Irish PRIDE

"I will keep coming back for more," insists Eastern Region IRL midfielder Ray Whelehan, who holds the record for most games played in the UEFA Regions' Cup

o player knows the UEFA Regions' Cup like Eastern Region IRL midfielder Ray Whelehan. With 27 appearances in the competition stretching back six campaigns, the Tolka Rovers FC man has played more games in the world's top amateur competition than anyone else. Having helped steer his side through qualifying, the 31-year-old electrician has been robbed of the chance to play at this summer's finals by a cruciate injury, but he knows it will be a special occasion for his team-mates and all the other teams involved.

What does the UEFA Regions' Cup mean to you?

It means everything to play in it. You put in a lot of effort over the season, all the training and all the travel, and getting to play in the UEFA Regions' Cup makes it all worthwhile. At our level, I don't think you could play in a better tournament.

What past tournament stands out for you?

The finals in Portugal in 2011 was the big one. It was an incredible ten days. We got our rewards by getting to the final where we lost narrowly to the hosts. I first played in qualifying in Bosnia in 2004; I had just turned 21 and managed to make the squad. I'm 31 now but I still

run around as

if I was 21.

How important is it for the Irish players to be competing on home soil?

It will be good for our families that they can watch us play without the expense and hassle of travelling. My father comes to every home game; even though I am older now it's like I was 12 years old, the way we speak after the match. My mother, my wife and mother-in-law came to see me play



in Portugal in 2011 and the tournament was a nice excuse for them to get away. I don't know what they will do now we are playing in Ireland – a week in a hotel in Dublin maybe! Whoever is lucky enough to make the squad will have great support from their family and friends.

Was professional football ever an option for you?

At the start of my career, the option was there to play in the League of Ireland at a semi-pro level, but a couple of things stopped me. I am a selfemployed electrician now but at the time, when I was 19 or 20, I was starting an apprenticeship and the demands of playing professionally would have been very high on my time. Also, I had broken into the squad with the junior international team for the UEFA Regions' Cup and I knew that if I played at a professional level for a club I would not be able to play in future Regions' Cups. So the next level for me was the

international side at junior level; I knew that standard was still very high and I have learned how to compete at that level.

Your team is called Eastern Region IRL but do you feel as if you are representing your country?

Absolutely – we are playing for Ireland when we play in those matches. I know it's called amateur level by people outside of the game but to me, this is the highest level we can play at and represent our country. And I could not be happier when I pull on that green jersey as I know I am representing my country – I am very proud to be part of that.

Is it an honour to hold the record for appearances in the UEFA Regions' Cup?

I don't keep tabs on all of my games because I don't want to be one to gloat about it. When people ask me how many caps I have, I say "a few". But I was blown away when I heard that I had the record. And I will keep coming back for more.

How do you rate Eastern Region IRL's chances in the final tournament?

I know from past experience in the Regions' Cup that it will be a very tough tournament; the standard is very high. You tend not to get one team that dominates the group, but if we can get a positive result from the first game we have a chance of getting to the final. We are not in awe of the continental sides as we have been here before and we have experience.

The names of their sides have changed from campaign to campaign, but the Republic of Ireland have remained consistent performers throughout, with the likes of Kenneth Hoey, Ray Whelehan and Ross Carrig featuring regularly under coach Gerry Smith since the start of the 2001 UEFA Regions' Cup campaign.

Losing finalists in 2011 as Leinster & Munster, Smith is thrilled his side are hosting this tournament. "If you speak to any of our international managers, they would give anything to get to a final tournament, so we are delighted to be here and be in a position to play in Ireland," the 59-year-old said. "If

"I would love to see the Irish public come out and get right behind the players" you had said to me last October before we went to Hungary for the qualifying round that we could qualify and also be the hosts, I would have bitten both your hands off."

With a thriving amateur football scene in Ireland, the UEFA Regions' Cup is a big deal for local players, and Smith is hoping Eastern Region's exploits can capture the public imagination. "I would love to see the Irish public come out and get right behind the players. These are the players from the grassroots – the guys who do it for nothing but the love of the game."

Smith, however, is keen to point out that there is nothing amateurish about the talents at his command. "We have players who will impress," he said. "Greg Moorhouse is only 20 but he is one who can do well for us. We have players in the squad who could have played at League of Ireland level; Jimmy Carr and Darren Dunne are players like that."

COACH Gerry Smith

Dubliner Smith has experience and home advantage on his side. He has coached an Irish team in all nine seasons of the UEFA Regions' Cup, and took Leinster & Munster to the final in 2011. Having played for Saint Patrick's Athletic FC, he coached Vianney Boys FC and led the Republic of Ireland (featuring Kevin Doyle, Glenn Whelan and Keith Fahey) at the 2003 FIFA World Youth Championship.

"I am hung up on this trophy," admitted Ankara coach Mustafa Özer as he prepared his side for the UEFA Regions' Cup final tournament in the Republic of Ireland. "We need to bring it home to Turkey." The 45-yearold former Fenerbahce SK and Turkey defender led his team to one-goal victories against sides from Russia, Malta and Finland to earn a return to the amateur final tournament - where his assistant, Hames Öztürk, had led a previous Ankara outfit in 2011.

Qualifying as Group 6 winners was no easy task. "The teams were all of a similar standard, which is why the winning margins were so narrow," said Özer. "All three of our opponents were fantastic, in terms of mentality

and skill, but our team play and the individual ability of a few of our players made the difference."

Deploying a 4-2-3-1 formation, Özer's side thrive on pace with an emphasis on zonal defending. Midfielders Gökhan Demircan and Muhammet Kızılkava cauaht the eye in qualifying - and not only for their excitable hairstyles. Goalkeeper Gökhan Köksal and pacv right-winger Samet Dağlı also showed plenty of ability, while midfield utility man Muzaffer İlhan has impressed with his football and his singing voice, often entertaining his team-mates with duets with the Ankara kit man.

Özer hopes the whole side will have something to sing about in Ireland. "In terms of the standard of organisation and the quality of our opponents, this is a significant competition," the coach said. "Flying the flag for Turkey and representing our amateur football will be a great experience."

COACH Mustafa Özer

Özer was capped four times by Turkey after making his name – alongside his brother Hasan - at Gaziantepspor as a defender. He subsequently represented Fenerbahce SK and a number of other lower-league clubs, before moving into coaching with his home-town side Siirtspor. He is a regional coach for the Turkish Football Federation and has also helped out with the national women's vouth teams.

"We are not a team that has one or two stars," said South Moravia coach Stanislav Schwarz as he explained the spirit that has taken his side to the UEFA Regions' Cup final tournament. "Our opponents cannot just man mark one or two players to get the better of us. Our teamwork is our greatest weapon."

That spirit was very much in evidence as the Czech representatives made it through intermediary round Group 3, crucially beating host side Vojvodina on the final day. Goalkeeper David Juran conceded only once in that tournament in Serbia, and Ondřej Ullmann was the team's top scorer with two goals.

Schwarz was more than pleased

"This may be the highlight of these players' footballing careers" with the way that his side conducted themselves. "We stuck together when it mattered and played with proper Czech tactics," he explained. "I'm not exaggerating: we had some spectacular attacks that you would expect to see at a much higher level."

Some of his players had a glimpse of more successful careers as children – a number were on the books at local professional clubs, but for one reason or another never played professionally. That means the UEFA Regions' Cup final tournament is likely to be a career high. "Representing their country at the final tournament may be the highlight of these players' footballing careers," Schwarz noted. "They will not think twice about taking a ten-day holiday from work to come to the tournament."

Czech sides have been regulars at the UEFA Regions' Cup finals; Moravia won the 2001 edition on home soil, while the cities of Prague, Zlin and Brno have also sent teams to past finals.

COACH

Stanislav Schwarz

Schwarz is a full-time coach with the regional association in Moravia. He previously coached FC Zbrojovka Brno, the club he represented for the bulk of his playing career, either side of a spell in the top division with RH Cheb. Capped eight times at Under-21 level by Czechoslovakia, Schwarz played twice for the senior B team and finished his playing career in Vienna with SV Wienerfeld.

a second UEFA Regions' Cup final tournament. "We will try to do better than last time, and maybe reach the final." Tuzla came agonizingly close to that target on their debut in 2007. Fuad Grbešić's side went into their final game in top spot only to lose to eliminated French side Basse-Normandie. Bronze medals as the best group runners-up in Bulgaria were some consolation, but they will hope to do better under local footballing legend Šećerbegović, who also led Tuzla into their 2012/13 UEFA Regions' Cup tilt.

The third-largest city in Bosnia and Herzegovina, Tuzla is something

of a footballing hotbed; national team players past and present Elvir Rahimić, Sejad Salihović, Miralem Pjanić, Ervin Bičakčić, Mirsad Bešlija and Mirsad Dedić all come from the Tuzla region. Football has been popular here for a century or more, with Šećerbegović's old club – FK Sloboda Tuzla - founded in 1919. The Crvenocrni (Red-and-Blacks) are among 120 clubs in the region, with around 6,500 players affiliated to the Tuzla Canton association. Many of Tuzla's players work in the local coal and salt mines, or in related industries, with goalkeeper Dino Hamidović, defender Haris Mehanović, midfielder Nedžad Djanić and forward Majid Šmigalović all standing out in qualifying, as Tuzla recorded wins against teams from Belarus, Italy and Portugal to reach the final tournament. "We have quality and with a little luck we will have something to be proud of at the end of the tournament," said Šećerbegović.

COACH

Dževad Šećerbegović

A member of the Yugoslavia squad that finished fourth in the 1980 Olympic football tournament in Moscow, Šećerbegović is well known in Tuzla, having represented local club FK Sloboda from 1974 to 1983. He spent the final years of his playing career in Turkey with Beşiktaş JK, his side finishing second in the league in 1984/85. Since retirement, he has remained involved with local football in Tuzla.

Visits to Dublin Arena can be arranged, while displays in the public bars in Dalymount Park, home of Bohemian FC, offer an insight into the history of the stadium, which has hosted some of the greatest ever players including Pelé, Franz Beckenbauer,

George Best, Marco van Basten, Bobby Charlton, Zbigniew Boniek and Zinédine Zidane.

BBC DJ Steve Lamacq, on a recent visit to Dublin, found himself in Dalymount Park and was amazed to see a poster from Bob Marley's concert at the venue in July 1980. A keen football fan, Marley reportedly got a kick from knowing he was appearing on the same stage as greats of the likes of Pelé and Best, proof Dublin's football community welcomed one and all.

Croke Park

Home to the Gaelic Athletic Association, the stunning stadium showcases Ireland's key indigenous sports: gaelic football and hurling.

Guinness brewery

Kilmainham Gaol

Many Irish national heroes were imprisoned here during the struggle for independence, making the jail an excellent place to learn about Irish history.

n the 1980s, when four lads from the city were about to make U2 the biggest group in the world, Dublin was dubbed the "city of a thousand bands". City of a thousand footballers would be more accurate, as football is at the heart of the Republic of Ireland's capital. As flights descend to land at the city's airport on Saturday and Sunday mornings, there's a view on the green fields below of match after match, because the Dublin and District Schoolboy League, which has helped produce

such talents as Robbie Keane,
Damien Duff and Richard Dunne,
is the biggest of its kind in Europe.
Cork has spawned players such as
Denis Irwin and Roy Keane,
but Dublin is the pulse of the
Irish game.

Dublin is a compact city, as visitors here for the UEFA Regions' Cup will discover, and its most popular attractions (according to Ireland's tourist board) – the Guinness Storehouse, Dublin Zoo, the Book of Kells and St Patrick's Cathedral – are all in, or within walking distance of, the city centre. So

FOR THE LOVE OF THE GAME

The UEFA Regions' Cup has given amateur players a fitting stage to display their talents since 1999

t's incredible, beautiful, marvellous," beamed forward Francesco
Gasparato after his side's shoot-out success in the 2013 final made Veneto the first two-time UEFA Regions' Cup winners. "This is the best thing going. But tomorrow, we return to our normal lives – back to work on Monday, but certainly with a bigger smile."

There were 38 entrants for this the ninth edition of the UEFA Regions' Cup, which makes dreams come true for amateur players. "It's their UEFA Champions League," explained the UEFA Youth and Amateur Football Committee chairman, Jim Boyce. "These are the guys who usually turn out to play on a Saturday afternoon for fun. They never dreamed they would be getting on aeroplanes and playing in a European competition."

The UEFA Regions' Cup is for players who have never featured at any professional level. Contested by the winners of national amateur



competitions – with smaller nations fielding national teams – it is a showcase for the wealth of talent that exists under the radar in European football.

The successor to the UEFA Amateur Cup, which ran from 1965 to 1978, the UEFA Regions' Cup was first contested in 1999, when Italian contenders Veneto won the first of their two titles. The Czech Republic's Central Moravia won the second edition as hosts in 2001, with Italy's Piemonte Valle d'Aosta taking the 2003 crown in Germany.

A team representing Spain's Basque Country won the 2005 tournament in Poland, while it was the latter nation's Dolnośląski Region who prevailed in Bulgaria in 2007. Another Spanish side, Castilla y León, won in Croatia in 2009, and Portuguese hosts Braga triumphed in 2011.

Players who have featured in the UEFA Regions' Cup have gone on to greater things – some past alumni have featured in the UEFA Champions League proper and been capped at senior level – but playing for love rather than money is the competition's central principle. We do it because we love it.

Zagreb Region coach Sreten Ćuk is confident that the UEFA Regions' Cup will be some of his players' last hurrah as amateurs, with scouts in Croatia eager to sign up some of the team's top performers. "We've had players who ended up in professionall teams, even playing professionally abroad," the 51-year-old said. "There are more and more scouts coming to our matches and asking about the players, as there is plenty of potential in this side."

Zagreb outstripped sides from Azerbaijan, Sweden and Latvia in Group 1 to become the last side to qualify, and Ćuk hopes his team can now also make an impression here. "Croatia is a relatively small

country and our region can't compare with some of the others at the final tournament in terms of population," he said. "However, for years now we have shown we're doing a great job in Croatia. We have a lot of talented players, and a good coaching and scouting system is crucial here."

Fashioning amateur players into a coherent side for the UEFA Regions' Cup is no easy task. "A lot of them have day jobs and university commitments, so it's a hard to get them together to play," Ćuk said. "Our captain, 31-year-old Željko Štulec, works at a rolling stock company and had trouble getting time off work to help us in qualifying, but he is a really passionate and hard-working player who even put his job at risk to help the team. Nikica Brujić at 28 has a catering company and he loses out financially when he is on duty with the team, but he wouldn't miss these games for anything."

COACH Sreten Ćuk

Ćuk notably led NK Lokomotiva from the third division to the top flight in Croatia, and since coaching Zagreb at the 2009 UEFA Regions' Cup final tournament has been in charge of HNK Gorica and NK Croatia Sesvete. He has also worked as assistant coach at GNK Dinamo Zagreb - briefly taking sole command for a **UEFA Champions League** qualifier. As well as being a regional coach, Ćuk is also in charge of Dinamo's B team.

"Some people even think he deserves a senior cap. That shows that, even playing amateur football, you can make a leap into the professional world."

For now, Kowalski's players are very much in the amateur world. Of his top talents, goalkeeper Jarosław Krawczyk works in a bank, defender Jacek Madrzejewski is a director at a shopping centre, and forward Jakub Jakóbczyk is studying physical education. However, their coach is certain Dolnoślaski will show professional commitment in Ireland. "We're going there to play football, not have a nice break. We'll do our very best."

A defender with Lotnik Wrocław, Ślask Wrocław and Ślęza Wrocław among others, Kowalski also played abroad in Germany and Malaysia before moving into coaching. said Württemberg coach Michael Rentschler as he looked ahead to the UEFA Regions' Cup final tournament. "The grassroots are an important part of football and this helps to keep grassroots alive. I really enjoy this competition. It is a highlight for me as well as the players, and it is always exciting to get to know new people and new surroundings."

"It is just a great competition,"

Rentschler has both coached and played in this competition previously with Württemberg, and several members of his squad have also played in it before. They too know that the UEFA Regions' Cup is something special. "It gets the players out of their everyday lives and is very professionally

"Wearing the eagle on your chest: that matters" organised by UEFA, and of course they get to wear a Germany shirt," Rentschler said. "Wearing the eagle on your chest: that matters."

Württemberg got the better of sides from Slovakia, England and Scotland in qualifying, scoring ten times and conceding just once, against Eastern Slovakia in their opening game. They were one of five teams to advance with a perfect three wins from three games and come into the tournament with confidence high. "We want to attack and dominate all the time," Rentschler said. "We like quick transitions and getting shots on goal. Of course, this means keeping the ball a lot of the time."

To that end, midfielder and business administrator Martin Kleinschrodt is a key player. He is featuring in his third UEFA Regions' Cup and offers "danger in front of goal", according to his coach. Attacker and university student Marian Asch also gets a special mention for his "pace and versatility".

COACH

Michael Rentschler

Rentschler is a coach instructor at the local football association in Württemberg and also oversees local youth and women's teams. Once coach of VfL Kirchheim/ Teck, the 44-year-old was on the staff of Germany's Under-21s between 2009 and 2013 Rentschler coached Württemberg in 2012/13 as they came to within one game of the UEFA Regions' Cup final tournament, and was a defender in the Württemberg side that staged the event in 2003.

GETTING INVOLVED

UEFA is working with member associations around Europe to increase participation

he UEFA Regions' Cup is the world's top amateur football tournament and its success and popularity are an example of how the grassroots game across Europe is flourishing. Inspiring people to play, whatever their age, sex or ability, is an essential part of UEFA's mission, and to do that the right infrastructure needs to be in place. This is one of the principal aims of the UEFA Grassroots Charter, which was set up in 2005 to protect the development and growth of the European game. The charter was devised to help upgrade grassroots programmes as well as to evaluate and reward **UEFA** member associations for their grassroots work, with membership gained by achieving

certain criteria. This quality mark system operates on three levels - gold, silver and bronze - and each of UEFA's 54 associations is classified according to the quality and depth of the grassroots football they provide. The charter also seeks to help associations better understand

Lisbon (above) how the game is played in their territory – and by whom. "Grassroots is the basic foundation of all our activities. in order to create football for all and at the same time develop skills and talented players," said UEFA grassroots ambassador Per Ravn Omdal.

Like most UEFA members. the Football Association of Ireland (FAI) - currently a silver award holder - has its own grassroots projects to highlight the importance of

community. One such initiative is the Soccer Sisters scheme, which encourages girls to take up the sport and began when the FAI realised it was mainly boys who were attending regular football camps. Weekly sessions were started in areas where football was not widely played by girls despite facilities being available, and this soon spread to clubs so they could engage more with the grassroots. The use of ambassadors such as FIFA Puskás Award nominee Stephanie Roche afforded star endorsement to the project.

are a great way to introduce girls to the game. I used to really look forward to them," said Irish senior international Lauren Dwyer. "Growing up, boys' football used to be the focus of schools and clubs, but the camps really gave us girls the opportunity to develop our skills, make friends and have lots of fun too."

Grassroots initiatives can boost various sectors of society. A walking football scheme for players aged about 60 offers a framework for participation as well as health benefits. The Late Night League, inaugurated in 2010, endeavours to keep youngsters away from alcohol and drugs; in areas where matches take place, instances of anti-social behaviour have decreased. The FAI chief executive, John Delaney, is full of praise. "This has proven to be a great success keeping at-risk teenagers off the streets at night," he said. "Football

can be used as a tool to bring people together and to improve relationships and this is exactly what it has succeeded in doing."

Such grassroots efforts have encouraged more people to get involved in football and also to play the game in a respectful manner. Ireland's Don't X the Line campaign has had a positive impact on the behaviour of spectators, parents and children by teaching tolerance and giving a platform to messages about safe participation.

UEFA's member associations are also urged to keep players in football so that they continue enjoying the sport. The subject

is regularly on the agenda at the UEFA Grassroots Workshop – held every three years – where the associations gather to exchange ideas and share best practice examples of the latest trends. This is one of several ventures that enable European football's governing body to promote the grassroots game throughout the continent. The next workshop is scheduled for April 2016 in Ljubljana, Slovenia.

Meanwhile, UEFA Grassroots
Week takes place each year and
will now be part of the European
Week of Sport in September,
organised in cooperation with
the European Commission.
This year, national assocations
will be encouraged to arrange
grassroots activities at a time
when football is in the spotlight
between important fixtures
in the European Qualifiers and
the launch of the European club
competition season.

What's more, each year, maxipitches are donated to the host cities of the UEFA Champions League and UEFA Europa League finals to leave a legacy for the grassroots long after the showpiece matches have been played. In 2014, Cristiano Ronaldo and Gareth Bale lit up Lisbon in the UEFA Champions League final, and the grassroots game in the city continues to profit from the maxi-pitch donated by UEFA. From the grassroots to the stars, we all play the same game.



For most of the players here, competing in the UEFA Regions' Cup is the pinnacle of their footballing careers. For the referee teams at the final tournament, though, it is only the start. The referees involved in the UEFA Regions' Cup are all regulars in their domestic top flights and have been earmarked by UEFA and their national associations for a bright future in the game.

At the final tournament, UEFA's team of referee observers passes on its experience, hosting practical sessions in which the match officials watch and discuss video footage of thought-provoking match incidents. Referee fitness trainers, meanwhile, ensure the officials stay in shape. "Control is important, as are respect and man management," explained Ray Ellingham, an observer at the

2013 final tournament, referring to what UEFA wants to see from the up-and-coming referees. "And it's about getting the big, game-changing decisions right."

Success at this level leads to bigger things. Paolo Tagliavento, referee of the 2007 final, is now a regular in the UEFA Champions League, while the man who took charge of the 2013 final, Artur Soares Dias, features regularly in the UEFA Europa League and the European Qualifiers, "Being here with all the other referees from different backgrounds gives you a different perspective," said the Portuguese official (pictured above on a UEFA referee training course). The 2015 final tournament will doubtless broaden horizons for a new generation of officials.


