Match background

For Fenerbahçe SK it was success at the fifth attempt as they qualified for the knockout rounds of the UEFA Champions League for the first time. Sevilla FC achieved the same feat in their first foray on European club football's biggest stage and now the two clubs meet for the right to prolong their adventure to the quarter-finals.

- Fenerbahçe not only finished in their highest ever position but their eleven-point tally was the best a Turkish team has managed since the competition began, surpassing Galatasaray AS's record of ten points set in the second group stage of the 2000/01 edition. Yet they will not want to rest on their laurels and will be looking to repeat their fine home form in the competition thus far to set up an opportunity to remove the Spanish side from their path.

- Zico's team won all three fixtures at the Sükrü Saraçoğlu Stadium, conceding just once in their final outing at home. That game, against PFC CSKA Moskva, resulted in a 3-1 victory with strikes from Alex and Uğur Boral (2) cancelling out Edu's own-goal opener. Earlier, they accounted for FC Internazionale Milano 1-0 there thanks to a Deivid effort. PSV Eindhoven were swept aside 2-0 – Semih Şentürk getting the second after a Dirk Marcellis own goal – and, bolstered by two away draws, Fenerbahçe finished runners-up in Group G, four points behind Inter.

- The Turkish champions will want to concentrate on that home form for inspiration rather than their previous results against Spanish visitors because they have lost every European game played against teams from that country, seven in total, and scored in only two of those matches.

- At home they were beaten 3-0 in the 2001/02 UEFA Champions League first group stage by FC Barcelona while in the UEFA Cup they went down 2-1 against Real Betis Balompié in the 1995/96 first round and 1-0 against Real Zaragoza in the 2004/05 Round of 32.

- Spanish teams have won on their last four visits to Turkey in the UEFA Champions League starting with that Fenerbahçe defeat by Barcelona in 2001.

- Sevilla, though, have only faced opponents from Turkey on one previous occasion. In the 2005/06 UEFA Cup group stage they beat Beşiktaş JK 3-0 at home, helped by two goals from striker Frédéric Kanouté, on their way to lifting their first European silverware. The Spanish side carried off the UEFA Cup trophy again the following season and on each occasion they owed a lot to their home form.



- In 14 fixtures at the Ramón Sánchez-Pizjuán during those two triumphant UEFA Cup campaigns Sevilla lost just once, with two draws and eleven victories. Their first UEFA Champions League campaign has marked a continuation of their dominance in Spain with three wins.

- Away, they lost on their first appearance in the competition, against Arsenal FC. However, Manuel Jiménez's men followed that 3-0 reverse with a 2-0 win at FC Steaua București – Renato getting both goals – and a 3-0 victory at SK Slavia Praha – Luis Fabiano, Kanouté and Daniel Alves all scoring – to give them a two-point advantage at the head of the section.

A much weakened Fenerbahçe side scored four goals in 15 minutes as they recovered from a goal down to claim an impressive away win. Deniz Barış, Can Ulun, Gürhan Gürsoy and Serdar Kulbilge were all rested, while Semih Şentürk was out with a knee injury and Chilean midfielder Claudio Maldonado was confined to the substitutes' bench due to a restriction on the number of foreign players.

- "Although we went 1-0 down in the first half, we were the better side throughout," said Fenerbahçe coach Zico. "We came up against a resistant outfit determined to spoil the game's flow. Our players went down a few gears in the second half but the important thing is that we got three points."

- Second in the Turkish Süper Lig when the UEFA Champions League group stage concluded on 12 December, a run of six wins in seven league games have helped Zico's charges keep in touch with Galatasaray AS at the summit.

- Maldonado joined Fenerbahçe on an 18-month deal in January as cover for Stephen Appiah after the Ghana captain was ruled out for the rest of the season. Maldonado made his debut in the 3-1 win against Gençlerbirliği Oftaşspor on 10 February when Selçuk Şahin was ruled out through illness.

- The game also featured Fenerbahçe's first successful penalty of the Süper Lig season, when Alex converted after Mehmet Aurélio had been brought down.

- Fenerbahçe advanced to the Turkish Cup quarter-finals in January after an incredible 10-3 victory against second-tier Alanyaspor helped them top their group. They were paired with Galatasaray in the last eight, the first leg ending goalless to set up a finely-poised trip for the second encounter on 27 February.

- Fenerbahçe are unbeaten at home in the Süper Lig this season, winning nine and drawing two.

- Semih had been expected to be fit for the Rizespor game, but suffered a recurrence of his injury last week and is expected to resume training on the eve of the match.

Sevilla continued their Primera División ascent with an absorbing victory against Espanyol in a repeat of last season's UEFA Cup final, a win made easier by Pablo Zabaleta's 65th-minute dismissal. The triumph was especially impressive considering that Alves and Keita were both suspended while Ernesto Chevantón and Javi Navarro missed out through knee injuries. José Ángel Crespo has recovered from a torn thigh muscle but was not risked as coach Manolo Jiménez recalled Arouna Koné to the substitutes' bench.

- "Although we have suffered setbacks this season we have never stopped playing well," said Jiménez. "In the first half we could have put the game to bed but we lacked that cutting edge so the 2-1 half-time score was deceptive. Diego Capel is doing everything well these days and he's demonstrating what an excellent player he is."
- Luis Fabiano is the Primera División's top scorer with 17 goals; that is already two more than he mustered in his previous two seasons at the Ramón Sánchez-Pizjuán.
- Kanouté also scored against Espanyol in last season's UEFA Cup final in Glasgow, a match Sevilla eventually won on penalties.
- Koné came on in the last minute to make his first Primera División appearance since 5 December.
- Sevilla have had a mixed time since rounding off their Group H campaign with a 3-0 victory at SK Slavia Praha. They won three out of four Primera División matches at home – drawing the other against FC Barcelona – but have struggled to replicate that form on their travels, picking up just seven points from a possible 15. They have nevertheless climbed up into the top half of the table and back into contention for a European place.
- Sevilla have already played Barcelona three times this year, with all the games ending all-square. Aside from the 1-1 league draw, they met twice in the Copa del Rey, with Barça edging through to the quarter-finals by virtue of the away-goals rule.
- The Andalusian outfit have lost twice as many Primera División games this term than at the same stage last season. After 23 matches in 2006/07, Sevilla were second to Barcelona in the standings on 47 points. After 24 games this season, Jiménez's men have 36 points.
- The loss to Getafe CF on 19 January was Sevilla's tenth Primera División defeat of the season – more than in the whole of last season.

- On 1 February Kanouté was named 2007 African Player of the Year, beating Chelsea FC duo Michael Essien and Didier Drogba to the title. Born in Sainte-Foy-les-Lyon, a suburb of Lyon, the 30-year-old becomes the first European-born player to receive the award.
- Alves was named in the uefa.com users' Team of the Year 2007. Palop, Kanouté and Poulsen were among the nominees.
- The UEFA Cup final between Sevilla and Espanyol last May was the most watched programme on Spanish television in 2007. Over ten million people tuned in to witness Sevilla defending their title.
- Capel celebrated his 20th birthday on 16 February, four days before the first leg with Fenerbahçe.
- Crespo signed his first professional contract with Sevilla on 3 January.

- Although insisting he is "not very superstitious", Alves told uefa.com that he does have a pre-match routine. "Before I go out on the pitch, I do three quick jumps," he said. "And I always step out with my right foot first."

- Chevantón has been added to Sevilla's UEFA Champions League squad list and goalkeeper Pablo Vargas maintains his place on the 'A' List, with Hinkel and Martí making way.

International news

- Three Sevilla players were in African Cup of Nations action in Ghana in January, with Koné helping the Ivory Coast to fourth place. He made three appearances, including one start in the 3-0 victory against a Mali side including Keita and Kanouté in the group stage. Kanouté had scored the winner from the penalty spot against Benin in Mali's opening fixture but the Ivory Coast loss ended their tournament.

- On 6 February Luis Fabiano was in action for Brazil as they beat the Republic of Ireland 1-0, and on the other side of the Atlantic Ocean, club-mate Federico Fazio helped a youthful Argentina side to an impressive 5-0 triumph over Guatemala in Los Angeles. Morgan De Sanctis was an unused substitute for Italy against Portugal, Dragutinović was in the Serbia side held 1-1 by F.Y.R. Macedonia, while Escudé played the second half of France's 1-0 loss to Spain.

- The night before, Capel helped Spain's Under- 21 side to a 2-0 victory against France.

Head coach

Nationality: Brazilian

Arthur Antunes Coimbra, universally known as Zico, is considered one of Brazil's best midfielders and has proved a canny coach. He helped Flamengo to victory in the 1981 Copa Libertadores and European/South American Cup and won four Brazilian titles. Zico also played for Udinese Calcio and, after a spell as Brazil's sport minister, J-League founders Kashima Antlers. His full Brazil debut came in 1976 and over the next 13 years he won 88 caps, scoring 66 goals and playing in three FIFA World Cups. He was named South American Footballer of the Year in 1977, 1981 and 1982 and his 508 goals for Flamengo and 333 strikes at the Maracanã Stadium are both records.

After retiring he held a technical role for his nation at the 1998 World Cup as well as with the Antlers, who he briefly coached in 1999. His first major head coaching role began in 2002, when he took the helm of the Japanese national side following the World Cup. Adopting a free-flowing attacking style, he made a shaky start but things picked up when they won the 2004 AFC Asian Cup in China and qualified comfortably for the 2006 World Cup.

Japan were knocked out in the group stage in Germany with only one point and Zico resigned to take over at Fenerbahçe SK. His first season produced a Süper Lig title, and his team began 2007/08 by defeating Beşiktaş JK to win the Turkish Super Cup and RSC Anderlecht to qualify for the UEFA Champions League. A calm and positive coach, Zico likes to make full use of his squad in a rotation system.

Sevilla FC: Manuel Jiménez

Born in the Andalusian town of El Arahál, Manuel Jiménez spent almost his entire playing career at Sevilla FC. Having graduated from reserve outfit Sevilla Atlético Club, he made his senior debut in 1983 and the left-back went on to make a club record 354 top-flight appearances over 14 years. He also earned 15 caps for Spain between 1988 and the 1990 FIFA World Cup.

After seeing out the last year of his playing days with Real Jaén CF, Jiménez returned to football in 2000 as coach of Sevilla Atlético. He won promotion to Segunda División B in his first term and in a successful reign brought on the likes of José Antonio Reyes, Kepa Blanco, Sergio Ramos and Antonio Puerta. A further promotion to Segunda División A, after three play-off near misses, arrived in 2007 with an extra-time defeat of Burgos CF – one day after the first team beat Getafe CF to lift the Copa del Rey.

Jiménez's men made a successful start to the second division proper, yet he was not to remain long at the helm. Following the departure of head coach Juande Ramos to Tottenham Hotspur FC after UEFA Champions League Matchday 3, Sevilla allowed Jiménez to fulfil his long-held ambition of leading the club he had played for with such distinction. And he enjoyed a superb debut, masterminding a 3-0 victory over Valencia CF little more than 24 hours after his appointment.

A fan of jogging, reading and tennis, Germany's Florian Meyer is looking to make further progress up the refereeing ladder after enjoying a steady rise in recent seasons.

Born on 21 November 1968, and is based in Burgdorf, he became a top-flight German Bundesliga referee in 1999, and earned his FIFA international badge in 2002. Meyer took charge of various youth championship qualifiers and UEFA Intertoto Cup games before stepping up to the UEFA Cup proper in September 2003 as AS Roma defeated FK Vardar 4-0 at the Stadio Olimpico in the first round. Twelve months later Meyer oversaw his first game in the UEFA Champions League group stage, Rosenborg BK and Arsenal FC drawing 2-2 in Trondheim.

A series of fine displays in the Bundesliga won him selection for the 2005 German Cup final between FC Schalke 04 and FC Bayern München, and the following year he was the fourth official as Sevilla FC defeated Middlesbrough FC in the UEFA Cup final in Eindhoven. In the 2006/07 UEFA Champions League, he began the competition proper with Celtic FC's 1-0 home win against FC København on Matchday 2 and has remained a regular in that competition, the UEFA Cup and UEFA EURO 2008™ qualifying.

UEFA information

Anti-social behaviour

General Secretary David Taylor has highlighted UEFA's plans to combat fan misconduct in the near future, telling uefa.com: "UEFA have been very strong in terms of their messages, the actions they are taking, and sanctioning activities which breach fundamental human rights. And we've seen situations where, in terms of hooliganism last year, a club was ejected from one of our major competitions.

"Now we will not hesitate to take such action if the circumstances require, but each case must be treated on its merits. There are greater difficulties, of course, with incidents which happen outside football stadiums, further away from football grounds. This is where the police and civic authorities must work with football to deal with these matters. They are not primarily the responsibility of football – it's a societal problem. UEFA will deal with matters within our capability and within our regulatory powers, but we must work with the civic authorities to have a stronger joint action against these things which have negative influences on our sport."

Munich tribute

Mr Taylor also spoke of the "unique bond" between Manchester United FC and European football's governing body on the 50th anniversary of the Munich air disaster. The tragedy on 6 February 1958 cost 23 people – including eight United players – their lives as the team returned from a European Champion Clubs' Cup quarter-final against FK Crvena Zvezda in Belgrade.

"On behalf of UEFA, the UEFA President Michel Platini, and the entire European football family, I am honoured to be here with you today to pay our respects to the 23 victims of the Munich air disaster," said Mr Taylor at the memorial service in Manchester. "Manchester United are one of the great clubs in Europe. They have been pioneers in many areas. The tragedy of the Munich air disaster has, however, created a special bond between the club and the organisers of European football, a bond which remains strong to this day."

Referees' course

Respect and protection will be the watchwords for UEFA's leading referees when the European club competitions resume. That was the clear message from the 16th UEFA Advanced Course for Elite and Premier Referees in Limassol, Cyprus, between 5 and 8 February. The need for strict action to be taken to protect players from unfair play – including dangerous tackles and holding in the penalty area – and also to protect the image of the game, particularly in scenes of player confrontation, was also emphasised. Equally, the importance of maintaining respect was writ large, with match officials told not to hesitate over sanctioning players who undermine their authority.

During a discussion session in Limassol, the referees unanimously declared themselves in favour of introducing goalline technology to assist them in eliminating any element of doubt in cases where it is uncertain whether or not the ball has crossed the line. However, the referees were opposed both to the use of video technology elsewhere on the pitch and to the presence of a monitor to aid the fourth official at pitch-side.

Trophy tour

Football fans in Brazil are being given a unique opportunity to see the UEFA Champions League trophy as European football's most coveted club prize has begun a two-month tour of four Latin American countries. A ceremony in Sao Paulo on Friday launched the UEFA Champions League Trophy Tour – sponsored by Heineken and stopping in Brazil, Argentina, Chile and Mexico. Former Brazil international Bebeto, a FIFA World Cup winner in 1994, is the Trophy Tour ambassador in Sao Paulo.

Key dates

The 2007/08 UEFA Champions League first knockout round is played over two legs on 19/20 February and 4/5 March, although FC Internazionale Milano's second leg against Liverpool FC will take place on 11 March. The draw for the quarter-finals, semi-finals and final will be staged on 14 March. The last eight will be played on 1/2 and 8/9 April before the semi-finals on 22/23 and 29/30 April. The UEFA Champions League final will be held in Moscow on 21 May, before UEFA EURO 2008™ kicks off in Austria and Switzerland on 7 June.

Competition facts

UEFA Champions League knockout stage: Did you know?

- Teams have come back from a first-leg deficit to go through to the next stage on 20 occasions, including both 2006/07 semi-final victors. The biggest losing margin a side has overturned was achieved by RC Deportivo La Coruña in 2003/04 when they fought back from a 4-1 defeat at AC Milan to win 4-0 at home and progress to the semi-finals.
- Fifteen ties, including three in the 2006/07 season's first knockout round, have been decided on the away goals rule, including five where the triumphant team lost the first leg.
- Manchester United FC hold the record for the biggest first-leg lead with a 4-0 home success against FC Porto in the 1996/97 quarter-finals, eventually going through by that margin after a goalless return.
- Only six ties have gone to penalties. Four of these were finals – 1996, 2001, 2003 and 2005. The first two-legged tie decided on spot-kicks was PSV Eindhoven's 4-2 win against Olympique Lyonnais on 13 April 2005 after a 2-2 aggregate draw. The second was Liverpool's 4-1 semi-final win on penalties on 1 May 2007 against Chelsea after a 1-1 aggregate draw.
- In all, 12 ties have required extra time, including, in 2006/07, AC Milan's meeting with Celtic FC in the first knockout round and Liverpool's semi-final triumph against Chelsea. Along with the six ties mentioned above, four quarter-final and two first knockout round encounters have also needed an additional 30 minutes in an attempt to determine a winner.
- Real Madrid CF have extended their record for knockout stage qualification in successive seasons. The 2006/07 campaign was the tenth straight season since 1997/98 that they made it beyond the group stage, moving them ahead of United, who appeared nine times in a row between 1996/97 and 2004/05, and the Spanish side have extended that run to eleven successive campaigns this season. Overall, they have now played in the knockout stage 12 times, one more than United and two more than FC Bayern München.
- Had FC Bayern München beaten AC Milan in the 2006/07 last eight, it would have meant the first time the UEFA Champions League final four had no representation from either the Primera División or Serie A.
- The last European Champion Clubs' Cup season that featured not one semi-finalist from either Spain or Italy, or English for that matter, was the 1990/91 campaign.
- The 2004/05 first knockout round encounter between Lyon and Werder Bremen featured more goals (12) over its two legs than any previous UEFA Champions League knockout tie – as Lyon defeated Bremen 10-2.
- United's 7-1 victory against AS Roma in the 2006/07 campaign is the biggest victory in a UEFA Champions League quarter-final match. The previous best were Barcelona's 5-1 second-leg defeat after extra time of Chelsea (1999/00), RC Deportivo La Coruña's 4-0 return victory against AC Milan (2003/04) and United's 4-0 first-leg success against Porto (1996/97).
- Roma-United featured eleven goals over the two legs, a quarter-final record shared by Chelsea's 6-5 aggregate victory against Bayern in 2004/05 and Madrid's success by the same margin against United in 2002/03.
- There has never been a knockout tie ending goalless after two legs. Eight have finished 1-0 on aggregate, most recently Milan's narrow victory against Celtic after extra time in the 2006/07 first knockout round.

- Clarence Seedorf is the only player to win the European Cup with three clubs (Ajax 1995, Madrid 1998 and Milan 2003 and 2007). Had Bayern gone all the way last season, Ottmar Hitzfeld would have joined Liverpool FC's Bob Paisley – 1977, 1978 and 1981 – as the only coach to win three times, having won with BV Borussia Dortmund in 1997 and Bayern in 2001.

- Hitzfeld and Ernst Happel (Feyenoord 1970, Hamburger SV 1983) are the only coaches to win with two clubs.

- If Arsenal FC, Chelsea FC, Olympiacos CFP, Fenerbahçe SK or AS Roma go all the way this season, it would be the first European Cup success for London, Athens, Istanbul or Rome. Only five capital cities have been successful in this way: Madrid (Real Madrid CF), Belgrade (FK Crvena Zvezda), Bucharest (FC Steaua București), Amsterdam (AFC Ajax) and Lisbon (SL Benfica).

- Moscow was awarded the 2008 UEFA Champions League final after a decision by the UEFA Executive Committee at its meeting in Ljubljana, Slovenia in October 2006. The Luzhniki Stadium, formerly known as the Grand Arena of the Central Lenin Stadium, was inaugurated in 1956. Owned by FC Torpedo Moskva, it is the biggest sports arena in Russia with 84,745 covered seats. The capacity reached 103,000 when the Luzhniki sports complex staged the Olympic Games in 1980, but was reduced following renovation work between 1995 and 1997. It is one of few major European stadiums to use an artificial pitch, having installed the UEFA-approved FieldTurf surface in 2002 to withstand the effects of the freezing winters, although the final will be played on a new natural grass pitch. Luzhniki held the 1999 UEFA Cup final between Parma FC and Olympique de Marseille, and also hosted the first UEFA Champions League match on artificial turf, between FC Spartak Moskva and Sporting Clube de Portugal, in September 2006.

- **UEFA Champions League:** Did you know?

S.S. Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta became the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League when he featured against Olympiacos CFP on Matchday 1 at the age of 43 years and 168 days. The record was previously held by Alessandro Costacurta, the AC Milan defender who played against AEK Athens FC in the 2006/07 season at the age of 40 years and 211 days. Ballotta was aged 43 years 252 days when he featured against Real Madrid CF on Matchday 6. Laurent Blanc is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 36 years and 339 days, having found the net for Manchester United FC in their 3-2 defeat of Olympiacos on 23 October 2002.

Celestine Babayaro is the youngest player to have appeared in the UEFA Champions League. He was 16 years and 87 days when he started for RSC Anderlecht against FC Steaua București on 23 November 1994. He was then sent off in the 37th minute.

More familiar opposition waited in the final with RCD Espanyol pushing Sevilla to a penalty shoot-out after a 2-2 draw in Glasgow. Yet the holders were not to be denied and triumphed 3-1 on spot-kicks.

Competition information

UEFA's most prestigious club competition was originally created as the European Champion Clubs' Cup for the 1955/56 season, before its revamping as the UEFA Champions League in 1992.

- **Away goals:** If the two teams involved in a tie score the same number of goals over the two legs, the team which scores more away goals qualifies for the next stage. If this procedure does not produce a result, extra time of two periods of 15 minutes shall be played at the end of the second leg. If, during extra time, both teams score the same number of goals, away goals count double. If no goals are scored during extra time, kicks from the penalty mark determine which club qualifies for the next stage.

- **Disciplinary information:** As a rule, a player who is sent off is suspended for the next match in a UEFA club competition. The Control and Disciplinary Body is entitled to augment this punishment. In the case of repeated cautions, a player is suspended for one match after three cautions in three different matches, as well as following any subsequent odd-numbered caution (fifth, seventh, ninth, etc). Single yellow cards and pending suspensions are always carried forward either to the next stage of the competition or to another club competition in the current season.

- **Locally-trained players rule:** In February 2005, UEFA announced the 'A' list that teams submit for UEFA club competitions will continue to be limited to 25 players, and from season 2007/08, at least six places will be reserved for players trained by the club's own football academy of which half can be players trained by other clubs from within the same association of the said club. The 'B' list will also continue to exist – involving an unlimited number of Under-21 players who have been at the club for two seasons. In 2006/07, the number of locally-trained players required began at four but the current six will rise to eight in 2008/09, with up to half of each figure allowed to be association trained. A club-trained player is defined as a player who has been registered for a minimum of three seasons with the club between the age of 15 and 21, whereas an association-trained player is one who has been registered for at least three seasons by the club or by other clubs affiliated to the same association between the age of 15 and 21.

- **Player registration:** UEFA regulations state that for all UEFA Champions League matches from the start of the first knockout round, a club may register a maximum of three new eligible players within their squad of 25 for the remaining matches in the current competition. One player from the above quota of three who has played UEFA club competition matches for another competing club in the current season may exceptionally be registered, provided that the player has not been fielded by another club in the UEFA Champions League this season.

- **Financial information:** UEFA estimate the gross income for the 2007/08 UEFA Champions League is €824.5m. Under competition regulations, 75 per cent of the total revenue received from television and commercial contracts concluded by UEFA, up to a maximum of €530m, will go to the 32 teams taking part in the group stage of Europe's premier club competition. The remaining 25 per cent is earmarked for European football and remains with UEFA to cover organisational and administrative costs, as well as for solidarity payments to associations, clubs and leagues. It is also stipulated that participating clubs will receive 82 per cent of any revenue received from the same stream in excess of €530m, with the remaining 18 per cent allocated to UEFA for European football. In addition, 50 per cent of the revenue received from new media contracts concluded by UEFA will also be available for distribution to the clubs, and the remaining 50 per cent will be allocated to the above-mentioned European football portion/quota.

According to projections, the estimated €824.5m will be made up of €819m from TV and commercial contracts and €5.5m from new media contracts. The total amount to be distributed to the clubs is €588.6m. Each of the 32 clubs in the group stage will receive a starting bonus of €3m. In addition, they will receive a match bonus of €400,000 per match. Performance bonuses will amount to €600,000 for a win and €300,000 for a draw in the group stage. The 16 teams playing in the first knockout round will receive €2.2m, the eight quarter-finalists €2.5m each and the four semi-finalists €3m each. The UEFA Champions League winners will receive €7m, and the runners-up €4m.
