Match background

Of the four teams returning to the UEFA Champions League for their second participation, none has had to wait longer than FK Partizan who were last in the group stage in 2003/04. Their first fixture in Group H takes them to Ukraine to face FC Shakhtar Donetsk.

Previous meetings

- This is a quick reunion for these teams who faced each other last season in the UEFA Europa League group stage. Shakhtar won 4-1 in Ukraine with a Marko Lomić own goal setting them on their way and Luiz Adriano, Jadson and Yaroslav Rakitskiy also on the scoresheet. Adem Ljajić scored Partizan's reply.

- The teams for that game on 1 October 2009 were:

- In the return, Partizan obtained a measure of revenge with a 1-0 win secured by Lamine Diarra's early strike.

- Those matches were the only occasions Shakhtar have faced a team from Serbia in UEFA competition. Partizan played FC Dnipro Dnipropetrovsk in the 2004/05 UEFA Cup round of 32 and FC Dynamo Kyiv in a 1976/77 European Champion Clubs' Cup first round tie. They won 1-0 in Dnipropetrovsk for a 3-2 overall victory and lost 3-0 in Kyiv on the way to a 5-0 aggregate defeat.

Match background

- This is Shakhtar's sixth UEFA Champions League participation and they are aiming to advance from the group stage for the first time. They will be hoping to start with a victory, just as they did in 2007/08 and again the following year when they beat Celtic FC 2-0 and FC Basel 1893 2-1 respectively.

- In the 2008/09 UEFA Champions League, Shakhtar lost at home to FC Barcelona (1-2) and Sporting Clube de Portugal (0-1) before beating Basel 5-0. Finishing third in the group, they then switched to the UEFA Cup and won all four home games, conceding just a single goal, en route to the Istanbul final where they lifted their first European trophy with a 2-1 extra-time defeat of SV Werder Bremen.

- Last season they were ousted on away goals by FC Timișoara in the UEFA Champions League third qualifying round, moving into the UEFA Europa League where they lost to Fulham FC in the round of 32. Partizan finished bottom of Group J.

- This time round Partizan eased past FC Pyunik 4-1 in the second qualifying round, winning 1-0 away, and next faced HJK Helsinki, a 2-1 away win cementing a 5-1 overall success. In the play-off round they eventually came through a thrilling tie with RSC Anderlecht, surviving the concession of a two-goal lead – Brazilian striker Cléo scoring both to add to his first-leg strike in a 2-2 draw – in the decider in Belgium for another 2-2 draw. Partizan won the penalty shoot-out 3-2.

Team ties

- Mladen Krstajić was part of the FC Schalke 04 team defeated 2-1 on aggregate by Shakhtar in the 2004/05 UEFA Cup round of 32. He played in both the 1-1 draw in Ukraine and the 1-0 reverse at home.

- As coach of FC Dinamo București, Shakhtar coach Mircea Lucescu got the better of Partizan in the 1989/90 UEFA Cup Winners' Cup quarter-final, the Romanian team winning 2-1 at home and 2-0 away.

- Shakhtar's 25-game unbeaten run in the Ukrainian Premier League came to an end on Friday though the match was overshadowed by a broken leg suffered by Fernandinho. Mircea Lucescu's side had won 23 and drew two since a 3-0 loss at FC Dynamo Kyiv on 21 November 2009.
- The Ukrainian champions had been on a six-match winning run and had not lost in 18 fixtures in all competitions.
- Before the Obolon game Shakhtar had scored in each of their last 14 league matches stretching back to April.
- Armenian forward Henrik Mkhitaryan made his Shakhtar debut against Obolon.
- Shakhtar have won eight in a row at home and have not lost on their own turf in 43 matches, stretching back to 22 October 2008 and a 1-0 defeat by Sporting Clube de Portugal.
- Andriy Pyatov has not conceded at the Donbass Arena in 822 minutes for Shakhtar, since Maksim Shatskiy's consolation in FC Arsenal Kyiv's 3-1 defeat on 28 March.

- Fernandinho is expected to miss the group stage after breaking his right leg against Obolon.
- Dmytro Chygrynskiy pulled his left hamstring against FC Illychivets Mariupil on 29 August and has not featured since.

• Pierre Boya's double came on his first appearance since returning to Partizan this summer. He scored nine times in 64 league appearances during his first spell at the club between 2003 and 2007.

• Stefan Savić made his debut against Rad, the team Aleksandar Stanojević faced in his first match in charge of Partizan on 18 April. He oversaw a 2-1 win in that game and his side have won ten out of ten in the league since.

• Partizan have made an unbeaten start to 2010/11, winning eight and drawing two in the UEFA Champions League and Serbian Super League.

• The Belgrade outfit have scored at least two goals in each of their last eight outings.

• Partizan were unbeaten in the Super League last season and have not lost in 37 top-flight games, since a 2-1 defeat by FK Jagodina on 10 May 2009.

• Cléo has scored ten goals in all competitions this season, including eight in UEFA Champions League qualifying.

• Despite being without several players due to international commitments, Partizan beat FK Hajduk Kula 2-0 on 4 September.

• Mladen Krstajić was replaced at half-time of the Rad win as a precaution after complaining of muscle pain. He also broke his nose in the match, undergoing a minor operation to fix it on Sunday afternoon.

• Joseph Kizito was sidelined with a knee injury in August but returned at left-back against Hajduk Kula.

Head coach

FC Shakhtar Donetsk: Mircea Lucescu

Date of birth: 29 July 1945

Nationality: Romanian

Playing career: FC Dinamo 1948 București, FC Sportul Studențesc București, FC Corvinul Hunedoara

Coaching career: FC Corvinul Hunedoara, Romania, FC Dinamo 1948 București, Pisa Calcio, Brescia Calcio, Reggiana AC, FC Rapid București (twice), FC Internazionale Milano, Galatasaray AŞ, Beşiktaş JK, FC Shakhtar Donetsk

- A useful striker for Dinamo in the 1960s and 1970s, winning six titles and 70 caps for Romania as well as playing at the 1970 FIFA World Cup, Lucescu became Corvinul player-coach in his early 30s and went on to win three Romanian titles with Dinamo.
- Fluent in six foreign languages and regarded as a workaholic, he cemented his reputation at Pisa, Brescia and Reggiana before returning home for the first of two spells as Rapid coach, winning the league in 1998 and 2000.
- Returned to Serie A for a short spell at Inter in 1998/99 before a one-season return to Rapid, going on to lift the UEFA Super Cup in his first game as Galatasaray coach in 2000. Lucescu won the Turkish title in 2001/02 and repeated the feat with Beşiktaş in 2002/03, their centenary season.
- Left Beşiktaş in 2004 and promptly joined Shakhtar, leading the club to titles in 2005, 2006 and 2008, when his side also won the Ukrainian Cup.
- In May 2009, Lucescu's Shakhtar became the first Ukrainian club to win the UEFA Cup in the competition's final edition. He suffered a heart attack that summer but swiftly returned to work, guiding the club to another league title at the end of the season.

FK Partizan: Aleksandar Stanojević

Date of birth: 28 October 1973

Nationality: Serbian

Playing career: FK Partizan (twice), FK Obilic, RCD Mallorca, OFK Beograd, Videoton FC

Coaching career: OFK Beograd (youth), FK Srem, FK Partizan (assistant), Serbia (assistant), Serbia Under-19, Partizan

- A defensive midfielder who spent much of his playing career with Partizan, Stanojević initially departed for Obilic in 1993, moving on to Spanish side Mallorca in 1995/96. Returned to Partizan in 1998, winning a league and domestic cup in three seasons before hanging up his boots after spells with OFK and Hungarian side Videoton.
- Started his coaching career in autumn 2003 in OFK's youth categories, also working as an assistant coach to the first team. Took charge of second division side Srem in 2006.
- Back at Partizan in December 2006 as assistant to Miroslav Djukić, following him to the Serbian national side a little over a year later to take up the same role.
- Following Djukić's dismissal in August 2008, Stanojević was put in charge of Serbia's U19s, leading them to the semi-finals of that season's UEFA European Championship in Ukraine and also working with the U21 team alongside head coach Ratomir Dujković.
- Succeeded Goran Stevanović at Partizan in April 2010, becoming at 36 the youngest head coach in their history. Swiftly secured the league title and, at the start of the following season, became the first Serbian to guide a Serbian club into the UEFA Champions League group stage.

- Carlos Velasco made his debut in the Spanish Liga in 2004 and has progressed rapidly through the ranks, getting his first taste of the UEFA Champions League group stage in the FC Shakhtar Donetsk-FK Partizan game in September 2010.

- An engineer from Madrid, Velasco's first taste of European competition came in April 2005 when he was selected as fourth official for three UEFA European Under-19 Championship elite round games.

- Held the same role in qualifying for the UEFA Champions League and UEFA Cup from 2005/06 onwards, also working as fourth official at the UEFA EURO 2008 qualifier between Turkey and Malta in September 2006.

- Awarded his first UEFA Champions League refereeing appointment when Anorthosis Famagusta FC took on SK Rapid Wien in the second qualifying round in July 2008, the following June he oversaw his only 2010 FIFA World Cup qualifier, a 2-2 draw between Cyprus and Montenegro.

- A regular as a referee in the 2009/10 UEFA Europa League, where he oversaw six matches in total, Velasco was also entrusted with the Estonia-Italy fixture at the start of UEFA EURO 2012 qualifying in September 2010.

Competition facts

• UEFA Champions League: Group stage milestones

Holders FC Internazionale Milano are looking to avoid becoming the first defending champions to fail to get through a group stage since the UEFA Champions League began. (This record, like the others, includes the seasons between 1999/2000 and 2002/03 that featured a second group stage).

In 1992/93, FC Barcelona were the reigning European Champion Clubs' Cup holders and were beaten 4-3 on aggregate in the second round by PFC CSKA Moskva.

S.S. Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta became the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League in 2007/08 when he featured against Olympiacos FC on Matchday 1 at the age of 43 years and 168 days. The record was previously held by Alessandro Costacurta, the AC Milan defender who played against AEK Athens FC in 2006/07 at the age of 40 years and 211 days. Ballotta was aged 43 years 252 days when he featured against Real Madrid CF on Matchday 6.

Laurent Blanc is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 36 years and 339 days, having found the net for Manchester United FC in their 3-2 defeat of Olympiacos on 23 October 2002.

Celestine Babayaro is the youngest player to have appeared in the UEFA Champions League. He was 16 years and 87 days when he started for RSC Anderlecht against FC Steaua Bucureşti on 23 November 1994. He was then sent off in the 37th minute.

Barcelona and Manchester United have both finished as group winners on 11 occasions, one more than Milan and Real Madrid.

Four teams have recorded six successive victories in a UEFA Champions League group stage: Milan (1992/93), Paris Saint-Germain FC (1994/95), FC Spartak Moskva (1995/96) and Barcelona (2002/03, first group stage).

Ten teams have gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without picking up a single point, including Maccabi Haifa FC and Debreceni VSC in 2009/10. The other eight are: FC Dynamo Kyiv (2007/08), PFC Levski Sofia (2006/07), SK Rapid Wien (2005/06), RSC Anderlecht (2004/05), FC Spartak Moskva and Bayer 04 Leverkusen (2002/03, first and second group stage respectively), Fenerbahçe SK (2001/02, first group stage) and 1. FC Košice (1997/98).

Manchester United scored 20 goals in the 1998/99 group stage, more than any other side has managed. Barcelona scored 19 times in the 1999/2000 first group stage.

Debrecen conceded 19 goals in their six outings in 2009/10, equalling the record let in during a group stage set by Dynamo Kyiv (2007/08) and Ferencvárosi TC in 1995/96.

No team has ever gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without conceding a goal. Milan (1992/93), AFC Ajax (1995/96), Juventus (1996/97 and 2004/05), Chelsea FC (2005/06), Liverpool FC (2005/06) and Villarreal CF (2005/06) all let in just one.

Before their 3-1 win against Sporting Clube de Portugal on Matchday 6 of the 2006/07 campaign, FC Spartak Moskva went 22 games without a victory in the competition, surpassing the unwanted record set by AEK Athens FC on Matchday 3 of the same campaign.

The lowest total for a team qualifying from the group stage is seven points. The first to do it, since three points for a win was introduced in 1995/96, were Legia Warszawa that same season before Bayer Leverkusen managed it in 1999/2000 and Liverpool in 2001/02. FC Lokomotiv Moskva and eventual finalists Juventus both progressed with seven points in 2002/03, a feat achieved by Rangers FC and Werder Bremen in 2005/06.
