## Match background

---

FC Viktoria Plzeň's four-match unbeaten home run in this season's UEFA Champions League receives the ultimate test when they welcome title holders FC Barcelona.

- Barcelona beat Plzeň 2-0 at the Camp Nou on matchday three and with another victory will secure qualification so long as FC BATE Borisov fail to beat AC Milan in the other Group H fixture. Bottom-placed Plzeň's hopes of progress are already faint and their elimination will be confirmed if they fail to at least match Milan's result in Belarus.

### Match background

- Pavel Vrba's Plzeň have played four home games so far in this first UEFA Champions League adventure – beating FC Pyunik (5-1), Rosenborg BK (3-2) and FC København (2-1) in qualifying before drawing 1-1 with BATE on matchday one.

- Prior to this season Plzeň had only played two European home games in their history, against FC Bayern München (0-1) in the 1971/72 UEFA Cup Winners' Cup first round and Beşiktaş JK (1-1) in last season's UEFA Europa League third qualifying round.

- Those two fixtures, together with the ties against Pyunik and Rosenborg, were played at Plzeň's Stadion města Plzně. Prague's Eden Stadium has been their base from the play-offs onwards but at both venues, the club have failed to keep a clean sheet in Europe.

- Ominously, Barcelona won 5-0 at BATE in their first game on the road in this season's UEFA Champions League. It was the third in a row in the competition for a team who have lost just one of their last seven European away fixtures.

- Josep Guardiola was playing when Barcelona last faced Czech opposition in the 1999/2000 UEFA Champions League second group stage. He scored the third goal in a 5-0 defeat of AC Sparta Praha at the Camp Nou, and also appeared in Barcelona's 2-1 victory in Prague. He had suffered defeat on Czech soil when Barcelona lost 1-0 at Sparta in the group stage of the 1991/92 European Champion Clubs' Cup, although they won 3-2 at home.

- Barcelona's away record against Czech sides is W2 D1 L2. Their overall record reads W7 D1 L3.

### Team ties

- Pavel Horváth is still seeking a first win against Spanish opposition; he was in the SK Slavia Praha side beaten 1-0 on aggregate by Valencia CF in the 1996/97 UEFA Cup second round and faced Real Madrid CF with Sporting Clube de Portugal in the 2000/01 UEFA Champions League first group stage, earning a 2-2 home draw.

- David Villa became Spain's all-time leading scorer after striking twice in the 2-1 home win against the Czech Republic in UEFA EURO 2012 qualifying last March. Gerard Piqué, Andrés Iniesta, Xavi Hernández and Sergio Busquets also featured in the triumph in Granada.

- Xavi, Busquets and Piqué started the return fixture on 7 October, while Villa and Carles Puyol came on in Spain's 2-0 victory. Daniel Kolář and Petr Jiráček started for the Czechs with Milan Petržela an unused substitute.

- Villa made his UEFA club competition debut for Real Zaragoza in a two-legged victory against SK Sigma Olomouc in the 2004/05 UEFA Cup first round. He appeared as a 62nd-minute substitute against Slavia for Valencia CF in the UEFA Europa League on 22 October 2009, but was sent off 23 minutes later.

- Daniel Alves helped Sevilla FC beat Slavia home and away in the 2007/08 UEFA Champions League group stage, scoring in a 3-0 win in the Czech capital. Seydou Keita and Adriano featured alongside him in the 4-2 home success.

- Cesc Fàbregas scored twice as his Arsenal FC side defeated Slavia 7-0 at home in the same group on 23 October 2007. Fàbregas had already found the net in both legs of Arsenal's third qualifying round win against Sparta that season.

- Ibrahim Afellay played for PSV Eindhoven in a 1-0 home victory against Sparta in the 2009/10 UEFA Europa League.

- Sergi Gómez and Gerard Deulofeu helped Spain beat a Czech Republic side including Plzeň's Martin Sladký 3-2 after extra time in the 2011 UEFA European Under-19 Championship final in Romania.

- With on-loan Václav Pilař ineligible against his parent club, Pavel Vrba's side claimed only their third win in their last seven games in all competitions, although they have won three of the last four matches.
- Marek Bakoš and Milan Petržela each scored for the third successive league game, the latter a stunning solo effort that began inside his own half.
- At this stage last term, Plzeň were unbeaten and top of the league on 34 points – ten more than this time around.
- Marián Čišovský, on target again on Friday, scored his first goal for the club on 23 October as Plzeň beat FK Viktoria Žižkov 4-1.
- None of Daniel Kolář's eight goals this season have come earlier than first-half added time.
- A 2-0 loss to AC Sparta Praha on 29 August represents Plzeň's only home league defeat in 35 games.
- Vrba's side began the domestic season with victory in the Czech Super Cup, beating Czech Cup holders FK Mladá Boleslav 4-2 on penalties following a 1-1 draw.

#### Injury news

- Marek Čech has not played since injuring his knee in Barcelona. The Žižkov win marked Roman Pavlík's return to action after suffering ligament damage at Rosenborg BK on 27 July; Čech was signed from FC Zhemchuzhina-Sochi as cover.

#### Miscellaneous

- Kolář, Petr Jiráček and Pilař are likely to be on duty on 11 and 15 November when the Czech Republic face Montenegro in the UEFA EURO 2012 play-offs.

- Messi's third hat-trick of the campaign – his 13th for Barcelona – and Isaac Cuenca's first goal for the club helped Josep Guardiola's side to their seventh win in eight outings.
- Barcelona are 22 games unbeaten in all competitions, since a 2-1 loss at Real Sociedad de Fútbol on 30 April.
- The Catalan giants have kept eight successive clean sheets and have not been breached in 787 minutes, since Pablo Hernández's goal in the 2-2 draw with Valencia CF on 21 September. Víctor Valdés, who broke Andoni Zubizarreta's club goalkeeping record of 301 Liga appearances on 2 October, has been in goal throughout that run.

- Xavi Hernández passed Migueli's club record for Liga appearances at Granada CF on 25 October, marking his 392nd top-flight match with the only goal of the game. It took him to four in nine league outings this term, passing his tallies for each of the last two seasons.
- Cuenca, who made his first appearance for the club as a late substitute on matchday three, made his full debut against a Granada side that ended the game with nine men.
- Messi missed an added-time penalty in a 0-0 draw at home to Sevilla FC on 22 October, the first time this season Barça have failed to score.
- Messi moved ahead of László Kubala into second place on the club's all-time scoring list with his two goals against Real Racing Club on 15 October. Messi has registered 199 times for Barça and is now chasing César Rodríguez, who scored 235 club goals between 1942 and 1955.
- Barça have scored in 25 consecutive Liga away games, a Spanish top-flight record.
- Barcelona have already collected two trophies this season, beating FC Porto 2-0 in the UEFA Super Cup on 26 August having already wrapped up a 5-4 aggregate victory against Real Madrid CF in the Spanish Super Cup.
- Barça will play third tier CD L'Hospitalet in the Copa del Rey round of 32 on 9 November and 21 December.

#### **Injury news**

- Pedro Rodríguez has been ruled out of the Plzeň match after suffering an ankle injury at Granada.
- Gerard Piqué returned from a hamstring problem against Mallorca. That and a torn calf have limited the defender to just two starts for Barcelona this season.
- Carles Puyol also featured against Mallorca – his first outing in four games following a groin injury.
- Cesc Fàbregas came on as a substitute against Sevilla on his comeback from a torn hamstring that had kept him out since 1 October. Alexis Sánchez has been sidelined since 10 September with a similar problem.
- Ibrahim Afellay is likely to be out until next year after suffering a knee ligament injury in training in September.

#### **Miscellaneous**

- On 20 October Messi was named Barcelona player of the season for 2010/11.
- David Villa struck his 50th goal for Spain in their 3-1 home win against Scotland on 11 October, a game that marked Valdés' first competitive start in goal for the Roja.

## Head coach

---

### **FC Viktoria Plzeň: Pavel Vrba**

**Date of birth:** 6 December 1963

**Nationality:** Czech

**Playing career:** FC Baník Ostrava (twice), TJ Železářny Prostějov, RH Cheb, TJ Baník Havířov, FC Přerov

**Coaching career:** FC Přerov, FC Baník Ostrava (youth, assistant), Czech Republic Under-20, FK Matador Púchov, MŠK Žilina, Slovakia (assistant), FC Viktoria Plzeň

- The defender was part of the Czechoslovakia side that reached the final of the 1982 UEFA European Under-18 Championship and also appeared at the FIFA U-20 World Cup the following year; the Czechs lost in the quarter-finals to a Brazil team including Bebeto and Dunga.
- His club career did not hit the same highs, Vrba making a handful of appearances for Cheb and Baník before finishing his playing days in the lower leagues with hometown club Přerov.
- Returned to Baník as a youth coach and also went back to the U20 World Cup, taking charge of the Czech Republic in the 2003 edition. Became assistant at Baník and, despite a 7-0 loss to SK Slavia Praha in his first match in temporary charge in May 2003, the next season ended with Baník and Vrba celebrating the league title.
- That summer crossed the border into Slovakia, winning a championship as head coach of Žilina in 2007, by which time he was also working as assistant to Ján Kocián with the country's national side.
- Moved on to Plzeň in 2008, winning the Czech Cup in his second season – when he was voted the country's coach of the year – and the league in 2011. Even better followed at the start of 2011/12, Plzeň claiming the scalps of Rosenborg BK and FC København en route to reaching the UEFA Champions League group stage for the first time.

### **FC Barcelona: Josep Guardiola**

**Date of birth:** 18 January 1971

**Nationality:** Spanish

**Playing career:** FC Barcelona, Brescia Calcio (twice), AS Roma, Al-Ahly Club, Dorados de Sinaloa

**Coaching career:** FC Barcelona B, FC Barcelona

- Known as 'Pep', he came up through Barcelona's youth ranks to win six Spanish Liga titles, one European Champion Clubs' Cup, a UEFA Cup Winners' Cup and two Copa del Rey trophies from 1990 to 2001. Also had spells with Brescia, Fabio Capello's Roma, Al-Ahly in Doha and Mexico's Dorados de Sinaloa before ending his playing career in 2006.
- Won 40 caps and Olympic footballing gold with Spain in 1992, but missed the 1998 and 2002 FIFA World Cup tournaments through injury.
- Having coached Barcelona's B team, became the 15th Catalan-born boss of the senior team in 2008 and won the UEFA Champions League, Spanish Liga and Copa del Rey in his first season in charge.
- Success in the 2008/09 final made Guardiola the sixth man to lift the European Cup as a player and a coach. Barcelona followed up with victories in the Spanish and UEFA Super Cups at the start of 2009/10, going on to win the FIFA Club World Cup and retain the Liga title.
- Steered the Azulgrana to a third successive Liga crown and their fourth European Cup in 2010/11.

• Austrian official Robert Schörgenhofer started his career in 1991 and was first involved in UEFA competition seven years later as an assistant referee for a UEFA European Under-18 Championship qualifier between Spain and Belgium. Similar engagements followed at U21 and UEFA Cup level over the following four years.

• Schörgenhofer was more usually involved as a fourth official, however, working at UEFA Cup matches in that role from 2004/05 onwards. Stepped up to take charge of Austrian Bundesliga fixtures in 2004 before his first UEFA engagement as a referee came at a UEFA European U19 Championship elite round game between Serbia and England in March 2007.

• Worked at that year's UEFA Regions' Cup in Bulgaria, overseeing two games, 2007 also bringing his FIFA badge. Schörgenhofer's first taste of refereeing in the UEFA Cup came in the 2007/08 first qualifying round.

• Involved in six UEFA Europa League games during 2009/10 and kicked off the following campaign with the UEFA EURO 2012 qualifier between Romania and Albania; went on to oversee six more UEFA Europa League matches that season, making his UEFA Champions League group stage debut in the Chelsea FC-MŠK Žilina fixture in November.

• Took charge of three games at the 2011 UEFA European Under-21 Championship, including the Switzerland-Czech Republic semi-final, and also oversaw two group matches at the FIFA U-20 World Cup the same summer.

---

### UEFA Champions League: Group stage milestones

- Holders FC Barcelona are bidding to avoid becoming the first defending champions to fail to get through a group stage since the UEFA Champions League began. (This record, like the others, includes the seasons between 1999/2000 and 2002/03 that featured a second group stage).
- In 1992/93, Barcelona were the reigning European Champion Clubs' Cup holders and were beaten 4-3 on aggregate in the second round by PFC CSKA Moskva.
- No team has successfully defended the UEFA Champions League trophy with AC Milan (1989, 1990) the last club to win consecutive European Cups. Milan (1994, 1995), AFC Ajax (1995, 1996), Juventus (1996, 1997) and Manchester United (2008, 2009) have all returned to the UEFA Champions League final as holders only to lose.
- S.S. Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta became the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League in 2007/08 when he featured against Olympiacos FC on matchday one at the age of 43 years and 168 days. The record was previously held by Alessandro Costacurta, the AC Milan defender who played against AEK Athens FC in 2006/07 at the age of 40 years and 211 days. Ballotta was aged 43 years 252 days when he featured against Real Madrid CF on matchday six.
- Ryan Giggs is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 37 years and 289 days, in Manchester United's 1-1 draw at SL Benfica on 14 September 2011.
- Celestine Babayaro is the youngest player to have appeared in the UEFA Champions League. He was 16 years and 87 days when he started for RSC Anderlecht against FC Steaua București on 23 November 1994. He was then sent off in the 37th minute.
- Peter Ofori-Quaye is the youngest player to have scored in the UEFA Champions League, aged 17 years and 195 days. He found the net in Olympiacos's 5-1 defeat at Rosenborg BK on 1 October 1997.
- Barcelona and Manchester United FC have both finished as group winners on 12 occasions, one more than Real Madrid.
- Four teams have recorded six successive victories in a UEFA Champions League group stage: Milan (1992/93), Paris Saint-Germain FC (1994/95), FC Spartak Moskva (1995/96) and Barcelona (2002/03, first group stage).
- Twelve teams have gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without picking up a single point, including MŠK Žilina and FK Partizan in 2010/11. The other ten are: Maccabi Haifa FC and Debreceni VSC (2009/10), FC Dynamo Kyiv (2007/08), PFC Levski Sofia (2006/07), SK Rapid Wien (2005/06), Anderlecht (2004/05), Spartak Moskva and Bayer 04 Leverkusen (2002/03, first and second group stage respectively), Fenerbahçe SK (2001/02, first group stage) and 1. FC Košice (1997/98).
- Manchester United scored 20 goals in the 1998/99 group stage, more than any other side has managed. Barcelona scored 19 times in the 1999/2000 first group stage.
- MŠK Žilina conceded 19 goals in their six outings in 2010/11, equalling the record let in during a group stage set by Debrecen (2009/10), Dynamo Kyiv (2007/08) and Ferencvárosi TC in 1995/96.
- No team has ever gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without conceding a goal. Milan (1992/93), AFC Ajax (1995/96), Juventus (1996/97 and 2004/05), Chelsea FC (2005/06), Liverpool FC (2005/06), Villarreal CF (2005/06) and Manchester United (2010/11) all let in just one.
- Before their 3-1 win against Sporting Clube de Portugal on matchday six of the 2006/07 campaign, Spartak Moskva went 22 games without a victory in the competition, surpassing the unwanted record set by AEK Athens FC on matchday three of the same campaign.
- The lowest total for a team qualifying from the group stage is seven points. The first to do it, since three points for a win was introduced in 1995/96, were Legia Warszawa that same season before FC Dynamo Kyiv and Bayer 04 Leverkusen managed it in 1999/2000 and Liverpool in 2001/02. FC Lokomotiv Moskva and eventual finalists Juventus both progressed with seven points in 2002/03, a feat achieved by Rangers FC and SV Werder Bremen in 2005/06.
