FC Bayern München go into their Matchday 5 fixture against Maccabi Haifa FC with their destiny no longer in their own hands.

- After home-and-away defeats by FC Girondins de Bordeaux, Louis van Gaal's men have slipped to third in Group A – four points behind second-placed Juventus. All they can do now is defeat Haifa and hope that Juventus fail to beat Bordeaux in the other group game in France.

- Haifa travel to Bavaria still seeking their first points after their own successive losses to Juventus left them out of the running at the foot of the table. Four points adrift, they retain a slim hope of finishing third and claiming entry into the UEFA Europa League but must beat Bayern to keep that ambition alive.

Previous meeting

- Bayern won the teams' first ever encounter at the Ramat Gan Stadium on Matchday 1, prevailing 3-0 through goals from Daniel Van Buyten (64) and Thomas Müller (85, 88).

Match background

- Bayern go into the match looking for the first home goal of their campaign, having recorded blanks in a stalemate with Juventus and a 2-0 loss to Bordeaux.

- Elisha Levi's visitors have even bigger problems in front of goal – they are the only team of the 32 participating in the group stage yet to find the opposition net.

- Bayern have made it through to the last 16 in their five previous attempts. The last time they failed to do so was in 2002/03 when they finished bottom of their group with just two points.

- The Bundesliga club will hope for a repeat of their one previous home encounter with Israeli opposition – a 5-1 UEFA Champions League victory against Maccabi Tel-Aviv FC on 23 November 2004. Claudio Pizarro, Hasan Salihamidžić,

Torsten Frings and Roy Makaay (2) found the net that night for a Bayern side that included current squad member Bastian Schweinsteiger with Martín Demichelis and Michael Rensing unused substitutes.

- Haifa's only previous visit to Germany brought a 2-1 loss at Bayer 04 Leverkusen in the 2002/03 group stage. Nenad Pralija scored the goal for a Haifa team that featured both Alon Harazi and Yaniv Katan, the latter as a substitute, with Bayern custodian Hans-Jörg Butt then keeping goal for Leverkusen.

- Haifa, who also lost at home to Leverkusen, eventually finished third in that maiden group-stage campaign.

Team ties

- Bayern's Miroslav Klose scored a 15-minute hat-trick against Israel in a 7-1 victory for Germany in Kaiserslautern in February 2002.
- Harazi and Haifa's technical manager Adoram Keisi both featured in that Israel team, Keisi starting at left-back and Harazi coming on as a late substitute.
- Bayern's Philipp Lahm, Mario Gómez, Schweinsteiger and Klose appeared for Germany in a 2-0 win against a South Africa side that included Haifa defender Tsepo Masilela in a friendly in Leverkusen in September this year. Gómez scored the opening goal.
- Bayern duo Ivica Olić and Danijel Pranjić helped Croatia earn a 1-0 home win against an Israel side featuring Haifa's Nir Davidovitch and Eyal Meshumar in qualifying for UEFA EURO 2008™.
- The last Israeli club side to visit Germany were Hapoel Tel-Aviv FC, who lost 4-2 at Hamburger SV in a UEFA Europa League group-stage game last month.

- Louis van Gaal made one change to the side held 1-1 at home to FC Schalke 04 on 7 November, Miroslav Klose replacing the injured Luca Toni. Hamit Altintop had been due to start ahead of Klose but suffered a knock during the warm-up.
- Bayern have now gone three home games without a win in all competitions, their worst run since a sequence of four draws in November/December 2001.
- The result also extended Bayern's winless run to four matches home and away, their most barren sequence since a similar spell between December 2006 and February 2007.
- Gómez's strike was his first in 14 games for club and country, since scoring in the 5-0 German Cup victory over SC Rot-Weiss Oberhausen on 22 September.
- Bayern had not scored in the opening 24 minutes of a league game this season before Sunday.
- Alexander Baumjohann made his first appearance since the opening day of the season as a late substitute.
- Bayern had won their previous nine league meetings with Leverkusen, the only unbeaten team in the Bundesliga.
- Bayern are seventh in the Bundesliga after 13 matches; their worst position at this stage since 1994/95 when they occupied the same place.
- Van Buyten's goal in the draw against Schalke was the defender's sixth in all competitions for Bayern this term. Only Müller and Gómez, with seven, have scored more.
- Bayern took two points from their opening three Bundesliga games, their worst start to a season for 43 years.

- Van Gaal's charges will be at home to SpVgg Greuther Fürth in the German Cup quarter-finals on 10 February.

- Ribéry missed France's successful FIFA World Cup play-off against the Republic of Ireland after failing to shake off a persistent knee problem. Van Gaal said: "The injury keeps coming back. We have to get rid of it completely before he returns to the side."
- Robben sat out the Netherlands' friendlies against Italy and Paraguay because of ongoing concerns about his knee.

- Haifa have conceded 46 goals in the European Champion Clubs' Cup to date.

- Haifa are the only team yet to score in this season's group stage. Only once has a team gone through the group stage without registering – RC Deportivo La Coruña in 2004/05.
- Baram Kayal is available again after a two-game suspension while Tiago Dutra will complete his two-match ban against Bayern. Gustavo Boccoli, Jhon Jairo Culma and Ali Osman are all within a booking of a ban.

- Haifa extended their 100 per cent start to the Ligat Ha'Al season to ten games as Elisha Levi marked his 200th match as a top-flight coach in style.

- The Israeli titleholders won their opening eleven fixtures in 2005/06.
- Defender Talb Tawatha, 17, made his debut as a half-time substitute. He is known at the club as 'The Prince'.
- Haifa are 22 matches unbeaten in Ligat Ha'Al since a 1-0 defeat at Hapoel Ironi Kiryat Shmona FC on 28 February.
- Arbeitman has now scored ten league goals this season and was also on target when Haifa earned a 1-0 win at FC Ashdod on 9 November.
- The Ashdod victory was Haifa's first clean sheet away from home in the league this season.
- On 16 November Levi's men sealed progress to the Israeli League Cup quarter-finals after a second goalless draw with Hapoel Beer-Sheva FC in five days guaranteed them a top-two place in their group with a game to spare.
- Nir Davidovitch has played every minute of Haifa's league campaign.
- Vladimer Dvalishvili has scored seven goals in his last eleven games for club and country.
- Eyal Golasa has scored four goals this season. He mustered just one in 37 competitive games for club and country last term.

- Alon Harazi – who has featured in more UEFA club competition matches (65) than any other Israeli player – will retire at the end of Haifa's European campaign.
- Having made his debut against Beitar Jerusalem FC on 4 November 1995, Davidovitch celebrated 14 years in the Haifa first team a day after the visit of Juventus.

Head coach

FC Bayern München: Louis van Gaal

Date of birth: August 8 1951

Nationality: Dutch

Playing career: AFC Ajax, R. Antwerp FC, Stormvogels Telstar, Sparta Rotterdam, AZ Alkmaar

Coaching career: AFC Ajax, FC Barcelona (twice), Netherlands, AZ Alkmaar, FC Bayern München

- Having never made it beyond the reserve team at his first club, Ajax, Van Gaal spent most of his playing career as a Sparta midfielder, retiring in 1987 after a season with AZ, where he started his coaching career as an assistant.
- Took on a similar coaching role at hometown club Ajax, under Leo Beenhakker, from 1988 to 1991 before moving up to the top job on his mentor's departure.
- Had six glorious years at Ajax, winning three Eredivisie titles, a Dutch Cup, the 1992 UEFA Cup and the 1995 UEFA Champions League; defended that title in 1996 all the way to a penalty shoot-out defeat by Juventus in the final. Was awarded an Order of the Oranje-Nassau in 1997 and made a knight.
- Moved to Spain the same year for a three-season stint at Barcelona, winning two Liga titles and a Copa del Rey. Became Netherlands coach in 2000 in an unsuccessful bid to qualify the Oranje for the 2002 FIFA World Cup. Returned briefly to Barça before a spell out of coaching.
- Took over at Alkmaar in 2005, steering them to their first Eredivisie title since 1981 in April 2009. Appointed coach of Bayern a month later, as a replacement for caretaker Jupp Heynckes.

Maccabi Haifa FC: Elisha Levi

Date of birth: 18 November 1957

Nationality: Israeli

Playing career: Hapoel Beit She'an FC (twice), Maccabi Haifa FC, Maccabi Petach-Tikva FC

Coaching career: Hapoel Beit She'an FC (twice), Maccabi Herzliya FC, Hapoel Tzafiririm Holon FC, Hapoel Ironi Rishon LeZion FC, Hapoel Kfar-Saba FC (twice), FC Ashdod, Bnei Sakhnin FC, Maccabi Haifa FC

- One of Israel's most experienced coaches, Elisha Levi enjoyed perhaps his finest moment at the start of 2009/10 when he guided Maccabi Haifa FC into the UEFA Champions League group stage.
- Levi joined hometown club Hapoel Beit She'an FC aged eleven and stepped up to the first team in 1974, signing for Maccabi Haifa in 1982. A season later the midfielder joined Maccabi Petach-Tikva FC, where he spent four years prior to returning to Beit She'an, hanging up his boots in 1989.
- Levi promptly took over as head coach, leading the club to successive promotions from the third to the first division in 1993 and 1994 and avoiding relegation on the final day of the 1994/95 season with a 3-2 win against Maccabi Haifa that denied his future employers the title.
- Levi went on to coach a number of clubs, enjoying particular success at Hapoel Ironi Rishon LeZion FC and FC Ashdod, securing a fourth-placed Premier League finish with the latter in 2001.
- Promotions to the top flight with both Hapoel Kfar-Saba FC (2005) and Bnei Sakhnin FC (2007) prompted a chance at Maccabi Haifa in 2008. Levi was an instant hit, winning the league in his first season.

• Craig Thomson has put the judgement he has acquired as a lawyer to good use to become a promising international referee.

• Thomson, who has been officiating since the age of 16 and counts golf, reading and cinema among his hobbies, made his first foray into international refereeing in spring 2003 when he took charge of two UEFA European Under-19 Championship Elite round fixtures.

• That September he refereed his first competitive U21 game and stepped up to the UEFA Champions League first qualifying round in summer 2004. Thomson made his FIFA World Cup qualifying debut in September 2004 and also featured in UEFA EURO 2008™ qualifying, subsequently acting as fourth official in three group matches at the final tournament.

• He officiated at three UEFA Cup matches in 2006/07 and took charge of two games at the 2007 UEFA European U21 Championship finals before making his UEFA Champions League group-stage debut when Rosenborg BK played Valencia CF in October 2007.

• Thomson also worked at the FIFA U-17 World Cup in the Korea Republic the same year, although his career highlights remain two 'Old Firm' games between Celtic FC and Rangers FC, the 2006/07 Scottish League Cup final and the 2009 Scottish Cup final.

• **UEFA Champions League:** Group stage milestones

Holders FC Barcelona are looking to avoid becoming the first defending champions to fail to get through a group stage since the UEFA Champions League began. (This record, like the others, includes the seasons between 1999/00 and 2002/03 that featured a second group stage).

In 1992/93, Barcelona were the reigning European Champion Clubs' Cup holders and were beaten 4-3 on aggregate in the second round by PFC CSKA Moskva.

S.S. Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta became the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League in 2007/08 when he featured against Olympiacos CFP on Matchday 1 at the age of 43 years and 168 days. The record was previously held by Alessandro Costacurta, the AC Milan defender who played against AEK Athens FC in the 2006/07 season at the age of 40 years and 211 days. Ballotta was aged 43 years 252 days when he featured against Real Madrid CF on Matchday 6.

Laurent Blanc is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 36 years and 339 days, having found the net for Manchester United FC in their 3-2 defeat of Olympiacos CFP on 23 October 2002.

Celestine Babayaro is the youngest player to have appeared in the UEFA Champions League. He was 16 years and 87 days when he started for RSC Anderlecht against FC Steaua Bucureşti on 23 November 1994. He was then sent off in the 37th minute.

Barcelona, Manchester United and Milan have all finished as group winners on ten occasions, one more than Real Madrid and Juventus.

Four teams have recorded six successive victories in a UEFA Champions League group stage: Milan (1992/93), Paris Saint-Germain FC (1994/95), FC Spartak Moskva (1995/96) and Barcelona (2002/03, first group stage).

In 2006/07, PFC Levski Sofia joined 1. FC Košice in being the only team to have played in the UEFA Champions League and never picked up a point. The Slovakian side have not returned to the competition since losing all six games in their only campaign to date in 1997/98. Six other teams have gone through a single group stage campaign without picking up a point: FC Dynamo Kyiv (2007/08), SK Rapid Wien (2005/06) and RSC Anderlecht (2004/05) plus Spartak Moskva and Bayer 04 Leverkusen (2002/03, first and second group stage respectively) and Fenerbahçe SK (2001/02, first group stage).

Manchester United scored 20 goals in the 1998/99 group stage, more than any other side has managed. Barcelona scored 19 times in the 1999/2000 first group stage.

Dynamo conceded 19 goals in their six outings in 2007/08, equalling the record let in during a group stage set by Ferencvárosi TC in the 1995/96 campaign.

No team has ever gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without conceding a goal. Milan (1992/93), AFC Ajax (1995/96), Juventus (1996/97 and 2004/05), Chelsea FC (2005/06), Liverpool FC (2005/06) and Villarreal CF (2005/06) all let in just one.

Before their 3-1 win against Sporting Clube de Portugal on Matchday 6 of the 2006/07 campaign, FC Spartak Moskva went 22 games without a victory in the competition, surpassing the unwanted record set by AEK Athens FC on Matchday 3 of the same campaign.

The lowest total for a team qualifying from the group stage is seven points. The first to do it, since three points for a win was introduced in 1995/96, were Legia Warszawa that same season before Bayer Leverkusen managed it in 1999/2000 and Liverpool in 2001/02. FC Lokomotiv Moskva and eventual finalists Juventus both progressed with seven points in 2002/03, a feat achieved by Rangers FC and Werder Bremen in 2005/06.
