his second (winning) goal coming three minutes into stoppage time

- The Netherlands have never beaten Italy in a friendly. Their last attempt, in Amsterdam on 12.11.2005, ended in a 3-1 defeat. It was coach Marco van Basten's first defeat in charge
- Italy defeated the Netherlands on penalties in the semi-final of EURO 2000. It was the third successive European Championship in which the Dutch had been eliminated in that manner. They were also the fourth successive EURO host nation to exit at the semi-final stage
- The meeting in Amsterdam was the first between the two countries in a major tournament since the 1978 World Cup. The Dutch won that encounter in Buenos Aires to reach the Final, coming from behind to win what was effectively a semi-final with two long-range goals from Ernie Brandts and Arie Haan. Brandts had earlier scored an own goal to give Italy the lead. The Netherlands have not beaten Italy in eight matches since
- The two coaches, Marco van Basten and Roberto Donadoni, played together for several years at AC Milan
