Match background

Panathinaikos FC have recorded a win and a draw from FC Barcelona's previous visits and another victory would provide a timely fillip for their UEFA Champions League chances.

- The Greek champions, who parted company with coach Nikos Nioplias on 15 November, are in need of a boost as they lie bottom of Group D, although on Matchday 1 in Spain they did take a surprise lead through Sidney Govou. Their supremacy was short-lived as Lionel Messi took centre stage to help his side run out 5-1 winners, the Argentinian international scoring twice as well as laying on two assists. David Villa made it 3-1 at the interval with further goals coming from Pedro Rodríguez and Daniel Alves late on.

Previous meetings

- Barça have now won three of the five previous competitive matches between the teams, all of which were in the UEFA Champions League, although those victories all came at Camp Nou. Panathinaikos' solitary success was a 1-0 home win in the 2001/02 quarter-final first leg, Angelos Basinas supplying the goal, although their opponents overturned the deficit with a 3-1 victory in Spain.
- Not only are the Greens unbeaten at home against the Catalan club, they have not conceded a goal. The other fixture, in the 2005/06 group stage, ended scoreless.
- Panathinaikos have lost their last two home games against Spanish opponents, going down 3-2 to Club Atlético de Madrid in last season's UEFA Champions League play-off and 2-1 against Villarreal CF in the last 16 of the same competition the previous season. Of the six previous fixtures only two were won – the rest all finished as draws.
- In other visits to Athens, Barcelona have been more successful, winning 3-0 at Panionios GSS in the 2003/04 UEFA Cup second round to set up a 5-0 aggregate success. They were 1-0 away victors against AEK Athens FC in the fourth round of the 2000/01 competition, eventually going through 6-0 overall.
- Barça's first trip to Greece ended in a 1-0 reverse at PAOK FC in the 1975/76 UEFA Cup first round first leg, although they won the return 6-1.

Match background

- Panathinaikos were beaten 2-0 at home by FC København on Matchday 2, before home and away goalless draws against FC Rubin Kazan left the Greens at the bottom of the table with two points.
- Panathinaikos have won only one of their last eight home matches in the UEFA Champions League proper.
- Barcelona were held 1-1 at Rubin in their second fixture, but overhauled København at the top of the table with a 2-0 defeat of the Danish champions at Camp Nou on Matchday 3. They remained a point ahead of their opponents after a 1-1 draw in Copenhagen last time out.
- The draw in Denmark meant that the Spanish champions have lost just one of their last 14 UEFA Champions League away games, although they have won only one of the last 11 and none of the last five. They went 11 matches without defeat before going down 3-1 in last season's semi-final first leg at FC Internazionale Milano.

Team ties

- Luis García started his career at La Masia, Barcelona's famous academy, along with Carles Puyol, Xavi Hernández, Andrés Iniesta and Víctor Valdés. All five were members of the Barcelona team in 2003/04 before García joined Liverpool FC.
- García (2007-09) and Giourkas Seitaridis (2006-09) both had spells at Atlético, García spending last season at Real Racing Club. Panathinaikos central defender Josu Sarriegi spent his entire career in Spain with Deportivo Alavés (2000-06) and Athletic Club (2006/07) before joining Panathinaikos in summer 2007.
- Sebastián Leto and Javier Mascherano were team-mates at Liverpool in 2007/08 while Govou and Éric Abidal played together at Olympique Lyonnais between 2004 and 2007.
- Daniel Alves and Adriano are international team-mates with Gilberto Silva for Brazil while Djibril Cissé, Govou and Jean-Alain Boumsong play alongside Abidal for France. Cédric Kanté and Seydou Keita are team-mates with Mali.
- Gilberto Silva was in the Arsenal FC side beaten 2-1 by Barcelona in the 2006 UEFA Champions League final in Paris.
- Kostas Katsouranis scored against Spain in Greece's 3-2 friendly defeat in Thessaloniki on 22 August 2007. Seitaridis started for the home team, Loukas Vyntra and Nikos Spyropoulos coming on after the break. Xavi and Villa started for Spain, Iniesta and García appearing as second-half replacements.

UEFA milestones

- Panathinaikos have scored 298 goals in UEFA competition.
- The Greek side have conceded 98 UEFA Champions League goals, group stage to final, and 195 in the European Champions Clubs' Cup.
- At 16 years and 242 days Charis Mavrias became the second youngest player to feature in the UEFA Champions League on Matchday 3. Celestine Babayaro was 16 years and 87 days when he appeared for RSC Anderlecht against FC Steaua București on 23 November 1994.

- Giorgos Karagounis serves a one-game ban on Matchday 5.
- Karagounis made his 76th European appearance for Panathinaikos on Matchday 4, taking him level with Giannis Goumas as the player who has played the most continental matches for the club.

- Jesualdo Ferreira was appointed as Nikos Nioplias' successor as coach on the day of the Iraklis win, though Jacek Gmoch remained in charge for the game. Nioplias left the club by mutual consent on 15 November having succeeded Henk ten Cate last December.
- Djibril Cissé registered twice against Iraklis to take his tally to ten goals in ten league appearances this term.
- Luis García's effort was his first in ten league outings for the Greek champions.
- The Iraklis victory was only the club's second by more than a single goal in the league this season, their first a 4-1 success at Ergotelis FC on 3 October.
- Panathinaikos are unbeaten in their last six matches in all competitions, winning four.
- Panathinaikos have lost only three of their last 58 league games at home, including the end-of-season play-offs.
- Mavrias made his Super League debut at AEK Athens FC on 24 October. At 16 years and 246 days he became the second youngest player to grace the Greek top flight after Kostas Antoniou (15 years, 292 days), the current director of football at Panathinaikos.
- The Greens will host second-tier Trikala FC in the Greek Cup fifth round on 22 December.

Injury news

- Jean-Alain Boumsong returned to the starting lineup against Iraklis after recovering from the thigh injury that forced him off early in the second half on Matchday 4.
- Sotiris Ninis was an unused substitute against Iraklis and has not played since 12 October, having injured his right foot on international duty and then, a week later, strained his quadriceps in training.
- Sebastian Leto has been out with a knee injury since 3 October.

- Karagounis became the third Greek player after Theodoros Zagorakis and Angelos Basinas to reach 100 caps when he lined up against Latvia on 8 October.

- Matchday 4 was Barcelona's 150th game in the UEFA Champions League, group stage to final.

UEFA Champions League statistics

- Lionel Messi is Barça's all-time leading scorer in the competition with 30 goals in 48 games. He overtook Rivaldo (25 in 45) on Matchday 1.
- Messi has had 12 shots on goal to date, the joint highest total in the competition along with Cristiano Ronaldo.
- José Pinto completes a two-match ban for gross unsporting conduct. The UEFA Control and Disciplinary Body considered he whistled to stop a promising attack from César Santin against FC København on Matchday 3.

- Josep Guardiola gave 21-year-old Andreu Fontàs his first Liga start of the season.
- The 8-0 triumph equalled the record for an away victory in the Spanish top flight. The Camp Nou outfit triumphed by the same scoreline at UD Las Palmas on 25 October 1959.
- Messi has scored in his last nine matches for club and country, registering a total of 15 goals in that time.
- His hat-trick during the Almería win brought his league total to 101 goals in 153 appearances.
- Josep Guardiola's side are unbeaten in 16 games, winning nine of the last ten.
- They have also racked up six successive away Liga successes – their best start to a campaign on the road.
- In the 3-1 win against Villarreal on 13 November, Carles Puyol made his 500th appearance for Barcelona in all competitions. Only Xavi Hernández (542 games) and Migueli (549) are ahead of him on the club's all-time list.
- The Azulgrana will play Athletic Club in the last 16 of the Copa del Rey after a 7-1 aggregate triumph over AD Cueta. They will contest the first leg at home on 22 December, with the return on 5 January.

Injury news

- Éric Abidal failed to make the trip to Almería after picking up a right thigh strain.
- Pedro Rodríguez sat out Spain's defeat by Portugal due to gastroenteritis but started the win at Almería.
- Gerard Piqué was substituted at the break in the Spain match after complaining of discomfort in his hamstring; he was an unused substitute away against Almería.
- Gabriel Milito, who had recently overcome a groin injury, tore a muscle in his right thigh against Ceuta and is expected to be out for six weeks.
- Jeffren recovered from a left thigh muscle tear to make his first club start of the season in the first leg against Ceuta on 26 October, but lasted just over half an hour before suffering a dislocated shoulder.

- Puyol, Alves, Xavi, Iniesta, Messi and Villa have all been shortlisted for the FIFA Ballon d'Or, the winner of which will be announced in Zurich on 10 January.
- Barça's encounter at home to Real Madrid CF will take place on Monday 29 November to avoid clashing with local elections the previous weekend.
- Seydou Keita has been shortlisted for the African Footballer of the Year award.
- On 16 November, Barcelona announced that they have reached an agreement with PSV Eindhoven to sign midfielder Ibrahim Afellay in January.

- Like countrymen José Mourinho and Carlos Queiroz, Ferreira moved into coaching through sports science education rather than playing; indeed, Ferreira taught Mourinho at the Lisbon Superior Institute of Physical Sciences in the 1980s.
- Ferreira coached smaller Portuguese sides, and Moroccan outfit FAR Rabat, before coming to prominence with a spell as Portugal U21 coach between 1996 and 2000.
- Subsequent spells at Alverca and Benfica, where he won the title as assistant to António Oliveira in 1993/94, proved less successful, but he revived his reputation at Braga.
- Snared by Porto in summer 2006 months after being hired by neighbours Boavista, Ferreira made an indelible mark on the club, winning titles in his first three seasons in charge and adding Portuguese Cups in 2009 and 2010.
- Having guided the club to at least the UEFA Champions League round of 16 in all four of his campaigns, Ferreira left for Málaga in May 2010 after Porto had finished third in the Liga. His stay in Spain proved brief as he was dismissed after only nine games, but Ferreira swiftly resurfaced at Panathinaikos, where he signed a contract until June 2012.

FC Barcelona: Josep Guardiola

Date of birth: 18 January 1971

Nationality: Spanish

Playing career: FC Barcelona, Brescia Calcio (twice), AS Roma, Al-Ahly Club, Dorados de Sinaloa

Coaching career: FC Barcelona B, FC Barcelona

- Known as 'Pep', he came up through Barcelona's youth ranks to win six Spanish Liga titles, one European Champion Clubs' Cup, a UEFA Cup Winners' Cup and two Copa del Rey trophies from 1990 to 2001.
- Also had spells with Brescia, Fabio Capello's Roma, Al-Ahly in Doha and Mexico's Dorados de Sinola before ending his playing career in 2006.
- Won 40 caps and Olympic footballing gold with Spain in 1992, but missed the 1998 and 2002 FIFA World Cup tournaments through injury.
- Having coached Barcelona's B team, became the 15th Catalan-born boss of the senior team in 2008 and won the UEFA Champions League, Spanish Liga and Copa del Rey in his first season in charge.
- Success in the 2008/09 final made Guardiola the sixth man to lift the European Cup as a player and a coach. Barcelona followed up with victories in the Spanish and UEFA Super Cups at the start of 2009/10, going on to win the FIFA Club World Cup and retain the Liga title.

- Italian referee Gianluca Rocchi has enjoyed a steady rise through the ranks, being promoted to UEFA's Premier category in July 2009 before moving up to Elite status in May of the following year.
- Born in Florence on 25 August 1973, Rocchi began his refereeing career in Serie C back in 2000, spending the next three seasons learning his trade in the third tier of Italian football.
- Stepped up to Serie B in 2003, subsequently also taking charge of top-flight games, Rocchi was given regular assignments in UEFA competition as a fourth official from 2004/05 onwards, featuring in the group stages of both the UEFA Champions League and UEFA Cup.
- Handed his first UEFA Cup refereeing assignment at the start of 2008/09, Rocchi took charge of four matches in total in the competition proper that season and was in the middle for six more in the 2009/10 UEFA Europa League. He finished the season by working as fourth official as Club Atlético de Madrid beat Fulham FC in the final in Hamburg.
- Often entrusted with some of Serie A's biggest matches, Rocchi made his UEFA Champions League refereeing debut in August 2009 when SK Slavia Praha took on FC Sheriff in the third qualifying round.

• **UEFA Champions League:** Group stage milestones

Holders FC Internazionale Milano are looking to avoid becoming the first defending champions to fail to get through a group stage since the UEFA Champions League began. (This record, like the others, includes the seasons between 1999/2000 and 2002/03 that featured a second group stage).

In 1992/93, FC Barcelona were the reigning European Champion Clubs' Cup holders and were beaten 4-3 on aggregate in the second round by PFC CSKA Moskva.

S.S. Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta became the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League in 2007/08 when he featured against Olympiacos FC on Matchday 1 at the age of 43 years and 168 days. The record was previously held by Alessandro Costacurta, the AC Milan defender who played against AEK Athens FC in 2006/07 at the age of 40 years and 211 days. Ballotta was aged 43 years 252 days when he featured against Real Madrid CF on Matchday 6.

Javier Zanetti is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 37 years and 72 days, having found the net for FC Internazionale Milano in their 4-3 defeat of Tottenham Hotspur FC on 20 October 2010.

Celestine Babayaro is the youngest player to have appeared in the UEFA Champions League. He was 16 years and 87 days when he started for RSC Anderlecht against FC Steaua București on 23 November 1994. He was then sent off in the 37th minute.

Peter Ofori-Quaye is the youngest player to have scored in the UEFA Champions League, aged 17 years and 195 days. He found the net in Olympiacos FC's 5-1 defeat at Rosenborg BK on 1 October 1997.

Barcelona and Manchester United have both finished as group winners on 11 occasions, one more than Milan and Real Madrid.

Four teams have recorded six successive victories in a UEFA Champions League group stage: Milan (1992/93), Paris Saint-Germain FC (1994/95), FC Spartak Moskva (1995/96) and Barcelona (2002/03, first group stage).

Ten teams have gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without picking up a single point, including Maccabi Haifa FC and Debreceni VSC in 2009/10. The other eight are: FC Dynamo Kyiv (2007/08), PFC Levski Sofia (2006/07), SK Rapid Wien (2005/06), RSC Anderlecht (2004/05), FC Spartak Moskva and Bayer 04 Leverkusen (2002/03, first and second group stage respectively), Fenerbahçe SK (2001/02, first group stage) and 1. FC Košice (1997/98).

Manchester United scored 20 goals in the 1998/99 group stage, more than any other side has managed. Barcelona scored 19 times in the 1999/2000 first group stage.

Debrecen conceded 19 goals in their six outings in 2009/10, equalling the record let in during a group stage set by Dynamo Kyiv (2007/08) and Ferencvárosi TC in 1995/96.

No team has ever gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without conceding a goal. Milan (1992/93), AFC Ajax (1995/96), Juventus (1996/97 and 2004/05), Chelsea FC (2005/06), Liverpool FC (2005/06) and Villarreal CF (2005/06) all let in just one.

Before their 3-1 win against Sporting Clube de Portugal on Matchday 6 of the 2006/07 campaign, FC Spartak Moskva went 22 games without a victory in the competition, surpassing the unwanted record set by AEK Athens FC on Matchday 3 of the same campaign.

The lowest total for a team qualifying from the group stage is seven points. The first to do it, since three points for a win was introduced in 1995/96, were Legia Warszawa that same season before FC Dynamo Kyiv and Bayer Leverkusen managed it in 1999/2000 and Liverpool in 2001/02. FC Lokomotiv Moskva and eventual finalists Juventus both progressed with seven points in 2002/03, a feat achieved by Rangers FC and SV Werder Bremen in 2005/06.
