Women's football in UEFA

National senior teams

- UEFA first became involved in women's football in 1971 when a motion was passed urging national associations to take responsibility for the female game in their countries.
- The first competitive fixture in a UEFA women's competition was played on 18 August 1982 in Vammala when Finland were beaten 6-0 by Sweden in the opening game of qualifying for the UEFA European Competition for Representative Women's Teams. Sweden were to win the final in 1984.
- For the 1991 edition the competition was relaunched as the UEFA Women's Championship.
- The final was played over two legs in 1984. Between 1987 and 1993 there was a four-team knockout final tournament, before a one-off final in 1995. In 1997, 2001 and 2005 there was an eight-team final tournament played every four years, expanded to 12 this time around.
- From 16 competitors in the 1984 edition, the current tournament began with 46 entrants including three countries new to competitive senior international women's football: Azerbaijan, Luxembourg and FYR Macedonia.

National youth teams

- The UEFA European Women's Under-18 Championship was launched in 1997/98 and has run annually ever since, altering to an U19 event in 2001/02. Germany have secured five wins (2000, 2001, 2002, 2006, 2007) while other champions have been Denmark (1998), Sweden (1999), France (2003), Spain (2004), Russia (2005), Italy (2008) and England (2009).
- The 2009/10 U19 final tournament will be played in FYR Macedonia and 45 sides will be aiming to join the hosts in the eight-team competition next year.
- In 2007/08 the first annual UEFA European Women's Under-17 Championship was held. Germany have won both editions so far, with the final tournament played as a four-team knockout competition in UEFA's home town of Nyon, Switzerland.

European club competition

- At its meeting in Paris on 23 May 2000, the UEFA Executive Committee approved the proposal to introduce a European Women's club competition, and thus the UEFA Women's Cup for national league champions came into being.
- For 2009/10 the competition was relaunched as the UEFA Women's Champions League, also allowing entry to the runners-up from the eight top-ranked nations.
- In the first final on 23 May 2002, 1. FFC Frankfurt beat Umeå IK 2-0 with two Steffi Jones goals in the Waldstadion.
- Frankfurt were to pick up further wins in 2006 and 2008. Umeå triumphed in 2003 and 2004 and also lost the 2007 and 2008 finals. A second German team, 1. FFC Turbine Potsdam, took the trophy in 2005. Arsenal LFC won in 2007.
- Last season two debutants reached the final, with another German club, FCR 2001 Duisburg, defeating Russia's Zvezda-2005 to emulate both Frankfurt and Potsdam in winning the trophy at their first attempt. Duisburg won the first leg in Russia 6-0 and drew their home leg 1-1 in front of a competition record 28,112 crowd at the MSV Arena.
- For the new UEFA Women's Champions League the final will be played as a one-off fixture in the same city as the men's UEFA Champions League final, two nights before. The first final is scheduled for Thursday 20 May 2010 in Madrid, with London (2011) and Munich (2012) to follow.

Head coach profiles

Denmark: Kenneth Heiner-Møller

Date of birth: 17 January 1971

Playing career: Ølstykke FC, Ferencvárosi TC, AGF Århus, Vejle BK

Coaching career: B93 København Under-18, Brøndby IF U18, Brøndby IF women, Denmark women

Kenneth Heiner-Møller is a busy man. Not only does he coach the Denmark women's team, but he also works part-time as a psychologist and is a teacher at a sports school.

Taking his current surname from his wife after they married, Heiner-Møller was known as Kenneth Rasmussen during his playing career as a midfielder, beginning at youth level with B 1903 København and then at senior level with second division Ølstykke FC. In 1994 he made the rare move from Denmark to Hungary with Ferencvárosi TC, winning the league as well as two national cups in a short spell. Returning home with B 1903, he went on to play for AGF Århus and Vejle BK, tallying his tally of Danish league games to 250 before becoming a coach in 2002.

His first role was with the B93 København Under-18 side and he then had two years in charge of Brøndby IF's team at the same age group, before a 2005 switch to lead the club's female section. Heiner-Møller enjoyed immediate success with a domestic double and run to the UEFA Women's Cup quarter-finals.

In July 2006, he was appointed Denmark women's coach after Peter Bonde switched to become assistant for the men's team. After taking his charges to the 2007 FIFA Women's World Cup, only just missing out on the quarter-finals and an Olympic berth, Heiner-Møller successfully steered his side through qualifying for UEFA WOMEN'S EURO 2009™ with a last-gasp 1-0 defeat of Ukraine. In January he signed a new three-year contract running until 2012.

England: Hope Powell

Date of birth: 8 December 1966

Playing career: Millwall Lionesses LFC, Fulham LFC, Croydon LFC

Coaching career: England women

Since becoming England's first female national coach in 1998, Hope Powell has transformed women's football in her country.

Born in London, Powell started playing football aged eleven and developed into a talented midfielder at Millwall Lionesses LFC. She went on to represent Friends of Fulham LFC and Croydon LFC and won the FA Women's Cup three times, in addition to the championship in 1996. Her international career began as a 16-year-old against the Republic of Ireland, and she was part of the side that reached the last eight of the 1995 FIFA Women's World Cup in Sweden.

After 35 goals in 66 games for England, Powell went on to become the first female coach of her country in 1998 and she now oversees the whole women's set-up from the Under-15s upwards. In 2003, she was the first female to earn the coveted UEFA Pro Licence. By then, Powell had been appointed OBE in the Queen's birthday list and had taken England to the 2001 UEFA European Women's Championship.

Pipped by France in a play-off for the 2003 World Cup, England hosted UEFA WOMEN'S EURO 2005™ and only just missed out on the semi-finals. They gained revenge on France to reach the 2007 World Cup, matching their 1995 run to the last eight, and qualified unbeaten for UEFA WOMEN'S EURO 2009™. In 2003 she was inducted into the English Football Hall of Fame, only the second women to be so honoured.

Finland: Michael Käld

Date of birth: 6 May 1954

Playing career: GBK Kokkola, Hovsala BK, Larsmo BK

Coaching career: GBK Kokkola reserves, Nykarleby IK, FC United, Finland women

Originating from the small west-coast town of Kronoby, Michael Käld has masterminded Finland's rise to the continental elite, fostering an impressive team spirit and moulding the squad into an effective unit.

Käld's playing career took him to GBK Kokkola, Hovsala BK and Larsmo BK, before a second spell at GBK. It was at Kokkola that he moved into coaching at reserve-team level in 1991, a position he held for six years. His next job was at Nykarleby IK, before being appointed coach of leading women's side FC United in 2000.

In Käld's first year he led United to victory in the Finnish Cup, ending second in the league, and in 2001 he took over the national team. Finland had never qualified for a major finals and in his opening campaign they finished bottom of their 2003 FIFA Women's World Cup qualifying group, with three points from six games and 24 goals conceded.

But an experienced and talented squad hit form in UEFA WOMEN'S EURO 2005™ qualifying, finishing third in their section and beating Russia 3-1 on aggregate in the play-offs. With that, they went on to reach the semi-finals in England with victory against Denmark, which earned Käld an invitation to the annual president's reception on Independence Day and the title of coach of the year. Denmark had their revenge with a 1-0 win to pip Finland to the 2007 World Cup, but Käld was rewarded with a new contract seeing him through to the end of UEFA WOMEN'S EURO 2009™ on home soil.

France: Bruno Bini

Date of birth: 1 October 1954

Playing career: Laragne Sports, AS Aix-en-Provence, AS Nancy-Lorraine, Tours FC, US Orléans, FC Meung-sur-Loire, FC Orléans

Coaching career: France Under-16 women, France U20 women, France U18 women, Méditerranée Amateur, France U19 women, France women

Bruno Bini took over from Elisabeth Loisel at the helm of the France senior team on 16 February 2007, having previously won a European title at youth level. His predecessor had been in charge for ten years and had plenty of achievements to her name, but Bini lived up to expectations by reaching the UEFA European Women's Championship finals at the first attempt.

Bini was an excellent amateur football player. Twice a South-East Junior champion in the early 1970s with Laragne Sports and AS Aix-en-Provence, he had an apprenticeship at AS Nancy-Lorraine in 1973/74 but never turned professional, subsequently playing for Tours FC, US Orléans, FC Meung-sur-Loire and FC Orléans.

Working as a regional coach, as well as at the Ministry of Justice, Bini was appointed to lead the France women's Under-16 and U20 teams in 1993. Four years later, he took over the U18 side, finishing second at the 1998 UEFA European Women's U18 Championship. He repeated that in the first U19 event in 2002 and the following year France took the title in Germany.

Stepping down in 2004, three years later he returned to succeed Loisel with the senior side and they topped their UEFA WOMEN'S EURO 2009™ qualifying group ahead of Iceland, with a team familiar to him from his youth squads. Married with one daughter, Bini has said: "Coaching women, I think, suited me more than anything else." A man of letters, he is able to conjure a Paulo Coelho quotation or deploy Jean de la Fontaine fables in his team talks.

Germany: Silvia Neid

Date of birth: 2 May 1964

Playing career: SC Klinge Seckach, SSG 09 Bergisch Gladbach, TSV Siegen

Coaching career: Germany Under-18 women, Germany U19 women, Germany women

Silvia Neid had some act to follow when she took over as Germany coach in 2005, but in her very first tournament her team retained the FIFA Women's World Cup.

Neid was a leading player in the first great generation of Germany women's football. Joining SSG 09 Bergisch Gladbach in 1983 from SC Klinge Seckach, she helped them to a league title and one German Cup triumph before moving to TSV Siegen, where she claimed six championships and five knockout crowns between 1985 and 1996. In that time, she also captained Germany to victory at the 1989, 1991 and 1995 UEFA European Women's Championships, as well as reaching the World Cup final in the last of those years.

In 1996 she retired, having long been groomed for a coaching role by the founder of the Germany women's team, Gero Bisanz. Neid joined the technical staff of the national squad under her former playing colleague Tina Theune-Meyer, and in addition to assisting her to further senior European titles in 1997 and 2001 and the 2003 World Cup, Neid proved a success in charge of the youth team, winning the 2000 and 2001 UEFA European Women's Under-18 Championships and completing a hat-trick with the renamed U19 event a year later. That was topped in 2004 when Germany won the FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup, and after Neid helped Theune-Meyer to end her time in charge with another European crown in 2005, she took over as senior coach.

Germany soon cruised into the 2007 World Cup and once in China made stately progress to retaining their global title. In 2008, Germany won Olympic bronze for the third consecutive games and were the first team to qualify for UEFA WOMEN'S EURO 2009™ in Finland. Neid is under contract until 2013, a period that will take in the 2011 World Cup on home soil.

Iceland: Siggí Eyjólfsson

Date of birth: 1 December 1973

Playing career: KR Reykjavík, ÍA Akranes (twice), UNC Greensboro Spartans, Walsall FC, Chester City FC, KRC Harelbeke

Coaching career: Iceland women

The first man to lead an Iceland team to a senior final tournament in either men's or women's football, Siggí Eyjólfsson had a cosmopolitan playing career before moving into coaching.

Born in December 1973 and entering the youth ranks of KR Reykjavík at a young age, he graduated to the first team and helped them win the 1994 Icelandic Cup. In 1995, he moved to the United States for a bachelor's degree in exercise and sports science and then a master's in exercise and sports psychology at the University of North Carolina in Greensboro. Returning home with ÍA Akranes in 1998, the following year he joined English club Walsall FC, scoring in a 3-1 win against Oldham Athletic FC that secured promotion to the second tier.

He was loaned to Chester City FC for the first three months of 2000, before leaving Walsall for KRC Harelbeke of Belgium that November. Six months later, Eyjólfsson was back at KR, winning two league titles in as many years, and he ended his career in 2005 at ÍA. In 2002 he also began working at the Football Association of Iceland as technical director, and in that time he studied for UEFA's coaching qualifications. He earned the UEFA Pro Licence in 2007 in England, making him one of just two people from Iceland to hold that qualification at the time.

In January 2007, Eyjólfsson was appointed to the helm of the Iceland women's team, taking a particular interest in the psychological side of coaching as befitting his academic speciality. Success in UEFA WOMEN'S EURO 2009™ qualification was immediate, with his charges beating France 1-0 that June. Although Les Bleues ultimately pipped them to first place in the group, Iceland defeated the Republic of Ireland 4-1 in the play-offs, with an overall home record in the competition of five wins from five games and 21 unanswered goals.

Italy: Pietro Ghedin

Date of birth: 21 November 1952

Playing career: ACF Fiorentina, S.S. Lazio, AC Venezia, Calcio Catania, Pescara Calcio, AC Pistoiese, AC Siena

Coaching career: Italy Under-18, Malta U21, Malta, Italy (assistant), Italy women

Pietro Ghedin has been working for the Italian Football Federation since 1987. He started as coach for the Under-18 side before becoming a scout for the senior national team ahead of the 1990 FIFA World Cup in Italy.

He then became the Azzurri goalkeeping coach for the Olympic Games in 1992 and 1996, in Barcelona and Atlanta respectively. Between 1992 and 1995, he also coached the Malta national team at Under-21 and senior level, while still under contract with the FIGC.

He was then made assistant to Italy coach Cesare Maldini during the 1998 World Cup before covering the same role under Dino Zoff at UEFA EURO 2000™ and Giovanni Trapattoni at the 2002 World Cup. He took over as coach of the women's national team from Carolina Morace after Italy lost all their games in the group stage of UEFA WOMEN'S EURO 2005™, and has now led them to the 2009 finals.

A former defender, Ghedin played in Serie A with ACF Fiorentina and S.S. Lazio, joining the latter immediately after the capital side had won their first ever Scudetto in 1974 and remaining at the Stadio Olimpico until 1981. He also played in the lower divisions with AC Venezia, Calcio Catania, Pescara Calcio and AC Pistoiese before hanging up his boots in 1985 after a season at AC Siena.

Netherlands: Vera Pauw

Date of birth: 18 January 1963

Club career: SV Brederodes, VV Vreeswijk, CF Modena, Puck Deventer, Saestum

Coaching career: Scotland women, Netherlands women

Vera Pauw has long been a ground-breaker in Dutch female football and has now become the first coach to lead the Netherlands to a senior women's finals.

Born in January 1963, she began playing as a defender with SV Brederodes and VV Vreeswijk before becoming the first female player from her nation to join an Italian professional club, CF Modena. She also went on to play for Puck Deventer and Saestum, and won 89 caps from her debut in 1983 to her retirement 15 years later. At the same time, she worked for the Royal Netherlands Football Association (KNVB), mainly in the realm of girls' and women's soccer.

Having hung up her boots, she accepted the position of Scotland coach as well as national technical director for the women's game. Taking over a team in the second tier of European international competition, she improved their status enough for them to take part in main qualifying for UEFA WOMEN'S EURO 2005™, only just missing out on the play-offs. In 2004, she was appointed Netherlands coach and made a superb start to 2007 FIFA Women's World Cup qualifying with a 1-0 win in France. The Dutch were to miss out on a finals berth, but second place in their UEFA WOMEN'S EURO 2009™ qualifying pool, followed by a 4-0 aggregate play-off defeat of Spain, sent them through to Finland. In July 2009 she signed a new two-year contract.

Pauw is highly regarded internationally as a coach, and in May 2005 she was the first woman to complete the KNVB's CBV coaching diploma, earning her the UEFA Pro Licence. She has worked as a technical observer at major events including UEFA WOMEN'S EURO 2005™ and is a member of the UEFA Women's Football Committee.

Norway: Bjarne Berntsen

Date of birth: 21 December 1956

Playing career: Figgjo IL, Viking FK

Coaching career: Figgjo IL, Bryne FK, Viking FK, Norway women

Bjarne Berntsen was a surprise choice to follow the popular Åge Steen when the former Norway coach stood down a few months before UEFA WOMEN'S EURO 2005™, but the former international defender, with no experience of the women's game, immediately led the team to their first final since winning 2000 Olympic gold.

Having begun his playing career at local club Figgjo IL, Berntsen signed for Viking FK aged 20 in 1977 and went on to make more than 130 appearances in the next five years, as well as winning 33 Norway caps, most notably in the 2-1 win against England in September 1981. After ending his playing career, Berntsen returned to Figgjo to coach before his appointment by Bryne FK, whom he led to the 1987 Norwegian Cup, their only major honour. In this period, he also assisted national coach Tor Røste Fossen.

Berntsen returned to Viking in 1989 in a directorial role before being made coach between 1992 and 1995. He was then back at the club in 1999 as CEO until a reorganisation in 2004, previous to which he had acted as caretaker coach. But, at the end of the year, he was announced as Steen's replacement from 1 January 2005.

After success in England, where they beat Sweden in the last four before losing to Germany in Blackburn, Norway went on to reach the 2007 FIFA Women's World Cup semi-finals and the quarter-finals at the 2008 Olympics, having begun by inflicting a rare defeat on the United States, who went on to win gold. Shortly afterwards, Norway confirmed their place at UEFA WOMEN'S EURO 2009™, after which Berntsen is to step down in favour of Eli Landsem.

Russia: Igor Shalimov

Date of birth: 2 February 1969

Playing career: FC Spartak Moskva, US Foggia, FC Internazionale Milano, MSV Duisburg, AC Lugano, Udinese Calcio, Bologna FC, SSC Napoli

Coaching career: FC Krasnoznamensk, FC Uralan Elista, Russia women

One of his country's best known football talents, Igor Shalimov was appointed Russia coach on 20 May 2008 and within six months had led his team to UEFA WOMEN'S EURO 2009™.

Born in Moscow, he joined FC Spartak Moskva and won the Soviet title in 1989, before leaving two years later for US Foggia. In 1992, he moved on to FC Internazionale Milano and later went on to represent MSV Duisburg, AC Lugano, Udinese Calcio, Bologna FC and SSC Napoli, where the midfielder retired in 1999.

Having helped the Soviet Union win the 1990 UEFA European Under-21 Championship, he played at that year's FIFA World Cup finals. Shalimov represented the successor Commonwealth of Independent States at EURO '92 and was capped 23 times by Russia, including at EURO '96™.

He started his coaching career at second division club FC Krasnoznamensk in 2001, before taking charge of Premier-Liga outfit FC Uralan Elista in 2003, suffering relegation. Shalimov's next big coaching role was his current one, and he successfully guided Russia to the UEFA WOMEN'S EURO 2009™ play-offs before pipping Scotland on away goals.

Sweden: Thomas Dennerby

Date of birth: 13 August 1959

Playing career: Hammarby IF

Coaching career: Värtans IK, Spårvägens FF, Hammarby (assistant), Hammarby women, Djurgården/Älvsjö, Sweden women

Thomas Dennerby has been in charge of the Sweden team since July 2005, having previously assisted Marika Domanski-Lyfors at that year's UEFA European Women's Championship in England.

Dennerby grew up in southern Stockholm, and played Allsvenskan football for Hammarby IF between 1977 and 1985. Dennerby's best year there was 1982, when Hammarby finished league runners-up behind UEFA Cup winners IFK Göteborg. Dennerby was also capped by Sweden at Under-21 and youth level.

Moving on into coaching, Dennerby worked at Värtans IK and Spårvägens FF before working as assistant to Sören Cratz for Hammarby's sole Allsvenskan title success in 2001. After switching to lead Hammarby's female team, Dennerby moved to coach Djurgården/Älvsjö and won the 2003 title. Repeating that success the following year, Dennerby's side also knocked out compatriots Umeå IK in the UEFA Women's Cup quarter-finals in October 2004, the only time the northern club have ever lost before the final.

Three months later, Dennerby left to become No2 to Domanski-Lyfors. After reaching the semi-finals in England, he took over as Sweden's head coach, qualifying for the 2007 FIFA Women's World Cup and progressing to the quarter-finals of the 2008 Olympics, as well as earning a place at UEFA WOMEN'S EURO 2009™ with eight wins and 31 unanswered goals. Before going into full-time coaching, Dennerby worked as a detective inspector at the Swedish National Criminal Investigation Department.

Ukraine: Anatoliy Kutsev

Date of birth: 20 April 1959

Playing career: FC Dnipro Dnipropetrovsk, FC Kryvbas Kryvyi Rih, FC SKA Kyiv, FC Dynamo Kyiv

Coaching career: Ukraine women Under-19, Ukraine women

Born in Bender, Moldova, Anatoliy Kutsev has proved successful in his role as Ukraine coach.

A defender as a player, Kutsev started his career at FC Dnipro Dnipropetrovsk in 1977 and also played for FC Kryvbas Kryvyi Rih, FC SKA Kyiv and FC Dynamo Kyiv reserves. He also played ten games for the Ukrainian SSR in internal Soviet Union competitions.

Moving into coaching, he joined the staff of the Ukraine women's team in 1995 and took charge of the Under-19 side. Kutsev was appointed to the helm of the senior team in January 2007, in time for UEFA WOMEN'S EURO 2009™ qualifying, and made a superb start with six straight wins, including victory at home against Denmark.

In the end, Denmark were to pip Ukraine to first place in the group but a 5-0 aggregate win against Slovenia ensured their berth in Finland, having conceded just three goals in ten qualifiers. Kutsev said: "Many think that defence is our main strength, but we are trying hard to achieve balance in every position, though we're building it on a solid back line."

The stadium

Helsinki's Olympic Stadium, with an original capacity of more than 70,000, was opened in 1938, and was due to stage the summer games two years later but war was to intervene. However, the Olympics did come to the Finnish capital in 1952, occurring in the shadow of the stadium's 72m-high tower, which commands superb views of the city.

As well as being the regular home for the Finland national team, the Olympic Stadium has continued to stage major international sporting events, not least the inaugural IAAF World Championship in Athletics in 1983, and the same event in 2005. Major concerts are also held at the arena, with the Rolling Stones having played there six times.

The stadium

The Helsinki Football Stadium was opened in 2000 as well as being used by the capital's biggest club and the national team, it staged the final of the 2003 FIFA U-17 World Cup, with a sell-out crowd watching Brazil beat Spain 1-0. Although it usually has an artificial surface, a grass pitch will be laid for UEFA WOMEN'S EURO 2009™.

The club

HJK are the most successful club in Finland with a record 21 league titles as well as eight Finnish Cups and four League Cups. Founded in 1907, they are the only Finnish side to compete in the UEFA Champions League group stage, beating FC Metz to qualify in 1998/99 and picking up five points including a win against SL Benfica and draw in Lisbon. Among their former players are Jari Litmanen, Mikael Forssell and father and son internationals Alexei Eremenko Sr and Jr.

The city

The capital of Finland since 1812, Helsinki was founded in 1550 but only really grew with its new status in the 19th century. It is now one of the fastest-growing cities in Europe and is home to attractions including the National Museum of Finland. It has a famous sporting heritage; not only was the 1952 Olympic Games held in Helsinki, but also the first IAAF World Championships in Athletics in 1983 and the same event 22 years later.

The stadium

The Lahti Stadium, built in 1981 and revamped for the 2003 FIFA U-17 World Cup, is not only used for football but also athletics, lacrosse, cross-country skiing and biathlon, in which it has staged the world championship three times. The record attendance for a football match is 13,533 for a 1988 fixture between FC Kuusysi and FC Reipas, the two teams that merged to form FC Lahti in 1996. For the tournament the arena is being turned into an 8,000-seater stadium.

The club

Kuusysi and Reipas put a long-held rivalry aside when they combined, and took two years to earn promotion to the top division, where they have remained ever since. However, while Kuusysi won five league titles and Reipas two, Lahti only finished in the top three for the first time in 2008, though they did lift the League Cup the year before.

The city

Given city status in 1905, Lahti has a population of around 100,000 and is famed as a major sporting centre. As well as football and winter sports events, the city staged the 1997 World Games, a quadrennial event for disciplines not included in the Olympics.

The stadium

The Tampere Stadium was built in 1965 and stages several sports but its primary use is for football, and as well as the local club, Finland's national team have played there on a number of occasions. The record attendance was set by local club FC Ilves when 24,000 watched them play Juventus in the European Champion Clubs' Cup in 1984. The stadium was renovated in 2004.

The club

Tampere United were formed in 1998 when a merger between FC Ilves and local rivals Tampereen Pallo-Veikot was abandoned but the new club took over Ilves's place in the first division. Within a year they were promoted and by 2001 Tampere were Finnish champions, repeating the feat in 2006 and 2007.

The city

Tampere has a metropolitan population of around 240,000 people; only the capital area is larger in Finland. Founded in 1775 by Gustav III of Sweden, it grew in the following century as a major industrial centre, often compared to Manchester. It was there in 1905 that the 'Red Declaration' was issued in a strike leading to democracy for Finland, then under Russian control, and it was in the city that VI Lenin first met Joseph Stalin. Although football is popular in Tampere, it is strongly challenged by ice hockey with Ilves and Tappara both successful teams. The city also boasts the large Särkänniemi amusement park.

The stadium

The Turku Stadium, home to both the city's top-flight clubs, was built to stage events at the 1952 Olympic games and revamped in 2003, in time for the FIFA U-17 World Cup in Finland. A further 1,600 seats are being installed for UEFA WOMEN'S EURO 2009™. The record crowd there is around 15,000 for a 1987 UEFA Cup tie between TPS and FC Internazionale Milano while local derbies involving the two Turku clubs regularly sell out.

The clubs

TPS are the older of the two clubs. Founded in 1922, they won the Finnish championship eight times, most recently in 1975, and lifted the Finnish Cup in 1991 and 1994. They also have a women's team in the top Finnish division.

Inter, set up in 1990, reached the top division for the first time six years later and have become one of the strongest sides in the nation, taking their first league title in 2008.

The city

Turku is the oldest and fifth largest city in Finland with a population of around 175,000. A major port, it is the capital of the region of Finland Proper. At times it has been the largest Finnish city, capital until 1812, and was a major centre during the days of the Swedish Empire. The town continues to have a large Swedish population; appropriately that nation will play all their group games in Turku.
