## Match background

England will look to maintain their unbeaten record under Roy Hodgson when they take on Italy in the last UEFA EURO 2012 quarter-final in Kyiv.

- Hodgson led England to first place in Group D but now faces an Italy side also unbeaten at this EURO, having finished runners-up in Group C.
- It is the teams' first meeting for ten years and only once before have they met at a UEFA European Championship final tournament, Italy winning 1-0 in 1980 to eliminate England.
- The winners will play Germany in the semi-finals in Warsaw on 28 June.

### Head-to-head record

- Italy took nine attempts to beat England for the first time, Fabio Capello scoring in a 2-0 home friendly victory in 1973. The Azzurri nevertheless hold a slight head-to-head advantage with a record of W9 D6 L7.
- Although the nations first played in 1933 they did not meet in a competitive fixture until 1978 FIFA World Cup qualifying, trading 2-0 home wins – but it was Italy who made it to Argentina. The Azzurri have won four of their six competitive meetings, England just one.

- Vincenzo Montella's double overturned Robbie Fowler's goal in the countries' most recent encounter, from which Gianluigi Buffon is the only survivor. Demetrio Albertini, now Italian Football Federation vice-president, appeared as a substitute.

#### **11 October 1997: Italy 0-0 England – Stadio Olimpico, Rome, FIFA World Cup, qualifier**

- England avenged a 1-0 home defeat earlier in this qualifying campaign by earning the draw that took them to the 1998 World Cup as group winners and left Italy to qualify via the play-offs. Hodgson was in Rome with Glenn Hoddle's squad and helped out as Hoddle's interpreter.
- Gianfranco Zola, then of Chelsea FC, had scored the only goal of the first game at Wembley on 12 February 1997, securing Italy's first away win against England since 1973 when they were 1-0 victors in a friendly.

#### **7 July 1990: Italy 2-1 England (R Baggio 72, Schillaci 86pen; Platt 82) – Stadio San Nicola, Bari, FIFA World Cup, third-place play-off**

- Italy claimed the bronze medal at their home World Cup thanks to Salvatore Schillaci's late penalty, which secured him the Golden Shoe.

#### **15 June 1980: Italy 1-0 England (Tardelli 79) – Stadio Comunale, Turin, 1980 UEFA European Championship, group stage**

- Italy's narrow victory in their second game of the 1980 finals ended English hopes of finishing as group winners and reaching the final. Enzo Bearzot's hosts eventually finished second in the section behind Belgium and lost the third-place play-off to Czechoslovakia.

### **Form guide**

- England have posted four wins and one draw under Hodgson and are now looking to reach only their second UEFA European Championship semi-final since 1968.

- When Italy finished fourth in 1980 and reached the semi-final in 1988, there was no quarter-final stage.

### **Team ties**

- Hodgson has had coaching spells in Italy at FC Internazionale Milano (1995-97, 1999) and Udinese Calcio (2001). In 1999, when serving briefly as caretaker coach back at Inter, he worked with Andrea Pirlo.

- Hodgson faced Italy four times as Switzerland coach, posting one win, one draw and two defeats. In 1994 World Cup qualifying, his Switzerland side earned a 2-2 draw in Cagliari and then won 1-0 in Berne before two 1-0 friendly defeats.

- Hodgson enjoyed a famous win against Juventus during Fulham FC's run to the 2010 UEFA Europa League final, overturning a 3-1 first-leg loss with a 4-1 home victory in the round of 16. Claudio Marchisio played for Juventus in the first leg.

- As a Juventus player, Cesare Prandelli suffered a 1979/80 UEFA Cup Winners' Cup semi-final defeat by Arsenal FC but beat Manchester United FC at the same stage of the 1983/84 edition. He came off the bench for the last six minutes of Juventus's 1984/85 European Champion Clubs' Cup final victory over Liverpool FC.

- Prandelli's ACF Fiorentina side beat Everton FC 4-2 on penalties after a 2-2 aggregate draw in the 2007/08 UEFA Cup round of 16. Riccardo Montolivo – a scorer in the Viola's 2-0 first-leg win – converted his spot kick in the shoot-out, while Phil Jagielka had his penalty saved. Joleon Lescott was also in Everton's team and Leighton Baines on the bench.

- Steven Gerrard headed the first goal when Liverpool fought back to draw 3-3 draw with Pirlo's AC Milan and win the 2004/05 UEFA Champions League final on penalties. Pirlo's deflected free-kick off scorer Filippo Inzaghi helped Milan avenge that defeat in the 2007 showpiece.

- Wayne Rooney has struck ten goals in 14 UEFA Champions League appearances for Manchester United against Italian clubs. This included four goals in a 7-2 aggregate win against Pirlo's Milan in the 2009/10 round of 16 – although he was also on the losing side against them in the 2006/07 semi-finals despite finding the net twice in the first leg.

- Rooney has scored four times in six appearances against Daniele De Rossi's AS Roma – including one goal in a 7-1 quarter-final win at Old Trafford in 2006/07 when De Rossi got the visitors' goal. De Rossi missed a penalty at the same stadium when Roma lost at the same stage in 2007/08.

- John Terry scored in Chelsea FC's 4-1 UEFA Champions League round of 16 second-leg victory against SSC Napoli in March. Ashley Cole was also in Chelsea's lineup, while Morgan de Sanctis and Christian Maggio featured for Napoli. The Italy pair played against Manchester City FC's Joe Hart, James Milner and Lescott in the group stage.

- Theo Walcott got the winner in both legs of Arsenal's UEFA Champions League play-off success against Udinese Calcio last August. Antonio Di Natale scored but also had a penalty saved in Udinese's 3-1 aggregate loss.

- Mario Balotelli has been a team-mate of Hart, Lescott and Milner at Manchester City since 2010, winning the FA Cup in 2011 and the club's first league title since 1968 a year later.

- Alessandro Diamanti played alongside Robert Green and Scott Parker at West Ham United FC in 2009/10.

- Fabio Borini was as a youth player at Chelsea and made four Premier League substitute appearances as a team-mate of Terry and Cole. He also had a three-month loan at Swansea City AFC in 2011.

- Ashley Young, Baines and Milner were in the England team that drew 2-2 with the Italy of Giorgio Chiellini, Antonio Nocerino and Montolivo at the 2007 UEFA European Under-21 Championship.

## Match facts

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### ENGLAND

- Ashley Young, Alex Oxlade-Chamberlain, James Milner, Ashley Cole and Steven Gerrard are all a yellow card away from a suspension.
- England have won just eight of the 16 UEFA European Championship games when they have scored first.
- England were one of only two teams not to catch a single opponent offside in the group stage along with Greece.
- Wayne Rooney took his tally of international goals to 29 against Ukraine, moving up to eighth on England's all-time list. He is one behind Tom Finney, Nat Lofthouse and Alan Shearer.
- Roy Hodgson's side did not muster a shot on target in the first half against Ukraine, the first time they have failed to do so at a UEFA European Championship since their group stage meeting with Italy in 1980.
- England had not beaten Sweden in seven previous competitive meetings, drawing five and losing two, before 15/06.
- Finalists eight times, England have never won their opening game at a UEFA European Championship, though this time they recovered to top their group for only the second time after 1996.
- Oxlade-Chamberlain and Jordan Henderson made their competitive debuts against France on 11/06. Jack Butland and Martin Kelly are yet to make theirs; Butland is the only uncapped member of the squad.
- Cole has played a national record 21 final tournament games and has gone a record 97 outfield appearances without an England goal. Gary Neville, a member of the coaching staff at UEFA EURO 2012, set the previous mark of 85.

### Injury news

- Kelly has been struggling with a virus while Glen Johnson has been on antibiotics for a toe infection.
- John Ruddy (broken finger), Gareth Barry (torn stomach muscle), Frank Lampard (thigh) and Gary Cahill (broken jaw) pulled out of the squad with injuries and were replaced by Butland, Phil Jagielka, Henderson and Kelly respectively.

### Miscellaneous

- On 21/06, Queens Park Rangers FC announced that Rob Green will join them on a free transfer at the end of June.
- England convened in Manchester on 23/05, with Chelsea FC's UEFA Champions League-winning contingent joining six days later as their base moved to Hertfordshire on their return from Oslo. They arrived in Krakow on 06/06.
- Hodgson was unveiled as Fabio Capello's successor on 01/05, assuming the reins on 14/05. Capello quit on 08/02.
- Four players in the squad have previous UEFA European Championship experience: Steven Gerrard (2000, 2004), Cole (2004), John Terry (2004), Rooney (2004). Gerrard is the fifth England player to feature at three UEFA European Championships after Tony Adams, Shearer, Gary Neville and Sol Campbell.

- Oxlade-Chamberlain and Kelly made debuts in Norway; Danny Welbeck scored his first goal against Belgium.

### UEFA EURO 2012 qualifying

- Joe Hart played every minute of England's campaign, keeping five clean sheets in eight qualifiers; Cole was the only other ever-present member of the squad. Five of the squad did not feature in qualifying: Green, Butland, Oxlade-Chamberlain, Henderson and Kelly.

### Domestic information

- Hart, Joleon Lescott and Milner helped Manchester City FC earn their first top-flight championship in 44 years.
- Cole played on 19/05 as Chelsea defeated FC Bayern München to win the UEFA Champions League for the first time, the left-back converting a penalty as the shoot-out ended 4-3 following a 1-1 draw. Captain Terry was suspended but lifted the trophy, Chelsea's second in a fortnight after beating Liverpool FC 2-1 in the FA Cup final.
- Andy Carroll struck for Liverpool, who at least had the consolation of the League Cup having seen off Cardiff City FC in the final in February. Level at 2-2 after full time, Gerrard missed the Reds' opening penalty of the shoot-out but Stewart Downing made no mistake and Johnson converted the winner to make it 3-2.
- Rooney scored 27 goals in 34 league appearances for Manchester United FC, his best ever return.

## **ITALY**

- The Azzurri were five games without a win before beating the Republic of Ireland last time out.
- The Ireland win ended a national-record run of six games without a victory in major final tournaments for Italy.
- Coach Cesare Prandelli is unbeaten in competitive internationals, recording nine wins and four draws to date.
- Christian Maggio, Giorgio Chiellini, Mario Balotelli, Leonardo Bonucci, Thiago Motta, Riccardo Montolivo, Gianluigi Buffon, Federico Balzaretti and Daniele De Rossi are all within a booking of a suspension.
- Andrea Pirlo's effort against Croatia was the first goal direct from a free-kick at the UEFA European Championship since Marek Heinz versus Germany at UEFA EURO 2004.
- Antonio Di Natale's goal against Spain was his first for Italy since his effort in the 3-2 defeat by Slovakia at the 2010 FIFA World Cup – he had played just once since, however.
- Emanuele Giaccherini made his Italy debut against Spain and Alessandro Diamanti did likewise against Ireland; Fabio Borini is yet to make his competitive bow at international level.

### **Injury news**

- Chiellini limped off with a hamstring injury against Croatia and will miss the quarter-final.
- Antonio Cassano was expected to miss the rest of the season after undergoing heart surgery on 04/11 but returned to action at the start of April.

### **Miscellaneous**

- Cassano (v Ireland) and Pirlo (v Croatia) have picked up Carlsberg Man of the Match awards at UEFA EURO 2012.
- Italy gathered at Coverciano, Florence, on 21/05, with players of Juventus, SSC Napoli and Paris Saint-Germain FC joining four days later due to domestic duties. The Azzurri arrived in Krakow on 05/06.
- At 1.64m, Sebastian Giovinco is the smallest player at UEFA EURO 2012.
- Eight of the squad had EURO experience: Buffon (2004, 2008), Cassano (2004, 2008), Pirlo (2004, 2008), Chiellini (2008), Andrea Barzagli (2008), De Rossi (2008), Di Natale (2008) and Morgan De Sanctis (2008).

### **Pre-tournament friendly**

01/06 Italy 0-3 Russia (Kerzhakov 59, Shirokov 75 89)

- Italy's friendly with Luxembourg in Parma, scheduled for 29/05, was cancelled after an earthquake.

### **UEFA EURO 2012 qualifying**

- Italy's tally of 26 points from ten games was a national record in a qualifying section for a major tournament.
- The Azzurri also finished with the best defensive record across the nine groups, conceding only two goals.
- Discounting the six minutes of the home game against Serbia before it was abandoned, Italy did not concede for 625 minutes between Estonia finding the net in their opening fixture and Serbia's goal 13 months later.
- Chiellini played every minute of Italy's campaign; Cassano was the only other ever-present member of the squad and also the Azzurri's six-goal leading scorer.
- Six of the squad did not play in qualifying: Angelo Ogbonna, Ignazio Abate, Giaccherini, Di Natale, Borini, Diamanti.

### **Domestic information**

- The Italy squad features seven members of the Juventus side that went through the Serie A season unbeaten en route to the title: Buffon, Barzagli, Bonucci, Chiellini, Giaccherini, Claudio Marchisio and Pirlo.
- The Bianconeri suffered their first defeat of the season in their last outing in the Coppa Italia final on 20/05, losing 2-0 to a Napoli side featuring De Sanctis and Maggio.
- Balotelli scored 13 goals in 23 appearances and was sent off twice as Manchester City FC won their first English top-flight title in 44 years.
- Di Natale struck 23 times as Udinese Calcio finished third in Serie A, the third successive season he has hit 20 or more. He did not manage more than 17 before he reached the age of 30.
- Giovinco (15), Marchisio (9) and Diamanti (8) all established personal bests in front of goal in Serie A while Nocerino's return of ten in 35 games was four more than he had mustered in his previous four seasons combined.
- Pirlo has not been on the losing side in Serie A since 18 December 2010, when he was at AC Milan.

## Head coach

**Coaching career:** Halmstads BK, Bristol City FC, IK Oddevold, Örebro SK, Malmö FF, Neuchâtel Xamax FC, Switzerland, FC Internazionale Milano (twice), Blackburn Rovers FC, Grasshopper-Club, FC København, Udinese Calcio, United Arab Emirates, Viking FK, Finland, Fulham FC, Liverpool FC, West Bromwich Albion FC, England

- After spending the majority of his playing career in the English non-league, a coaching career spanning eight countries began with Halmstad for Hodgson. He guided the Swedish club to their first ever Allsvenskan titles in 1976 and 1979; five successive championships later came with Malmö.

- A spell at Xamax followed before the first of four forays into international management. Hodgson's Switzerland side qualified for the 1994 FIFA World Cup – their first in 28 years – and then EURO '96 but the coach left for Inter before the latter tournament.

- After taking the Nerazzurri to the 1997 UEFA Cup final, Hodgson had spells in England, Switzerland, Denmark, Italy, the UAE, Norway and Finland, as well as a short stint back at Inter as technical director.

- He returned to England and relegation-threatened Fulham in 2007/08, leading them to safety in his first season, a club-best seventh in the Premier League in his second and then guiding them to the 2010 UEFA Europa League final. The 2-1 extra-time defeat by Club Atlético de Madrid proved his last game with the Cottagers before taking the reins at Liverpool.

- He left Anfield after 31 games in charge, the shortest reign in Liverpool history, but within five weeks he was at West Brom, whom he guided to a Premier League high of 11th. He was appointed England manager on 1 May 2012.

### Italy: Cesare Prandelli

**Date of birth:** 19 August 1957

**Nationality:** Italian

- Made his name as a promising coach in the prestigious youth system at Atalanta, the club where he finished his playing career in 1990 after three league titles with Juventus (1981, 1982, 1984).

- His six seasons in Turin also brought the 1983 Coppa Italia, the 1984 UEFA Cup Winners' Cup and the European Champion Clubs' Cup a year later, although he struggled to win a regular role.

- Having impressed at Atalanta, Prandelli accepted the head coach position at Lecce in 1997 but resigned the following January. He then earned promotion to the top flight with both Verona and Venezia before further boosting his burgeoning reputation after moving to Parma in 2002.

- In 2004 Prandelli took over at Roma but soon left as wife Manuele – who sadly died in November 2007 – fell seriously ill. He moved to Fiorentina in 2005, leading them to a fourth place in his first season although they were subsequently stripped of their achievement for their part in Italy's sporting fraud trial.

- Prandelli guided the club to the 2007/08 UEFA Cup semi-finals and was awarded the Panchina d'Oro for the best coach in Serie A, in 2008. Took the Viola into the UEFA Champions League group stage in 2008/09 and the round of 16 a year later before succeeding Marcello Lippi as Italy coach, signing a four-year deal and guiding the Azzurri to UEFA EURO 2012 unbeaten.

- Pedro Proença has been on the rise in European refereeing circles since taking charge of the UEFA European Under-19 Championship final in 2004. He achieved UEFA Premier referee status in January 2007 but had been a fixture on the international scene for some time, enjoying regular outings in UEFA's two high-profile club competitions since making his UEFA Champions League group stage debut on matchday one of the 2007/08 campaign.
- A financial director from Pinhal Novo, Proença enjoys skiing in his spare time along with a love of reading and writing.
- Notable matches include the 2007 and 2010 Portuguese Cup finals, and he also ran the rule over two FC Porto successes in the domestic Super Cup in August 2003 and 2006.
- Proença took charge of two UEFA EURO 2008 qualifiers and was at the 2009 European U21 Championship, overseeing three games as a referee and acting as fourth official in Germany's 4-0 final defeat of England.
- Promoted to UEFA's Elite category at the start of 2009/10, he oversaw four games in that season's UEFA Champions League group stage and five in the 2010/11 competition. The next season brought six more UEFA Champions League engagements, ending with the final between FC Bayern München and Chelsea FC in Munich.

## Competition facts

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### UEFA European Championship final tournament: Did you know?

- Germany are the competition's most successful side having lifted the trophy in 1972, 1980 (both as West Germany) and 1996, reaching the final in 1976, 1992 and 2008. Only Spain (1964, 2008) and France (1984, 2000) have also triumphed more than once.
- Only three sides have ever won the UEFA European Championship on home soil: Spain (1964), Italy (1968) and France (1984).
- No side has ever retained the trophy, and no player has ever appeared in two victorious UEFA European Championship finals. The Soviet Union (1960, 1964) and West Germany (1972, 1976) returned to the finals as holders only to lose, while Rainer Bonhof twice picked up a winners' medal with West Germany (1972, 1980) but did not play in either tournament.
- Berti Vogts was a winner as a player with West Germany in 1972 and as coach of Germany in 1996, making him the only man to win as player and coach.
- Since 1980, when the final tournament expanded to become an eight-team event, the hosts or co-hosts have only failed to reach the semi-finals – or better – four times: Italy (1980), Belgium (2000) Austria and Switzerland (2008) and now Poland and Ukraine.
- UEFA EURO 2012 is Germany's 11th successive UEFA European Championship final tournament – they last missed out as West Germany in 1968. The Netherlands were in the finals for the seventh successive edition.
- Germany are appearing in the finals for the eleventh time, one more than Russia. This is the ninth tournament for the Netherlands and Spain.
- Five teams have qualified for the finals with a perfect record, including Spain and Germany this time round. The others are France (1992 and 2004) and Czech Republic (2000).
- The Netherlands' 6-1 defeat of Yugoslavia in the UEFA EURO 2000 quarter-finals is the biggest win in a final tournament. Three games have finished 5-0, most recently Sweden's 2004 defeat of Bulgaria.
- That 2000 Netherlands win is also the biggest margin of victory in a UEFA European Championship quarter-final, going back to 1960. Before the final tournament expanded to eight teams in 1980, five teams scored five goals in a single last-eight fixture: France (5-1 v Austria, 1960), Spain (5-1 v Republic of Ireland, 1964), Netherlands (5-0 v Belgium, 1976) and Yugoslavia twice (5-1 v both Portugal, 1960 and France, 1968).
- Since quarter-finals were re-introduced in 1996, the biggest margin of victory aside from the Dutch's 6-1 triumph in 2000 is the Czech Republic's 3-0 defeat of Denmark four years later. Only two other teams have scored three goals or more, both in 2008: Germany beat Portugal 3-2 and Russia were 3-1 victors against the Netherlands, the latter after extra time.
- Spain are seeking to retain the trophy having already become only the third team to hold the UEFA European Championship and FIFA World Cup at the same time. West Germany won the European title in 1972 and added the world crown two years later, while France won the 1998 World Cup and UEFA EURO 2000. No team has ever won three consecutive world and continental titles.
- A total of 15 players appeared in both those finals: for West Germany, Sepp Maier, Franz Beckenbauer, Hans-Georg Schwarzenbeck, Paul Breitner, Uli Hoeness and Gerd Müller played in both matches, while Fabien Barthez, Marcel Desailly, Bixente Lizarazu, Lilian Thuram, Didier Deschamps, Youri Djorkaeff, Patrick Vieira, Zinédine Zidane and Christophe Dugarry also achieved the feat for France.
- Iker Casillas, Sergio Ramos, Carles Puyol, Joan Capdevila, Andrés Iniesta, Xavi Hernández, Cesc Fàbregas, Xabi Alonso and Fernando Torres played in Spain's 2008 EURO final win and the 2010 World Cup success.
- Five players have appeared in European Cup and UEFA European Championship final victories in the same year: Luis Suárez achieved the feat with FC Internazionale Milano and Spain in 1964, while in 1988 PSV Eindhoven quartet Hans van Breucklen, Ronald Koeman, Barry van Aerle and Gerald Vanenburg were all in the victorious Netherlands side.
- Wim Kieft and Nicolas Anelka narrowly missed out on this club. A Champion Clubs' Cup finalist with PSV in 1988, Kieft was an unused substitute in the Netherlands' European triumph, while Nicolas Anelka was similarly thwarted with France in 2000 after appearing in Real Madrid CF's UEFA Champions League final. Anelka's Madrid team-mate

Christian Karembeu holds the unique position of being an unused substitute in both European Cup and European Championship final victories in the same year.

- In 2008 Germany's Michael Ballack, then with Chelsea FC, became the first player to appear in European Cup and EURO final defeats in the same year.
- Four players have followed European Cup final defeat with EURO victory in the same year: Ignacio Zoco and Amancio Amaro (1964, Real Madrid CF and Spain) and Manny Kaltz and Horst Hrubesch (1980, Hamburger SV and West Germany).
- Lothar Matthäus is the oldest player to appear in a UEFA European Championship finals; he was aged 39 years 91 days in Germany's 3-0 loss to Portugal at UEFA EURO 2000.
- Jetro Willems became the youngest player to grace a UEFA European Championship when he started the Netherlands' opening Group B match against Denmark at UEFA EURO 2012. The PSV Eindhoven defender was aged 18 years and 71 days, breaking the record held by Belgium's Enzo Scifo, who was 18 years and 115 days against Yugoslavia in 1984.
- Before UEFA EURO 2012, five players had appeared in four final tournaments: Lothar Matthäus, Peter Schmeichel, Alessandro Del Piero, Edwin van der Sar and Lilian Thuram. Olof Mellberg and Iker Casillas joined the group in Poland and Ukraine.
- Austria's Ivica Vastic is the oldest player to score having found the net in a 1-1 draw against Poland at UEFA EURO 2008 aged 38 years 257 days.
- Johan Vonlanthen was 18 years 141 days old when scoring in Switzerland's 3-1 defeat by France at UEFA EURO 2004, making him the youngest player to strike in the finals.
- Russia's Dmitri Kirichenko scored the fastest goal in a UEFA European Championship; his effort against Greece at UEFA EURO 2004 was timed at 67 seconds.
- There have been eight hat-tricks in a final tournament: Dieter Müller (1976), Klaus Allofs (1980), Michel Platini (1984, twice), Marco van Basten (1988), Sérgio Conceição (2000), Patrick Kluivert (2000) and David Villa (2008).

## UEFA information

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### Children of Chernobyl visit Kyiv match

At the invitation of UEFA President Michel Platini, 150 Ukrainian and Belarusian children from the Children of Chernobyl Relief and Development Fund in Ukraine and the children's rehabilitation centre Nadezhda were given the football thrill of a lifetime when they attended the Group D match between Sweden and France at the Olympic Stadium in Kyiv. Before visiting the stadium, a group of the children met with the renowned Ukrainian rock band S.K.A.Y., whose members gave the boys and girls with gifts. In the stadium further surprises awaited the children at half-time, as they were introduced to UEFA general secretary Gianni Infantino and Croatian legend Davor Šuker – one of European football's most renowned strikers. Both answered questions from the enthusiastic youngsters, whose big day was rewarded with another entertaining 90 minutes of action.

### Ban and fine for Bendtner

The UEFA Control and Disciplinary Body has suspended Denmark's Nicklas Bendtner for one competitive fixture for improper conduct at the Group B match against Portugal on 13 June. This suspension applies to the next 2014 FIFA World Cup match, including the qualifying competition, for which Bendtner is eligible. He has also been fined €100,000.

### €80,000 fine for HNS

The Croatian Football Federation (HNS) has been fined €80,000 for the setting-off and throwing of fireworks, and the improper conduct of supporters (racist chants, racist symbols) at the Group C match against Italy in Poznan on 14 June.

### RFS appeal against decision

The Football Union of Russia (RFS) has appealed against the decision by the UEFA Control and Disciplinary Body on 13 June to impose a deduction of six points for the qualifying competition of the next UEFA European Championship. This decision is suspended for a probationary period running from now until the end of the play-offs for the UEFA EURO 2016 finals. The RFS was also fined €120,000. The RFS was facing charges for the improper conduct of its supporters (crowd disturbances), the setting off and throwing of fireworks and the display of illicit banners at the Group A match against the Czech Republic in Wroclaw on 8 June.

### EURO Legends choose Carlsberg Man of the Match

Legends who have graced past EUROS will be making a key contribution to UEFA EURO 2012 by voting for and helping to present the Carlsberg Man of the Match Award at each of the 31 games in Poland and Ukraine – and fans will join them in deciding who wins the coveted prize each time. A EURO legend, invited by UEFA President Michel Platini, will be present at each match. A fan vote will be accessible via the UEFA.com match centre, and the EURO Legend will take into consideration the fans' vote before making the final decision on the most outstanding man on the field during the match. A glittering array of superstars are being lined up to decide who wins each UEFA EURO 2012 Carlsberg Man of the Match Award. Fernando Couto (Portugal), Christian Karembou (France), Predrag Mijatović (Montenegro), Peter Schmeichel (Denmark), Allan Simonsen (Denmark), Davor Šuker (Croatia) and Patrick Vieira (France) are among those who will act as award ambassadors in Poland and Ukraine.

### Showcase games

UEFA EURO 2012 is welcoming disabled athletes to demonstrate their football skills at matches taking place ahead of the quarter-finals. These games form part of UEFA's RESPECT Inclusion projects, initiatives implemented by CAFE (Centre for Access to Football in Europe) to promote the integration of disabled players and fans into football. The showcase games give EURO 2012 fans the opportunity to watch disabled players compete against each other. A total of four matches are being staged at stadiums 90 minutes before the quarter-final games – a seven-a-side game for athletes with intellectual disabilities from Special Olympics Poland; a five-a-side game for blind and partially-sighted players from the CROSS association; a seven-a-side game for deaf players; and a seven-a-side game for players with locomotive disabilities, such as cerebral palsy.

### Tournament charity benefits from EURO goals

Fans in the stadiums and in front of their TV screens have been hailing the goals at UEFA EURO 2012, and the Centre for Access to Football in Europe (CAFE), the official tournament charity, have had more reason than most to cheer with joy. UEFA is donating €3,000 to CAFE for each goal scored at the tournament. The group stage featured no less than 60 goals in 24 games – which means that European football's governing body donated €180,000, to contribute to improved access and facilities for disabled football fans. As part of the Respect programme at UEFA EURO 2012, UEFA is working with CAFE to manage separate Respect Inclusion initiatives, and football followers and other benefactors are being encouraged to donate money for upcoming schemes.
