It is win or bust for FC Bayern München when they visit Juventus for their concluding fixture in UEFA Champions League Group A.

- Juventus enter the game a point ahead of Bayern and requiring just a draw to join section winners FC Girondins de Bordeaux in the last 16.
- The Serie A side have a formidable recent home record in Europe and the historical omens do not favour Bayern either – they were beaten on their two previous trips to Turin and their coach Louis van Gaal once lost a UEFA Champions League final against Juventus.

Previous meetings

- The teams drew 0-0 in Munich on 30 September.
- Juventus were 2-1 winners when the clubs last met in Italy in the UEFA Champions League group stage in November 2005. David Trezeguet (62, 85) struck both Bianconeri goals, sandwiching a Sebastien Deisler (66) effort for Bayern. Juventus ended with ten men after Zlatan Ibrahimović's 90th-minute sending-off.
- The full lineups that evening were:
Juventus: Abbiati, Zambrotta, Thuram, Cannavaro, Chiellini, Kovač (Camoranesi 58; Mutu 76), Emerson, Vieira, Del Piero (Nedvěd 46), Trezeguet, Ibrahimović.
Bayern: Kahn, Sagnol, Lucio, Ismaël, Schweinsteiger, Zé Roberto, Demichelis (Scholl 87), Ballack, Deisler, Pizarro, Makaay (Guerrero 88).
- Juve also beat Bayern at home in the 2004/05 group stage, Pavel Nedvěd's 75th-minute goal securing a 1-0 victory. Ciro Ferrara, now Juventus coach, was in their team that evening.

Match background

- Juventus need only preserve their 16-game unbeaten home record in the UEFA Champions League to advance to the knockout stage.
- The Bianconeri suffered their last home reverse in Europe when losing 1-0 to RC Deportivo La Coruña in the first knockout round in 2003/04.
- Since then they have recorded eleven wins and six draws, including this term's 1-1 home result against Bordeaux and victory over Maccabi Haifa FC. Their defensive record in this time has been formidable with eleven clean sheets and just six goals conceded.
- Qualifiers included, the unbeaten run stands at 18 matches.
- Juventus's last home fixture against a Bundesliga outfit brought a 2-1 success against Werder Bremen in the 2005/06 first knockout round – Trezeguet cancelled out an early Bremen goal before Emerson's 88th-minute winner ensured the Bianconeri scraped through on away goals.
- Hamburger SV were the last German team to win at Juventus, prevailing 3-1 in the 2000/01 group stage. Bayern goalkeeper Hans-Jörg Butt was in the Hamburg lineup while Ferrara featured for Juve along with Alessandro Del Piero and Trezeguet.

- Bayern will travel to Italy with a strong recent record away from home in the UEFA Champions League – their last 12 fixtures have produced six wins, three draws and three defeats.
- This sequence includes draws at ACF Fiorentina (1-1 in the 2008/09 group stage) and AC Milan (2-2 in the 2006/07 quarter-finals).
- Bayern last won in Italy in September 2006 when goals from Claudio Pizarro and Lukas Podolski earned a 2-0 success at FC Internazionale Milano in the UEFA Champions League group stage.
- Juventus lost European Champion Clubs' Cup finals against German clubs in 1983 (Hamburg 0-1) and, with Ferrara in the team, 1997 (BV Borussia Dortmund 1-3). They defeated Dortmund 6-1 on aggregate to land the UEFA Cup in 1993.
- Of the 16 teams occupying top-two positions in their UEFA Champions League groups this season, only Olympiacos FC have scored as few goals as Juventus (three).

Team ties

- The two rival coaches met in the 1996 UEFA Champions League final in Rome when Bayern's Van Gaal was in charge of an AFC Ajax side beaten on penalties by a Juventus team featuring Ferrara, his present-day Bianconeri counterpart.
- Van Gaal had led Ajax to victory against another Italian side, Milan, in the final 12 months earlier.
- Van Gaal also guided Ajax past Juve's city rivals, Torino FC, in the 1992 UEFA Cup final.
- Ferrara was in the SSC Napoli team that got the better of Bayern in the 1988/89 UEFA Cup semi-finals, drawing 2-2 in Munich to complete a 4-2 aggregate success.
- Hasan Salihamidžić spent nine years with Bayern from 1998 to 2007 and was part of their UEFA Champions League-winning team in 2001.
- Fabio Grosso faced Bayern at the equivalent stage of the last season's competition with Olympique Lyonnais – and finished on the losing side in a 3-2 defeat. Felipe Melo was playing in the same section for Fiorentina.
- Grosso and Del Piero scored Italy's goals against Germany in their 2006 FIFA World Cup semi-final. Gianluigi Buffon, Fabio Cannavaro, Mauro Camoranesi and Vincenzo Iaquinta were also in the victorious Azzurri side against a Germany team including Bayern trio Miroslav Klose, Philipp Lahm and Bastian Schweinsteiger.
- Bayern goalkeeper Butt has scored two UEFA Champions League goals against Juventus – converting one spot-kick for Hamburg in a 4-4 draw in 2000/01 and another for Bayer 04 Leverkusen in a 3-1 win the following season.
- Bayern's Italy striker Luca Toni played against Juventus for US Città di Palermo and Fiorentina in Serie A. He was on target for the Viola in a 1-1 draw in Turin in April 2006.
- Arjen Robben appeared as a substitute for Real Madrid CF when they lost 2-1 at Juventus in the 2008/09 group stage. He was a colleague of Juve defender Cannavaro at Madrid.

- Matchday 5 marked Juventus' 200th game in the European Champion Clubs' Cup.
- Juventus have drawn 49 matches and conceded 196 goals in the European Cup.

- Following the loss to Cagliari Calcio on 29 November, Ciro Ferrara switched from a 4-2-3-1 formation to 4-3-1-2, with Alessandro Del Piero restored to the forward line alongside Amauri, and Camoranesi making way. Fit-again Fabio

Grosso replaced Cristian Molinaro at left-back, while Melo – who was dismissed late on – was preferred to Christian Poulsen in midfield.

- Claudio Marchisio's goal was his second of the campaign, one shy of his career-best tally of three for a season, set in 2008/09.
- The 2-0 defeat by Cagliari was Juventus's second consecutive loss following the 2-0 reverse at FC Girondins de Bordeaux on Matchday 5.
- Juventus had not previously lost two successive matches since 31 January, when they followed up a defeat at Udinese Calcio with a setback at home against Cagliari.
- Before drawing blanks against Cagliari and Bordeaux, the Bianconeri had scored in eight straight fixtures. Their previous failure to find the net came in a 2-0 defeat by US Città di Palermo on 4 October.
- Eleven different players have scored for the Bianconeri so far this term, with David Trezeguet leading the way on six goals – all in Serie A.
- Trezeguet last struck in the 5-2 win over Atalanta BC on 7 November. It was his 167th for the club, putting him level with Omar Sivori as the fourth-highest scorer in the Bianconeri's history. Del Piero leads the way on 262 strikes.
- Del Piero is yet to get off the mark in 2009/10, having only made his first start of the season against Bordeaux on 25 November.
- Juve have lost four times in 22 outings since Ferrara replaced Claudio Ranieri with two games of last season remaining.
- Gianluigi Buffon and Giorgio Chiellini have played every minute of Juventus's Serie A campaign.

- Del Piero and Sissoko were both introduced seven minutes after half-time against Udinese on 22 November.
- Before his appearance against Udinese, Del Piero had played just seven minutes for Juve this season – against Bologna FC on 27 September – before sustaining another injury.
- After facing the Republic of Ireland in October, Buffon revealed he will continue to play with damaged knee meniscus until surgery becomes unavoidable: "I'll try to go on until the game against Inter."
- Salihamidžić and Zebina have resumed training with the rest of Ferrara's squad.
- Chiellini broke his nose in a clash with Cagliari forward Nenê. He underwent surgery on 30 November and wore a protective mask against Inter.

- On 16 November, Del Piero received the Premio Internazionale Sport e Civiltà in recognition of the example he has long set both on and off the pitch.
- Buffon and Diego have been shortlisted for the FIFA World Player of the Year award. The winner will be announced in Zurich on 21 December.
- On 27 October, Frenchman Jean-Claude Blanc was appointed Juventus president, succeeding Giovanni Cobolli Gigli.

- Defender Holger Badstuber proved the hero for Bayern as the 20-year old curled in a 75th-minute free-kick winner, Mönchengladbach's Roel Brouwers having earlier cancelled out Mario Gómez's opener.
- The German Under-21 international's first ever Bundesliga effort earned Bayern their second consecutive championship success and a third straight win in all competitions – their longest run of victories since 22 September.
- "I am happy, but it was hard work and the luckier team won tonight," said coach Louis van Gaal. His team are now unbeaten in their last eleven league encounters at home but have won just four of eight this term.
- In their previous contest on 29 November, Bayern moved into the Bundesliga top four with a 3-0 victory away against Hannover 96, Thomas Müller opening the scoring with his eighth goal for the club in 2009/10.
- The Bavarian club were seventh in the Bundesliga after 13 matches; their worst position at that stage since 1994/95, when they occupied the same place.
- Daniel Van Buyten's goal in the 1-1 draw against FC Schalke 04 on 7 November was the defender's sixth in all competitions for Bayern this term. Only Müller and Gómez have scored more.
- Bayern took two points from their opening three Bundesliga games, their worst start to a season for 43 years.
- Van Gaal's charges will host SpVgg Greuther Fürth in the German Cup quarter-finals on 10 February.

- Ribéry missed France's successful FIFA World Cup play-off against the Republic of Ireland after failing to shake off a persistent knee problem. Van Gaal said: "The injury keeps coming back. We have to get rid of it completely before he returns to the side."

- Uli Hoeness officially replaced Franz Beckenbauer as club president on 27 November.
- Bayern will hold a week's winter training camp in Dubai from 4 January.
- Ribéry has been shortlisted for the FIFA World Player of the Year award. The winner will be announced in Zurich on 21 December.

- Took on a similar coaching role at hometown club Ajax, under Leo Beenhakker, from 1988 to 1991 before moving up to the top job on his mentor's departure.
- Had six glorious years at Ajax, winning three Eredivisie titles, a Dutch Cup, the 1992 UEFA Cup and the 1995 UEFA Champions League; defended that title in 1996 all the way to a penalty shoot-out defeat by Juventus in the final. Was awarded an Order of the Oranje-Nassau in 1997 and made a knight.
- Moved to Spain the same year for a three-season stint at Barcelona, winning two Liga titles and a Copa del Rey. Became Netherlands coach in 2000 in an unsuccessful bid to qualify the Oranje for the 2002 FIFA World Cup. Returned briefly to Barça before a spell out of coaching.
- Took over at Alkmaar in 2005, steering them to their first Eredivisie title since 1981 in April 2009. Appointed coach of Bayern a month later, as a replacement for caretaker Jupp Heynckes.

Competition facts

• UEFA Champions League: Group stage milestones

Holders FC Barcelona are looking to avoid becoming the first defending champions to fail to get through a group stage since the UEFA Champions League began. (This record, like the others, includes the seasons between 1999/2000 and 2002/03 that featured a second group stage).

In 1992/93, Barcelona were the reigning European Champion Clubs' Cup holders and were beaten 4-3 on aggregate in the second round by PFC CSKA Moskva.

S.S. Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta became the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League in 2007/08 when he featured against Olympiacos CFP on Matchday 1 at the age of 43 years and 168 days. The record was previously held by Alessandro Costacurta, the AC Milan defender who played against AEK Athens FC in the 2006/07 season at the age of 40 years and 211 days. Ballotta was aged 43 years 252 days when he featured against Real Madrid CF on Matchday 6.

Laurent Blanc is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 36 years and 339 days, having found the net for Manchester United FC in their 3-2 defeat of Olympiacos CFP on 23 October 2002.

Celestine Babayaro is the youngest player to have appeared in the UEFA Champions League. He was 16 years and 87 days when he started for RSC Anderlecht against FC Steaua Bucureşti on 23 November 1994. He was then sent off in the 37th minute.

Barcelona, Manchester United and Milan have all finished as group winners on ten occasions, one more than Real Madrid and Juventus.

Four teams have recorded six successive victories in a UEFA Champions League group stage: Milan (1992/93), Paris Saint-Germain FC (1994/95), FC Spartak Moskva (1995/96) and Barcelona (2002/03, first group stage).

In 2006/07, PFC Levski Sofia joined 1. FC Košice in being the only team to have played in the UEFA Champions League and never picked up a point. The Slovakian side have not returned to the competition since losing all six games in their only campaign to date in 1997/98. Six other teams have gone through a single group stage campaign without picking up a point: FC Dynamo Kyiv (2007/08), SK Rapid Wien (2005/06) and RSC Anderlecht (2004/05) plus Spartak Moskva and Bayer 04 Leverkusen (2002/03, first and second group stage respectively) and Fenerbahçe SK (2001/02, first group stage).

Manchester United scored 20 goals in the 1998/99 group stage, more than any other side has managed. Barcelona scored 19 times in the 1999/2000 first group stage.

Dynamo conceded 19 goals in their six outings in 2007/08, equalling the record let in during a group stage set by Ferencvárosi TC in the 1995/96 campaign.

No team has ever gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without conceding a goal. Milan (1992/93), AFC Ajax (1995/96), Juventus (1996/97 and 2004/05), Chelsea FC (2005/06), Liverpool FC (2005/06) and Villarreal CF (2005/06) all let in just one.

Before their 3-1 win against Sporting Clube de Portugal on Matchday 6 of the 2006/07 campaign, FC Spartak Moskva went 22 games without a victory in the competition, surpassing the unwanted record set by AEK Athens FC on Matchday 3 of the same campaign.

The lowest total for a team qualifying from the group stage is seven points. The first to do it, since three points for a win was introduced in 1995/96, were Legia Warszawa that same season before Bayer Leverkusen managed it in 1999/2000 and Liverpool in 2001/02. FC Lokomotiv Moskva and eventual finalists Juventus both progressed with seven points in 2002/03, a feat achieved by Rangers FC and Werder Bremen in 2005/06.
