FC Bayern München will hope 13 proves a lucky number when they take on first-time semi-finalists Olympique Lyonnais.

- The Bundesliga outfit are competing in their 13th semi-final in Europe's elite club competition and aiming to qualify for their first final since they last won the UEFA Champions League in 2001 – when, as now, they overcame Manchester United FC in the quarter-finals.
- Bayern hold the advantage in terms of history for this is Lyon's first UEFA Champions League semi-final. Indeed the Ligue 1 visitors have never played in the final of any major European competition – the closest they got previously was the last four of the 1963/64 UEFA Cup Winners' Cup, losing to Sporting Clube de Portugal after a replay.

Previous meetings

- The clubs have met six times in the UEFA Champions League over the past decade, recording two wins apiece.
- In the 2008/09 group stage, they drew 1-1 in Munich, Zé Roberto (52) cancelling out a Martin Demichelis own goal (25).
- The full lineups for that meeting on 30 September 2008 were:
Bayern: Rensing, Oddo, Breno, Lucio, Lahm, Schweinsteiger, Demichelis, Zé Roberto, Ribéry (Borowski 82), Klose, Toni.
Lyon: Lloris, Réveillère, Cris, Bodmer, Mensah, Juninho (Boumsong 87), Toulalan, Makoun, Govou (Ederson 36), Fred (Mounier 75), Benzema.
- Bayern secured first place in the section with a 3-2 win in Lyon on the final matchday that consigned their hosts to second. The Bavarian side raced into a three-goal lead through Miroslav Klose (11, 37) and Franck Ribéry (34) before Sidney Govou (52) and Karim Benzema (68) narrowed the deficit.
- It was Lyon first and Bayern second when the teams met in the 2003/04 group stage. Then they drew 1-1 at Stade de Gerland – Péguy Luyindula's 88th-minute equaliser rescuing the hosts – before Lyon won 2-1 in Bavaria through a goal from Bayern old boy Giovane Elber.
- Demichelis featured for Bayern in those games with Anthony Réveillère and Govou in the Lyon side.
- The clubs first met in the 2000/01 second group stage, Jens Jeremies scoring the only goal in Munich in November 2000. Govou is the only survivor of that encounter, having appeared as an 81st-minute substitute.
- Govou hit two first-half goals to set up a 3-0 Lyon victory in the return fixture in France on 6 March 2001, but Bayern still advanced and went on to claim the trophy that year while Les Gones were eliminated.

Match background

- Bayern lost home (0-2) and away (1-2) in the group stage to French champions FC Girondins de Bordeaux – Lyon's victims in the quarter-finals.
- Four-times European champions, Bayern's record in European Champion Clubs' Cup semi-finals is seven wins and five defeats:

- Overall Bayern have contested 20 semi-finals in UEFA competition, winning nine and losing 11. Their most recent semi-final was against FC Zenit St. Petersburg in the 2007/08 UEFA Cup when they drew 1-1 at home but lost 4-0 away.
- Bayern's home record against Ligue 1 opposition is W7 D2 L3. They have won two out of three two-legged contests with French sides, most recently the 1995/96 UEFA Cup final against Bordeaux.
- Bayern recorded their third European Cup final victory by beating France's St-Etienne 1-0 in 1976, Franz Roth the scorer.
- Bayern coach Louis van Gaal is hoping to lead the German club to the UEFA Champions League 15 years after winning it with Ajax. Only Ernst Happel (Feyenoord 1970, Hamburger SV 1983) and Ottmar Hitzfeld (BV Borussia Dortmund 1997, Bayern 2001) have won the European Cup as coaches of two different clubs. FC Internazionale Milano's José Mourinho, a winner with FC Porto in 2004, is also attempting the feat this time round.
- Bayern feature two players in their squad with experience of a UEFA Champions League final. Mark van Bommel won the 2006 showpiece while at FC Barcelona and Hans-Jörg Butt was on the losing side with Bayer 04 Leverkusen in 2002.
- Lyon have recorded four wins and a draw on their last five visits to Germany. Their overall record on German soil is W4 D2 L5.
- In two-legged ties against Bundesliga sides, Lyon's record is two wins and three defeats.

Team ties

- Van Gaal faced France's AJ Auxerre in the 1996/97 UEFA Champions League group stage while at Ajax. He oversaw a 1-0 win in France and a 2-1 home defeat.
- Klose has unhappy memories of facing Lyon – he was in the Werder Bremen side beaten 10-2 on aggregate by Les Gones in the 2004/05 UEFA Champions League round of 16.
- Ribéry had mixed fortunes against Lyon in French football. He never got the better of them in Ligue 1, in one game with FC Metz and three with Olympique de Marseille. But he did help eliminate them twice from the French Cup. In 2005/06, he set up Mamadou Niang's winner in a 2-1 quarter-final success at Gerland and the next season featured again as OM won 2-1 in a last-16 tie at Vélodrome.
- Daniel Van Buyten spent two and a half seasons at Marseille from 2001.
- Van Buyten, who did not manage a victory in five Ligue 1 outings against Lyon, scored against them in a 4-1 home defeat for Marseille in November 2003. Réveillère and Govou were in the opposition lineup.
- Butt faced Lyon with Leverkusen in the first group stage of the UEFA Champions League in 2001/02. While Leverkusen won 1-0 in France, Les Gones prevailed 4-2 in Germany with Govou among the scorers.
- Arjen Robben struck his first UEFA Champions League goal for PSV Eindhoven against Auxerre in a 3-0 home win on 30 October 2002. He also scored in the Netherlands' 4-1 defeat of France at UEFA EURO 2008. Lyon's Jérémy Toulalan, Bafétimbi Gomis and Govou were in the France team along with Ribéry.
- Kim Källström was in the Sweden team beaten 2-0 by a Germany side including Klose, Philipp Lahm and Bastian Schweinsteiger at the 2006 FIFA World Cup.
- On 14 October last year David Alaba appeared as a substitute for Austria in a 3-1 World Cup qualifying defeat in France. Hugo Lloris, Govou and Gomis were in the opposition team.
- The second leg will be played in Lyon on 27 April. The victorious team will advance to the final in Madrid on 22 May where they will play the winners of the Inter-Barcelona semi-final.

Bayern

UEFA milestones

- Bayern have conceded 149 goals in the UEFA Champions League, group stage to final.

UEFA Champions League statistics

- Bayern have let in 13 goals to date this term, the highest total among the four clubs in the semi-finals.
- The Munich outfit have won 77 corners, more than any other side in the competition, and have been caught offside just 17 times, fewer than any other team.
- Hans-Jörg Butt, Philipp Lahm and Holger Badstuber have played every minute of Bayern's campaign this season.
- Badstuber and Mark van Bommel are banned for the first leg after collecting their third yellow cards of the season on Matchday 10, while Danijel Pranjić will also incur a suspension with his next booking.

- Bayern coach Louis van Gaal made two changes to the side that had drawn 1-1 at Bayer 04 Leverkusen seven days previously, drafting in Diego Contento and Thomas Müller for Badstuber and Mario Gómez. Suffering a slight ankle strain, Badstuber was consigned to the bench for the first time in the Bundesliga this season.
- Arjen Robben's first hat-trick since joining the club last summer and two goals apiece from Ivica Olić and Müller gave Bayern their biggest triumph this term. It was also their most comprehensive win in their 84 Bundesliga encounters since moving to the Fußball Arena München.
- The win maintained the Munich side's two-point lead over closest rivals FC Schalke 04 at the top of the Bundesliga, with three matches remaining for both teams.
- Robben has plundered 16 goals in his last 18 games for Bayern, and is the club's leading scorer in the league with 14 strikes. Olić and Müller lie joint second on ten efforts, along with Gómez.
- The clean sheet was Bayern's first in six attempts in the league, their last having come in the 1-0 home victory against Hamburger SV on 28 February. They have kept just two clean sheets in eleven matches in all competitions.
- Bayern have registered in each of their last 20 Bundesliga encounters, and in 21 of their 23 away games this term.
- Just three of Bayern's 65 league goals this season have come in the first 15 minutes of matches.
- Bayern are unbeaten in ten games following a UEFA Champions League meeting this season, winning six and drawing four of their Bundesliga contests after a European engagement.
- Van Gaal's men kept that run going with their 1-1 stalemate at Leverkusen on 10 April, Robben giving Bayern a 51st-minute lead from the penalty spot before Arturo Vidal levelled eight minutes later.
- Bayern suffered their first home defeat in this season's Bundesliga on 27 March, losing 2-1 to VfB Stuttgart.
- Daniel Van Buyten has scored ten goals for club and country this season.
- Lahm has started all of Bayern's 46 matches this term, and seven more for Germany.
- Bayern will face Werder Bremen in the German Cup final in Berlin on 15 May after a fine Robben solo goal eight minutes before the end of extra time earned a 1-0 victory at Schalke on 24 March.
- The German Cup's most successful side, Bayern have triumphed in 14 of the 16 showpieces they have contested – Bremen are second with six titles.
- At 17 years and 255 days, David Alaba became Bayern's youngest ever Bundesliga player when he made his debut against 1. FC Köln on 6 March. He has already won three senior caps for Austria.
- Contento and Alaba made Bayern debuts in February's German Cup win against SpVgg Greuther Fürth.
- Bayern took two points from their opening three Bundesliga games, their worst start to a season for 43 years. The Bavarian club were seventh after 13 matches, their worst position at that stage since 1994/95 when they finished fifth.

- Klose was omitted from the squad for the meeting with Hannover due to an abdominal infection.

Miscellaneous

- On 17 March, Van Bommel signed a one-year contract extension, committing to Bayern until next summer. "I have a few things still to achieve here," he said.

- Bayern have confirmed that 20-year-old midfielder Toni Kroos, who been on loan at Leverkusen since January 2009, will return to Munich in the summer. Bayern's director of sport Christian Nerlinger said: "The die is cast. It was a loan deal. Leverkusen benefited from it, Toni Kroos did and Bayern did too."

Lyon

UEFA milestones

- Lyon have conceded 97 goals in the UEFA Champions League, group stage to final, and 196 strikes overall in UEFA club competition.

UEFA Champions League statistics

- Lyon have let in only six goals in the competition this season, fewer than any other team in the last four.
- The French outfit have committed 155 fouls, more than any other club still involved.
- Hugo Lloris has played every minute of Lyon's campaign this season.
- While Sidney Govou and Lisandro are available again after one-match bans, Aly Cissokho, César Delgado, Maxime Gonalons, Kim Källström, Jérémy Toulalan, Cris and Miralem Pjanić will all incur a suspension with their next bookings.

- **Saturday 17 April: FC Girondins de Bordeaux 2-2 Olympique Lyonnais (Chamakh 25, Plašil 62; Ederson 55, Cris 71)**

Lloris; Réveillère, Cris, Toulalan, Cissokho; Källström, Pjanić; Govou (Lisandro 46), Ederson (Grenier 82), Bastos; Gomis (Delgado 67).

- Midfielder Toulalan was chosen to partner Cris in central defence for the visit of Bordeaux, with regular stoppers Jean-Alain Boumsong, Anderson and Mathieu Bodmer all injured. Lyon were also missing Gonalons due to suspension, though Cissokho returned from injury.
- A feisty encounter ended with Les Gones losing Anthony Réveillère to a straight red card in added time, while Bordeaux were eventually reduced to nine men after both Benoît Trémoulinas and Jussiê were dismissed late on.
- Cris's 71st-minute equaliser was his second goal in two games following his leveller against LOSC Lille Métropole on 11 April. Both strikes were headers from set pieces. The centre-back has registered four efforts so far in Ligue 1 this term, equalling his best return in 2006/07.
- Marouane Chamakh once again found the net for Bordeaux against Claude Puel's side, having scored in both legs of their UEFA Champions League quarter-final tie as well as Bordeaux's 1-0 success at the Stade de Gerland on 13 December.
- Due to air traffic problems caused by a volcanic eruption in Iceland, Lyon travelled back from Bordeaux by coach – a distance of around 540km by road.
- The Rhone side have kept just one clean sheet in their last nine outings in all competitions. Before that sequence, they managed to go 620 minutes without conceding.
- Lyon have lost two of their last four away games in all competitions and have won only one of six matches away from home.
- Four days after the second leg of their last-eight contest with Bordeaux, Lyon drew 1-1 at home with Lille. Former OL striker Pierre-Alain Frau put the visitors in front in the 62nd minute before Cris restored parity nine minutes later.
- Claude Puel made four changes to his lineup for that game, with Dejan Lovren – who is ineligible for the UEFA Champions League – Lisandro, Pjanić and Ederson coming in for Boumsong, Cissokho, Bafétimbi Gomis and Michel Bastos.

- Källström was deployed in an unfamiliar left-back role in place of Cissokho, providing the free-kick from which Cris equalised.
- Both teams ended with ten men, Lyon's Gonalons collecting the first red card of his professional career 11 minutes from time.
- Lyon have lost only two games by two-goal margins or more in all competitions this term – 2-0 at home to FC Sochaux-Montbéliard on 17 October and, a week later, 4-1 at OGC Nice.
- No fewer than 21 of Lyon's 54 Ligue 1 goals this season have come in the final 15 minutes of games.

- Jean-Alain Boumsong – out 10 March to 3 April and since 7 April (calf)
- Mathieu Bodmer – out 26 September to 9 January, 9 January to 27 February (groin) and since 11 April (hamstring)
- Third-choice goalkeeper Hartock will miss the rest of the season.
- Bodmer had to be withdrawn just 13 minutes after coming on as a substitute against Lille.
- Cissokho and Boumsong picked up their problems in the second leg against Bordeaux, though Cissokho returned against the same side in Ligue 1 action on Saturday.

Miscellaneous

- Lyon's women's side are facing Swedish club Umeå IK in April's UEFA Women's Champions League semi-finals. They won the first leg 3-2 but Sunday's decider was postponed as Lyon were unable to fly.
- Lyon signed Lovren on a four-and-a-half year contract in January, but the Croatian international, 20, could not be included in their UEFA Champions League squad after having appeared for NK Dinamo Zagreb in qualifying.

- Having never made it beyond the reserve team at his first club, Ajax, Van Gaal spent most of his playing career as a Sparta midfielder, retiring in 1987 after a season with AZ, where he started his coaching career as an assistant.
- Took on a similar coaching role at hometown club Ajax, under Leo Beenhakker, from 1988 to 1991 before moving up to the top job on his mentor's departure.
- Had six glorious years at Ajax, winning three Eredivisie titles, a Dutch Cup, the 1992 UEFA Cup and the 1995 UEFA Champions League; defended that title in 1996 all the way to a penalty shoot-out defeat by Juventus in the final. Was awarded an Order of the Oranje-Nassau in 1997 and made a knight.
- Moved to Spain the same year for a three-season stint at Barcelona, winning two Liga titles and a Copa del Rey. Became Netherlands coach in 2000 in an unsuccessful bid to qualify the Oranje for the 2002 FIFA World Cup. Returned briefly to Barça before a spell out of coaching.
- Took over at Alkmaar in 2005, steering them to their first Eredivisie title since 1981 in April 2009. Appointed coach of Bayern a month later, as a replacement for caretaker Jupp Heynckes.

Olympique Lyonnais: Claude Puel

Date of birth: 2 September 1961

Nationality: French

Playing career: AS Monaco FC

Coaching career: AS Monaco FC, LOSC Lille Métropole, Olympique Lyonnais

- Olympique Lyonnais coach Claude Puel is no stranger to big European nights, having spent 22 years as player and coach at AS Monaco FC and then led LOSC Lille Métropole into the UEFA Champions League.
- Puel amassed 488 league games as Monaco's midfield anchorman, winning two French titles (1982, 1988) and the 1991 French Cup in addition to reaching the 1992 UEFA Cup Winners' Cup final and the UEFA Champions League semi-finals two years later.
- Puel's coaching philosophy is simple: assemble a team with high fitness levels, stamina and speed in abundance and a miserly defence. Such virtues helped Monaco to the French title in 2000 and earned Lille UEFA Intertoto Cup victory in 2004, three years after Puel had taken charge.
- When appointed Lille coach in summer 2001, Puel looked to the long term; his ambitions came to fruition ahead of schedule as he steered his team into Europe's premier club competition achieved with second place in Ligue 1 in 2005 – their best finish for 50 years.
- Lille came third in 2006, going on to the UEFA Champions League first knockout round before Puel moved to Lyon in 2008. Although he oversaw the end of a seven-year run of league titles in his first season, Puel did guide Lyon to the UEFA Champions League first knockout round, where they lost to eventual winners FC Barcelona.

- Rosetti took charge of the UEFA EURO 2008™ opener between co-hosts Switzerland and the Czech Republic. He also refereed the quarter-final between Turkey and Croatia and the final, when Spain beat Germany 1-0.

UEFA Champions League knockout stage: Did you know?

- Teams have recovered from a first-leg deficit to go through to the next stage on 22 occasions, although only once – AFC Ajax's defeat of Panathinaikos FC in the 1995/96 semi-finals – has a side gone through after losing the first leg at home. The biggest losing margin a side has overturned was achieved by RC Deportivo La Coruña in the 2003/04 quarter-finals when they fought back from a 4-1 defeat at AC Milan to win 4-0 at home.
- Nineteen ties have been decided on the away goals rule, including five where the triumphant team lost the first leg.
- FC Bayern München hold the record for the biggest first-leg lead with a 5-0 success at Sporting Clube de Portugal in the 2008/09 first knockout round, eventually going through 12-1 after a 7-1 home victory in the second leg.
- Ten ties have now gone to penalties, including the game between Arsenal FC and AS Roma in the 2008/09 first knockout round. Five of these were finals – 1996, 2001, 2003, 2005 and 2008. The first two-legged tie decided on spot-kicks was PSV Eindhoven's 4-2 win against Olympique Lyonnais on 13 April 2005 after a 2-2 aggregate draw.
- In all, 17 ties have required extra time. So far seven have been decided by extra time alone: four quarter-finals, two first knockout round encounters and the 2007/08 semi-final between Chelsea FC and Liverpool FC.
- The 2008/09 last-16 encounter between Bayern and Sporting featured more goals (13) over its two legs than any previous UEFA Champions League knockout tie, Bayern prevailing 12-1.
- There has never been a knockout tie ending goalless after two legs. Nine have finished 1-0 on aggregate, most recently Manchester United FC's narrow victory against FC Barcelona in the 2007/08 semi-finals.
- This is the first time in six seasons teams from four different countries have reached the semi-finals; in the 2003/04 competition, AS Monaco FC beat Chelsea in one semi-final with FC Porto overcoming RC Deportivo La Coruña in the other.
- The biggest winning margin in one UEFA Champions League semi-final game has been three goals. AFC Ajax recorded a 5-2 home success in the 1994/95 second leg against Bayern, while there have been 4-1 victories on three occasions. Juventus did it twice at home against Ajax (second leg) and AS Monaco FC (first leg) in 1996/97 and 1997/98 respectively, and Valencia at home to Barcelona (first leg) in 1999/00. On five other occasions, teams won 3-0 - most recently Milan's defeat of Manchester United in the 2006/07 semi-final second leg.
- That 4-1 win for Juventus against Monaco in 1997/98 was part of the biggest aggregate semi-final score. The principality club won 3-2 in their home return to make it ten goals in the tie.
- Madrid's 6-0 second-leg win against FC Zürich in the 1963/64 edition remains the biggest victory in a European Champion Clubs' Cup semi-final. Eintracht Frankfurt's 12-4 aggregate success against Rangers FC in 1959/60 is the biggest two-leg total overall.
- Clarence Seedorf is the only player to win the European Champion Clubs' Cup with three clubs (Ajax 1995, Madrid 1998, Milan 2003, 2007). Liverpool's Bob Paisley (1977, 1978, 1981) is the only coach to win three times.
- Ottmar Hitzfeld (BV Borussia Dortmund 1997, Bayern 2001) and Ernst Happel (Feyenoord 1970, Hamburger SV 1983) are the only coaches to win the trophy with two clubs.
- No team has successfully defended the UEFA Champions League trophy with AC Milan (1989, 1990) the last club to win consecutive European Champion Clubs' Cups. Milan (1994, 1995), Juventus (1996, 1997) and Manchester United (2008, 2009) have all returned to the final as holders only to lose.

UEFA Champions League: Did you know?

- S.S. Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta is the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League having been aged 43 years 252 days when he featured against Real Madrid CF on Matchday 6 of the 2007/08 competition.
- Laurent Blanc is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 36 years and 339 days, in Manchester United's 3-2 defeat of Olympiacos FC on 23 October 2002.
- Celestine Babayaro is the youngest player to have appeared in the UEFA Champions League. He was 16 years and 87 days when he started for RSC Anderlecht against Steaua on 23 November 1994. He was then sent off in the 37th minute.
