Club football's biggest prize is at stake when two of the great names of the European game, FC Bayern München and FC Internazionale Milano, cross swords in the climax to the 2009/10 UEFA Champions League season in Madrid.

- The Santiago Bernabéu, home of Real Madrid CF, will stage the showdown between a Bayern side seeking their fifth European crown and an Inter team looking to lift the trophy for the first time in 45 years.
- Bayern go into the game seeking a third Italian scalp in this term's competition having already eliminated Juventus and ACF Fiorentina but Inter have their own reasons to believe, not least their impressive dethroning of the holders, FC Barcelona, in the semi-finals.
- The personal history between coaches Louis van Gaal and José Mourinho enhances the intrigue with the latter having worked as assistant to the current Bayern boss at Barcelona between 1997 and 2000.
- Both men are past winners of the competition and each will join the exclusive club of coaches who have guided more than one team to European Champion Clubs' Cup success if victorious in the Spanish capital.

Previous meetings

- This is the fifth match between Bayern and Inter, whose most recent encounter came in the 2006/07 UEFA Champions League group stage. Patrick Vieira's added-time equaliser earned Inter a 1-1 draw in Munich on 5 December 2006, cancelling out Roy Makaay's 62nd-minute opener.

- The teams that night were:

Bayern: Kahn, Sagnol, Lucio, Van Buyten, Lahm, Ottl, Salihamidžić (Deisler 79), Van Bommel (Demichelis 73), Schweinsteiger, Pizarro, Makaay (Santa Cruz 83).

Inter: Toldo, Zanetti, Samuel, Andreolli, Maicon, Vieira, Mariano González, Maxwell, Solari (Grosso 83), Ibrahimović (Crespo 46), Figo (Recoba 70).

- Bayern had won 2-0 at Inter on 27 September that year, courtesy of goals from Claudio Pizarro (81) and Lukas Podolski (91). Inter ended with nine men after the second-half dismissals of Zlatan Ibrahimović and Fabio Grosso.

- The lineups at San Siro were:

Inter: Julio Cesar, Maicon, Córdoba, Materazzi, Grosso, Zanetti, Figo (Mariano González 67), Dacourt, Stanković (Solari 77), Ibrahimović, Crespo (Adriano 77).

Bayern: Kahn, Sagnol, Lucio, Van Buyten, Lahm, Salihamidžić (Scholl 70), Van Bommel, Ottl, Schweinsteiger, Pizarro (Podolski 89), Makaay (Santa Cruz 82).

- Felix Magath and Roberto Mancini were the respective coaches for those ties in 2006/07 and it was Magath's Bayern who topped the group with Inter second.

- Bayern produced a spectacular comeback to defeat Inter in the clubs' only two-legged contest in the 1988/89 UEFA Cup third round. Aldo Serena (60) and Nicola Berti (71) gave Inter a 2-0 first-leg win in Munich on 23 November 1988. But Bayern struck three goals in eight first-half minutes in the return through Roland Wohlfarth (33), Klaus Augenthaler (37) and Jürgen Wegmann (40). Although Serena pulled a goal back just before the break, Bayern's 3-1 win carried them through on away goals.

- Jupp Heynckes was Bayern coach with Giovanni Trapattoni, a future boss of the Bavarian club, at the Inter helm.

Match background

- Bayern, winners most recently in 2001, are seeking to join Liverpool FC on five European Cup wins, and become the joint-third most successful club in the competition's history behind Real Madrid and AC Milan.

- Bayern's record in European Cup finals is four wins and three defeats:

1974: 4-0 v Club Atlético de Madrid, Brussels

(replay after 1-1 draw)

1975: 2-0 v Leeds United AFC, Paris

1976: 1-0 v AS Saint-Etienne, Glasgow

1982: 0-1 v Aston Villa FC, Rotterdam

1987: 1-2 v FC Porto, Vienna

1999: 1-2 v Manchester United FC, Barcelona

2001: 1-1 v Valencia CF, 5-4 on penalties, Milan

- Bayern also won the 1967 UEFA Cup Winners' Cup final and 1996 UEFA Cup final.

- Inter are hoping to secure their first European crown since Helenio Herrera steered them to back-to-back triumphs in the mid-60s. With a third win, Inter would join Barcelona and Manchester United FC on three European Cups.

- Inter's record in European Cup finals is two wins and two defeats:

1964: 3-1 v Real Madrid CF, Vienna

1965: 1-0 v SL Benfica, Milan

1967: 1-2 v Celtic FC, Lisbon

1972: 0-2 v AFC Ajax, Rotterdam

- Inter appeared in four UEFA Cup finals in the 1990s, winning in 1991, 1994 and 1998 but losing in 1997.

- Javier Zanetti was in the Nerazzurri side that lost the 1997 UEFA Cup final on penalties against FC Schalke 04 but lifted the trophy the following year with a 3-0 victory against S.S. Lazio, scoring the second goal.

- Bayern were 4-1 winners at Juventus in Turin in December to qualify for the knockout rounds at the Bianconeri's expense, finishing second behind FC Girondins de Bordeaux in Group A. They then squeezed past Fiorentina on away goals in the round of 16, following a 2-1 home win with a 3-2 reverse in Tuscany.

- Bayern subsequently edged past Manchester United FC in another away-goals success before beating Olympique Lyonnais 4-0 on aggregate in the last four.

- With four defeats en route to Madrid, Bayern have lost more games than any finalist since Milan, the champions in 2002/03 who suffered four reverses in the competition proper and another in qualifying.
- Like Bayern, Inter were runners-up in the group stage, finishing behind Barcelona in Group F. They have since ousted Mourinho's old club Chelsea FC and PFC CSKA Moskva before a 3-2 aggregate success against Barcelona in the semi-finals.
- Both clubs have played the same number of matches (28) against teams from the rival country, but Inter have the superior record:
Bayern v Italian clubs: P28 W9 D7 L12
Inter v German clubs: P28 W13 D8 L7
- Van Gaal has twice faced Italian opposition in the UEFA Champions League final. In 1995 his Ajax team overcame Milan 1-0, losing the following season's showpiece to Juventus after a penalty shoot-out. He did guide Ajax to victory against Torino FC in the 1992 UEFA Cup final.
- Inter's most recent encounter with Bundesliga opposition came against Werder Bremen in last season's group stage – they drew 1-1 at home and lost 2-1 away.
- Van Gaal and Mourinho have both won the European Cup before – Van Gaal with Ajax in 1995 and Mourinho in 2004 with FC Porto. Whoever prevails will become the third coach to have lifted the famous trophy with two different clubs, following Ernst Happel and Ottmar Hitzfeld.
- Thirteen years separated Happel's successes with Feyenoord (1970) and Hamburger SV (1983) meaning Van Gaal would establish a record for the longest gap between European Cup triumphs if he emerged victorious. Hitzfeld's wins came with BV Borussia Dortmund (1997) and Bayern (2001).
- This is Bayern's tenth visit to the Santiago Bernabéu. Their record from nine previous matches there is W2 D1 L6.
- Mark van Bommel hit Bayern's second goal in the 88th minute of their 3-2 defeat at the stadium in a last-16 meeting with Real Madrid in the 2006/07 UEFA Champions League. His strike set up an eventual away-goals triumph for the Bavarian side, 2-1 victors in the second leg.
- Bayern visited the Bernabéu twice in 1999/2000. They won 4-2 in the UEFA Champions League second group stage in February 2000, but then suffered a 2-0 defeat by Madrid in the first leg of a semi-final that they lost 3-2 on aggregate.
- The following season Giovane Elber's strike secured a 1-0 semi-final first-leg success at the Bernabéu en route to Bayern winning the trophy.
- Inter have won one and lost five of six previous matches at the Bernabéu.
- Inter have lost four semi-finals against Real Madrid after defeats in the Spanish capital, suffering spectacular reverses in successive UEFA Cup campaigns.
- In 1984/85 Inter's 2-0 first-leg lead disappeared as Madrid overwhelmed them 3-0 at the Bernabéu. The following season the Nerazzurri succumbed 5-1 after extra time in Madrid following a 3-1 home success. Final ambassador Emilio Butragueño was in the Merengues' lineup that day.
- Inter's only win at the Bernabéu came in the 1966/67 European Cup quarter-final against Madrid when a Renato Cappellini strike and Ignacio Zoco own goal earned a 2-0 second-leg success and 3-0 aggregate triumph.

Team ties

- Mourinho got the better of Bayern in the 2004/05 quarter-finals, although he was suspended for both legs of that contest. His Chelsea side won 4-2 in London before going down 3-2 in Munich.
- Two members of the Bayern squad have played in a UEFA Champions League final – Hans-Jörg Butt in Bayer 04 Leverkusen's 2002 defeat by Real Madrid and Van Bommel in Barcelona's 2006 victory against Arsenal FC.
- Samuel Eto'o played alongside Van Bommel in Barcelona's 2006 success, scoring the first goal, and hit the target again when the Azulgrana defeated Manchester United in last seasons's final.
- Lucio, meanwhile, was a team-mate of Butt in the 2002 defeat, scoring Leverkusen's goal.
- With a goal against Bayern, Eto'o would become the first player in the UEFA Champions League era to find the net in three finals. Only Real Madrid's Alfredo di Stéfano has managed the feat previously – he scored in five successive finals between 1956 and 1960.
- Arjen Robben played under Mourinho at Chelsea from 2004 to 2007, winning two league titles at Stamford Bridge.

- Esteban Cambiasso spent two years with Madrid's B team from 1996 to 1998 then, after four seasons on loan back in Argentina, joined the Merengues' senior squad from 2002 to 2004 before moving to Inter. Walter Samuel was there for 2004/05 while Wesley Sneijder spent two seasons at Madrid alongside Robben from 2007 to 2009.
- Cambiasso had a spot-kick saved when his Argentina side lost on penalties to Germany in the 2006 FIFA World Cup quarter-finals. Miroslav Klose had scored Germany's equaliser in a 1-1 draw that also featured the Bavarian side's Philipp Lahm and Bastian Schweinsteiger.
- The Bayern trio came unstuck in the semi-finals, however, against an Italy side that included Marco Materazzi.
- Two famous names of European football, Lothar Matthäus as a player and Trapattoni as a coach, hold the distinction of having won domestic titles with both Bayern and Inter.
- This is the third final between German and Italian teams – on both previous occasions the Bundesliga side prevailed:
1983: Hamburger SV 1-0 Juventus
1997: BV Borussia Dortmund 3-1 Juventus
- The Santiago Bernabéu has hosted three previous European Cup finals:
1957: Real Madrid CF 2-0 ACF Fiorentina
1969: AC Milan 4-1 AFC Ajax
1980: Nottingham Forest FC 1-0 Hamburger SV
- The stadium also hosted the 1964 UEFA European Championship final and the 1982 World Cup final when Italy beat West Germany 3-1. Alessandro Altobelli, then an Inter player, scored Italy's third goal in that final, the German consolation coming from Bayern's Paul Breitner.
- Bayern's record in penalty shoot-outs is:

9-8 v PAOK FC, 1983/84 UEFA Cup second round

- This season's UEFA Champions League final is the first to be played on a Saturday.

Match facts

Bayern

UEFA milestones

- Bayern have conceded 149 goals in the UEFA Champions League, group stage to final, and scored 446 times in the European Champion Clubs' Cup.

UEFA Champions League statistics

- Bayern have scored 21 times, the joint highest total in the competition with Arsenal FC and Manchester United FC.
- The Munich outfit have won 92 corners and had 76 shots wide, both more than any other side this season.
- Ivica Olić has scored seven goals, fewer only than Lionel Messi who has eight.
- Bastian Schweinsteiger has had 16 shots wide, the joint highest total along with Wayne Rooney and Hulk.
- Jörg Butt and Philipp Lahm have played every minute of Bayern's European campaign.
- Danijel Pranjić is available after a one-match ban but Franck Ribéry serves the second of his three-match suspension.

Latest domestic information

- Bayern claimed their eighth domestic double with victory in the German Cup final.

- Louis van Gaal made one change to the side that sealed the Bundesliga title at Berlin's Olympic Stadium the previous week, with Martín Demichelis returning to central defence. Holger Badstuber switched to left-back as Diego Contento dropped to the bench.
- The German Cup's most successful side, Bayern have now won 15 of the 17 finals they have contested – Bremen are second with six titles.
- The 4-0 scoreline represented the biggest margin of victory in a German Cup final since 1972 when FC Schalke 04 beat 1. FC Kaiserslautern 5-0.
- Bayern have registered in 25 of their 27 games outside Munich this term.
- Bayern have kept just six clean sheets in their last 23 matches.
- On 8 May Inter coach José Mourinho was in the crowd as Bayern sealed their 22nd Bundesliga title with a 3-1 win at Hertha BSC Berlin on the last day of the season. Rivals Schalke were held at 1. FSV Mainz 05.
- Just three of Bayern's 72 league goals this season came in the first 15 minutes of matches.
- Arjen Robben has scored 20 goals in his last 24 games for Bayern, including his first hat-trick for the club in the 7-0 win against Hannover 96 on 17 April.
- That represented Bayern's most comprehensive Bundesliga victory since 24 November 1990 when they overcame SG Wattenscheid 09 by the same scoreline.
- Thomas Müller scored his first hat-trick for Bayern in a 3-1 win against VfL Bochum 1848 on 1 May.
- Daniel Van Buyten has scored ten goals for club and country this season, but none in his last 18 games.
- Lahm has started all of Bayern's 52 matches this term (and seven more for Germany). Müller has played 51 of those fixtures, missing November's home defeat by FC Girondins de Bordeaux through suspension.
- At 17 years and 255 days, David Alaba became Bayern's youngest ever Bundesliga player when he made his debut against 1. FC Köln on 6 March. He had already won three senior caps for Austria.
- Contento and David Alaba made Bayern debuts in February's German Cup win against SpVgg Greuther Fürth.
- Bayern took two points from their opening three Bundesliga games, their worst start to a season for 43 years.

- Inter sealed their 18th Scudetto and a league and cup double after a fifth successive Serie A victory.
- It is Inter's fifth successive title, including the 2005/06 championship awarded as a consequence of the match-fixing scandal, equalling the Serie A record set by Juventus between 1931 and 1935.
- José Mourinho made one change to the side that beat AC Chievo Verona 4-3 on 9 May, fit-again Sneijder replacing Dejan Stanković. Marco Materazzi continued to deputise for the injured Lucio at centre-back.
- Milito has scored 22 goals in 35 Serie A appearances since joining Inter last summer, and his overall tally in Italy's top flight reads 46 goals in 66 games following 24 in 31 outings for Genoa CFC.
- The Nerazzurri have won just eight of their last 19 games outside Milan, losing five.
- Inter boasted a 14-point lead over AS Roma on 5 December – in the end they beat the capital club by two.
- Inter ended the season with Serie A's best attack (75 goals scored) and best defence (34 goals conceded).

- Having never made it beyond the reserve team at his first club, Ajax, Van Gaal spent most of his playing career as a Sparta midfielder, retiring in 1987 after a season with AZ, where he started his coaching career as an assistant.
- Took on a similar coaching role at hometown club Ajax, under Leo Beenhakker, from 1988 to 1991 before moving up to the top job on his mentor's departure.
- Had six glorious years at Ajax, winning three Eredivisie titles, a Dutch Cup, the 1992 UEFA Cup and the 1995 UEFA Champions League; defended that title in 1996 all the way to a penalty shoot-out defeat by Juventus in the final. Was awarded an Order of the Oranje-Nassau in 1997 and made a knight.
- Moved to Spain the same year for a three-season stint at Barcelona, winning two Liga titles and a Copa del Rey. Became Netherlands coach in 2000 in an unsuccessful bid to qualify the Oranje for the 2002 FIFA World Cup. Returned briefly to Barça before a spell out of coaching.
- Took over at Alkmaar in 2005, steering them to their first Eredivisie title since 1981 in April 2009. Appointed coach of Bayern a month later, as a replacement for caretaker Jupp Heynckes, and became the first Dutch coach to win the Bundesliga in his first season, also adding the German Cup and steering Bayern into the UEFA Champions League final.

FC Internazionale Milano: José Mourinho

Coaching career: SL Benfica, UD Leiria, FC Porto, Chelsea FC, FC Internazionale Milano

- A former teacher, he worked as a translator for Sporting Clube de Portugal coach Sir Bobby Robson in the 1990s, eventually following the Englishman to Porto and Barcelona as a coaching assistant.
- As coach, had a nine-game spell at Benfica and a highly successful tenure at Leiria before getting his big break with Porto in January 2002.
- In his first full season, 2002/03, Porto won the UEFA Cup and a domestic double. The next year they retained their league title and claimed the UEFA Champions League with a 3-0 defeat of AS Monaco FC in the final in Gelsenkirchen.
- Joined Chelsea in 2004 as successor to Claudio Ranieri and led the club to their first league championship for 50 years and the League Cup in his first season. Followed up with the league title again in 2006, and both the League Cup and FA Cup in 2007.
- Left Chelsea by mutual agreement in September 2007 and stayed out of football until joining Inter in June 2008. In his first campaign the Nerazzurri retained their Serie A title, a feat they repeated in 2009/10 when they also won the Coppa Italia and reached the UEFA Champions League final.

- Howard Webb has made tremendous progress in his native England in recent years with highlights including the 2006/07 League Cup final and the 2008/09 FA Cup final, both won 2-1 by Chelsea.
- His appointment on Matchday 2 of the 2006/07 campaign was his first taste of the UEFA Champions League proper, reward for an impressive performance at the UEFA European Under-21 Championship in Portugal.
- A former police officer who enjoys keeping fit, Webb already has a long career behind him having been inspired to pick up the whistle by his father at the age of 18.
- He took charge of the 2005 FA Community Shield between Chelsea FC and Arsenal FC, and that November was in the middle for his first senior international as Northern Ireland and Portugal drew 1-1.
- Having overseen five qualifiers, Webb was referee for two games at UEFA EURO 2008. In 2008/09 he took charge of the UEFA Cup semi-final first leg between Werder Bremen and Hamburger SV and the following season became the fifth Englishman to take charge of the European Champion Clubs' Cup final when FC Bayern München met FC Internazionale Milano in Madrid.

Competition facts

UEFA Champions League final: Did you know?

- Spain are the most successful nations with five triumphs, one more than Italy. Spain's wins – 1998, 2000, 2002, 2006 and 2009 – came from eight final dates while Italy were victorious in 1994, 1996, 2003 and 2007 from their ten appearances. England emerged victorious in 1999, 2005 and 2008, and were losing finalists in 2006, 2007, 2008 and 2009 while Germany were winners in 1997 and 2001 and runners-up in 1999 and 2002.
- No team has played in more finals than AC Milan as 2007 marked their sixth appearance. They equalled Real Madrid CF's record of three victories with that triumph against Liverpool FC in Athens.
- Italy with 25 has the most appearances per nation in all-time European Champion Clubs' Cup finals – of those eleven have ended in victory and 14 in defeat. Germany 13 has recorded six wins from 13 final appearances. Spain has 21 final appearances (12 wins/nine defeats) and England 17 (11/6).
- In the previous 17 finals, there have been 12 outright wins and five matches decided on shoot-outs. A total of 43 goals have been scored with the most common results being 2-1, which has happened on four occasions, while three finals have finished 1-0.
- Fourteen European Champion Clubs' Cup finals have gone to extra time. The finals of 1958, 1968, 1970 and 1992 were decided in the additional period, while the 1974 showpiece between FC Bayern München and Club Atlético de Madrid ended 1-1 after 120 minutes with Bayern subsequently winning a replay. The other nine finals were settled by a penalty shoot-out after extra time: in 1984, 1986, 1988, 1991, 1996, 2001, 2003, 2005 and 2008 when Manchester United FC defeated Chelsea FC 6-5 in the shoot-out after a 1-1 draw.
- Milan's 4-0 win against FC Barcelona in the 1994 final remains the biggest winning margin and the Rossoneri were also involved in the highest scoring showpiece when they shared six goals with Liverpool in 2005 before penalties. In terms of the all-time European Cup, Madrid's 7-3 defeat of Eintracht Frankfurt in 1960 remains the most impressive while Bayern (1974 v Club Atlético de Madrid) and Milan (1989 v FC Steaua Bucureşti) also recorded 4-0 successes.
- No player has scored a hat-trick in a final. Daniele Massaro (Milan 1994), Karlheinz Riedle (BV Borussia Dortmund 1997), Hernán Crespo (Milan 2005) and Filippo Inzaghi (2007) all struck twice. In European Cup terms, only Ferenc Puskás (Madrid 1962) and Pierino Prati (Milan 1969) have managed a final hat-trick.
- Only Raúl González (Madrid 2000 and 2002) and Samuel Eto'o (Barcelona 2006 and 2009) have scored in two different UEFA Champions League finals – adding them to an exclusive club of 13 players to have found the net in more than one European Cup showpiece. Alfredo di Stéfano leads the list having scored seven goals in five separate finals for Madrid.
- Jens Lehmann (2006) and Didier Drogba (2008) are the only players to have been dismissed in a European Cup final.
- Clarence Seedorf is the only player to win the European Champion Clubs' Cup with three clubs (Ajax 1995, Madrid 1998, Milan 2003, 2007). Liverpool's Bob Paisley (1977, 1978, 1981) is the only coach to win three times.
- Ottmar Hitzfeld (BV Borussia Dortmund 1997, Bayern 2001) and Ernst Happel (Feyenoord 1970, Hamburger SV 1983) are the only coaches to win the trophy with two clubs.
- No team has successfully defended the UEFA Champions League trophy with AC Milan (1989, 1990) the last club to win consecutive European Champion Clubs' Cups. Milan (1994, 1995), Juventus (1996, 1997) and Manchester United (2008, 2009) have all returned to the final as holders only to lose.

• The 2009/10 UEFA Champions League final will be the first to be played on a Saturday following a decision by the UEFA Executive Committee in November 2007. As part of the changes to the competition for this season, the access list was amended meaning 22 teams (21 teams + titleholder) qualified directly for the group stage instead of 16.

UEFA Champions League: Did you know?

- S.S. Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta is the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League having been aged 43 years 252 days when he featured against Real Madrid CF on Matchday 6 of the 2007/08 competition.
- Laurent Blanc is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 36 years and 339 days, in Manchester United's 3-2 defeat of Olympiacos FC on 23 October 2002.
- Celestine Babayaro is the UEFA Champions League's youngest player. He was 16 years 87 days when he started for RSC Anderlecht against Steaua on 23 November 1994 and was then sent off in the 37th minute.
