After exiting last season's UEFA Champions League at the hands of FC Barcelona at Stamford Bridge, Chelsea FC will hope to fare much better when another Liga side, Club Atlético de Madrid, visit west London on Matchday 3.

- Chelsea are looking for a third successive win in Group D, while Atlético will be keen to kick-start their campaign after following a goalless draw at home to APOEL FC with a 2-0 loss at FC Porto.

Match background

- The teams have never previously met in a competitive fixture but Chelsea will be encouraged by the fact that only once in eleven games have they lost at home to Spanish visitors.

- That came in the 2005/06 UEFA Champions League Round of 16 when FC Barcelona won 2-1. Last season a 1-1 draw between the same sides in the English capital proved enough for the visitors to advance to the final on away goals, Andrés Iniesta hitting the all-important equaliser in the third minute of added time.

- That was the third in a succession of draws Chelsea have recorded at home to Spanish sides. Valencia CF were their opponents on the other two occasions, with a 0-0 stalemate in the 2007/08 group stage and a 1-1 draw in the previous season's quarter-finals.

- Atlético have only once tasted victory away against English opposition, defeating Leicester City FC 2-0 in the 1997/98 UEFA Cup first round.

- With four draws in their eight visits, however, Atlético will not travel fearing the worst. Their last three games against English clubs – home and away – have ended all-square and it took a Steven Gerrard penalty five minutes into added time at Anfield to rescue a point for Liverpool FC eleven months ago after Maxi Rodríguez had put Atlético ahead.

- Chelsea's narrow victory over Porto on Matchday 1 extended their unbeaten run at home in the competition to 19 games, since that Barcelona triumph in February 2006.

- Atlético's Matchday 2 setback at Porto was their first away loss in the UEFA Champions League proper, the club having collected three wins and four draws from their seven previous outings.

Team ties

- Diego Forlán scored for Uruguay against a Brazil team featuring Alex in the 2007 Copa América semi-finals. However, Forlán missed his penalty during the subsequent shoot-out, which Brazil won 5-4.

- Rodríguez played for Argentina in a friendly against England in Geneva in November 2005. John Terry and Frank Lampard lined up on the other side and Joe Cole appeared as a second-half substitute.

- Joe Cole scored England's winner in a friendly against Uruguay at Anfield in March 2006. Terry also featured while Forlán was in the visitors' lineup.

- Paulo Assunção played for Porto against Chelsea in both legs of the 2006/07 UEFA Champions League first knockout round.

- Pablo Ibáñez made his Spain debut against England in a friendly in Madrid in November 2004. Ashley Cole, Terry and Lampard all featured for the visitors and José Antonio Reyes for Spain.

- Reyes scored for Arsenal FC against Chelsea in the second leg of their UEFA Champions League quarter-final at Highbury in April 2004, but Lampard equalised and Chelsea eventually went through 3-2 on aggregate.

- Petr Čech and Tomáš Ujfaluši are team-mates for the Czech Republic.

- Simão, Ricardo Carvalho, Deco and José Bosingwa are all team-mates for Portugal.

- Carlo Ancelotti's side suffered a second successive away Premier League defeat at Villa Park.
- Drogba's goal at Villa was Chelsea's first in the first half-hour of a league game this season.
- Michael Essien made his 100th Premier League start at Villa Park.
- Chelsea's perfect start to the Premier League season had ended with a 3-1 loss at Wigan Athletic FC on 26 September, Ancelotti tasting defeat for the first time since his arrival in west London. They had claimed eight successive victories in all competitions, and seemed to have got back on track by beating APOEL and then Liverpool FC before losing at Villa.
- Chelsea had been on a club record eleven-game winning streak in the Premier League before the Wigan defeat.
- Chelsea have scored at least twice in eleven of their last 13 Premier League matches. The exceptions were the losses at Wigan and Villa, the former ending a 14-match unbeaten league run.

• Drogba's goal in Malawi secured the point Ivory Coast needed to go through to a second successive World Cup. Ballack and Ivanović were also celebrating qualification thanks to Germany's win in Russia and Serbia's defeat of Romania respectively.

• Russia, France and Portugal will take part on November's play-offs.

• Lampard won his 76th cap for already-qualified England against Belarus, 74 have which have come since he joined Chelsea, making his the club's joint-highest international appearance maker along with Marcel Desailly.

• Forlán was rested after complaining of fatigue and muscular pain but Luis Perea (ankle) and Sergio Asenjo (thigh) both shook off knocks to start. Raúl García came on as a second-half substitute – his first appearance since breaking a toe on the opening day of the season.

• Atlético have picked up six points from their opening seven league games this term, one fewer than at this stage in 1999/00 when they were relegated. It represents their worst start to a top-flight season since 1994/95.

• Abel Resino's side have conceded two or more goals in seven of their eleven games this season.

• Atlético had claimed their first Liga win of the season on 3 October with a 2-1 home win against Real Zaragoza. It was their first victory in any competition in eight matches, since an aggregate 5-2 triumph over Panathinaikos in the UEFA Champions League play-offs.

• Atlético started their league campaign with a 3-0 loss at Málaga CF on 30 August. The last time Los Rojiblancos suffered an opening-day defeat by more than one goal in the top flight was in 1999/00 when they went down 2-0 at home to Rayo Vallecano.

- One of only six people – the others being Miguel Muñoz, Giovanni Trapattoni, Johan Cruyff, Frank Rijkaard and Josep Guardiola – to have lifted the European Champion Clubs' Cup as both a player and coach.
- A combative midfielder, he helped Roma win the 1983 Serie A title and four Italian Cups before joining Milan in 1986 where he added two more league championships, as well as back-to-back European Cup triumphs in 1989 and 1990, to his tally.
- Began coaching in 1995 with a year at Reggiana, earning them promotion from Serie B, before spending two seasons at Parma. Replaced Marcello Lippi at Juventus in February 1999 and returned to San Siro as coach of Milan in 2001.
- Took Milan back to the top during an eight-year spell, winning the UEFA Champions League in 2003 and 2007, but losing the 2005 final on penalties to Liverpool FC after leading 3-0. Milan also won a Serie A title, a Coppa Italia and the 2007 FIFA World Club Cup.
- Resigned on 31 May and was named as Chelsea's new manager the following day.

- Abel Resino went on to forge a formidable reputation over 13 years at Club Atlético de Madrid after joining in 1982. The goalkeeper enjoyed his best season in 1990/91, winning the Copa del Rey and collecting the Zamora trophy awarded to the custodian with the best top-flight record.
- That was a season in which Resino went 1,275 minutes without conceding a Liga goal, a record which remains unbeaten. The Toledo-born goalkeeper helped Atlético defend their Copa del Rey title with victory against Real Madrid CF in 1992.
- After seeing out his playing days with Rayo Vallecano, Resino hung up his gloves in 1996 having won two caps for Spain. He returned to Atlético two years later, working as goalkeeping coach before being named as an assistant to then sporting director Paulo Futre.
- Resino was appointed as César Ferrando's second in command in 2004 and used the experience to strike out on his own as coach of CF Ciudad de Murcia, who he led to a fourth-placed finish in the Spanish second division in 2005/06.
- A seven-month stint at UD Levante followed before Resino took over at CD Castellón, leaving the team challenging for promotion to the top flight when he returned to Atlético as head coach in February 2009.

Competition facts

• **UEFA Champions League:** Group stage milestones

Holder FC Barcelona are looking to avoid becoming the first defending champions to fail to get through a group stage since the UEFA Champions League began. (This record, like the others, includes the seasons between 1999/00 and 2002/03 that featured a second group stage).

In 1992/93, Barcelona were the reigning European Champion Clubs' Cup holders and were beaten 4-3 on aggregate in the second round by PFC CSKA Moskva.

S.S. Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta became the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League in 2007/08 when he featured against Olympiacos CFP on Matchday 1 at the age of 43 years and 168 days. The record was previously held by Alessandro Costacurta, the AC Milan defender who played against AEK Athens FC in the 2006/07 season at the age of 40 years and 211 days. Ballotta was aged 43 years 252 days when he featured against Real Madrid CF on Matchday 6.

Laurent Blanc is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 36 years and 339 days, having found the net for Manchester United FC in their 3-2 defeat of Olympiacos CFP on 23 October 2002.

Celestine Babayaro is the youngest player to have appeared in the UEFA Champions League. He was 16 years and 87 days when he started for RSC Anderlecht against FC Steaua Bucureşti on 23 November 1994. He was then sent off in the 37th minute.

Barcelona, Manchester United and Milan have all finished as group winners on ten occasions, one more than Real Madrid and Juventus.

Four teams have recorded six successive victories in a UEFA Champions League group stage: Milan (1992/93), Paris Saint-Germain FC (1994/95), FC Spartak Moskva (1995/96) and Barcelona (2002/03, first group stage).

In 2006/07, PFC Levski Sofia joined 1. FC Košice in being the only team to have played in the UEFA Champions League and never picked up a point. The Slovakian side have not returned to the competition since losing all six games in their only campaign to date in 1997/98. Six other teams have gone through a single group stage campaign without picking up a point: FC Dynamo Kyiv (2007/08), SK Rapid Wien (2005/06) and RSC Anderlecht (2004/05) plus Spartak Moskva and Bayer 04 Leverkusen (2002/03, first and second group stage respectively) and Fenerbahçe SK (2001/02, first group stage).

Manchester United scored 20 goals in the 1998/99 group stage, more than any other side has managed. Barcelona scored 19 times in the 1999/2000 first group stage.

Dynamo conceded 19 goals in their six outings in 2007/08, equalling the record let in during a group stage set by Ferencvárosi TC in the 1995/96 campaign.

No team has ever gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without conceding a goal. Milan (1992/93), AFC Ajax (1995/96), Juventus (1996/97 and 2004/05), Chelsea FC (2005/06), Liverpool FC (2005/06) and Villarreal CF (2005/06) all let in just one.

Before their 3-1 win against Sporting Clube de Portugal on Matchday 6 of the 2006/07 campaign, FC Spartak Moskva went 22 games without a victory in the competition, surpassing the unwanted record set by AEK Athens FC on Matchday 3 of the same campaign.

The lowest total for a team qualifying from the group stage is seven points. The first to do it, since three points for a win was introduced in 1995/96, were Legia Warszawa that same season before Bayer Leverkusen managed it in 1999/2000 and Liverpool in 2001/02. FC Lokomotiv Moskva and eventual finalists Juventus both progressed with seven points in 2002/03, a feat achieved by Rangers FC and Werder Bremen in 2005/06.
