FC Internazionale Milano welcome the holders to San Siro for the first leg of a UEFA Champions League semi-final rich in sub-plots.

- FC Barcelona travel to Italy seeking to become the first team since Inter's neighbours AC Milan 20 years ago to win back-to-back European crowns. As for Inter, their goal is a first final appearance in the competition since 1972 but first they must find the net against a Barcelona side whom they are yet to score against after four meetings.
- For the second time this season, Zlatan Ibrahimović and Maxwell return to their old stamping ground to face a Nerazzurri side featuring three former Barcelona players in Samuel Eto'o, Thiago Motta and Ricardo Quaresma.
- The presence of José Mourinho in the home dugout adds another layer of intrigue given his history as a former assistant coach at Barcelona – not to mention several high-profile contests with the Spanish titleholders during his time as Chelsea FC manager.
- Barcelona earned a goalless draw when they visited Inter in September and another closely contested encounter appears on the cards given the unbeaten records of both teams – the Nerazzurri at home and Josep Guardiola's visitors on the road – in the 2009/10 UEFA Champions League.

**Previous meetings**

- These two sides need no introduction having met last autumn in the group stage. They drew 0-0 at San Siro on 16 September before reconvening in Barcelona on 24 November, the Catalan side prevailing 2-0 through first-half strikes from Gerard Piqué and Pedro Rodríguez.
- The clubs had previously met in the UEFA Champions League second group stage in 2002/03. Barcelona were 3-0 winners at the Camp Nou on 18 February 2003. Goals from Javier Saviola, Phillip Cocu and Patrick Kluivert secured a ninth successive victory in the UEFA Champions League proper, still a competition record.
- The return the following week finished goalless and both teams progressed to the quarter-finals, Barcelona as group winners. Yet Inter went further that season, reaching the last four.

- Inter's Javier Zanetti and Barcelona pair Carles Puyol and Xavi Hernández played in both matches, with Andrés Iniesta an unused substitute at San Siro.

### **Match background**

- Inter are aiming to lift the European Champion Clubs' Cup for the first time since their back-to-back triumphs in 1964 and 1965. They can take heart from the fact they have never lost a home semi-final match in the competition.

- This season the Italian titleholders are undefeated at San Siro in the UEFA Champions League, where they have registered three wins and two draws.

- Inter have played in seven previous semi-finals in Europe's elite club competition. Their record is four victories and three defeats:

- Besides losing two European Cup semi-finals to Barcelona's arch-rivals Real Madrid, Inter also succumbed to Madrid twice at the semi-final stage of the UEFA Cup in 1984/85 and 1985/86.

- The Nerazzurri achieved the first of their two European Cup successes by defeating Madrid 3-1 in the 1964 final in Vienna.

- Inter have lost just one of 17 home matches against Spanish clubs, recording eight wins and eight draws.

- They have a poor record in two-legged ties against teams from Spain, however, with four victories and nine defeats from 13 contests. The most recent occasion was against Valencia CF in the round of 16 in 2006/07 and brought an away-goals defeat.

- Inter coach Mourinho's record in UEFA Champions League semi-finals is mixed. He led FC Porto past RC Deportivo La Coruña in 2004 but fell at this stage with Chelsea in 2005 and 2007.

- Mourinho is hoping to lead Inter to the UEFA Champions League six years after winning it with Porto. Only Ernst Happel (Feyenoord 1970, Hamburger SV 1983) and Ottmar Hitzfeld (BV Borussia Dortmund 1997, FC Bayern München 2001) have won the European Cup as coaches of two different clubs. Bayern's Louis van Gaal, a winner with AFC Ajax in 1995, is also attempting the feat this time round.

- Holders Barcelona have recorded one win and four draws on the road in this term's UEFA Champions League. Their last away loss in the competition proper, qualifiers excluded, was in the 2007/08 semi-final at Manchester United FC.

- Barcelona have played in ten previous semi-finals and their record is five wins and five defeats:

- Barcelona have failed to score in the last four semi-final home legs.

- The visitors' coach, Guardiola, was in the Barcelona side that defeated Porto in the 1993/94 semi-final, which was a one-off match. There was no semi-final stage in the 1991/92 competition.

- This is Barcelona's eighth trip to San Siro where their record is W2 D3 L2.

- Barça visited San Siro for the first leg of their 2005/06 UEFA Champions League semi-final against Milan and achieved a 1-0 success, Ludovic Giuly's 57th-minute strike the only goal of the tie.

- The Spanish club were twice successful in UEFA Cup Winners' Cup semi-finals against Serie A sides, overcoming ACF Fiorentina in 1997 and Juventus in 1991.

- Overall Barcelona's record away to Italian opponents is W5 D6 L4. They have a strong record in two-legged ties against teams from the country, with six victories and three defeats.
- Barcelona lifted the European Cup for the first time after beating Italy's UC Sampdoria 1-0 in the 1992 final at Wembley. They lost the 1994 final 4-0 to Milan.
- The Blaugrana won last season's final on Italian soil, beating Manchester United 2-0 in Rome.

#### **Team ties**

- Mourinho served as an assistant to the late Sir Bobby Robson and Louis van Gaal at Barcelona from 1996 to 2000.
- As Chelsea manager Mourinho oversaw a 5-4 aggregate defeat of Barcelona in the 2004/05 first knockout round but suffered a 3-2 overall loss at the same stage the next season. The 2006/07 campaign brought another reunion, this time in the group stage, with Chelsea finishing above Barça after a 1-0 home win and 2-2 away draw.
- Guardiola played in Italy between 2001 and 2003, making 24 appearances in Serie A for Brescia Calcio and another four for AS Roma.
- Eto'o spent five seasons with Barcelona from 2004. The Cameroon striker hit 109 goals in 144 league appearances, including 30 last season. In the UEFA Champions League he registered 18 in 43 games, scoring Barcelona's first goals in the final triumphs of 2006 and 2009.
- Motta made 96 league appearances for Barcelona between 2002 and 2007, scoring six goals. He was an unused substitute in the Blaugrana's 2-1 UEFA Champions League final defeat of Arsenal FC in 2006.
- Inter forward Diego Milito, 30, could line up against his 29-year-old brother Gabriel of Barcelona. The Argentinian siblings played together for two seasons with Real Zaragoza between 2005 and 2007.
- Only three sets of brothers have played against each other in UEFA club competition: Johannes (Celtic FC) and Atli Edvaldsson (Valur Reykjavík) in the first round of the 1974/75 UEFA Cup Winners' Cup, Ronald (PSV Eindhoven) and Erwin Koeman (KV Mechelen) in the 1988 UEFA Super Cup and John Arne (AS Roma) and Bjørn Helge Riise (Fulham FC) in this season's UEFA Europa League group stage.
- Quaresma spent 2003/04 at the Camp Nou, making 22 Liga appearances and scoring once.
- During his three-year spell at Inter, Barcelona striker Ibrahimović hit 57 goals in 88 Serie A appearances and six in 22 UEFA Champions League games.
- An unused substitute for Barcelona at San Siro in September, Maxwell was also with Inter for three years from 2006 to 2009. The Brazil full-back made 79 appearances in Serie A and scored two goals.
- Thierry Henry scored twice for Arsenal in a 5-1 win at Inter in the 2003/04 group stage. The France forward previously suffered a UEFA Cup semi-final defeat at Inter's hands when playing for AS Monaco FC in 1996/97.
- Former Barcelona forward Jordi Cruyff – son of Camp Nou favourite Johan – hit the opening goal for Deportivo Alavés when they became the first, and so far only, Spanish team to beat Inter in Milan, prevailing 2-0 in a UEFA Cup fourth-round tie in 2000/01.
- The second leg is in Barcelona on 28 April. The victorious team will advance to the final in Madrid on 22 May where they will play either FC Bayern München or Olympique Lyonnais.

- Coach José Mourinho restored Wesley Sneijder, Goran Pandev, Esteban Cambiasso, Samuel and Milito to his starting lineup for the Derby d'Italia with Juventus, having omitted them all from his first XI for Tuesday's Coppa Italia meeting with ACF Fiorentina.
- Mohamed Sissoko was dismissed on 37 minutes for Juve after collecting his second yellow card, but it took until 15 minutes from time for the hosts to pounce, full-back Maicon breaking the deadlock with a superb volley from the edge of the area.
- The Brazilian international has now hit six league goals this term, his best return in four seasons in Italy.
- Samuel Eto'o made sure of the points in added time to take his recent tally to six goals in his last nine games over three different competitions. The Cameroon striker nonetheless had to wait until 16 March to score his first Inter goal in 2010.
- Victory proved the perfect way for Mourinho to celebrate his 100th match as Inter coach. The former Chelsea FC boss has now overseen 72 Serie A games with the Nerazzurri, as well as 18 in the UEFA Champions League, eight in the Coppa Italia and two in the Italian Super Cup.
- Captain Zanetti also celebrated a special milestone against the Bianconeri, contesting his 500th Serie A match with Inter (including two end-of-season UEFA Cup play-off games in 1998/99). That figure puts Zanetti second in club history, 19 appearances behind Giuseppe Bergomi.
- Inter are unbeaten at San Siro this term and Mourinho has not lost a home league fixture since 23 February 2002 when SC Beira-Mar overcame his FC Porto side 3-2, 134 games ago.
- The Italian titleholders have gone 42 matches unbeaten at home in all competitions since a 1-0 defeat by Panathinaikos FC in the UEFA Champions League group stage on 26 November 2008.
- Despite the win over Juve, Inter have triumphed only four times in their last 12 Serie A outings, drawing six and losing two.
- Mourinho's charges have kept clean sheets in 16 of their last 26 games in all competitions, including five of the last six, but only eight in 23 away trips this season.
- The Nerazzurri have won just five of their last 15 away games in all competitions, losing four.
- After booking their place in the UEFA Champions League semi-finals, Inter faced Fiorentina in Florence twice in four days. A 2-2 Serie A draw on 10 April, Milito and Eto'o scoring in the final 20 minutes for Inter, allowed AS Roma to overtake them at the top of the table.
- Inter boasted a 14-point lead over Roma on 5 December and had been Serie A leaders for 24 consecutive games before the draw at Fiorentina.
- Milito's goal against Fiorentina was his 19th in 30 Serie A appearances since joining Inter last summer, and his overall tally in Italy's top flight now reads 43 goals in 62 games following his 24 efforts in 31 outings for Genoa CFC.
- On 13 April, an Eto'o effort gave Mourinho's side a 1-0 Coppa Italia semi-final second-leg win over Fiorentina and a 2-0 aggregate success. The Nerazzurri will now play either Roma or Udinese Calcio, who contest their second leg on 21 April, in the final in Rome on 5 May.
- Zanetti was suspended for the 3-0 home win against Bologna FC on 3 April, missing his first league game since 28 October 2006 – a run of 137 consecutive matches. The Inter captain had also appeared in 167 games in a row in Serie A and the UEFA Champions League.

- Santon has been sidelined for about a month following minor surgery on a persistent problem with his right knee. The 19-year-old Italian international had an operation to correct the meniscus on 6 April, having undergone surgery on the same knee last year.



- Toldo and Motta both collected their injuries during training on the eve of Inter's quarter-final second leg against PFC CSKA Moskva in Russia.

#### **Miscellaneous**

- Milito's wife Sofia gave birth to a girl, Agustina, on 21 March. The couple already have a son.
- On 10 April, Inter's website paid tribute to former coach Helenio Herrera to mark the 100th anniversary of his birth. Herrera, who died in 1997, led Inter to their European Champion Clubs' Cup triumphs in 1964 and 1965, also adding three league titles during his eight years in charge.

#### **Barcelona**

##### **UEFA milestones**

- Lionel Messi's four goals in the quarter-final second leg against Arsenal FC put him level with Rivaldo as Barça's all-time top scorer in the UEFA Champions League on 25 strikes.
- Messi became only the sixth player to score four times in a UEFA Champions League match.
- Barcelona have conceded 147 goals in the UEFA Champions League, group stage to final.

##### **UEFA Champions League statistics**

- Barcelona have plundered 18 goals this term, more than any other team in the semi-finals.
- Barça have committed 126 fouls, fewer than any other side in the last four.
- Messi has scored eight goals to date, making him the competition's highest scorer. The Barcelona forward was also the top marksman in 2008/09 with nine goals.
- Messi fired 25 shots on goal in the first ten matches, more than any other player; Zlatan Ibrahimović is second on that list with 20 attempts on target.
- Daniel Alves has committed 23 fouls, more than any other player left in the competition.
- Víctor Valdés has played every minute of Barcelona's campaign this season.
- Carles Puyol and Gerard Piqué are available again after one-match bans, although Puyol is within a booking of another suspension.

- Barcelona coach Josep Guardiola made three changes to the side that ran out 3-0 winners against RC Deportivo La Coruña in midweek, with Gabriel Milito replacing Rafael Márquez in defence, Sergio Busquets chosen ahead of Bojan Krkić and Puyol brought back in place of Jeffrén.
- With Alves sent off after receiving his second yellow card on 62 minutes, Barça failed to find a way past their city neighbours.
- It was the club's first goalless draw since their UEFA Champions League group-stage meeting with FC Rubin Kazan on 4 November. It was also only the second time they have failed to find the net in the Liga this term, following a 0-0 stalemate at Valencia CF on 17 October.
- For goalkeeper Valdés, the result represented his 19th clean sheet in the championship this season.
- It nonetheless brought to an end a run of seven consecutive league victories – Barça's best sequence this season – with their most recent the win over Deportivo on 14 April. Bojan, Pedro Rodríguez and Yaya Touré got the goals in that encounter.
- Four days prior to that success, Guardiola's charges gave their title defence a major fillip courtesy of a 2-0 triumph at rivals Real Madrid CF. Efforts from Messi and Pedro gave the Blaugrana their first ever back-to-back triumphs at the Santiago Bernabéu following last season's 6-2 success in Madrid.
- Guardiola has now won all four games against Madrid since taking charge of Barcelona.
- With five fixtures to go, his side need just three points to match last season's title-winning total of 87.
- Barça have won 15 encounters by three goals or more this term.
- The Catalan giants have scored five Liga goals direct from free-kicks in 2009/10, all struck by different players: Alves, Ibrahimović, Márquez, Thierry Henry and Messi.

- Ibrahimović has notched five strikes in his last five appearances.
- Messi has registered 29 goals in his last 27 outings for the Spanish titleholders and 16 in his last 12 matches.
- The Argentinian international became only the second player to record back-to-back Liga hat-tricks with his efforts against Real Zaragoza and Valencia last month. Salva Ballesta blazed that particular trail for Real Racing Club in October 1999.
- Messi, who also became the youngest player to reach 100 goals for Barça in January, made his 200th appearance for the club against CA Osasuna on 24 March. He reached that landmark with 114 goals under his belt, including 72 in his last 90 games before hitting the milestone.
- Pedro has surpassed Giovanni Silva's 1997/98 club record by scoring in six competitions in one season: the Liga, UEFA Champions League, UEFA Super Cup, Copa del Rey, Spanish Super Cup and FIFA Club World Cup.
- The Blaugrana's six-match winning start to the Liga campaign equalled a club record also achieved in 1929/30, 1990/91 and 1997/98.
- Ibrahimović started the season by becoming the first new signing to score in Barcelona's opening five league games. Hristo Stoichkov held the previous record for a newcomer, having struck in Barça's first three outings in 1990/91.

- On 26 March, Johan Cruyff was named Barcelona's honorary president following a unanimous decision by the club's board. Director general Joan Oliver said the move was made "in recognition of Johan Cruyff as a player, a coach and someone who helped inspire the successes at the club in 2009."
- On 8 April, Xavi Hernández received the medal of honour from the local council of his home town of Terrassa in recognition of his achievements in football.
- Barcelona's reserve goalkeeper José Pinto has signed a one-year contract extension that ties him to the club until 30 June 2011.

### **FC Internazionale Milano: José Mourinho**

**Date of birth:** 26 January 1963

**Nationality:** Portuguese

**Coaching career:** SL Benfica, UD Leiria, FC Porto, Chelsea FC, FC Internazionale Milano

- A former teacher, he worked as a translator for Sporting Clube de Portugal coach Sir Bobby Robson in the 1990s, eventually following the Englishman to Porto and Barcelona as a coaching assistant.
- As coach, had a nine-game spell at Benfica and a highly successful tenure at Leiria before getting his big break with Porto in January 2002.
- In his first full season, 2002/03, Porto won the UEFA Cup and a domestic double. The next year they retained their league title and claimed the UEFA Champions League with a 3-0 defeat of AS Monaco FC in the final in Gelsenkirchen.
- Joined Chelsea in 2004 as successor to Claudio Ranieri and led the club to their first league championship for 50 years and the League Cup in his first season. Followed up with the league title again in 2006, and both the League Cup and FA Cup in 2007.
- Left Chelsea by mutual agreement in September 2007 and stayed out of football until joining Inter in June 2008. His first campaign saw the Nerazzurri retain their Serie A title but they bowed out to eventual finalists Manchester United FC in the UEFA Champions League first knockout round.

### **FC Barcelona: Josep Guardiola**

**Date of birth:** 18 January 1971

**Nationality:** Spanish

**Playing career:** FC Barcelona, Brescia Calcio (twice), AS Roma, Al-Ahly Club, Dorados de Sinaloa

**Coaching career:** FC Barcelona B, FC Barcelona

- Known as 'Pep', he came up through Barcelona's youth ranks to win six Spanish Liga titles, one European Champion Clubs' Cup, a UEFA Cup Winners' Cup and two Copa del Rey trophies from 1990 to 2001.
- Also had spells with Brescia, Fabio Capello's Roma, Al-Ahly in Doha and Mexico's Dorados de Sinola before ending his playing career in 2006.
- Won 40 caps and Olympic footballing gold with Spain in 1992, but missed the 1998 and 2002 FIFA World Cup tournaments through injury.
- Having coached Barcelona's B team, became the 15th Catalan-born boss of the senior team in 2008 and won the UEFA Champions League, Spanish Liga and Copa del Rey in his first season in charge.
- Success in the 2008/09 final made Guardiola the sixth man to lift the European Cup as a player and a coach following Miguel Muñoz, Giovanni Trapattoni, Johan Cruyff, Carlo Ancelotti and Frank Rijkaard. Barcelona followed up with victories in the Spanish and UEFA Super Cups at the start of 2009/10.

• Olegário Benquerença, an insurance broker based in Leiria, was born on 18 October 1969 and, having made fine progress after officiating his first top-flight match in October 1995, won his FIFA international badge in 2001 at the tender refereeing age of 31.

## Competition facts

---

### UEFA Champions League knockout stage: Did you know?

- Teams have recovered from a first-leg deficit to go through to the next stage on 22 occasions, although only once – AFC Ajax's defeat of Panathinaikos FC in the 1995/96 semi-finals – has a side gone through after losing the first leg at home. The biggest losing margin a side has overturned was achieved by RC Deportivo La Coruña in the 2003/04 quarter-finals when they fought back from a 4-1 defeat at AC Milan to win 4-0 at home.
- Nineteen ties have been decided on the away goals rule, including five where the triumphant team lost the first leg.
- FC Bayern München hold the record for the biggest first-leg lead with a 5-0 success at Sporting Clube de Portugal in the 2008/09 first knockout round, eventually going through 12-1 after a 7-1 home victory in the second leg.
- Ten ties have now gone to penalties, including the game between Arsenal FC and AS Roma in the 2008/09 first knockout round. Five of these were finals – 1996, 2001, 2003, 2005 and 2008. The first two-legged tie decided on spot-kicks was PSV Eindhoven's 4-2 win against Olympique Lyonnais on 13 April 2005 after a 2-2 aggregate draw.
- In all, 17 ties have required extra time. So far seven have been decided by extra time alone: four quarter-finals, two first knockout round encounters and the 2007/08 semi-final between Chelsea FC and Liverpool FC.
- The 2008/09 last-16 encounter between Bayern and Sporting featured more goals (13) over its two legs than any previous UEFA Champions League knockout tie, Bayern prevailing 12-1.
- There has never been a knockout tie ending goalless after two legs. Nine have finished 1-0 on aggregate, most recently Manchester United FC's narrow victory against FC Barcelona in the 2007/08 semi-finals.
- This is the first time in six seasons teams from four different countries have reached the semi-finals; in the 2003/04 competition, AS Monaco FC beat Chelsea in one semi-final with FC Porto overcoming RC Deportivo La Coruña in the other.
- The biggest winning margin in one UEFA Champions League semi-final game has been three goals. AFC Ajax recorded a 5-2 home success in the 1994/95 second leg against Bayern, while there have been 4-1 victories on three occasions. Juventus did it twice at home against Ajax (second leg) and AS Monaco FC (first leg) in 1996/97 and 1997/98 respectively, and Valencia at home to Barcelona (first leg) in 1999/00. On five other occasions, teams won 3-0 - most recently Milan's defeat of Manchester United in the 2006/07 semi-final second leg.
- That 4-1 win for Juventus against Monaco in 1997/98 was part of the biggest aggregate semi-final score. The principality club won 3-2 in their home return to make it ten goals in the tie.
- Madrid's 6-0 second-leg win against FC Zürich in the 1963/64 edition remains the biggest victory in a European Champion Clubs' Cup semi-final. Eintracht Frankfurt's 12-4 aggregate success against Rangers FC in 1959/60 is the biggest two-leg total overall.
- Clarence Seedorf is the only player to win the European Champion Clubs' Cup with three clubs (Ajax 1995, Madrid 1998, Milan 2003, 2007). Liverpool's Bob Paisley (1977, 1978, 1981) is the only coach to win three times.
- Ottmar Hitzfeld (BV Borussia Dortmund 1997, Bayern 2001) and Ernst Happel (Feyenoord 1970, Hamburger SV 1983) are the only coaches to win the trophy with two clubs.
- No team has successfully defended the UEFA Champions League trophy with AC Milan (1989, 1990) the last club to win consecutive European Champion Clubs' Cups. Milan (1994, 1995), Juventus (1996, 1997) and Manchester United (2008, 2009) have all returned to the final as holders only to lose.

### UEFA Champions League: Did you know?

- S.S. Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta is the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League having been aged 43 years 252 days when he featured against Real Madrid CF on Matchday 6 of the 2007/08 competition.
- Laurent Blanc is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 36 years and 339 days, in Manchester United's 3-2 defeat of Olympiacos FC on 23 October 2002.
- Celestine Babayaro is the youngest player to have appeared in the UEFA Champions League. He was 16 years and 87 days when he started for RSC Anderlecht against Steaua on 23 November 1994. He was then sent off in the 37th minute.
