Real Madrid CF will hope to move a step closer to their dream of reaching this year's UEFA Champions League final at their Santiago Bernabéu home when they welcome Olympique Lyonnais for the second leg of their last-16 tie. The nine-times European champions have not reached the quarter-finals since 2004 but will hope to put that right by finally getting the better of opponents who avoided defeat on both of their previous two trips to the Spanish capital and travel defending a 1-0 lead thanks to Jean Il Makoun's 47th-minute thunderbolt in the first leg.

Previous meetings

• The clubs first squared off in the 2005/06 UEFA Champions League group stage. Lyon defeated Madrid 3-0 at the Stade de Gerland before a 1-1 draw in the Spanish capital, John Carew (72) cancelling out Guti's goal (41) and securing first place in the group for the Ligue 1 side.

• The lineups for that meeting in Madrid on 23 November 2005 were:

• Lyon again claimed top spot in their group with a draw at the Bernabéu in 2006/07. After a 2-0 home victory against Los Merengues in September 2006, they drew 2-2 in Madrid on 21 November that year despite letting slip a two-goal lead. Mahamadou Diarra (39) – playing against his old club – and Ruud van Nistelrooy (83) restored parity after Carew (11) and Malouda (31) had struck, Grégory Coupet then saving a last-minute Van Nistelrooy penalty to secure Lyon a point.

Match background

• Madrid have already beaten one Ligue 1 team at the Santiago Bernabéu this term, registering a 3-0 success against Olympique de Marseille in the group stage.

• However, the Spanish side have lost their last three two-legged contests with Ligue 1 opposition, going down on away goals to AS Monaco FC in the 2003/04 UEFA Champions League quarter-finals and losing to Paris Saint-Germain FC in the last eight of both the 1992/93 UEFA Cup and the 1993/94 UEFA Cup Winners' Cup.

• Lyon have fallen at this stage in each of the past three campaigns, losing 6-3 to FC Barcelona 12 months ago after a 1-1 home draw was followed by a 5-2 defeat in Catalonia.

• Their only win in seven attempts in Spain came at this stage of the 2003/04 UEFA Champions League when a 1-0 first-leg success at Real Sociedad de Fútbol, courtesy of Gabriel Schürer's own goal, set them on the way to a 2-0 aggregate victory.

• Sidney Govou is the only survivor of the Lyon team that won in San Sebastian. Rémy Vercoutre watched from the bench.

• Lyon have won three out of four away games in this season's UEFA Champions League.

• Madrid won the first of their nine European Champion Clubs' Cups by beating French club Stade de Reims Champagne 4-3 in the competition's inaugural final in 1955/56. They defeated the same opponents 2-0 three years later to claim a fourth successive crown.

• History provides Madrid with plenty of cause for optimism, the Spanish club having overturned a first-leg deficit at the Santiago Bernabéu on 20 previous occasions in UEFA competition, most recently against FC Bayern München in the 2001/02 UEFA Champions League quarter-finals (1-2 away, 2-0 home). They have been eliminated 11 times after losing the away leg, however, including at this stage of the competition in 2007/08 with a pair of 2-1 losses to AS Roma.

• Lyon have won the first leg at home 11 times in UEFA competition and failed to progress only once, against Werder Bremen in the 1999/2000 UEFA Cup third round (3-0 home, 0-4 away). The most recent of Lyon's ten aggregate wins came in this season's play-off round against RSC Anderlecht (5-1 home, 3-1 away).

Team ties

• Madrid coach Manuel Pellegrini got the better of his Lyon counterpart Claude Puel when they met in the UEFA Champions League in the 2005/06 group stage.

• Pellegrini's Villarreal CF earned a goalless draw at Puel's LOSC Lille Métropole before a 1-0 home win earned Villarreal progress as group winners and eliminated Lille.

• Puel has had little joy against Spanish sides, suffering a 4-2 aggregate defeat by RCD Mallorca in the 1999/2000 UEFA Cup fourth round while at Monaco. With Lille he enjoyed a 1-0 win against Sevilla FC in the 2004/05 UEFA Cup group stage but suffered a round of 16 elimination by the same opponents in the 2005/06 edition.

• The Lyon coach lost against Spanish opposition in his first ever European tie as a player. His Monaco team went down 2-0 at Valencia CF in the 1980/81 UEFA Cup Winners' Cup first round, before a 3-3 second-leg draw. Nine years later Puel was in the Monaco side that beat Real Valladolid CF on penalties after a 0-0 aggregate draw in the quarter-finals of the same competition.

- A product of the Lyon academy, Benzema spent five seasons in the club's first team, making 112 league appearances and scoring 43 goals. He helped Lyon win four league titles and finished the 20-goal top scorer in Ligue 1 in 2007/08.
- Benzema's fellow Lyon old boy Mahamadou Diarra made 121 appearances for the club between 2002 and 2006 before leaving for the Santiago Bernabéu.
- Madrid's French internationals Benzema and Lassana Diarra could line up against several national-team colleagues in the Lyon squad. Likewise, Madrid duo Gonzalo Higuaín and Fernando Gago may face Lyon's Argentinian international Lisandro while Madrid's Kaká and Marcelo are team-mates with Michel Bastos and Cris for Brazil.
- Higuaín has French citizenship having been born in Brest when his father Jorge, also a professional footballer, was playing for Stade Brestois 29.
- Kaká and Cristiano Ronaldo have both helped eliminate Lyon from the UEFA Champions League. The former was in the AC Milan side that beat Lyon in the 2005/06 quarter-finals, while Ronaldo scored the only goal when Manchester United FC recorded a home win against Lyon in the last 16 in 2007/08 to complete a 2-1 aggregate success.
- Govou was in the France side that overcame a Spain team featuring Madrid's Iker Casillas, Sergio Ramos, Xabi Alonso and Raúl González in the last 16 of the 2006 FIFA World Cup finals.
- Casillas, Raúl Albiol and Sergio Ramos helped Spain gain a measure of revenge with a 1-0 friendly win against a France featuring Lyon midfielder Jérémy Toulalan and Madrid's Lassana Diarra in February 2008.
- Kim Källström appeared as a late substitute in Sweden's 2-1 loss to a Spain side including Casillas, Ramos and Albiol at UEFA EURO 2008.
- Rafael van der Vaart came off the bench to score for AFC Ajax in a 2-0 win at Lyon in the UEFA Champions League group stage in October 2002. He also featured as a substitute in the Netherlands' 4-1 victory against France at UEFA EURO 2008.

- The first leg against Lyon was Madrid's 150th UEFA Champions League match, group stage to final.

UEFA Champions League statistics

- Cristiano Ronaldo is the top scorer in the competition with six goals. Madrid are the joint highest scorers with 15.
- Madrid have committed more fouls (125) than any other team in the last 16 and collected 20 yellow cards. Sergio Ramos alone has committed 22 fouls, the joint highest total in the competition.
- Marcelo and Xabi Alonso serve one-match bans following their bookings in Lyon. Álvaro Arbeloa, Iker Casillas and Lassana Diarra will all incur a suspension with their next yellow cards.

- Arbeloa returned from suspension to take his place at left-back, Marcelo pushing into midfield as Esteban Granero dropped to the bench.
- Madrid maintained their 100% home Liga record. They have won 16 of their 17 games at home in all competitions this season, including the last 11, their only defeat at the Santiago Bernabéu coming against AC Milan on Matchday 3.
- Manuel Pellegrini's side have 62 points from 25 games, Madrid's best ever haul at this stage, and moved back ahead of FC Barcelona at the Liga summit. They have scored three goals or more in each of their last six league matches.
- Against Sevilla Raúl González came on for his 543rd Liga match, drawing level with Eusebio Sacristán in second place on the list of all-time appearance-makers, behind Andoni Zubizarreta (622).
- Ramos struck against his former club, the defender's second goal in as many games after scoring for Spain against France on 3 March.

- Ronaldo has scored 20 goals in 21 games in all competitions for Madrid this season.
- Diego Maradona was among the spectators at the Santiago Bernabéu.
- Madrid had been in emphatic form in their previous two outings, beating Villarreal CF 6-2 at home and CD Tenerife 5-1 away. Ronaldo (2 goals), Kaká (3) and Gonzalo Higuaín (4) were each on target in both matches.
- Raúl scored his 227th Liga goal against Tenerife, joining Alfredo di Stéfano in third position on the list of all-time top-flight goalscorers behind Telmo Zarra (251) and Hugo Sánchez (234).
- Ramos made his 200th appearance for Madrid – his 150th for the club in the Liga – against Villarreal on 21 February.
- Higuaín has scored 20 goals in 30 games for club and country this season, including 11 in his last 11.
- Pellegrini's side have conceded 20 goals in 25 league fixtures this term, eight fewer than they had shipped at the same stage last season.

- Casillas moved level with Raúl on Spain's all-time appearance list when he won his 102nd cap in Paris. Zubizarreta leads the way on 126.

- The 3-0 win at Xerez CD on 13 February marked Casillas's 500th competitive appearance for Madrid.
- On 12 February Madrid announced the arrival of Real Racing Club forward Sergio Canales on a six-year deal. The 18-year-old will remain in Santander until the end of the season before linking up with his new side on 1 July.
- Ronaldo and Kaká were named in the UEFA.com Team of the Year 2009 announced on 20 January. Ronaldo finished runner-up to Barcelona's Lionel Messi in both the 2009 Ballon d'Or and FIFA World Player awards in December.
- On 5 February Marcelo agreed a three-year contract extension, tying him to Madrid until June 2015.

• Lyon's first ever game at Boulogne's Stade de la Libération ended in only their second goalless draw of the season. The hosts' Yoann Lachor was sent off in added time.

• It was Lyon's sixth successive clean sheet – they have not conceded in 620 minutes, since Mevlüt Erdinç struck for Paris Saint-Germain FC on 31 January.

• With Jérémy Toulalan rested alongside Lisandro on the substitutes' bench, Mathieu Bodmer made his first Ligue 1 start since 26 September.

• Michel Bastos appeared fine when substituted but was ruled out of the Madrid game on Monday with a "muscular problem" according to Lyon. Bastos had scored his first hat-trick in France in the 4-0 victory at FC Sochaux-Montbéliard on 21 February, all three goals coming in the opening 25 minutes.

• Lyon are unbeaten in seven outings, winning five and drawing two.

• Lisandro rounded off the win and was on target again six days later as a 2-0 home triumph over OGC Nice lifted Lyon into the top three in Ligue 1 for the first time since 6 December.

• Eighteen of Lyon's 45 Ligue 1 goals this term have come in the final 15 minutes of games.

• Lyon are unbeaten in Ligue 1 in 2010, winning six and drawing two.

• Toulalan scored his first competitive goal for Lyon on 13 January in a 3-0 League Cup victory against FC Metz. It was the midfielder's 105th game for the club since arriving from FC Nantes in summer 2006.

• Bafétimbi Gomis has missed just one of Lyon's 39 games this season – the second leg of their UEFA Champions League play-off at RSC Anderlecht.

- Took over at Villarreal in 2004, guiding them to fourth place in the Liga in his debut season and securing a place in the UEFA Champions League for the first time. His side also reached the quarter-finals of the UEFA Cup.
- The following campaign, Villarreal defied all expectations by reaching the UEFA Champions League semi-finals, where they bowed out 1-0 on aggregate to Arsenal FC.
- Turned Villarreal into a force to be reckoned with in the Liga, finishing second in 2007/08, a club record. They reached the UEFA Champions League quarter-finals last season, again being knocked out by Arsenal.
- Announced as the new Real Madrid coach on 1 June, signing a two-year contract.

Olympique Lyonnais: Claude Puel

- Olympique Lyonnais coach Claude Puel is no stranger to big European nights, having spent 22 years as player and coach at AS Monaco FC and then led LOSC Lille Métropole into the UEFA Champions League.
- Puel amassed 488 league games as Monaco's midfield anchorman, winning two French titles (1982, 1988) and the 1991 French Cup in addition to reaching the 1992 UEFA Cup Winners' Cup final and the UEFA Champions League semi-finals two years later.
- Puel's coaching philosophy is simple: assemble a team with high fitness levels, stamina and speed in abundance and a miserly defence. Such virtues helped Monaco to the French title in 2000 and earned Lille UEFA Intertoto Cup victory in 2004, three years after Puel had taken charge.
- When appointed Lille coach in summer 2001, Puel looked to the long term; his ambitions came to fruition ahead of schedule as he steered his team into Europe's premier club competition achieved with second place in Ligue 1 in 2005 – their best finish for 50 years.
- Lille came third in 2006, going on to the UEFA Champions League first knockout round before Puel moved to Lyon in 2008. Although he oversaw the end of a seven-year run of league titles in his first season, Puel did guide Lyon to the UEFA Champions League first knockout round, where they lost to eventual winners FC Barcelona.

• Born in the Italian town of Mirandola in October 1971, Nicola Rizzoli is following in the footsteps of one of the most famous referees of recent years, Pierluigi Collina, who also started his career as part of the group of match officials based in Bologna.

• An architect by profession, Rizzoli was promoted to the refereeing lists for Serie A and B in 2001, making his top-flight debut the following year.

• His major breakthrough came in 2006/07 when he took charge of some of Serie A's most high-profile fixtures, including the game between AS Roma and FC Internazionale Milano and the derbies in Milan and Rome.

• By the end of that season he had become a regular presence as a fourth official in the UEFA Champions League and UEFA Cup. He then took charge of five games in the latter competition in the 2007/08 campaign.

• Rizzoli made his only refereeing appearance in UEFA EURO 2008™ qualifying in the Netherlands-Slovenia match in October 2007 having received his FIFA badge earlier that year. He was selected in the UEFA Champions League proper for the first time at the start of 2008/09, taking charge of two games in that season's group stage and acting as fourth official at the semi-final second leg between Arsenal FC and Manchester United FC.

UEFA Champions League knockout stage: Did you know?

- Teams have recovered from a first-leg deficit to go through to the next stage on 21 occasions, although only once – AFC Ajax's defeat of Panathinaikos FC in the 1995/96 semi-finals – has a side gone through after losing the first leg at home. The biggest losing margin a side has overturned was achieved by RC Deportivo La Coruña in the 2003/04 quarter-finals when they fought back from a 4-1 defeat at AC Milan to win 4-0 at home.
- Seventeen ties have been decided on the away goals rule, including five where the triumphant team lost the first leg.
- FC Bayern München hold the record for the biggest first-leg lead with a 5-0 success at Sporting Clube de Portugal in the 2008/09 first knockout round, eventually going through 12-1 after a 7-1 home victory in the second leg.
- Ten ties have now gone to penalties, including the game between Arsenal FC and AS Roma in the 2008/09 first knockout round. Five of these were finals – 1996, 2001, 2003, 2005 and 2008. The first two-legged tie decided on spot-kicks was PSV Eindhoven's 4-2 win against Olympique Lyonnais on 13 April 2005 after a 2-2 aggregate draw.
- In all, 17 ties have required extra time. So far seven have been decided by extra time alone: four quarter-finals, two first knockout round encounters and the 2007/08 semi-final between Chelsea FC and Liverpool FC.
- The 2008/09 last-16 encounter between Bayern and Sporting featured more goals (13) over its two legs than any previous UEFA Champions League knockout tie, Bayern prevailing 12-1.
- There has never been a knockout tie ending goalless after two legs. Nine have finished 1-0 on aggregate, most recently Manchester United FC's narrow victory against FC Barcelona in the 2007/08 semi-finals.
- Arsenal FC, Chelsea FC, Olympique Lyonnais and Real Madrid CF are all appearing in the first knockout round for the seventh season in succession.
- Teams from the same country have contested the final on three previous occasions. Real Madrid CF overcame Valencia CF 3-0 in Paris in 2000. Three years later Milan defeated Juventus 3-2 on penalties after a goalless draw at Old Trafford, and United beat Chelsea, also on spot-kicks, after a 1-1 draw in Moscow in May 2008.
- Clarence Seedorf is the only player to win the European Champion Clubs' Cup with three clubs (Ajax 1995, Madrid 1998, Milan 2003, 2007). Liverpool's Bob Paisley (1977, 1978, 1981) is the only coach to win three times.
- Ottmar Hitzfeld (BV Borussia Dortmund 1997, Bayern 2001) and Ernst Happel (Feyenoord 1970, Hamburger SV 1983) are the only coaches to win the trophy with two clubs.
- Only five capital cities have been home to teams that have won the European Cup: Madrid (Real Madrid), Belgrade (FK Crvena Zvezda), Bucharest (FC Steaua Bucureşti), Amsterdam (Ajax) and Lisbon (SL Benfica).
- S.S. Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta is the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League having been aged 43 years 252 days when he featured against Real Madrid CF on Matchday 6 of the 2007/08 competition.
- Laurent Blanc is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 36 years and 339 days, in Manchester United's 3-2 defeat of Olympiacos FC on 23 October 2002.
- Celestine Babayaro is the youngest player to have appeared in the UEFA Champions League. He was 16 years and 87 days when he started for RSC Anderlecht against Steaua on 23 November 1994. He was then sent off in the 37th minute.
