FC Girondins de Bordeaux won all three home games in the group stage, conceding just a single goal, formidable statistics for Olympiacos FC to try and overcome as they seek to turn round a first-leg deficit in their UEFA Champions League first knockout round tie.

- The French champions earned a sixth successive victory in the competition with a 1-0 triumph in Piraeus on 23 February thanks to Michaël Ciani's header in first-half added time. It was the fourth successive UEFA Champions League match in which Bordeaux had kept a clean sheet.

Match background

- Bordeaux were the most successful side in the group stage with five wins and a draw. The only points dropped came in a 1-1 draw at Juventus on Matchday 1 while two goals conceded was also the best record of the 32 competing teams.

- The other goal to count against Laurent Blanc's team came in the home game with FC Bayern München which finished 2-1 in their favour. The French champions won their other two home games, against Maccabi Haifa FC (1-0) and Juventus (2-0) respectively.

- This is the first time the Ligue 1 club have played host to Greek opponents in UEFA club competition. Prior to the first leg, Bordeaux's only previous meeting with a Greek side was a 3-2 victory at Panionios GSS in the 2007/08 UEFA Cup group stage.

- Olympiacos have lost their last two away meetings with French opponents, going down 2-1 against both AS Saint-Etienne in last season's UEFA Cup round of 32 and Olympique Lyonnais in the 2005/06 UEFA Champions League group stage. Overall they have lost seven of their ten competitive fixtures in France and six of the last seven.

- Two years ago Olympiacos went out in the last 16 with a 3-0 defeat at Chelsea FC following a goalless home leg.

- The Greek champions reached the knockout phase for the second time in three seasons by finishing second in Group H, three points behind Arsenal FC and five ahead of R. Standard de Liège. They failed to score in their three away games, losing 2-0 at both Arsenal and Standard before a goalless draw at AZ Alkmaar.

- Olympiacos have not won away from home in the UEFA Champions League proper since a 2-1 group-stage triumph at S.S. Lazio on 28 November 2007. That was their second away success in three games, having had to wait 31 matches for their first, but of their four matches since that Lazio victory, three ended in defeat with one draw.

- After their UEFA Cup campaign ended on French soil at St-Etienne last season – when they also lost the first leg at home – history is against Olympiacos progressing. Of ten ties in UEFA competition where the Greek champions have lost the first leg at home, only once have they recovered the deficit: against FC Chornomorets Odesa in the 1992/93 UEFA Cup Winners' Cup first round, a 1-0 reverse in Athens being followed by a 3-0 triumph in Ukraine.

- Furthermore, Olympiacos have lost the first leg home or away on 29 occasions and progressed on aggregate just three times. Only once in UEFA Champions League history has a team beaten at home in the first leg come through, AFC Ajax losing 1-0 against Panathinaikos FC in the 1995/96 semi-finals first leg but winning 3-0 in Athens.

- Bordeaux, meanwhile, have never lost in UEFA competition after winning the first leg away from home, coming through all 12 ties in which they have taken a lead back to France, most recently against Tampere United in the 2007/08 UEFA Cup first round (3-2 away, 1-1 home). Indeed, of 32 ties in which Les Marine et Blanc have won the first leg home or away, they have progressed on all but six occasions.

Team ties

- Central defender Michalis Kapsis, a UEFA EURO 2004 winner with Greece, played for both clubs. He left AEK Athens FC to join Bordeaux immediately after his country's triumph in Portugal, playing 29 matches in Ligue 1 before moving to Olympiacos 12 months later.

- At Manchester United FC, Bordeaux coach Laurent Blanc scored the opener in a 3-2 win at Olympiacos on 23 October 2002, his last goal in European competition. He also played in United's earlier 4-0 home victory as well as in the two games the previous season after the teams were again drawn in the same group, United winning 2-0 away and 3-0 at home.

- Blanc came up against Olof Mellberg three times while at United, the Frenchman recording two wins and a draw against the Swede's Aston Villa FC.

- Antonis Nikopolidis was in goal for Greece on 15 November 2006 when they went down 1-0 to France in a friendly in Paris. Alou Diarra came on in the second half for the hosts.

- Yoann Gourcuff and Dudu were together at Stade Rennais FC in 2004/05.

- Mellberg played for Sweden in a 3-2 home friendly defeat by France on 20 August 2008. Gourcuff and Diarra were on the opposing side.

- Michal Żewłakow was in the Poland team who lost 1-0 to a France side including Blanc in a Paris friendly on 23 February 2000. Blanc was substituted at the break.

- While with Manchester United, David Bellion faced Panathinaikos in the 2003/04 UEFA Champions League group stage, winning 5-0 at home and 1-0 away. Nikopolidis was on the other side. Bellion's first league goal came in Sunderland AFC's 1-0 win against a Villa team featuring Mellberg on 28 September 2002.

- Didier Domi spent eight seasons with Paris Saint-Germain FC from 1995 to 2003 and faced Bordeaux on eight occasions, winning once. However, he was in the team that beat Bordeaux on penalties in the 1997/98 French League Cup final.

- Jaouad Zairi faced Bordeaux on five occasions while at FC Sochaux-Montbéliard (2001 to 2006) and FC Nantes (2006/07), winning three times and losing twice.

- Michaël Ciani's goal at Olympiacos was Bordeaux's 50th in the European Champion Clubs' Cup.

- Bordeaux have kept four successive clean sheets and not conceded since Ciani's own goal against FC Bayern München on Matchday 3, a run of 444 minutes. Their total of two goals against is the lowest in the competition.

- Wendel has provided four assists, the joint highest total in the competition ahead of the first knockout round second legs.

- Marc Planus and Ciani will incur a suspension with their next bookings.

- Laurent Blanc made six changes to the side beaten 2-1 by AJ Auxerre on 10 March, with the injured Marc Planus replaced by Fernando and regulars Matthieu Chalmé, Jussiê, Yoann Gourcuff, Marouane Chamakh and Fernando Cavenaghi either rested or starting on the bench.
- Bordeaux were unable to provide their title defence with a notable boost, despite winning 4-3 and 6-0 in their previous two trips to Monaco. They have now taken just two points in their last three Ligue 1 outings.
- The stalemate was nonetheless enough to keep Blanc's men top of the division, level on points with Montpellier Hérault SC but ahead on goal difference.
- For Jaroslav Plašil, the Monaco trip represented a reunion with the side he helped reach the 2004 UEFA Champions League final.
- Bordeaux's fixture at strugglers Le Mans UC 72 on 27 February was postponed due to inclement weather, so they had to wait until 7 March and a 1-1 draw against title rivals Montpellier before returning to Ligue 1 action following the first leg with Olympiacos.
- In an action-packed encounter, Ciani was sent off after 32 minutes and Cédric Carrasso saved two penalties before Chamakh broke the deadlock close to the hour mark. It remained 1-0 until deep into added time, when Carrasso allowed Alberto Costa's free-kick to creep in.
- Seven penalties have been awarded against Bordeaux in Ligue 1 this season but only three have been converted.
- Chamakh scored with a low shot against Montpellier; seven of his nine league goals this term have been headers.
- Bordeaux again conceded late on three days later as Auxerre came from behind to win a rearranged fixture 2-1, Ireneusz Jeleń scoring in the 64th and 83rd minutes.
- Benoît Trémoulinas had broken the deadlock with seven minutes gone, a massive deflection giving him his maiden Ligue 1 goal and first in all competitions since 11 November 2008, when he struck in a 4-2 League Cup victory over EA Guingamp.
- Chalmé captained the side for the first time in the meeting with Auxerre; Ulrich Ramé, Alou Diarra and Planus have also worn the armband this term.
- The Auxerre reverse was Bordeaux's second home defeat in 47 Ligue 1 fixtures since succumbing 3-1 to Olympique Lyonnais on 7 October 2007. Their other home defeat during that run was a 1-0 loss to Valenciennes FC on 21 November.
- Blanc's side have lost three of their 21 home games in all competitions this season, winning 15 and drawing three.
- Bordeaux had not lost after going ahead since their 4-3 defeat by Galatasaray AŞ on 26 February 2009.
- The French titleholders kept clean sheets in 15 of their first 23 games this season but have recorded only five shutouts in 17 subsequent outings.
- Holders Bordeaux will face Olympique de Marseille in the League Cup final at the Stade de France on 27 March.

- Own goals from Avraam Papadopoulos and Olof Mellberg – both from deflected shots – prevented Olympiacos from getting back on track with a win in the Greek Super League, despite Matt Derbyshire's fifth strike in 11 league outings this term and Lomana LuaLua's third since returning to the club in January.
- Mellberg almost scored the winner with a late header against a post, but his side have now secured only three victories in their last seven home outings in all competitions, three of those matches having ended in defeat.
- Olympiacos slipped to third in the standings, behind Panathinaikos FC and PAOK FC, with a 1-0 loss to Iraklis FC on 7 March. Bogdan Mara scored the only goal from the penalty spot after six minutes.
- It was the club's fourth league reverse of the season, their worst tally since losing six in 2005/06. On that occasion they drew just once, however, and took the title by three points.
- Three of Olympiacos's four league losses have come against Salonika sides, the Piraeus outfit having succumbed 1-0 at home to PAOK and by the same scoreline away to Aris Thessaloniki FC and Iraklis.
- Club top scorer Kostas Mitroglou was on target (90+4) as Olympiacos beat Atromitos FC 2-0 on 28 February. Half of Mitroglou's 12 goals in all competitions this season have come in the last ten minutes of games; the earliest he has scored is the 38th minute.
- Vassilis Torosidis has plundered three league goals this season – already his highest haul in eight campaigns with Skoda Xanthi FC and Olympiacos.
- Losses either side of the winter break to Aris and AEK Athens FC represented Olympiacos's first back-to-back league defeats since April 2006.
- Urko Pardo made his Super League debut for Olympiacos in the 5-1 win against Levadiakos FC on 7 February after the injured Antonis Nikopolidis was forced to sit out only his eighth top-flight match since joining Olympiacos in summer 2004.
- The Greek champions have kept 19 clean sheets in 38 fixtures this term, although only one in their last seven games.
- Ten of the 17 league goals they have conceded have come in the final 15 minutes of each half.
- A point clear of Panathinaikos in mid-December after an unbeaten start to the Super League season, two defeats and one draw in four outings led to them losing the lead and, on 19 January, coach Zico. Božidar Bandović was appointed the next day.
- Holders Olympiacos were knocked out of the Greek Cup at the first hurdle on 27 October when they lost their last-32 tie 3-1 at second-tier Panserraikos FC – only the second time they have been eliminated by lower-league opposition.

- Kyriakos Papadopoulos and Giannis Papadopoulos – the latter no longer in the UEFA Champions League squad – scored Greece's goals in a 2-1 away win against England in UEFA European Under-21 Championship qualifying on 3 March. Mitroglou was also in the starting lineup.
- Mellberg became the seventh Sweden player to win 100 international caps when his side defeated Wales 1-0 on 3 March.
- Olympiacos celebrated their 85th anniversary on 10 March.

UEFA Champions League knockout stage: Did you know?

- Teams have recovered from a first-leg deficit to go through to the next stage on 21 occasions, although only once – AFC Ajax's defeat of Panathinaikos FC in the 1995/96 semi-finals – has a side gone through after losing the first leg at home. The biggest losing margin a side has overturned was achieved by RC Deportivo La Coruña in the 2003/04 quarter-finals when they fought back from a 4-1 defeat at AC Milan to win 4-0 at home.
- Seventeen ties have been decided on the away goals rule, including five where the triumphant team lost the first leg.
- FC Bayern München hold the record for the biggest first-leg lead with a 5-0 success at Sporting Clube de Portugal in the 2008/09 first knockout round, eventually going through 12-1 after a 7-1 home victory in the second leg.
- Ten ties have now gone to penalties, including the game between Arsenal FC and AS Roma in the 2008/09 first knockout round. Five of these were finals – 1996, 2001, 2003, 2005 and 2008. The first two-legged tie decided on spot-kicks was PSV Eindhoven's 4-2 win against Olympique Lyonnais on 13 April 2005 after a 2-2 aggregate draw.
- In all, 17 ties have required extra time. So far seven have been decided by extra time alone: four quarter-finals, two first knockout round encounters and the 2007/08 semi-final between Chelsea FC and Liverpool FC.
- The 2008/09 last-16 encounter between Bayern and Sporting featured more goals (13) over its two legs than any previous UEFA Champions League knockout tie, Bayern prevailing 12-1.
- There has never been a knockout tie ending goalless after two legs. Nine have finished 1-0 on aggregate, most recently Manchester United FC's narrow victory against FC Barcelona in the 2007/08 semi-finals.
- Arsenal FC, Chelsea FC, Olympique Lyonnais and Real Madrid CF are all appearing in the first knockout round for the seventh season in succession.
- Teams from the same country have contested the final on three previous occasions. Real Madrid CF overcame Valencia CF 3-0 in Paris in 2000. Three years later Milan defeated Juventus 3-2 on penalties after a goalless draw at Old Trafford, and United beat Chelsea, also on spot-kicks, after a 1-1 draw in Moscow in May 2008.
- Clarence Seedorf is the only player to win the European Champion Clubs' Cup with three clubs (Ajax 1995, Madrid 1998, Milan 2003, 2007). Liverpool's Bob Paisley (1977, 1978, 1981) is the only coach to win three times.
- Ottmar Hitzfeld (BV Borussia Dortmund 1997, Bayern 2001) and Ernst Happel (Feyenoord 1970, Hamburger SV 1983) are the only coaches to win the trophy with two clubs.
- Only five capital cities have been home to teams that have won the European Cup: Madrid (Real Madrid), Belgrade (FK Crvena Zvezda), Bucharest (FC Steaua Bucureşti), Amsterdam (Ajax) and Lisbon (SL Benfica).
- S.S. Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta is the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League having been aged 43 years 252 days when he featured against Real Madrid CF on Matchday 6 of the 2007/08 competition.
- Laurent Blanc is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 36 years and 339 days, in Manchester United's 3-2 defeat of Olympiacos FC on 23 October 2002.
- Celestine Babayaro is the youngest player to have appeared in the UEFA Champions League. He was 16 years and 87 days when he started for RSC Anderlecht against Steaua on 23 November 1994. He was then sent off in the 37th minute.
