Match background

Holders Spain find neighbours Portugal barring their path to a third successive major final when the teams square off in the first UEFA EURO 2012 semi-final in Donetsk.

- Not since West Germany in the 1970s has a European team achieved a hat-trick of successive final appearances but Spain are just one win away from matching that feat after their triumphs at UEFA EURO 2008 and the 2010 FIFA World Cup. Vicente del Bosque's men have a more significant piece of history in their sights, though, as they bid to become the first team to retain the Henri Delaunay Cup.

- Portugal will have other ideas as they look to return to the final, eight years after their 2004 defeat by Greece. Still seeking their first major trophy, they suffered elimination by Spain in the last 16 of the 2010 World Cup but emphatically triumphed in the team's most recent meeting and now have the perfect opportunity for revenge against opponents they knocked out of UEFA EURO 2004.

Head-to-head record

- The Iberian rivals first met in Madrid in December 1921, Spain prevailing 3-1. They have largely held the upper hand ever since, with a record against Portugal of P34 W15 D12 L7 F70 A43.

- Spain enjoyed an emphatic victory against their neighbours in 1934 World Cup qualifying, winning 9-0 in Madrid prior to a 2-1 success in Lisbon. That nine-goal reverse remains Portugal's second heaviest defeat.

- Portugal were also undone by Spain in 1950 World Cup qualifying, succumbing 5-1 away before a 2-2 home draw.

- Del Bosque included ten of the starting XI from Spain's World Cup final triumph but Portugal inflicted La Roja's heaviest defeat since 1963.

- David Villa's second-half goal ended Portugal's 19-match unbeaten run as Spain took another step closer to the world crown in South Africa. Ricardo Costa's red card compounded Carlos Queiroz's side's misery.

- Nuno Gomes's strike gave Luiz Felipe Scolari's Portugal their first win against Spain since 1981, as well as their first in a competitive encounter. It spelled elimination for Spain and the end of Iñaki Sáez's reign as coach.

17 June 1984: Portugal 1-1 Spain (Sousa 52; Santillana 73) – Stade Vélodrome, Marseille, UEFA European Championship, group match

- Carlos Santillana's 73rd-minute goal for eventual finalists Spain cancelled out António Sousa's opener and left both teams with work to do in their final group game – and both duly progressed together, Portugal beating Romania and Spain overcoming West Germany.

Form guide

- Spain have lost only three of their last 47 competitive UEFA European Championship and World Cup fixtures and won 41 of them.

- Adding Spain's 2010 World Cup semi-final victory, they have never lost at this stage, whereas Portugal also lost World Cup semi-finals in 1966 and 2006.

Team ties

- Portugal coach Paulo Bento played at Real Oviedo between 1996 and 2000 and won his first international cap against Spain as a substitute in a goalless friendly draw in January 1992. Bento helped Vitória SC defeat Real Sociedad de Fútbol 3-2 on aggregate in the 1992/93 UEFA Cup first round. As a coach his Sporting Clube de Portugal side lost 3-1 away and 5-2 at home to FC Barcelona in the 2008/09 UEFA Champions League group stage.
- As a player Del Bosque helped Real Madrid CF beat FC Porto on away goals in the second round of the 1979/80 European Champion Clubs' Cup. As Madrid coach his record against Portuguese clubs was W3 D1, including a 4-0 home win against a Sporting side including João Pinto, now Portuguese Football Federation (FPF) director, in the 2000/01 UEFA Champions League.
- Fábio Coentrão, Pepe and Cristiano Ronaldo won the 2011/12 Spanish Liga title alongside Iker Casillas, Sergio Ramos, Álvaro Arbeloa and Xabi Alonso at Real Madrid.
- Ricardo Costa and Jordi Alba are team-mates at Valencia CF and will be joined next season by João Pereira.
- Gerard Piqué was a team-mate of Ronaldo at Manchester United FC from 2004 to 2008, also playing alongside Nani in 2007/08.
- Piqué, along with Xavi Hernández, Víctor Valdés, Andrés Iniesta, Sergio Busquets and substitute Pedro Rodríguez, was part of the Barcelona team that overcame the Manchester United of Ronaldo and Nani 2-0 in the 2009 UEFA Champions League final in Rome. Those Barça players all featured in the 3-1 win against Nani's United at Wembley two years later, Pedro scoring the opening goal.
- Ronaldo and Pepe were on the losing side in a UEFA Champions League semi-final with Real Madrid against Spain's Barcelona contingent in 2010/11, although Ronaldo's header did earn Madrid victory in that season's Spanish Cup final between the teams. Ronaldo also enjoyed a UEFA Champions League semi-final victory against a Barcelona side featuring Valdés, Xavi and Iniesta with Manchester United in 2007/08.
- João Moutinho and Rolando – who was sent off – plus substitute Silvestre Varela featured in Porto's 2-0 UEFA Super Cup defeat by Barcelona in Monaco last August, Cesc Fàbregas scoring the second goal.
- Fernando Torres, Juan Mata and Raul Meireles were UEFA Champions League winners with Chelsea FC in May. Meireles tasted victory against Barcelona in the semi-finals, while Torres and Mata helped eliminate Néilson Oliveira's SL Benfica in the previous round.
- Rui Patrício and João Pereira's Sporting lost to Athletic Club in the 2011/12 UEFA Europa League semi-finals, Fernando Llorente scoring the winning goal and Javi Martínez also featuring for Athletic. The Portuguese pair had helped Sporting eliminate David Silva's Manchester City FC in the round of 16.
- Hugo Almeida's Beşiktaş JK lost out to Juanfran's Club Atlético de Madrid in the 2011/12 UEFA Europa League round of 16.
- João Moutinho and Silvestre Varela helped Porto overcome a Villarreal CF team including Santi Cazorla in the 2010/11 UEFA Europa League semi-finals.
- Hélder Postiga and Rubén Micael play for Liga side Real Zaragoza.
- Ricardo Quaresma spent 2003/04 alongside Valdés, Xavi and Iniesta at Barcelona.
- Hugo Viana was contracted to Valencia CF between 2005 and 2009, with a loan spell at CA Osasuna in 2007/08.

Match facts

PORTUGAL

- Portugal were four games without a win in 2012, scoring just once in that time, before beating Denmark on 13/06. They have now claimed three successive victories.
- Paulo Bento has named the same starting XI in each of Portugal's last six competitive games.
- Cristiano Ronaldo needs just one more to equal the record for UEFA European Championship goals of 22, qualifying included, currently shared by Hakan Şükür (Turkey) and Jon Dahl Tomasson (Denmark).
- Ronaldo has scored six UEFA European Championship finals goals, matching Nuno Gomes' national record.
- Portugal have hit the woodwork six times at UEFA EURO 2012, already one more than any other team in UEFA European Championship history. Ronaldo alone has struck it four times.
- Ronaldo's three goals at UEFA EURO 2012 have taken his international goals tally to 35, above Luís Figo (32) and third on Portugal's top scorer list. Only Pauleta (47) and Eusébio (41) lie ahead.
- Hélder Postiga and Ronaldo are now among seven players to score at three UEFA European Championships, after Jürgen Klinsmann, Vladimír Šmicer, Nuno Gomes, Thierry Henry and Zlatan Ibrahimović.

Injury news

- Postiga will miss the semi-final after sustaining a thigh muscle injury against the Czech Republic.
- Carlos Martins withdrew from the initial 23-men squad due to a calf injury, with Hugo Viana, who had not represented Portugal for five years, taking his place.

Miscellaneous

- Pepe (v Denmark) and Ronaldo (v Netherlands, v Czech Republic) have won Carlsberg Man of the Match awards at UEFA EURO 2012.
- Pepe scored Portugal's opening goal at UEFA EURO 2012, as he did in Austria/Switzerland four years ago.
- At 24 years and 115 days, Rui Patrício became Portugal's youngest ever final tournament keeper against Germany.
- Eleven of the squad have been in past EURO squads: Ronaldo (2004, 2008), Postiga (2004, 2008), Pepe (2008), Bruno Alves (2008), Miguel Veloso (2008), João Moutinho (2008), Raul Meireles (2008), Ricardo Quaresma (2008), Nani (2008), Hugo Almeida (2008) and Patrício (2008). This is Ronaldo's fifth successive major tournament.
- Miguel Lopes had to postpone his wedding on 26/05 after receiving his first call-up.
- Portugal gathered on 16/05 for their pre-tournament team camp in Obidos, 100km north of Lisbon. Ronaldo, Coentrão, Pepe, Meireles, Patrício and João Pereira joined five days later due to club commitments and Viana followed on the 24th. Portugal arrived at their EURO base of Opalenica, Poland, on 04/06.

- Ronaldo had a penalty saved at 2-1 against Turkey, when Miguel Lopes and Custódio won their first caps.

UEFA EURO 2012 qualifying

- Nani and Meireles started all ten of Portugal's qualifiers, each passing 50 caps during the campaign. Six of the final squad did not play in qualifying: Beto, Lopes, Ricardo Costa, Custódio, Viana and Néelson Oliveira.
- Bento replaced Carlos Queiroz two games – and one point – into UEFA EURO 2012 qualifying.

Domestic information

- Meireles helped Chelsea FC to their fourth FA Cup win in six years and a maiden UEFA Champions League triumph, though he was suspended for the Munich final.
- Ronaldo, Pepe and Coentrão helped Real Madrid CF to their first Spanish Liga title in four years. Ronaldo was ever-present, and eclipsed his record of 40 Spanish top-flight goals set in 2010/11 with 46 this time round – that was, however, four shy of leading scorer Lionel Messi.
- Rolando, João Moutinho, Silvestre Varela (FC Porto), Alves (FC Zenit St Petersburg) and Beto (CFR 1907 Cluj) all won domestic league titles.

SPAIN

- Spain are 18 competitive games without defeat, since their 1-0 loss to Switzerland on 16/06/2010 at the FIFA World Cup. They have lost four of their 14 friendlies in that time, however.
- Spain are nine games unbeaten, winning seven since their 1-0 defeat by England on 12/11/2011.
- Iker Casillas has gone 299 minutes without conceding, since Antonio Di Natale's effort for Italy on 10/06. Spain have kept eight successive clean sheets in major tournament knockout games.
- Xavi Hernández has made more completed passes at UEFA EURO 2012 (734) than any other player at a UEFA European Championship. He broke the record for passes in a single game against the Republic of Ireland (133).
- Cesc Fàbregas has made six substitute appearances in the UEFA European Championship, only one fewer than the Netherlands' Aron Winter's record of seven.
- Vicente del Bosque's team made 672 completed passes to Italy's 341, 810 to Ireland's 198, 639 to Croatia's 231 and 638 to France's 429.
- Spain have had over 50% possession in 20 of their last 21 games at major final tournaments, the exception being the UEFA EURO 2008 final against Germany (46%).

Injury news

- Carles Puyol (knee) and Spain's record scorer, David Villa (broken leg), were ruled out of the finals.

Miscellaneous

- Andrés Iniesta (v Croatia, Italy), Fernando Torres (v Ireland) and Xabi Alonso (v France) have won Carlsberg Man of the Match awards at UEFA EURO 2012.
- Spain's 4-0 victory against the Republic of Ireland was their biggest ever win at a UEFA European Championship.
- Alonso marked his 100th appearance for Spain with his 14th and 15th international goals against France.
- Spain, minus players from Chelsea FC and Copa del Rey finalists FC Barcelona and Athletic Club, travelled to a training camp in Schruns, Austria, on 22/05. Juan Mata and Torres joined them on 26/05, with the final 23-man squad unveiled the following day. Spain arrived at their EURO base of Gniewino on 05/06.
- Spain's squad includes 12 of the party that won UEFA EURO 2008: Casillas, Raúl Albiol, Iniesta, Xavi, Torres, Fàbregas, Santi Cazorla, Alonso, Sergio Ramos, Álvaro Arbeloa, David Silva and Pepe Reina. Casillas, Xavi, Alonso and Torres were also in the UEFA EURO 2004 squad, and for Casillas this represents a national record fourth UEFA European Championship appearance as he was also at UEFA EURO 2000.

- Casillas kept his 73rd clean sheet for Spain against Serbia on 26/05, beating Edwin van der Sar's international record. Five days later he celebrated a record 95th international win against South Korea 4-1.

UEFA EURO 2012 qualifying

- Spain won eight out of eight in Group I, becoming one of only five sides to go through a qualifying campaign with a 100% record in the history of the UEFA European Championship.
- Ramos and Villa were the only players to feature in all eight group games for Del Bosque's side. Two of the final tournament squad did not feature in qualifying: Reina and Juanfran.

Domestic information

- Casillas, Ramos, Arbeloa, Albiol and Alonso helped Real Madrid CF to Liga glory, Albiol making five league starts.
- FC Barcelona's Víctor Valdés, Gerard Piqué, Xavi, Fàbregas, Iniesta, Sergio Busquets and Pedro Rodríguez won the Copa del Rey, Pedro scoring twice on 25/05 in a 3-0 final triumph against an Athletic side featuring Fernando Llorente and Javi Martínez. Barça also won the UEFA Super Cup, Spanish Super Cup and FIFA Club World Cup.
- Mata and Torres were UEFA Champions League and FA Cup winners with Chelsea, while Reina enjoyed English League Cup success with Liverpool FC. Silva was in the Manchester City FC side that won the English top flight for the first time in 44 years.
- Juanfran, who made his Spain debut against Serbia on 26/05, was in the Club Atlético de Madrid XI that defeated an Athletic team featuring Llorente and Javi Martínez in the UEFA Europa League final in Bucharest on 09/05.

- A former international midfielder who made an instant impact upon rising to the top job at Sporting in October 2005, Paulo Bento has enjoyed success throughout his footballing life. He began his playing career at Estrela da Amadora, helping them to the Portuguese Cup in 1989/90.
- Moved on to Vitória SC before a switch to Benfica brought another cup triumph in 1995/96, prior to four seasons in Spain with Real Oviedo.
- Returned to Sporting for 2000/01, helping them win the Portuguese double the following season. Retired from playing in summer 2004 and quickly accepted a role in the Sporting coaching set-up where he guided the youth team to the national title in 2004/05.
- In October 2005, promoted to first-team coach after the sacking of José Peseiro and quickly improved the side's fortunes, leading Sporting on a run of ten straight victories between January and April 2006.
- Started 2008/09 with a Super Cup win against FC Porto but failed to add to that and left the club midway through the following campaign after a run of poor results. In September 2010 was appointed Carlos Queiroz's successor as Portugal coach after the team had taken only one point from their first two UEFA EURO 2012 qualifying games and oversaw a revival that culminated in a play-off win against Bosnia and Herzegovina.

- Came up through the youth ranks at Real Madrid and became an important member of the team as a defensive midfielder during the 1970s, winning five league titles in six seasons and four Spanish Cups.
- Capped 18 times, Del Bosque ended Spain career at the 1980 UEFA European Championship in Italy – his only major tournament as a player. Also appeared for Madrid in the 1981 European Champion Clubs' Cup final against Liverpool FC.
- Joined Madrid's coaching staff shortly after stopping playing in 1984 and spent many years in youth development, stepping up in 1994 and 1996 as the first team's interim coach.
- Given the job full time in November 1999, he won seven trophies including two UEFA Champions League triumphs and two Spanish titles. Left in 2003 and resurfaced briefly in Turkey with Beşiktaş.
- Succeeded Luis Aragonés as Spain coach in July 2008. Set a new global record by winning his opening 13 matches and steered the European champions to the 2010 FIFA World Cup with a perfect qualifying record. Went on to guide Spain to a first world title in South Africa with a final victory against the Netherlands and subsequently took team to UEFA EURO 2012 with wins in all eight qualifiers.

• One of Turkey's most promising match officials, Cüneyt Çakır has enjoyed a rapid rise up the ladder since his UEFA debut as the fourth official in the UEFA Champions League first qualifying round game between Skonto FC and Sliema Wanderers FC in July 2003.

• Took charge of two matches at the 2007 UEFA European Under-19 Championship in Austria and was also the referee for two UEFA EURO 2008 qualifying fixtures.

• Çakır, who lives with his wife in Istanbul and works in insurance, made his refereeing debut in the UEFA Cup proper in 2008/09, taking charge of two games including the group stage fixture between FC Twente and FC Schalke 04 in December 2008.

• He has been in the middle for more than 100 matches in the Turkish Süper Lig and was selected for the U21 finals in Sweden in 2009, taking charge of three games including England's penalty shoot-out win against the hosts in the semi-finals.

• Oversaw Fulham's second-leg win against Hamburger SV in the 2009/10 UEFA Europa League semi-finals, one of seven matches he refereed in total in the competition that season. Çakır took charge of three group stage matches in the 2010/11 UEFA Champions League and was selected for the 2011 FIFA U-20 World Cup, when he was in the middle for the France-Portugal semi-final.

Competition facts

UEFA European Championship final tournament: Did you know?

- Germany are the competition's most successful side having lifted the trophy in 1972, 1980 (both as West Germany) and 1996, reaching the final in 1976, 1992 and 2008. Only Spain (1964, 2008) and France (1984, 2000) have also triumphed more than once.
- Only three sides have ever won the UEFA European Championship on home soil: Spain (1964), Italy (1968) and France (1984).
- No side has ever retained the trophy, and no player has ever appeared in two victorious UEFA European Championship finals. The Soviet Union (1960, 1964) and West Germany (1972, 1976) returned to the finals as holders only to lose, while Rainer Bonhof twice picked up a winners' medal with West Germany (1972, 1980) but did not play in either tournament.
- Berti Vogts was a winner as a player with West Germany in 1972 and as coach of Germany in 1996, making him the only man to win as player and coach.
- Since 1980, when the final tournament expanded to become an eight-team event, the hosts or co-hosts have only failed to reach the semi-finals – or better – four times: Italy (1980), Belgium (2000) Austria and Switzerland (2008) and now Poland and Ukraine.
- UEFA EURO 2012 is Germany's 11th successive UEFA European Championship final tournament – they last missed out as West Germany in 1968. The Netherlands were in the finals for the seventh successive edition.
- Germany are appearing in the finals for the eleventh time, one more than Russia. This is the ninth tournament for the Netherlands and Spain.
- Five teams have qualified for the finals with a perfect record, including Spain and Germany this time round. The others are France (1992 and 2004) and Czech Republic (2000).
- The Netherlands' 6-1 defeat of Yugoslavia in the UEFA EURO 2000 quarter-finals is the biggest win in a final tournament. Three games have finished 5-0, most recently Sweden's 2004 defeat of Bulgaria.
- The biggest margin of victory in a UEFA European Championship semi-final is 3-0, achieved three times: twice by the USSR – against Czechoslovakia in 1960 and Denmark four years later – and Spain, who beat Russia in UEFA EURO 2008.
- The 1960 semi-final between Yugoslavia and France featured more goals – nine – than any other single last-four match, Yugoslavia winning 5-4. Only West Germany, in 1976, have also scored more than three goals in semi-final.
- A total of 11 semi-finals have gone to extra time, with five settled in the additional 30 minutes: Spain's 2-1 defeat of Hungary in 1964, Czechoslovakia's 3-1 victory against the Netherlands and West Germany's 4-2 defeat of Yugoslavia, both in 1976, plus France's 2-1 win against Portugal in 2000 and Greece's 1-0 victory against the Czech Republic in 2004. The last two victories came on golden and silver goals respectively.
- The remaining tie, between Italy and the USSR in 1968, remained goalless after 120 minutes and was settled on the toss of a coin, Italy going on to reach the final and lift the trophy.
- Five semi-final ties required penalties at the end of extra time, the first being Spain's 5-4 shoot-out defeat of Denmark following a 1-1 draw in 1984. Denmark came out on top against the Netherlands in 1992 (2-2, 5-4 penalties) while both semi-finals at EURO '96 ended 6-5 after a shoot-out, Germany overcoming England after a 1-1 draw and the Czech Republic eliminating France (0-0 aet). The last semi-final to go to spot kicks was Italy's 3-1 defeat of the Netherlands following a goalless 120 minutes at UEFA EURO 2000.
- Spain are seeking to retain the trophy having already become only the third team to hold the UEFA European Championship and FIFA World Cup at the same time. West Germany won the European title in 1972 and added the world crown two years later, while France won the 1998 World Cup and UEFA EURO 2000. No team has ever won three consecutive world and continental titles.
- A total of 15 players appeared in both those finals: for West Germany, Sepp Maier, Franz Beckenbauer, Hans-Georg Schwarzenbeck, Paul Breitner, Uli Hoeness and Gerd Müller played in both matches, while Fabien Barthez, Marcel Desailly, Bixente Lizarazu, Lilian Thuram, Didier Deschamps, Youri Djorkaeff, Patrick Vieira, Zinedine Zidane and Christophe Dugarry also achieved the feat for France.

- Iker Casillas, Sergio Ramos, Carles Puyol, Joan Capdevila, Andrés Iniesta, Xavi Hernández, Cesc Fàbregas, Xabi Alonso and Fernando Torres played in Spain's 2008 EURO final win and the 2010 World Cup success.
- Five players have appeared in European Cup and UEFA European Championship final victories in the same year: Luis Suárez achieved the feat with FC Internazionale Milano and Spain in 1964, while in 1988 PSV Eindhoven quartet Hans van Breucklen, Ronald Koeman, Barry van Aerle and Gerald Vanenburg were all in the victorious Netherlands side.
- Wim Kieft and Nicolas Anelka narrowly missed out on this club. A Champion Clubs' Cup finalist with PSV in 1988, Kieft was an unused substitute in the Netherlands' European triumph, while Nicolas Anelka was similarly thwarted with France in 2000 after appearing in Real Madrid CF's UEFA Champions League final. Anelka's Madrid team-mate Christian Karembou holds the unique position of being an unused substitute in both European Cup and European Championship final victories in the same year.
- In 2008 Germany's Michael Ballack, then with Chelsea FC, became the first player to appear in European Cup and EURO final defeats in the same year.
- Four players have followed European Cup final defeat with EURO victory in the same year: Ignacio Zoco and Amancio Amaro (1964, Real Madrid CF and Spain) and Manny Kaltz and Horst Hrubesch (1980, Hamburger SV and West Germany).
- Lothar Matthäus is the oldest player to appear in a UEFA European Championship finals; he was aged 39 years 91 days in Germany's 3-0 loss to Portugal at UEFA EURO 2000.
- Jetro Willems became the youngest player to grace a UEFA European Championship when he started the Netherlands' opening Group B match against Denmark at UEFA EURO 2012. The PSV Eindhoven defender was aged 18 years and 71 days, breaking the record held by Belgium's Enzo Scifo, who was 18 years and 115 days against Yugoslavia in 1984.
- Before UEFA EURO 2012, five players had appeared in four final tournaments: Lothar Matthäus, Peter Schmeichel, Alessandro Del Piero, Edwin van der Sar and Lilian Thuram. Olof Mellberg and Iker Casillas joined the group in Poland and Ukraine.
- Austria's Ivica Vastic is the oldest player to score having found the net in a 1-1 draw against Poland at UEFA EURO 2008 aged 38 years 257 days.
- Johan Vonlanthen was 18 years 141 days old when scoring in Switzerland's 3-1 defeat by France at UEFA EURO 2004, making him the youngest player to strike in the finals.
- Russia's Dmitri Kirichenko scored the fastest goal in a UEFA European Championship; his effort against Greece at UEFA EURO 2004 was timed at 67 seconds.
- There have been eight hat-tricks in a final tournament: Dieter Müller (1976), Klaus Allofs (1980), Michel Platini (1984, twice), Marco van Basten (1988), Sérgio Conceição (2000), Patrick Kluivert (2000) and David Villa (2008).

EURO Legends choose Carlsberg Man of the Match

Legends who have graced past EUROS will be making a key contribution to UEFA EURO 2012 by voting for and helping to present the Carlsberg Man of the Match Award at each of the 31 games in Poland and Ukraine – and fans will join them in deciding who wins the coveted prize each time. A EURO legend, invited by UEFA President Michel Platini, will be present at each match. A fan vote will be accessible via the UEFA.com match centre, and the EURO Legend will take into consideration the fans' vote before making the final decision on the most outstanding man on the field during the match. A glittering array of superstars are being lined up to decide who wins each UEFA EURO 2012 Carlsberg Man of the Match Award. Fernando Couto (Portugal), Christian Karembeu (France), Predrag Mijatović (Montenegro), Peter Schmeichel (Denmark), Allan Simonsen (Denmark), Davor Šuker (Croatia) and Patrick Vieira (France) are among those who will act as award ambassadors in Poland and Ukraine.

Tournament charity benefits from EURO goals

Fans in the stadiums and in front of their TV screens have been hailing the goals at UEFA EURO 2012, and the Centre for Access to Football in Europe (CAFE), the official tournament charity, have had more reason than most to cheer with joy. UEFA is donating €3,000 to CAFE for each goal scored at the tournament. The group stage featured no less than 60 goals in 24 games – which means that European football's governing body donated €180,000, to contribute to improved access and facilities for disabled football fans. As part of the Respect programme at UEFA EURO 2012, UEFA is working with CAFE to manage separate Respect Inclusion initiatives, and football followers and other benefactors are being encouraged to donate money for upcoming schemes.

President visits Gdansk

UEFA President Michel Platini took a guided tour of the Gdansk shipyards, birthplace of the Solidarność trade union, ahead of the UEFA EURO 2012 quarter-final between Germany and Greece. The chief of the trade union, Piotr Duda, guided Mr Platini around the shipyard and an exhibition on the union's work in Poland, entitled Roads To Freedom. An official photograph was then taken in front of the city's Monument to the Fallen Shipyard Workers. "I'm happy that Mr Platini found time to meet people from Solidarność," said Mr Duda. The UEFA President promised to visit Solidarność when he met Mr Duda at the House of European Football in Nyon a year ago. Mr Platini was also invited to attend a ceremony at the city's Władysławowo sports centre, where a star on the pavement was laid in his honour, as part of a walk of fame in Gdansk.

Volunteers' vital role

Volunteers are a critical component for the success of a major championship such as UEFA EURO 2012, as they will quite often be the first contact that supporters have with the tournament. For UEFA EURO 2012, organisers received a UEFA European Championship record 23,965 applications from fans worldwide to work as a volunteer. Ultimately more than 5,000 volunteers are supporting UEFA's full-time staff in 20 areas of operation, and are working at official UEFA EURO 2012 sites such as stadiums, airports and hotels. Volunteers not only support the successful implementation of operations but also lend their enthusiasm and a unique host-country flavour, helping to give visitors and participants an unforgettable experience.

Showcase games

UEFA EURO 2012 has welcomed disabled athletes to demonstrate their football skills at matches taking place ahead of the quarter-finals. These games formed part of UEFA's RESPECT Inclusion projects, initiatives implemented by CAFE (Centre for Access to Football in Europe) to promote the integration of disabled players and fans into football. The showcase games gave UEFA EURO 2012 fans the opportunity to watch disabled players compete against each other. A total of four matches were staged at stadiums 90 minutes before the quarter-final games - a seven-a-side game for athletes with intellectual disabilities from Special Olympics Poland; a five-a-side game for blind and partially-sighted players from the CROSS association; a seven-a-side game for deaf players; and a seven-a-side game for players with locomotive disabilities, such as cerebral palsy.

Respect Diversity

At the UEFA EURO 2012 semi-final matches in Donetsk and Warsaw the captains of the national teams of Spain, Portugal, Germany and Italy will reaffirm their stance against racism and encourage intercultural dialogue between fans. The semi-final matches are the culmination of UEFA's Respect campaign for UEFA EURO 2012. Football supporters are also becoming an integral part of the RESPECT campaign, by joining the fan choreographies organised in the stands at both stadiums, and which will see the word Respect and the national team flags appear just minutes before kick-off. The Respect Diversity project is implemented by UEFA's long-time partner the FARE network and its local counterpart in Poland/Ukraine, Never Again.
