Juventus travel to the Stade Chaban-Delmas on Matchday 5 seeking to follow hosts FC Girondins de Bordeaux in booking their place in the last 16.

- Group A leaders Bordeaux made sure of their continued involvement in the UEFA Champions League in the new year by winning at FC Bayern München last time out and Juventus will join them provided they at least match Bayern's result at home to Maccabi Haifa FC.

• Bordeaux sit top of the section with ten points, two more than Juventus, and victory will secure them first place in the pool – and their best ever points haul in the competition. The Ligue 1 outfit previously collected 12 points when advancing from the first group stage in 1999/2000.

Previous meetings

- Bordeaux earned a 1-1 draw at Juventus on Matchday 1 when Jaroslav Plašil struck with 15 minutes remaining to cancel out Vincenzo Iaquinta's 63rd-minute opener for the home team.
- The clubs first met in the 1984/85 European Champion Clubs' Cup semi-finals when Juventus prevailed 3-2 on aggregate en route to winning the trophy.
- Juventus gained a 3-0 first-leg lead through goals from Zbigniew Boniek (27), Massimo Briaschi (60) and Michel Platini (62) in Turin but Bordeaux ran them close in the return, narrowing the deficit to a single goal as Dieter Müller (25) and Patrick Battiston (80) found the net.
- Juventus subsequently beat Liverpool FC in the final but for Bordeaux that last-four appearance remains the pinnacle of their European Cup achievement.
- The starting lineups for the clubs' previous meeting at the Stade Chaban-Delmas on 24 April 1985 were:

Match background

- Bordeaux are looking to make it three wins out of three at home in the competition but they may not find it easy against a Juventus side yet to concede on their travels.
- Indeed Juventus have the meanest defence in the UEFA Champions League, having leaked just one goal in 360 minutes to date.
- Bordeaux will hope to fare better than when they last welcomed Italian opposition, going down 3-1 to AS Roma in the 2008/09 group stage.
- Juventus coach Ciro Ferrara was a player when the club last visited France for a 2-2 draw with Stade Rennais FC in the UEFA Intertoto Cup in 1999. Alessandro Del Piero is the only survivor of that Juventus team.
- Del Piero scored in Juventus's most recent UEFA Champions League tie away to Ligue 1 opposition, a 3-2 defeat at AS Monaco FC in the 1997/98 semi-final which secured a 6-4 aggregate success.

Team ties

- The two coaches, Bordeaux's Laurent Blanc and Ferrara of Juventus, were team-mates at SSC Napoli in 1991/92. Blanc had two spells as a player in Italy, later spending two years at FC Internazionale Milano from 1999.
- Blanc played alongside David Trezeguet in the France outfit that captured the 1998 FIFA World Cup and UEFA EURO 2000™.
- Alou Diarra featured alongside Trezeguet in the France team defeated by Italy in the 2006 World Cup final. The triumphant Azzurri side included Gianluigi Buffon, Mauro Camoranesi, Fabio Cannavaro, Del Piero and Fabio Grosso, who converted the winning spot-kick.
- Yoann Gourcuff made 36 Serie A appearances for AC Milan between 2006 and 2008, scoring two goals.
- Fernando was based in Italy with Calcio Catania and AC Siena between 2003 and 2005.
- Tiago won successive French titles with Olympique Lyonnais in 2006 and 2007.
- Grosso was also a two-time champion with Lyon in 2007 and 2008. He finished on the winning side twice against Bordeaux in Ligue 1 but lost the 2008 French Super Cup on penalties despite his own successful conversion.
- Juventus's French-born midfielder Mohamed Sissoko has a 100 per cent winning record in matches against Bordeaux. He helped Liverpool record home and away victories in the 2006/07 UEFA Champions League group stage, having previously featured for Valencia CF in a 2-1 success at Bordeaux in the first leg of a 2003/04 UEFA Cup quarter-final tie his team eventually won 4-2.
- Zdeněk Grygera scored past Bordeaux goalkeeper Ulrich Ramé when the former's Czech Republic side won 2-0 in France in 2003.

- The French champions' 13-match winning league run at the Stade Chaban-Delmas was ended by a Valenciennes side that had lost on their nine previous trips to Bordeaux and were without a victory there since 1976.
- Les Girondins were undefeated in 39 Ligue 1 fixtures at Stade Chaban-Delmas – a run stretching back to Olympique Lyonnais' 3-1 win on 7 October 2007.
- Laurent Blanc's side had won their last 15 home matches in all competitions, including eight this season, since a goalless draw against Galatasaray AŞ in the UEFA Cup round of 32 on 18 February.
- AS Saint-Etienne were the last side to triumph at Bordeaux in any competition, winning 1-0 on 3 January in the French Cup round of 64.
- It was Bordeaux's fourth Ligue 1 defeat of the season – they lost only six times en route to the title last term.
- Samassa's goal was the second Bordeaux had conceded at home in Ligue 1 this term, the third in all competitions.
- Alou Diarra was rested after playing all 210 minutes for France against the Republic of Ireland in the FIFA World Cup play-offs. "Tiredness is very important after such games," Blanc said.
- Prior to Saturday, Diarra was the only Bordeaux player to have started every league game this season.
- Coupled with the 2-0 defeat by LOSC Lille Métropole on 8 November – their third successive league loss away from home – Bordeaux have suffered back-to-back reverses. They have not lost three in a row in all competitions since 2004.
- On 13 November goals from Yoan Gouffran, Grégory Sertic, Abdou Traoré, David Bellion and Fernando Cavenaghi had earned Bordeaux a 5-0 friendly victory against Ligue 2 side FC Nantes.
- Nine of Bordeaux's 20 league goals and five of their six UEFA Champions League strikes this season have come from set-pieces.
- The eleventh round of the Ligue 1 season was postponed to give the French national team added preparation time for their successful World Cup play-off against Ireland. Bordeaux's game against Montpellier Hérault SC, originally scheduled for 28 October, will now take place on 16 December.
- Bordeaux will face Le Mans UC 72 in the French League Cup fourth round on 12 January.

- The Matchday 4 victory against Maccabi Haifa was Juventus' 100th success in the European Cup; they have drawn 49 matches.

- The Turin team have conceded 194 goals in the European Cup.

- Fabio Grosso's first goal for Juventus was enough to secure a sixth victory in seven outings in all competitions, four coming by 1-0 margins.

- With David Trezeguet ruled out with a calf injury Amauri returned to the starting XI.

- Juventus beat Atalanta BC 5-2 on 7 November, scoring five goals for the second time in three Serie A games having triumphed 5-1 against UC Sampdoria on 28 October. Prior to then the Bianconeri had not racked up five in a league fixture since a 5-2 victory against S.S. Lazio on 27 April 2008.

- Trezeguet struck the fifth against Atalanta, his 167th for the club, to join Omar Sivori as the fourth-highest scorer in the Bianconeri's history. Alessandro Del Piero leads the way with 262.

- The Atalanta match marked Fabio Cannavaro's 400th Serie A appearance and, coming on a minute from time, Ciro Immobile's first game of the season and only his second Serie A match.

- The 3-2 loss to SSC Napoli on 31 October was Juventus' first at home in the league in nine months, dating back to a 3-2 defeat by Cagliari Calcio on 31 January.

- Juve have lost just twice in 19 outings since Ciro Ferrara replaced Claudio Ranieri with two games of last season remaining.

- Gianluigi Buffon and Giorgio Chiellini have played every minute of Juventus's Serie A campaign.

- Sissoko returned from a seven-month absence against ACF Fiorentina on 17 October but managed just four games before picking up a thigh injury in the victory over Sampdoria.

- After facing the Republic of Ireland last month, Buffon revealed he will continue to play with damaged knee meniscus until surgery becomes unavoidable: "I'll try to go on until the game against Inter [on 5 December]."

Competition facts

• **UEFA Champions League:** Group stage milestones

Holders FC Barcelona are looking to avoid becoming the first defending champions to fail to get through a group stage since the UEFA Champions League began. (This record, like the others, includes the seasons between 1999/00 and 2002/03 that featured a second group stage).

In 1992/93, Barcelona were the reigning European Champion Clubs' Cup holders and were beaten 4-3 on aggregate in the second round by PFC CSKA Moskva.

S.S. Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta became the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League in 2007/08 when he featured against Olympiacos CFP on Matchday 1 at the age of 43 years and 168 days. The record was previously held by Alessandro Costacurta, the AC Milan defender who played against AEK Athens FC in the 2006/07 season at the age of 40 years and 211 days. Ballotta was aged 43 years 252 days when he featured against Real Madrid CF on Matchday 6.

Laurent Blanc is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 36 years and 339 days, having found the net for Manchester United FC in their 3-2 defeat of Olympiacos CFP on 23 October 2002.

Celestine Babayaro is the youngest player to have appeared in the UEFA Champions League. He was 16 years and 87 days when he started for RSC Anderlecht against FC Steaua Bucureşti on 23 November 1994. He was then sent off in the 37th minute.

Barcelona, Manchester United and Milan have all finished as group winners on ten occasions, one more than Real Madrid and Juventus.

Four teams have recorded six successive victories in a UEFA Champions League group stage: Milan (1992/93), Paris Saint-Germain FC (1994/95), FC Spartak Moskva (1995/96) and Barcelona (2002/03, first group stage).

In 2006/07, PFC Levski Sofia joined 1. FC Košice in being the only team to have played in the UEFA Champions League and never picked up a point. The Slovakian side have not returned to the competition since losing all six games in their only campaign to date in 1997/98. Six other teams have gone through a single group stage campaign without picking up a point: FC Dynamo Kyiv (2007/08), SK Rapid Wien (2005/06) and RSC Anderlecht (2004/05) plus Spartak Moskva and Bayer 04 Leverkusen (2002/03, first and second group stage respectively) and Fenerbahçe SK (2001/02, first group stage).

Manchester United scored 20 goals in the 1998/99 group stage, more than any other side has managed. Barcelona scored 19 times in the 1999/2000 first group stage.

Dynamo conceded 19 goals in their six outings in 2007/08, equalling the record let in during a group stage set by Ferencvárosi TC in the 1995/96 campaign.

No team has ever gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without conceding a goal. Milan (1992/93), AFC Ajax (1995/96), Juventus (1996/97 and 2004/05), Chelsea FC (2005/06), Liverpool FC (2005/06) and Villarreal CF (2005/06) all let in just one.

Before their 3-1 win against Sporting Clube de Portugal on Matchday 6 of the 2006/07 campaign, FC Spartak Moskva went 22 games without a victory in the competition, surpassing the unwanted record set by AEK Athens FC on Matchday 3 of the same campaign.

The lowest total for a team qualifying from the group stage is seven points. The first to do it, since three points for a win was introduced in 1995/96, were Legia Warszawa that same season before Bayer Leverkusen managed it in 1999/2000 and Liverpool in 2001/02. FC Lokomotiv Moskva and eventual finalists Juventus both progressed with seven points in 2002/03, a feat achieved by Rangers FC and Werder Bremen in 2005/06.
