During his three seasons in charge of Chelsea FC, José Mourinho was unable to lead them to the UEFA Champions League title and as coach of FC Internazionale Milano he is now aiming to end his former side's hopes of realising their dream.

- The tie also holds great resonance for Mourinho's opposite number, Carlo Ancelotti, who makes a swift return to the city where for eight years he held the reins at Inter's fierce rivals AC Milan, twice guiding the Rossoneri to UEFA Champions League glory.

Previous meetings

• Although this is the first time the clubs have met in UEFA competition they did lock horns last summer in a pre-season friendly in the United States. Chelsea won 2-0 thanks to goals from Didier Drogba and a Frank Lampard penalty.

Match background

• Inter have lost in the first knockout round in the last three seasons, being eliminated by English opposition for the last two years. The Italian champions lost 2-0 on aggregate to Manchester United FC in 2008/09, the first leg in Milan ending goalless.

• That stalemate continued the Italian side's poor home run against English visitors, Arsenal FC winning 5-1 at San Siro in the 2003/04 group stage before Liverpool FC's 1-0 triumph that completed a 3-0 aggregate success in the 2007/08 first knockout round. Inter have lost four of their last five matches against English sides, home and away.

• Chelsea visited Italy twice last season, losing 3-1 at AS Roma in the group stage before a 2-2 draw at Juventus in the first knockout round completed a 3-2 aggregate win.

• In knockout contests against Serie A sides Chelsea have two triumphs from two ties but have won only once in six visits to Italy, a 4-0 group-stage success at S.S. Lazio in 2003/04. The London side's only previous visit to San Siro ended in a 1-1 draw against Milan in the 1999/2000 first group stage.

• That campaign was the first time Chelsea had reached the last eight of the competition although they have competed in the semi-finals in four of the last five seasons. Only once (2007/08) have they made it to the final with two of their semi-final defeats coming during Mourinho's tenure – in 2005 and 2007, Liverpool their conquerors each time.

• Mourinho's Inter won only two games in finishing second in Group F, two points behind FC Barcelona. Just one of those came in San Siro, against FC Rubin Kazan.

• Chelsea topped Group D with 14 points, remaining unbeaten and winning twice on their travels, against APOEL FC and eventual runners-up FC Porto. Since a 2-1 defeat at Fenerbahçe SK in the 2007/08 quarter-final first leg Chelsea have played ten away games – not including their defeat on penalties in the 2008 final in Moscow against Manchester United FC – drawing six with three wins and just that one defeat, at Roma.

Team ties

• While in charge of Milan, Ancelotti won ten of 18 competitive games against Inter, losing five. Two of the three draws were in the 2002/03 UEFA Champions League semi-final, Milan progressing on away goals after drawing 1-1 in Inter's home leg and going on to lift the trophy to give Ancelotti his first UEFA Champions League crown as a coach.

• Ancelotti got the better of Mourinho in the 2003 UEFA Super Cup when Milan beat Porto 1-0. Honours were even when the pair went head to head in Serie A last season, Milan and Inter each winning their home game.

• Ancelotti scored against Inter in a 4-3 home win for Roma on 12 May 1985.

• Samuel Eto'o and Juliano Belletti scored the Barcelona goals which enabled them to come from behind to beat Ashley Cole's Arsenal 2-1 in the 2006 UEFA Champions League final.

• In last season's semi-finals, Eto'o helped Barça overcome Chelsea on away goals after a 1-1 aggregate draw.

• Ricardo Quaresma played on loan for Chelsea in 2009 but made only one starting appearance.

• Ricardo Carvalho and Deco won the UEFA Cup in 2003 and the UEFA Champions League a year later at Porto under Mourinho. José Bosingwa was also a member of the 2004 squad.

• Thiago Motta and Eto'o were team-mates of Deco and Belletti at Barcelona.

• Marco Materazzi scored in the 2006 FIFA World Cup final for Italy as they defeated France on penalties. Chelsea's Florent Malouda was fouled by Materazzi for the penalty which gave France an early lead.

• Didier Drogba scored for Marseille in a 1-0 home win against Inter in the 2004 UEFA Cup quarter-finals. Francesco Toldo, Iván Córdoba and Javier Zanetti all featured over the two legs for the Nerazzurri.

• Sulley Muntari spent 2007/08 with Portsmouth FC, helping them lift the FA Cup. He played in the 1-0 league defeat at Stamford Bridge against Chelsea and is a team-mate of Michael Essien for Ghana.

• Branislav Ivanović and Dejan Stanković play together for Serbia.

• John Terry, Lampard and Joe Cole all played for England in a 3-2 friendly victory against Argentina in November 2005. Inter trio Zanetti, Walter Samuel and Esteban Cambiasso appeared for their opponents.

- The Italian titleholders' victory against FC Rubin Kazan on Matchday 6 was their 150th in UEFA competition.
- Samuel Eto'o's goal was Inter's 200th in the European Champion Clubs' Cup and their 450th in UEFA competition.

- Inter have won only 12 corners, the lowest total among the sides in the first knockout round.
- Cristian Chivu served a one-game ban on Matchday 6. Walter Samuel, Maicon, Lucio and Javier Zanetti are all within a booking of a suspension.

- Centre-backs Walter Samuel (31 minutes) and Iván Córdoba (38) were both sent off as Inter earned a point at San Siro. Sampdoria ended with ten men after Giampaolo Pazzini was shown a second yellow card (73).
- Inter's third successive draw, the Nerazzurri have now gone 211 minutes without scoring. The Nerazzurri had won their last nine games at San Siro before Saturday's draw.
- The Italian titleholders are 36 matches unbeaten at home in all competitions, since a 1-0 loss to Panathinaikos FC in the UEFA Champions League group stage on 26 November 2008, but have won just once in their last seven away games in all competitions.
- Mourinho has not lost a home league fixture since 23 February 2002 when SC Beira-Mar beat his FC Porto side 3-2, 130 games ago.
- Inter have conceded just one goal in five outings and kept clean sheets in eight of their last 12 games.
- Inter's victory against Rubin on Matchday 6 was the start of a 14-match unbeaten run for the Nerazzurri, including nine wins. They have extended their advantage at the Serie A summit and advanced to the Coppa Italia semi-finals, where they beat ACF Fiorentina 1-0 in the first leg. The away leg takes place on 14 April.
- Diego Milito has scored 38 goals in 54 Serie A games for the Nerazzurri (14 in 23) and Genoa CFC (24 in 31).
- Zanetti has not missed a Serie A game since 28 October 2006, a run of 156 consecutive matches.

- Inter dominated the Oscar del Calcio ceremony on 18 January. Former forward Zlatan Ibrahimović was named best player and best foreign player of the year, Júlio César took goalkeeping honours, Milito won the fan award and Mourinho received the gong for best coach.

- Chelsea took full advantage of Manchester United FC's defeat at Everton earlier on Saturday to extend their advantage at the Premier League summit to four points.
- Didier Drogba has scored six goals in five outings since returning from Africa Cup of Nations duty. He has registered 25 times in 29 games for Chelsea this term, already his second best haul in six seasons at Stamford Bridge. The 31-year-old hit 33 goals in 60 appearances in 2006/07.
- The Blues are unbeaten in 20 home games this season, winning 18 including the last seven. They have scored 60 goals at Stamford Bridge, conceding 11.
- Chelsea had been in imperious form since Matchday 6, losing only one of 15 fixtures in all competitions.
- The 2-1 defeat at Everton on 10 February was Chelsea's fourth in the Premier League this season – all away – and ended a ten-game unbeaten league run.
- Chelsea have scored at least twice in 23 of their last 31 Premier League matches.
- Chelsea will play Manchester City FC or Stoke City FC in the FA Cup quarter-finals at Stamford Bridge on 7 March.

- Four Chelsea players were on Africa Cup of Nations in January. Drogba and Salomon Kalou made three appearances, each scoring once, as Ivory Coast reached the quarter-finals; John Mikel Obi played all six games as Nigeria finished third and Essien made one appearance for runners-up Ghana.

- A former teacher, he worked as a translator for Sporting Clube de Portugal coach Sir Bobby Robson in the 1990s, eventually following the Englishman to Porto and Barcelona as a coaching assistant.
- As coach, had a nine-game spell at Benfica and a highly successful tenure at Leiria before getting his big break with Porto in January 2002.
- In his first full season, 2002/03, Porto won the UEFA Cup and a domestic double. The next year they retained their league title and claimed the UEFA Champions League with a 3-0 defeat of AS Monaco FC in the final in Gelsenkirchen.
- Joined Chelsea in 2004 as successor to Claudio Ranieri and led the club to their first league championship for 50 years and the League Cup in his first season. Followed up with the league title again in 2006, and both the League Cup and FA Cup in 2007.
- Left Chelsea by mutual agreement in September 2007 and stayed out of football until joining Inter in June 2008. His first campaign saw the Nerazzurri retain their Serie A title but they bowed out to eventual finalists Manchester United FC in the UEFA Champions League first knockout round.

- One of only six people – the others being Miguel Muñoz, Giovanni Trapattoni, Johan Cruyff, Frank Rijkaard and Josep Guardiola – to have lifted the European Champion Clubs' Cup as both a player and coach.
- A combative midfielder, he helped Roma win the 1983 Serie A title and four Italian Cups before joining Milan in 1986 where he added two more league championships, as well as back-to-back European Cup triumphs in 1989 and 1990, to his tally.
- Began coaching in 1995 with a year at Reggiana, earning them promotion from Serie B, before spending two seasons at Parma. Replaced Marcello Lippi at Juventus in February 1999 and returned to San Siro as coach of Milan in 2001.
- Took Milan back to the top during an eight-year spell, winning the UEFA Champions League in 2003 and 2007, but losing the 2005 final on penalties to Liverpool FC after leading 3-0. Milan also won a Serie A title, a Coppa Italia and the 2007 FIFA World Club Cup.
- Resigned on 31 May and was named as Chelsea's new manager the following day.

- Manuel Mejuto González became only the third Spaniard to take charge of a European Champion Clubs' Cup final when he oversaw the 2004/05 showpiece between AC Milan and Liverpool FC.
- Still based in his place of birth, La Felguera in Asturias, Mejuto González is a civil employee who caught the officiating bug in his teens, moved into the Spanish first-division bracket in 1995 and was added to FIFA's international list in 1999.
- In 2001 he went to the FIFA U-20 World Cup in Argentina and ended up refereeing the final between the hosts and Ghana. A UEFA Intertoto Cup final followed the same year, as did his first UEFA Champions League group-stage appointment.
- Mejuto González remained in the limelight with a series of high-ranking appointments both at home – including RC Deportivo La Coruña's 2002 Spanish Cup final victory – and abroad, overseeing two group games at UEFA EURO 2004™.
- Dreams of adding the 2006 FIFA World Cup finals to his impressive CV were dashed when two of his assistants failed fitness tests. He was referee at two UEFA EURO 2008™ matches, however. Married with one son, his hobbies include reading, diving and music.

Competition facts

UEFA Champions League knockout stage: Did you know?

- Teams have recovered from a first-leg deficit to go through to the next stage on 21 occasions, although only once – AFC Ajax's defeat of Panathinaikos FC in the 1995/96 semi-finals – has a side gone through after losing the first leg at home. The biggest losing margin a side has overturned was achieved by RC Deportivo La Coruña in the 2003/04 quarter-finals when they fought back from a 4-1 defeat at AC Milan to win 4-0 at home.
- Seventeen ties have been decided on the away goals rule, including five where the triumphant team lost the first leg.
- FC Bayern München hold the record for the biggest first-leg lead with a 5-0 success at Sporting Clube de Portugal in the 2008/09 first knockout round, eventually going through 12-1 after a 7-1 home victory in the second leg.
- Ten ties have now gone to penalties, including the game between Arsenal FC and AS Roma in the 2008/09 first knockout round. Five of these were finals – 1996, 2001, 2003, 2005 and 2008. The first two-legged tie decided on spot-kicks was PSV Eindhoven's 4-2 win against Olympique Lyonnais on 13 April 2005 after a 2-2 aggregate draw.
- In all, 17 ties have required extra time. So far seven have been decided by extra time alone: four quarter-finals, two first knockout round encounters and the 2007/08 semi-final between Chelsea FC and Liverpool FC.
- The 2008/09 last-16 encounter between Bayern and Sporting featured more goals (13) over its two legs than any previous UEFA Champions League knockout tie, Bayern prevailing 12-1.
- There has never been a knockout tie ending goalless after two legs. Nine have finished 1-0 on aggregate, most recently Manchester United FC's narrow victory against FC Barcelona in the 2007/08 semi-finals.
- Teams from the same country have contested the final on three previous occasions. Real Madrid CF overcame Valencia CF 3-0 in Paris in 2000. Three years later Milan defeated Juventus 3-2 on penalties after a goalless draw at Old Trafford, and United beat Chelsea, also on spot-kicks, after a 1-1 draw in Moscow in May 2008.
- Clarence Seedorf is the only player to win the European Champion Clubs' Cup with three clubs (Ajax 1995, Madrid 1998, Milan 2003, 2007). Liverpool's Bob Paisley (1977, 1978, 1981) is the only coach to win three times.
- Ottmar Hitzfeld (BV Borussia Dortmund 1997, Bayern 2001) and Ernst Happel (Feyenoord 1970, Hamburger SV 1983) are the only coaches to win the trophy with two clubs.
- Only five capital cities have been home to teams that have won the European Cup: Madrid (Real Madrid), Belgrade (FK Crvena Zvezda), Bucharest (FC Steaua București), Amsterdam (Ajax) and Lisbon (SL Benfica).
- S.S. Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta is the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League having been aged 43 years 252 days when he featured against Real Madrid CF on Matchday 6 of the 2007/08 competition.
- Laurent Blanc is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 36 years and 339 days, in Manchester United's 3-2 defeat of Olympiacos FC on 23 October 2002.
- Celestine Babayaro is the youngest player to have appeared in the UEFA Champions League. He was 16 years and 87 days when he started for RSC Anderlecht against Steaua on 23 November 1994. He was then sent off in the 37th minute.
