FC Barcelona have already beaten FC Internazionale Milano once at home this season and they need a repeat performance if they are to claim a place in next month's UEFA Champions League final.

- José Mourinho's visitors may have performed well on their travels in recent rounds but they lost 2-0 at the Camp Nou in November and have never won a semi-final away leg in Europe's elite club competition.
- The Italian champions hold the upper hand in the tie, however, despite Pedro Rodríguez's 19th-minute strike at San Siro. Wesley Sneijder levelled on the half-hour, and second-half goals from Maicon (48) and Diego Milito (61) left Barcelona with plenty of work to do in the second leg.
- For two-time winners Inter, the goal is a first final appearance since 1972. Josep Guardiola's Barcelona, by contrast, are looking to take the penultimate step towards becoming the first team since Inter's neighbours AC Milan 20 years ago to win back-to-back European crowns.
- In a contest rich in sub-plots, Inter coach Mourinho returns once more to the club he served as assistant coach and he is not alone, with Nerazzurri players Samuel Eto'o, Thiago Motta and Ricardo Quaresma all having enjoyed spells at the Camp Nou.

Previous meetings

- These two sides need no introduction having met last autumn in the group stage. They drew 0-0 at San Siro on 16 September before reconvening in Barcelona on 24 November, the Catalan side prevailing through first-half strikes from Gerard Piqué and Pedro.
- The clubs had previously met in the UEFA Champions League second group stage in 2002/03. Barcelona were 3-0 winners at the Camp Nou on 18 February 2003. Goals from Javier Saviola, Phillip Cocu and Patrick Kluivert secured a ninth successive victory in the UEFA Champions League proper, still a competition record.
- The return the following week finished goalless and both teams progressed to the quarter-finals, Barcelona as group winners. Yet Inter went further that season, reaching the last four.
- Inter's Javier Zanetti and Barcelona pair Carles Puyol and Xavi Hernández played in both matches, with Andrés Iniesta an unused substitute at San Siro.

Match background

- Barcelona have won four out of five European home games so far this season yet their recent semi-final record at the Camp Nou is less impressive.

• Oddly for a team famed for their attacking football – and who have averaged 2.6 goals per home game in the 2009/10 competition – the Catalan side have failed to find the net in their past four home semi-final matches in the UEFA Champions League.

• Barcelona have played in ten previous semi-finals and their record is five wins and five defeats:

• Blaugrana coach Guardiola played in the Barcelona side that defeated Porto in the 1993/94 semi-final, which was a one-off match. There was no semi-final stage in the 1991/92 competition.

• The Spanish club were twice successful in UEFA Cup Winners' Cup semi-finals against Serie A sides, overcoming ACF Fiorentina in 1997 and Juventus in 1991.

• Overall Barcelona's home record against Italian opponents is W9 D4 L2. They also have a decent record in two-legged ties against teams from the country, with five victories and three defeats.

• Barcelona have won 11 ties in UEFA competition when they have lost the first leg away from home – although they have gone down in the other 11, most recently in the 2003/04 UEFA Cup fourth round when a 1-0 defeat at Celtic FC preceded a goalless draw at the Camp Nou.

• Of the four times they have been defeated 3-1 in an away opener, Barcelona have lost two ties and won the other two, most recently in the 1999/2000 UEFA Champions League quarter-finals when they succumbed at Chelsea FC but won 5-1 after extra time in Catalonia.

• Barcelona lifted the European Cup for the first time after beating Italy's UC Sampdoria 1-0 in the 1992 final at Wembley. They lost the 1994 final 4-0 to Milan.

• Inter boast a decent record on their travels in this season's UEFA Champions League, with three wins from five games.

• The Italian titleholders won at Chelsea and PFC CSKA Moskva in the preceding knockout rounds though they will not need reminding that their solitary defeat so far this campaign came at the Camp Nou.

• Inter have played in seven previous semi-finals in Europe's elite club competition. Their record is four victories and three defeats:

• Besides losing two European Cup semi-finals to Barcelona's arch-rivals Real Madrid, Inter also succumbed to Madrid twice at the semi-final stage of the UEFA Cup in 1984/85 and 1985/86.

• On a happier note, the Nerazzurri achieved the first of their two European Cup successes by defeating Madrid 3-1 in the 1964 final in Vienna.

• The visitors' record in Spain does not make good reading for Interisti: they have lost 12 of 17 matches with three wins and two draws.

• Inter also have a poor record in two-legged ties against teams from Spain, with four victories and nine defeats from 13 contests.

• However, the Italian champions have a formidable record when winning the first leg at home in UEFA competition, emerging triumphant in all but four of the 43 ties in which they have recorded an initial victory. They have already eliminated Chelsea and CSKA this season after a first-leg win at San Siro.

- Inter have won 3-1 at home in a first leg five times and gone on to progress on four occasions. The one blip, however, came against a Spanish side as they succumbed to a 5-1 extra-time defeat at Real Madrid in the 1985/86 UEFA Cup semi-finals.
- Inter's last two knockout games in Spain both brought UEFA Champions League elimination on away goals – against Valencia CF in the 2006/07 round of 16 and against Villarreal CF in the previous season's quarter-finals. The Villarreal defeat was the last time the Milan club were knocked out after a home first-leg win.
- Their last win in Spain was their most spectacular, 5-1 at Valencia in the 2004/05 group stage. Iván Córdoba, Esteban Cambiasso, Marco Materazzi and Dejan Stanković all started the game with Zanetti featuring as a substitute.
- Inter coach Mourinho's record in UEFA Champions League semi-finals is mixed. He led Porto past RC Deportivo La Coruña in 2004 but fell at this stage with Chelsea in 2005 and 2007.
- Mourinho is hoping to lead Inter to the UEFA Champions League six years after winning it with Porto. Only Ernst Happel (Feyenoord 1970, Hamburg 1983) and Ottmar Hitzfeld (Borussia Dortmund 1997, FC Bayern München 2001) have won the European Cup as coaches of two different clubs. Bayern's Louis van Gaal, a winner with AFC Ajax in 1995, is also attempting the feat this time round.

Team ties

- Mourinho served as an assistant to the late Sir Bobby Robson and Van Gaal at Barcelona from 1996 to 2000.
- As Chelsea manager Mourinho oversaw a 5-4 aggregate defeat of Barcelona in the 2004/05 first knockout round but suffered a 3-2 overall loss at the same stage the next season. The 2006/07 campaign brought another reunion, this time in the group stage, with Chelsea finishing above Barça after a 1-0 home win and 2-2 away draw.
- Guardiola played in Italy between 2001 and 2003, making 24 appearances in Serie A for Brescia Calcio and another four for AS Roma.
- Inter forward Diego Milito, 30, could line up against his 29-year-old brother Gabriel of Barcelona. The Argentinian siblings played together for two seasons with Real Zaragoza between 2005 and 2007.
- Only three sets of brothers have played against each other in UEFA club competition: Johannes (Celtic) and Atli Edvaldsson (Valur Reykjavík) in the first round of the 1974/75 UEFA Cup Winners' Cup, Ronald (PSV Eindhoven) and Erwin Koeman (KV Mechelen) in the 1988 UEFA Super Cup and John Arne (Roma) and Bjørn Helge Riise (Fulham FC) in this season's UEFA Europa League group stage.
- During his three-year spell at Inter, Barcelona striker Zlatan Ibrahimović hit 57 goals in 88 Serie A appearances and six in 22 UEFA Champions League games.
- An unused substitute for Barcelona at San Siro in September, Maxwell was also with Inter for three years from 2006 to 2009. The Brazilian full-back made 79 appearances in Serie A and scored two goals.
- Eto'o spent five seasons with Barcelona from 2004. The Cameroon striker hit 109 goals in 144 league appearances, including 30 last season. In the UEFA Champions League he registered 18 in 43 games, scoring Barcelona's first goals in the final triumphs of 2006 and 2009.
- Motta made 96 league appearances for Barcelona between 2002 and 2007, scoring six goals. He was an unused substitute in the Blaugrana's 2-1 UEFA Champions League final defeat of Arsenal FC in 2006.
- Quaresma spent 2003/04 at the Camp Nou, making 22 Liga appearances and scoring once.
- Thierry Henry scored twice for Arsenal in a 5-1 win at Inter in the 2003/04 group stage. The France forward previously suffered a UEFA Cup semi-final defeat at Inter's hands when playing for AS Monaco FC in 1996/97.
- Former Barcelona forward Jordi Cruyff – son of Camp Nou favourite Johan – hit the opening goal for Deportivo Alavés when they became the only Spanish team to beat Inter in Milan, prevailing 2-0 in a UEFA Cup fourth-round tie in 2000/01.

• The victorious team will advance to the final at the Santiago Bernabéu stadium in Madrid on 22 May where they will play either Bayern or Olympique Lyonnais.

UEFA milestones

- Lionel Messi's four goals in the quarter-final second leg against Arsenal FC put him level with Rivaldo as Barça's all-time top scorer in the UEFA Champions League on 25 strikes.
- Messi became only the sixth player to score four times in a UEFA Champions League match.
- Diego Milito's third goal for Inter in the first leg was the 150th Barcelona had conceded in the UEFA Champions League, group stage to final.

UEFA Champions League statistics

- Barcelona have scored more goals (19) and had more shots on goal (84) than any other semi-finalist.
- Messi has scored eight goals, making him the competition's highest scorer. He was also the top marksman in 2008/09 with nine goals.
- Messi fired 27 shots on goal in the first 11 matches, more than any other player; Zlatan Ibrahimović is second with 20 attempts on target.
- Daniel Alves has committed 27 fouls, more than any other player in the competition.
- Víctor Valdés has played every minute of Barcelona's European campaign.
- Carles Puyol serves a one-match ban after his first-leg yellow card. Gerard Piqué and Alves are within a booking of suspensions.

- Josep Guardiola made five changes to the side that started the defeat in Milan, with Gerard Piqué, Sergio Busquets, Messi and Pedro Rodríguez all dropping to the bench. Puyol shifted to right-back as cover for the suspended Alves.
- The Liga's bottom side Xerez ended the game with nine men after Matías Alustiza and Fabián Orellana were sent off in added time.
- Barcelona have won their last 11 matches at the Camp Nou, scoring 35 goals and conceding just five.
- With four fixtures to go Guardiola's side have already matched last season's title-winning total of 87 points.
- Ibrahimović has scored six goals in his last seven appearances.
- Barça have won 15 games by three goals or more this term.
- The Catalan giants have scored five Liga goals direct from free-kicks in 2009/10, all struck by different players: Alves, Ibrahimović, Rafael Márquez, Thierry Henry and Messi.
- Holder of the Ricardo Zamora Trophy as the goalkeeper with the lowest goals-to-game ratio last term, Valdés has kept 19 clean sheets in the Liga this season.
- Last week's 3-1 defeat in Italy represented the first time Barcelona had lost by more than one goal under Guardiola. They had not conceded three goals since a 4-3 Liga loss at Club Atlético de Madrid on 1 March 2009.
- Pedro has scored three goals in his last four games.
- Messi has registered 29 goals in his last 29 outings for the Spanish titleholders and 16 in his last 14 matches, although none in his last four games.

- The Argentinian international became only the second player to record back-to-back Liga hat-tricks with his efforts against Real Zaragoza and Valencia CF in March. Salva Ballesta blazed that particular trail for Real Racing Club in October 1999.
- Messi, who also became the youngest player to reach 100 goals for Barça in January, made his 200th appearance for the club against CA Osasuna on 24 March. He reached that landmark with 114 goals under his belt, including 72 in his last 90 games before hitting the milestone.
- Pedro has surpassed Giovanni Silva's 1997/98 club record by scoring in six competitions in one season: the Liga, UEFA Champions League, UEFA Super Cup, Copa del Rey, Spanish Super Cup and FIFA Club World Cup.
- The Blaugrana's six-match winning start to the Liga campaign equalled a club record also achieved in 1929/30, 1990/91 and 1997/98.
- Ibrahimović started the season by becoming the first new signing to score in Barcelona's opening five league games. Hristo Stoichkov held the previous record for a newcomer, having struck in Barça's first three outings in 1990/91.

- José Mourinho made six changes to the side that beat Barcelona, with only Júlio César; Zanetti, Sneijder, Milito and Eto'o retaining their places. Zanetti dropped into a new-look defence as Maicon was rested after losing a tooth on Tuesday.
- Simone Tiribocchi's early goal was the first Inter had conceded at home in 660 minutes in Serie A.
- Cristian Chivu also registered for the first time in a Nerazzurri shirt, in what was his 88th appearance since joining from AS Roma in summer 2007.
- Milito has scored 20 goals in 32 Serie A appearances since joining Inter last summer, and his overall tally in Italy's top flight now reads 44 goals in 63 games following his 24 efforts in 31 outings for Genoa CFC.
- It was only Inter's fifth win in 13 Serie A games, drawing six and losing two in that run, although they have won their last four matches in all competitions and seven of their last eight matches.
- Mourinho's charges have kept clean sheets in 16 of their last 28 games in all competitions, including six of the last ten, but only eight in 23 away trips this season.
- The Nerazzurri have won just five of their last 15 away games in all competitions, losing four.
- Inter boasted a 14-point lead over Roma on 5 December and had been Serie A leaders for 24 consecutive games before a 2-2 draw at ACF Fiorentina on 10 April allowed the Giallorossi to overtake them.

- Maicon has hit six league goals this term, his best return in four seasons in Italy.
- Inter are unbeaten at San Siro this term and Mourinho has not lost a home league fixture since 23 February 2002 when SC Beira-Mar overcame his FC Porto side 3-2, 135 games ago.
- The Italian titleholders have gone 44 matches unbeaten at home in all competitions since a 1-0 defeat by Panathinaikos FC in the UEFA Champions League group stage on 26 November 2008.
- Mourinho marked his 100th match as Inter coach with a 2-0 victory against Juventus on 16 April.
- Zanetti also celebrated a special milestone against the Bianconeri, contesting his 500th Serie A match with Inter (including two end-of-season UEFA Cup play-off games in 1998/99). That figure puts Zanetti second in club history, behind Giuseppe Bergomi (519 appearances).
- Zanetti was suspended for the 3-0 home win against Bologna FC on 3 April, missing his first league game since 28 October 2006 – a run of 137 consecutive matches. The Inter captain had also appeared in 167 games in a row in Serie A and the UEFA Champions League.
- The Nerazzuri will play Roma in the Coppa Italia final at the Stadio Olimpico on 5 May. The teams have met in four of the past five finals, Roma coming out on top in 2007 and 2008 and Inter prevailing in 2005 and 2006.

- Known as 'Pep', he came up through Barcelona's youth ranks to win six Spanish Liga titles, one European Champion Clubs' Cup, a UEFA Cup Winners' Cup and two Copa del Rey trophies from 1990 to 2001.
- Also had spells with Brescia, Fabio Capello's Roma, Al-Ahly in Doha and Mexico's Dorados de Sinola before ending his playing career in 2006.
- Won 40 caps and Olympic footballing gold with Spain in 1992, but missed the 1998 and 2002 FIFA World Cup tournaments through injury.
- Having coached Barcelona's B team, became the 15th Catalan-born boss of the senior team in 2008 and won the UEFA Champions League, Spanish Liga and Copa del Rey in his first season in charge.
- Success in the 2008/09 final made Guardiola the sixth man to lift the European Cup as a player and a coach following Miguel Muñoz, Giovanni Trapattoni, Johan Cruyff, Carlo Ancelotti and Frank Rijkaard. Barcelona followed up with victories in the Spanish and UEFA Super Cups at the start of 2009/10.

FC Internazionale Milano: José Mourinho

Coaching career: SL Benfica, UD Leiria, FC Porto, Chelsea FC, FC Internazionale Milano

- A former teacher, he worked as a translator for Sporting Clube de Portugal coach Sir Bobby Robson in the 1990s, eventually following the Englishman to Porto and Barcelona as a coaching assistant.
- As coach, had a nine-game spell at Benfica and a highly successful tenure at Leiria before getting his big break with Porto in January 2002.
- In his first full season, 2002/03, Porto won the UEFA Cup and a domestic double. The next year they retained their league title and claimed the UEFA Champions League with a 3-0 defeat of AS Monaco FC in the final in Gelsenkirchen.
- Joined Chelsea in 2004 as successor to Claudio Ranieri and led the club to their first league championship for 50 years and the League Cup in his first season. Followed up with the league title again in 2006, and both the League Cup and FA Cup in 2007.
- Left Chelsea by mutual agreement in September 2007 and stayed out of football until joining Inter in June 2008. His first campaign saw the Nerazzurri retain their Serie A title but they bowed out to eventual finalists Manchester United FC in the UEFA Champions League first knockout round.

- Has continued to be a regular in the UEFA Champions League and UEFA Cup, where he oversaw the 2007/08 semi-final second leg between ACF Fiorentina and Rangers FC. Also took charge of FC Barcelona's 1-0 extra-time win against FC Shakhtar Donetsk in the 2009 UEFA Super Cup.

Competition facts

UEFA Champions League knockout stage: Did you know?

- Teams have recovered from a first-leg deficit to go through to the next stage on 22 occasions, although only once – AFC Ajax's defeat of Panathinaikos FC in the 1995/96 semi-finals – has a side gone through after losing the first leg at home. The biggest losing margin a side has overturned was achieved by RC Deportivo La Coruña in the 2003/04 quarter-finals when they fought back from a 4-1 defeat at AC Milan to win 4-0 at home.
- Nineteen ties have been decided on the away goals rule, including five where the triumphant team lost the first leg.
- FC Bayern München hold the record for the biggest first-leg lead with a 5-0 success at Sporting Clube de Portugal in the 2008/09 first knockout round, eventually going through 12-1 after a 7-1 home victory in the second leg.
- Ten ties have now gone to penalties, including the game between Arsenal FC and AS Roma in the 2008/09 first knockout round. Five of these were finals – 1996, 2001, 2003, 2005 and 2008. The first two-legged tie decided on spot-kicks was PSV Eindhoven's 4-2 win against Olympique Lyonnais on 13 April 2005 after a 2-2 aggregate draw.
- In all, 17 ties have required extra time. So far seven have been decided by extra time alone: four quarter-finals, two first knockout round encounters and the 2007/08 semi-final between Chelsea FC and Liverpool FC.
- The 2008/09 last-16 encounter between Bayern and Sporting featured more goals (13) over its two legs than any previous UEFA Champions League knockout tie, Bayern prevailing 12-1.
- There has never been a knockout tie ending goalless after two legs. Nine have finished 1-0 on aggregate, most recently Manchester United FC's narrow victory against FC Barcelona in the 2007/08 semi-finals.
- This is the first time in six seasons teams from four different countries have reached the semi-finals; in the 2003/04 competition, AS Monaco FC beat Chelsea in one semi-final with FC Porto overcoming RC Deportivo La Coruña in the other.
- The biggest winning margin in one UEFA Champions League semi-final game has been three goals. AFC Ajax recorded a 5-2 home success in the 1994/95 second leg against Bayern, while there have been 4-1 victories on three occasions. Juventus did it twice at home against Ajax (second leg) and AS Monaco FC (first leg) in 1996/97 and 1997/98 respectively, and Valencia at home to Barcelona (first leg) in 1999/00. On five other occasions, teams won 3-0 - most recently Milan's defeat of Manchester United in the 2006/07 semi-final second leg.
- That 4-1 win for Juventus against Monaco in 1997/98 was part of the biggest aggregate semi-final score. The principality club won 3-2 in their home return to make it ten goals in the tie.
- Madrid's 6-0 second-leg win against FC Zürich in the 1963/64 edition remains the biggest victory in a European Champion Clubs' Cup semi-final. Eintracht Frankfurt's 12-4 aggregate success against Rangers FC in 1959/60 is the biggest two-leg total overall.
- Clarence Seedorf is the only player to win the European Champion Clubs' Cup with three clubs (Ajax 1995, Madrid 1998, Milan 2003, 2007). Liverpool's Bob Paisley (1977, 1978, 1981) is the only coach to win three times.
- Ottmar Hitzfeld (BV Borussia Dortmund 1997, Bayern 2001) and Ernst Happel (Feyenoord 1970, Hamburger SV 1983) are the only coaches to win the trophy with two clubs.
- No team has successfully defended the UEFA Champions League trophy with AC Milan (1989, 1990) the last club to win consecutive European Champion Clubs' Cups. Milan (1994, 1995), Juventus (1996, 1997) and Manchester United (2008, 2009) have all returned to the final as holders only to lose.

UEFA Champions League: Did you know?

- S.S. Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta is the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League having been aged 43 years 252 days when he featured against Real Madrid CF on Matchday 6 of the 2007/08 competition.
- Laurent Blanc is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 36 years and 339 days, in Manchester United's 3-2 defeat of Olympiacos FC on 23 October 2002.
- Celestine Babayaro is the youngest player to have appeared in the UEFA Champions League. He was 16 years and 87 days when he started for RSC Anderlecht against Steaua on 23 November 1994. He was then sent off in the 37th minute.
