ACF Fiorentina are looking for a third successive Group E win when they welcome a Debreceni VSC team who make a first trip to Italy knowing they must avoid defeat to prolong their first UEFA Champions League campaign.

- Fiorentina's first experience of Hungarian opposition since 1966/67 was a positive one on Matchday 3, Adrian Mutu scoring twice as the Viola found the net four times in the first half in Budapest to run out 4-3 victors. The result leaves the Italian side with six points, three behind section leaders Olympique Lyonnais but three above Liverpool FC.

- Péter Czvitkovics scored Debrecen's first group-stage goal in the first game between the sides, yet the Hungarian champions have now lost all three Group E games and cannot afford another reverse at the Stadio Artemio Franchi.

Match background

- While Debrecen had never met Italian opposition prior to this season, Fiorentina have faced Hungarian teams twice before, both in the UEFA Cup Winners' Cup in the 1960s.

- Fiorentina defeated Újpest FC both home and away in a 3-0 aggregate success in the 1961/62 semi-final – the first ever meeting between Italian and Hungarian teams in UEFA's club competitions. The holders failed to retain their trophy, however, losing to Club Atlético de Madrid in the final.

- The Viola then beat Györi ETO FC 1-0 in Florence in the first round of the same competition in 1966/67. That first-leg lead disappeared when they succumbed 4-2 in the return in the Hungarian capital.

- Fiorentina ended a five-game winless run at home in Europe with their 2-0 victory against Liverpool on Matchday 2.

- Qualifiers included, Debrecen have recorded two wins and two defeats so far on their travels in this season's competition.
- Hungarian sides have traditionally enjoyed little success in Italy down the years – recording two victories, four draws and 13 defeats on 19 previous visits.

Team ties

- Fiorentina coach Cesare Prandelli had his first taste of UEFA club competition against Hungarian opposition 30 years ago. As a 22-year-old with Juventus he made his European debut in a 2-0 home win against Győr in the 1979/80 UEFA Cup Winners' Cup first round, appearing again in the 2-1 return loss in Hungary. It was the only time that Prandelli faced a team from Hungary during his playing career.
- Fiorentina's Stevan Jovetić scored twice for Montenegro in a 3-3 friendly draw with Hungary at the Ferenc Puskás Stadium in Budapest on 20 August 2008. Debrecen's Zoltán Szélesi, László Bodnár and Gergely Rudolf all played for Hungary.
- Debrecen midfielder Tibor Dombi appeared as a substitute for Hungary in a 2-2 FIFA World Cup qualifying draw with Italy in Budapest in September 2000. Defender Bodnár featured in the return fixture in Parma in October 2001, which Italy won 1-0.
- Bodnár has also played against Italian opposition in the UEFA Champions League before, featuring in the FC Dynamo Kyiv side defeated 2-1 at home by Juventus in the 2002/03 group stage. He was an unused substitute when Dynamo lost 5-0 at Juventus in that same campaign.

- Cesare Prandelli replaced both full-backs who started the loss to Genoa CFC on 28 October, Lorenzo De Silvestri and Massimo Gobbi coming in for Gianluca Comotto and Manuel Pasqual. Marco Marchionni and Mario Santana were drafted in to support lone striker Alberto Gilardino, replacing injured pair Mutu and Stevan Jovetić.
- The win – Fiorentina's first in five league matches – came despite Dario Dainelli's dismissal just before half-time. Having equalised, Catania were also reduced to ten men themselves on 59 minutes.
- Prandelli became Fiorentina's longest-serving coach against Catania, his 204th game surpassing a mark set by Fulvio Bernardini – the man who led the Viola to their first Scudetto in 1956. Prandelli presided over a club record 100th win in all competitions as Fiorentina coach on 26 September when the Viola beat AS Livorno Calcio 1-0.
- Alessandro Gamberini's appearance was his 200th in Serie A – 78 with Bologna FC, 122 for Fiorentina.
- Prior to this season October had been the most profitable month for Prandelli as Fiorentina coach, the Viola earning 2.26 points per Serie A match compared to an average of 2.05. They mustered two points in four outings this time around.
- Marchionni has never scored more than five goals in one Serie A season – which he did for Parma FC in 2003/04 – but he has now struck three in two games. His first goal for the Viola was ultimately in vain, however, as Fiorentina lost 2-1 at Genoa, a match in which José Ignacio Castillo made his debut as an 82nd-minute substitute.
- It was Fiorentina's second successive Serie A loss having suffered their first home defeat of the season against SSC Napoli on 25 October, former Viola midfielder Christian Maggio scoring the only goal two minutes from time.
- Maggio's goal ended Fiorentina's run of 593 minutes without conceding at the Stadio Artemio Franchi, since 26 August and João Moutinho's strike for Sporting Clube de Portugal in the UEFA Champions League play-offs.
- Sébastien Frey has not missed a minute of the Viola's campaign.

- Jovetić has scored seven competitive goals this term for club and country, three more than he mustered in the whole of last season.
- For the first time since 1960/61, Fiorentina kept clean sheets in their first four home Serie A games this season.

- On 26 October Prandelli received the 'Giacinto Facchetti – Il Bello de Calcio' (the beauty of football) award, an accolade given by La Gazzetta dello Sport newspaper to those who respect the game's ethos.
- Viola supporters have written a song for Prandelli in which he is dubbed 'Il Mago di Orz' (the Wizard of Orz), a reference to his birthplace of Orzinuovi.
- Fiorentina signed Savio Nsereko from West Ham United FC in August but the German Under-20 international – yet to make his debut – is not in their UEFA Champions League squad.

- An added-time penalty, the fourth spot-kick of the match, condemned Debrecen to their second successive 1. Liga defeat. Having put András Herczeg's side ahead early on, Gergely Rudolf squandered the chance to double the lead when he missed his second penalty on 27 minutes.
- Debrecen had not lost back-to-back league matches since May 2004.
- Debrecen completed an 8-4 aggregate victory over second-tier Mezőkövesd-Zsóry SE on 28 October to reach the Hungarian Cup quarter-finals. Having won the first leg 4-1 six days earlier, two goals apiece from Dudu and László Rezes ensured comfortable progress for Herczeg's much-changed side as they won 4-3 on the night.
- Vinicius had scored twice in the away leg on 22 October, with Lóránt Oláh and Mirsad Mijadinovski also on target.
- On 25 October Debrecen lost their first league game since the opening day of the season, going down 3-0 at 1. Liga leaders FC Videoton.
- Debrecen have dropped eight points in six away games in the 1. Liga this term – they accrued 34 from a possible 45 on their travels last season.
- Of Debrecen's 20 goals this season 14 have come after half-time.
- Péter Szilágy scored the only goal as Debrecen beat Budapest Honvéd FC in the Hungarian Super Cup on 18 July.

Head coach

ACF Fiorentina: Cesare Prandelli

Date of birth: 19 August 1957

Nationality: Italian

Playing career: US Cremonese, Atalanta BC, Juventus

Coaching career: Atalanta BC, US Lecce, Hellas-Verona FC, AC Venezia, Parma FC, AS Roma, ACF Fiorentina

- Cesare Prandelli made his name as a promising coach in the prestigious youth system at Atalanta BC, the club where he finished his playing career in 1990 after three league titles with Juventus (1980-81, 1981-82, 1983-84).
- His six seasons in Turin also brought the 1983 Coppa Italia, the 1984 UEFA Cup Winners' Cup and the European Champion Clubs' Cup a year later, although he struggled to win a regular role.
- Having impressed at Atalanta, Prandelli accepted the head coach position at US Lecce in 1997 but resigned the following January with his side struggling in Serie A. He then earned promotion to the top flight with both Hellas-Verona FC and AC Venezia before further boosting his burgeoning reputation after moving to Parma FC in 2002.
- In 2004 Prandelli took over at AS Roma but soon left as wife Manuele – who sadly died in November 2007 – was seriously ill. He moved to ACF Fiorentina in 2005, leading them to a fourth-placed finish in his first season although they were subsequently stripped of their achievement for their part in Italy's sporting fraud trial.
- Prandelli guided the club to sixth in 2006/07 and earned a place in UEFA Champions League qualifying in each of the next two seasons. His achievements were recognised as he was awarded the 'Panchina d'Oro', for the best coach in Serie A, in 2008.

Debreceni VSC: András Herczeg

Coaching career: Debreceni VSC, Hungary Olympic team (as assistant), Tiszaújváros, Létavértes, Debrecen (as assistant), Debrecen

- András Herczeg has spent the majority of his career with Debreceni VSC, culminating in his steering the Hungarian club to the UEFA Champions League group stage for the first time at the start of 2009/10.
- Born in Gyongyos, Herczeg's long association with Debrecen stretches back to 1970, stepping up to the first team four years later and helping the club to the second division title in 1978/79.
- Herczeg hung up his boots in 1988 and spent the next decade working for Debrecen in various coaching capacities before leaving for a year as assistant coach to Hungary's Olympic team.
- Leaving that post in 1999, Herczeg returned to Debrecen and had stints with the club's youth team either side of spells in charge of Tiszaújváros and Létavértes.
- After two league titles as assistant to Attila Supka in 2005 and 2006, Herczeg's big break came when Miroslav Beránek left the club in 2007. He was an instant success, leading Debrecen to their third Hungarian Cup in 2008 and adding a fourth league title in five seasons a year later, although the crowning glory was to come at the start of the 2009/10 campaign.

- Manuel Mejuto González became only the third Spaniard to take charge of a European Champion Clubs' Cup final when he oversaw the 2004/05 showpiece between AC Milan and Liverpool FC.
- Still based in his place of birth, La Felguera in Asturias, Mejuto González is a civil employee who caught the officiating bug in his teens, moved into the Spanish first-division bracket in 1995 and was added to FIFA's international list in 1999.
- In 2001 he went to the FIFA U-20 World Cup in Argentina and ended up refereeing the final between the hosts and Ghana. A UEFA Intertoto Cup final followed the same year, as did his first UEFA Champions League group-stage appointment.
- Mejuto González remained in the limelight with a series of high-ranking appointments both at home – including RC Deportivo La Coruña's 2002 Spanish Cup final victory – and abroad, overseeing two group games at UEFA EURO 2004™.
- Dreams of adding the 2006 FIFA World Cup finals to his impressive CV were dashed when two of his assistants failed fitness tests. He was referee at two UEFA EURO 2008™ matches, however. Married with one son, his hobbies include reading, diving and music.

Competition facts

• **UEFA Champions League:** Group stage milestones

Holders FC Barcelona are looking to avoid becoming the first defending champions to fail to get through a group stage since the UEFA Champions League began. (This record, like the others, includes the seasons between 1999/00 and 2002/03 that featured a second group stage).

In 1992/93, Barcelona were the reigning European Champion Clubs' Cup holders and were beaten 4-3 on aggregate in the second round by PFC CSKA Moskva.

S.S. Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta became the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League in 2007/08 when he featured against Olympiacos CFP on Matchday 1 at the age of 43 years and 168 days. The record was previously held by Alessandro Costacurta, the AC Milan defender who played against AEK Athens FC in the 2006/07 season at the age of 40 years and 211 days. Ballotta was aged 43 years 252 days when he featured against Real Madrid CF on Matchday 6.

Laurent Blanc is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 36 years and 339 days, having found the net for Manchester United FC in their 3-2 defeat of Olympiacos CFP on 23 October 2002.

Celestine Babayaro is the youngest player to have appeared in the UEFA Champions League. He was 16 years and 87 days when he started for RSC Anderlecht against FC Steaua Bucureşti on 23 November 1994. He was then sent off in the 37th minute.

Barcelona, Manchester United and Milan have all finished as group winners on ten occasions, one more than Real Madrid and Juventus.

Four teams have recorded six successive victories in a UEFA Champions League group stage: Milan (1992/93), Paris Saint-Germain FC (1994/95), FC Spartak Moskva (1995/96) and Barcelona (2002/03, first group stage).

In 2006/07, PFC Levski Sofia joined 1. FC Košice in being the only team to have played in the UEFA Champions League and never picked up a point. The Slovakian side have not returned to the competition since losing all six games in their only campaign to date in 1997/98. Six other teams have gone through a single group stage campaign without picking up a point: FC Dynamo Kyiv (2007/08), SK Rapid Wien (2005/06) and RSC Anderlecht (2004/05) plus Spartak Moskva and Bayer 04 Leverkusen (2002/03, first and second group stage respectively) and Fenerbahçe SK (2001/02, first group stage).

Manchester United scored 20 goals in the 1998/99 group stage, more than any other side has managed. Barcelona scored 19 times in the 1999/2000 first group stage.

Dynamo conceded 19 goals in their six outings in 2007/08, equalling the record let in during a group stage set by Ferencvárosi TC in the 1995/96 campaign.

No team has ever gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without conceding a goal. Milan (1992/93), AFC Ajax (1995/96), Juventus (1996/97 and 2004/05), Chelsea FC (2005/06), Liverpool FC (2005/06) and Villarreal CF (2005/06) all let in just one.

Before their 3-1 win against Sporting Clube de Portugal on Matchday 6 of the 2006/07 campaign, FC Spartak Moskva went 22 games without a victory in the competition, surpassing the unwanted record set by AEK Athens FC on Matchday 3 of the same campaign.

The lowest total for a team qualifying from the group stage is seven points. The first to do it, since three points for a win was introduced in 1995/96, were Legia Warszawa that same season before Bayer Leverkusen managed it in 1999/2000 and Liverpool in 2001/02. FC Lokomotiv Moskva and eventual finalists Juventus both progressed with seven points in 2002/03, a feat achieved by Rangers FC and Werder Bremen in 2005/06.
