Arsenal FC's record against visitors from the Netherlands is in need of improvement and Arsène Wenger's side will be hoping to make positive strides on Matchday 4 as they welcome AZ Alkmaar to their home.

- The north London club looked set to take a firm grip on Group H in the reverse fixture on Matchday 3 when Cesc Fàbregas gave them a 36th-minute lead, only for David Mendes da Silva to volley an equaliser in the third minute of added time. The draw leaves Arsenal on seven points, one clear of Olympiacos FC and five above third-placed AZ.

Match background

- The game at the DS-Stadium was the teams' first-ever meeting.
- In seven competitive home games against Dutch opposition, Arsenal have only posted two victories. Four of the fixtures finished all-square with their only defeat coming in the first meeting – a European Champion Clubs' Cup quarter-final in 1971/72 when AFC Ajax won 1-0 at Highbury to complete a 3-1 aggregate triumph.
- AZ have lost all four previous games in England, conceding 12 goals. The most recent reverse was a 4-2 loss at Newcastle United FC in the 2006/07 UEFA Cup round of 16.
- After their 2-0 victory against Olympiacos on Matchday 2, Arsenal are looking for another long run of unbeaten home games in the competition. Their 3-1 home defeat by Manchester United FC in last season's semi-finals was the first time the Gunners had lost on their own territory in 24 matches in the competition proper, a run which stretched back to April 2004.
- It was also their first UEFA Champions League defeat at the Arsenal Stadium in 18 matches there, including qualifiers. Twelve of the first 17 ended in home wins.

Team ties

- AZ's Ronald Koeman is unbeaten as a coach against Arsenal, guiding Ajax to 1-1 home and 0-0 away draws against Wenger's Arsenal in the UEFA Champions League second group stage in February 2003.

- As PSV Eindhoven coach Koeman did even better against Arsenal, eliminating them in the 2006/07 first knockout round with a 1-0 home win followed by a 1-1 draw in London.
- The trip to north London will also stir pleasant memories for Koeman, whose extra-time free-kick at Wembley decided the 1992 European Champion Clubs' Cup final in favour of FC Barcelona, the first of the Catalan club's three titles.
- Arsenal centre-back Thomas Vermaelen and AZ's Gill Swerts, Maarten Martens, Moussa Dembele and Sebastien Pocognoli are team-mates in the Belgian national team.
- Similarly, the visitors' Stijn Schaars and Mendes da Silva have played with Robin van Persie for the Netherlands in qualifying for the 2010 FIFA World Cup.
- Van Persie played alongside Kew Jaliens in a UEFA EURO 2008™ qualifying tie against Slovenia in October 2007.
- Vermaelen made his Eredivisie debut for Koeman's Ajax – whom he left to join Arsenal this summer – on 15 February 2004 in an away game against FC Volendam.
- Swerts and Van Persie were team-mates at Feyenoord in 2003/04.
- While at Feyenoord Van Persie enjoyed two wins in three Eredivisie matches against AZ, scoring in a 4-1 away victory for the Rotterdam club in February 2003.
- Van Persie also struck for Feyenoord in the 1-1 draw against Koeman's Ajax in February 2003.
- As youngsters, Mounir El Hamdaoui and Van Persie played football together in Rotterdam.
- Andrei Arshavin appeared in FC Zenit St. Petersburg's 1-1 home draw against AZ in the 2007/08 UEFA Cup group stage.

- Arsenal have scored 297 goals in UEFA club competition.
- Matchday 3 was the London club's 49th draw in UEFA competition.

- Gaël Clichy and Robin van Persie are both within a booking of a one-match ban.

- The 162nd north London league derby was effectively settled by two Arsenal goals in a minute shortly before half-time, Bacary Sagna setting up Van Persie for a near-post finish and Cesc Fàbregas dispossessing Wilson Palacios and running through unchallenged to double the lead eleven seconds after the restart. Van Persie made it 3-0, again from a Sagna cross.
- Arsenal are yet to score in the first 15 minutes of any game this season.
- The Gunners are the English top flight's leading scorers with 32 goals in nine matches, although 13 goals conceded represents Arsenal's worst defensive record at this stage of the season in the Premier League era.
- The win means Arsène Wenger – who recalled Manuel Almunia in goal – has collected 1,000 league points as Arsenal manager.
- After seeing their seven-match winning run in all competitions ended at AZ on Matchday 3, Arsenal were held to a second successive draw on 25 October, letting a two-goal lead slip to draw 2-2 at West Ham United FC.
- Wenger marked his 750th game in charge of Arsenal with a 2-1 home win against Liverpool FC in the last 16 of the League Cup on 28 October thanks to goals from Fran Mérida and Nicklas Bendtner either side of Emiliano Insúa's equaliser for the visitors.

- Craig Eastmond made his first-team debut while Mérida's goal was his first for Arsenal in his tenth appearance. Łukasz Fabiański and Samir Nasri both made their first appearances of the season after injury.
- Arsenal will visit Manchester City FC in the League Cup quarter-finals in the week commencing 30 November.
- The 6-2 win against Blackburn Rovers FC on 4 October was the fifth time the Gunners have hit six in a league game this decade, the second this season following the opening-day 6-1 win at Everton FC. That triumph on Merseyside was the third time in Wenger's reign the Gunners have hit six in an away league fixture.

- Bendtner limped off shortly before half-time against Tottenham, with Wenger saying: "It was a serious one and we're going into a period where you need all your players. I am quite scared that he will be out for a while. It is a groin injury and it could be three or four weeks."
- Denilson is unlikely to return until late November because of a small fracture in his back.
- Djourou underwent surgery on 4 September and is not expected to be back until March.

Miscellaneous

- On 1 October Wenger became Arsenal's longest serving manager, celebrating 13 years at the club and eclipsing the previous record tenure of 4,748 days set by George Allison between 1934 and 1947.
- Van Persie became a father for the second time on 11 October when his wife Bouchra gave birth to a baby girl; Dina Layla.
- Gavin Hoyte joined third-tier side Brighton and Hove Albion FC on a one-month loan on 9 October.
- William Gallas, Sagna, Clichy and Abou Diaby will be hoping to appear when France play the Republic of Ireland in the FIFA World Cup play-offs on 14 and 18 November, while Andrei Arshavin's Russia take on Slovenia.

- Jeremain Lens marked his 50th appearance for AZ in style, coming off the bench to head the only goal of the game within five minutes of his introduction.
- Jaliens was serving a one-match ban while Mounir El Hamdaoui missed out with a pulled hamstring.
- It was only AZ's second win in eleven matches in all competitions over 90 minutes; they have lost six in that sequence.
- AZ lost 4-2 at home to coach Ronald Koeman's former club AFC Ajax on 25 October.
- The Ajax game marked Moussa Dembélé's 100th Eredivisie appearance for AZ, Sergio Romero's 50th.
- The Dutch titleholders have not drawn in the league since being held 1-1 by Ajax on 26 April, a run of 14 games.
- El Hamdaoui has scored seven goals in nine Eredivisie appearances this season and ten in his last 13 league games.

- On 28 October AZ booked a Dutch Cup last-16 meeting with Feyernoord on 22/23 December, although they needed extra time to see off amateur club SV Spakenburg. They eventually ran out 5-2 winners with 20-year-old Jonathas scoring on his debut.
- Before the Spakenburg game AZ had scored just seven goals in their previous eight fixtures.
- On 25 July AZ claimed the Super Cup for the first time with a 5-1 win against SC Heerenveen – the fixture's biggest margin of victory since 1991. El Hamdaoui, Brett Holman, Maarten Martens and Lens (2) were on target.

Miscellaneous

- Dirk Scheringa stepped down as AZ chairman on 29 October.
- AZ signed Rasmus Elm from Kalmar FF in August, although he is ineligible for the UEFA Champions League.
- On 23 September a side comprising first team and youth players defeated Liverpool FC's reserves 5-0 in Alkmaar, Milano Koenders, Nick van der Velden, Kees Luijckx, Lens and Morten Nielsen all scoring.
- David Mendes da Silva and Stijn Schaars have been named in the provisional Netherlands squad for the friendlies against Italy and Paraguay on 14 and 18 November.

- Not the most successful of players, Arsène Wenger has more than made up for that as a coach, turning Arsenal into one of Europe's top teams.
- Born in Strasbourg, Wenger worked at Strasbourg and Cannes before Nancy-Lorraine offered him his big break. He impressed sufficiently to be offered the job as coach of Monaco in 1987.
- Within a year Monaco scooped the French championship and Wenger the Coach of the Year award. After reportedly turning down France and FC Bayern München, he moved on to Japan and enjoyed tremendous success with Nagoya Grampus Eight.
- Appointed by Arsenal in September 1996, Wenger became the first non-Briton to win the Premier League in 1998, adding the first of four FA Cup triumphs. The Gunners lost the 2000 UEFA Cup final to Galatasaray SK but claimed another double in 2002, and in 2004 played some thrilling attacking football en route to becoming the first team since 1889 to negotiate a top-flight season unbeaten.
- Wenger nearly topped all his achievements by taking Arsenal to the 2006 UEFA Champions League final, only for FC Barcelona to come from behind to win 2-1. Arsenal's move to their new stadium later that year was also instigated by Wenger.

- As a player he won a Dutch title and cup with Ajax; two Dutch championships, two cups and the 1987/88 European Champion Clubs' Cup with PSV; four Spanish titles, one Copa del Rey and the 1991/92 European Cup – scoring the winner in the final – with Barça.
- After spells as assistant coach with the Netherlands and Barça, Koeman impressed in sole command at Vitesse and won a Dutch double at Ajax in his first season, 2001/02, and a second title two years later.
- Won another Dutch title with PSV in 2006/07 while the 2007/08 Spanish Cup was the highlight of his spell at Valencia.
- Replaced FC Bayern München-bound Louis van Gaal as coach of Dutch champions AZ in summer of 2009.

- Having started refereeing in 1982, Alain Hamer was taking charge of top-flight matches in his native Luxembourg before the turn of the next decade and has worked at the highest UEFA level since 2002.
- A bank manager from Waldbillig, he was awarded his FIFA badge in 1993 and went on to form part of the refereeing teams at the 1995 FIFA Women's World Cup, 1998 UEFA European Under-21 Championship and 2001 FIFA U-20 World Cup.
- In addition to covering league games in his homeland, Hamer also experienced domestic football in France and Belgium. Back home, he was established at the top of the refereeing tree at the age of 34, with the 1999 Luxembourg Cup final his first major domestic appointment.

Competition facts

• **UEFA Champions League:** Group stage milestones

Holders FC Barcelona are looking to avoid becoming the first defending champions to fail to get through a group stage since the UEFA Champions League began. (This record, like the others, includes the seasons between 1999/00 and 2002/03 that featured a second group stage).

In 1992/93, Barcelona were the reigning European Champion Clubs' Cup holders and were beaten 4-3 on aggregate in the second round by PFC CSKA Moskva.

S.S. Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta became the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League in 2007/08 when he featured against Olympiacos CFP on Matchday 1 at the age of 43 years and 168 days. The record was previously held by Alessandro Costacurta, the AC Milan defender who played against AEK Athens FC in the 2006/07 season at the age of 40 years and 211 days. Ballotta was aged 43 years 252 days when he featured against Real Madrid CF on Matchday 6.

Laurent Blanc is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 36 years and 339 days, having found the net for Manchester United FC in their 3-2 defeat of Olympiacos CFP on 23 October 2002.

Celestine Babayaro is the youngest player to have appeared in the UEFA Champions League. He was 16 years and 87 days when he started for RSC Anderlecht against FC Steaua Bucureşti on 23 November 1994. He was then sent off in the 37th minute.

Barcelona, Manchester United and Milan have all finished as group winners on ten occasions, one more than Real Madrid and Juventus.

Four teams have recorded six successive victories in a UEFA Champions League group stage: Milan (1992/93), Paris Saint-Germain FC (1994/95), FC Spartak Moskva (1995/96) and Barcelona (2002/03, first group stage).

In 2006/07, PFC Levski Sofia joined 1. FC Košice in being the only team to have played in the UEFA Champions League and never picked up a point. The Slovakian side have not returned to the competition since losing all six games in their only campaign to date in 1997/98. Six other teams have gone through a single group stage campaign without picking up a point: FC Dynamo Kyiv (2007/08), SK Rapid Wien (2005/06) and RSC Anderlecht (2004/05) plus Spartak Moskva and Bayer 04 Leverkusen (2002/03, first and second group stage respectively) and Fenerbahçe SK (2001/02, first group stage).

Manchester United scored 20 goals in the 1998/99 group stage, more than any other side has managed. Barcelona scored 19 times in the 1999/2000 first group stage.

Dynamo conceded 19 goals in their six outings in 2007/08, equalling the record let in during a group stage set by Ferencvárosi TC in the 1995/96 campaign.

No team has ever gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without conceding a goal. Milan (1992/93), AFC Ajax (1995/96), Juventus (1996/97 and 2004/05), Chelsea FC (2005/06), Liverpool FC (2005/06) and Villarreal CF (2005/06) all let in just one.

Before their 3-1 win against Sporting Clube de Portugal on Matchday 6 of the 2006/07 campaign, FC Spartak Moskva went 22 games without a victory in the competition, surpassing the unwanted record set by AEK Athens FC on Matchday 3 of the same campaign.

The lowest total for a team qualifying from the group stage is seven points. The first to do it, since three points for a win was introduced in 1995/96, were Legia Warszawa that same season before Bayer Leverkusen managed it in 1999/2000 and Liverpool in 2001/02. FC Lokomotiv Moskva and eventual finalists Juventus both progressed with seven points in 2002/03, a feat achieved by Rangers FC and Werder Bremen in 2005/06.
