## Match background

---

Rangers FC will look to continue a promising start to Group C when they welcome Valencia CF to Ibrox.

- The Scottish titleholders built on their draw at Manchester United FC with a 1-0 home win against Bursaspor last time out having failed to collect a single point at Ibrox in last season's group stage. The challenge now is to get the better of a Valencia side who hit four goals at Bursaspor and won on their two previous trips to Ibrox.

### Previous meetings

- Rangers and Valencia first met in the UEFA Cup Winners' Cup second round in 1979/80 with John Greig, now a club director, in charge of the Scottish side.

- The teams drew 1-1 at Mestalla – Mario Kempes and Tommy McLean trading goals – before Valencia prevailed 3-1 at Ibrox. Kempes scored twice after Derek Johnstone had cancelled out an opening goal by Rainer Bonhof, later Scotland's Under-21 coach. Bonhof's free-kick deflected in off Sandy Jardine, today part of Rangers' back-room staff. Valencia went on to beat Arsenal FC in the final.

- When they met Rangers again in the 1999/2000 UEFA Champions League first group stage. Kily González's second-half double secured a 2-0 home win for Valencia and the Spanish side, eventual runners-up that year, then triumphed 2-1 in Glasgow, Gaizka Mendieta and Claudio López getting first-half goals before Craig Moore halved the deficit.

- With Dick Advocaat and Héctor Cúper the respective coaches, the lineups for the game on 26 October 1999 were:

- **Valencia:** Palop, Angulo, Djukić, Pellegrino, Carboni, Mendieta (Soria 80), Albelda, Gerard, González (Farinós 66), Ilie (Sánchez 69), López.

- The only survivor from the two squads is David Albelda.

### Match background

- The last time Rangers welcomed Spanish visitors they suffered a 4-1 defeat by Sevilla FC in last season's UEFA Champions League group stage.

- The Scottish champions have failed to win any of their last five home encounters with Spanish opposition since a 1-0 UEFA Cup first round defeat of CA Osasuna in September 1985. Their overall record against Liga sides at Ibrox is W3 D3 L4.

- Valencia lost 1-0 at Celtic FC on their last visit to Scotland for a UEFA Cup third round tie in 2001/02 but went through after a 5-4 penalty shoot-out win. Vicente scored the only goal of the first leg.

- Unai Emery's Valencia performed impressively on their travels in the 2009/10 UEFA Europa League – suffering just one defeat in seven away matches – and picked up where they left off in their Group C opener by crushing Bursaspor 4-0 in Turkey.

### Team ties

- Pablo Hernández was a 70th-minute substitute as Spain beat Scotland 3-2 in UEFA EURO 2012 qualifying at Glasgow's Hampden Park on 12 October. Rangers' Allan McGregor, Steven Whittaker, David Weir, Lee McCulloch, Kenny Miller and Steven Naismith were in the home lineup, Naismith making it 1-2 with his first international goal and Whittaker dismissed for a second yellow card in the 89th minute.

- Miller came off the bench for the final two minutes of an abandoned Spain-Scotland friendly at the Estadio Ciudad de Valencia in September 2004. Vicente was a substitute for Spain and Valencia old boy Rubén Baraja scored the hosts' goal in a match curtailed after 59 minutes with the score at 1-1 because of floodlight failure after heavy rain.

- Rangers' reserve coach Tommy Wilson was in joint charge of the Scotland team beaten 2-1 by a Spain side including Juan Mata in the 2006 UEFA European Under-19 Championship final.

- Alejandro Domínguez was an unused substitute when FC Zenit St. Petersburg beat Rangers in the 2008 UEFA Cup final.

- Roberto Soldado was on the bench as Osasuna overcame Rangers 1-0 in the 2006/07 UEFA Cup round of 16.

- Joachim Björklund made 59 appearances for Rangers between 1996 and 1998, when he left for Valencia. He spent three years with the Spanish club, scoring once in 57 league games. The former Swedish international was also in the IFK Göteborg team which beat Manchester United 3-1 in the 1994/95 UEFA Champions League group stage.

• Walter Smith made two changes to the side that beat Heart of Midlothian FC 2-1 on 2 October, Kyle Lafferty replacing the injured Nikica Jelavić and Neil Alexander deputising for the suspended Allan McGregor.

• Rory Loy made his first appearance of the season while Gregg Wylde came on for his first league game this term.

• The win means Rangers have equalled the record for consecutive victories at the start of a Scottish Premier League season – eight – set by Hearts in 2005/06 and Celtic FC in the current campaign. Hearts went on to finish runners-up, 17 points adrift of Celtic.

• Vladimir Weiss scored his first goal since joining Rangers on loan from Manchester City FC while Steven Davis got off the mark for the season.

• Kenny Miller has scored in seven of Rangers' eight league matches this season, 11 in all, with only Hearts keeping him at bay.

• Smith's side are unbeaten this season, winning ten and drawing one.

• Rangers have fallen behind four times in the Premier League this season but recovered to take all three points on every occasion.

#### Injury news

• Lee McCulloch will miss the visit of Valencia having been substituted at half-time during Scotland's defeat by Spain on 12 October with a groin injury.

• Kirk Broadfoot missed the Motherwell game with a foot injury.

• James Beattie has not played since 11 September because of a thigh problem.

• John Fleck picked up a hamstring injury in pre-season, suffering a relapse in mid-September.

• Miller earned his 50th cap as a second-half substitute in Scotland's defeat by the Czech Republic.

• Four days later Miller was back in the starting XI against Spain, setting up Naismith for his first international goal.

- Weir surpassed Jim Leighton as Scotland's oldest ever player on 3 September when he lined up against Lithuania aged 40 years, three months and 24 days.

- Rangers signed Jelavić from SK Rapid Wien in August but the forward is ineligible for the UEFA Champions League.

- Barcelona came from behind to inflict Valencia's first Liga defeat since 8 May, when they lost 2-0 at Villarreal CF.
- David Albelda replaced the injured Mehmet Topal while Aritz Aduriz dropped to the bench in favour of Éver Banega, who came in to bolster the midfield. Juan Mata was also among the substitutes, with Jordi Alba starting at left-back.
- Vicente's first Liga goal since 8 March 2009 proved decisive as Valencia defeated Athletic Club 2-1 at home on 2 October.
- With five wins and a draw from seven matches, Valencia are four points better off than they were at the same stage last term.

##### **Injury news**

- Miguel missed the Barcelona game because of a thigh strain suffered in training on 13 October.
- A scan on Monday revealed Sofiane Feghouli will miss both games against Rangers after tearing an adductor muscle in training.
- Against Barcelona, Banega made his first appearance since sustaining an ankle injury at home to Real Racing Club on 11 September.
- Mehmet Topal and Joaquín suffered ankle injuries in training on 5 and 12 October respectively.
- Hedwiges Maduro tore his left hamstring on Matchday 2.
- Vicente's appearance against Athletic Club was his first since picking up a hamstring injury against Racing.

## Head coach

---

### Rangers FC: Walter Smith

**Date of birth:** 24 February 1948

**Nationality:** Scottish

**Playing career:** Dundee United FC (twice), Dumbarton FC

**Coaching career:** Rangers FC (twice), Everton, Scotland

- Former defender Smith assisted Jim McLean as Dundee United won the 1982/83 Scottish title and was Sir Alex Ferguson's deputy when Scotland reached the 1986 FIFA World Cup finals.
- Came home from Mexico to a new job as Graeme Souness's assistant at Rangers and was given sole command of the club he supported as a boy in April 1991, winning the Scottish title in each of his first seven seasons in charge, including a domestic treble in 1993.
- He managed Everton from summer 1998 until March 2002, then briefly assisted Sir Alex at Manchester United FC before becoming Scotland coach in December 2004.
- Having helped Scotland rise 70 places in the FIFA rankings, he returned to Rangers in January 2007, leading them to defeat by FC Zenit St. Petersburg in the 2007/08 UEFA Cup final. A league and Scottish Cup double followed in 2008/09 and the league title was retained the following season, when Rangers also added the League Cup.
- His haul over two spells at Rangers comprises nine league titles, five Scottish Cups and five Scottish League Cups.

- The son and grandson of famous goalkeepers, Unai Emery took his first steps as a footballer in the youth ranks at Real Sociedad, where he played as a left-sided midfielder.
- Failing to shine with the first team at Real, Emery went on to carve out a career in the lower leagues with Toledo, Ferrol, Leganés and Lorca but was eventually forced to retire at 33 having suffered a knee injury.
- He was immediately offered the chance to coach Lorca – the club with whom he had ended his playing career – and took them up to the second division in his first season in charge, 2004/05.
- After coming close to taking Lorca into the Spanish top flight the following season, was appointed by UD Almería ahead of the 2006/07 campaign and duly won promotion to the Liga.
- Almería shone among the Spanish elite, finishing the season in eighth place while their manager's reputation soared, earning him a call to replace Ronald Koeman at Valencia, whom he guided to third place in the Liga in 2009/10.

• Born in the Italian town of Mirandola in October 1971, Nicola Rizzoli is following in the footsteps of one of the most famous referees of recent years, Pierluigi Collina, who also started his career as part of the group of match officials based in Bologna.

• An architect by profession, Rizzoli was promoted to the refereeing lists for Serie A and B in 2001, making his top-flight debut the following year.

• His major breakthrough came in 2006/07 when he took charge of some of Serie A's most high-profile fixtures, including the game between AS Roma and FC Internazionale Milano and the derbies in Milan and Rome. By the end of that season he had become a regular presence as a fourth official in the UEFA Champions League and UEFA Cup.

• Rizzoli made his only refereeing appearance in UEFA EURO 2008 qualifying in the Netherlands-Slovenia match in October 2007 having received his FIFA badge earlier that year. Also in the middle for three 2010 FIFA World Cup qualifiers.

• He was selected in the UEFA Champions League proper for the first time at the start of 2008/09, taking charge of two games in that season's group stage. Rizzoli oversaw six more the following season, which concluded with him refereeing the first UEFA Europa League final in Hamburg having taken charge of the Coppa Italia showpiece a week earlier.

### • UEFA Champions League: Group stage milestones

Holders FC Internazionale Milano are looking to avoid becoming the first defending champions to fail to get through a group stage since the UEFA Champions League began. (This record, like the others, includes the seasons between 1999/2000 and 2002/03 that featured a second group stage).

In 1992/93, FC Barcelona were the reigning European Champion Clubs' Cup holders and were beaten 4-3 on aggregate in the second round by PFC CSKA Moskva.

S.S. Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta became the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League in 2007/08 when he featured against Olympiacos FC on Matchday 1 at the age of 43 years and 168 days. The record was previously held by Alessandro Costacurta, the AC Milan defender who played against AEK Athens FC in 2006/07 at the age of 40 years and 211 days. Ballotta was aged 43 years 252 days when he featured against Real Madrid CF on Matchday 6.

Laurent Blanc is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 36 years and 339 days, having found the net for Manchester United FC in their 3-2 defeat of Olympiacos on 23 October 2002.

Celestine Babayaro is the youngest player to have appeared in the UEFA Champions League. He was 16 years and 87 days when he started for RSC Anderlecht against FC Steaua Bucureşti on 23 November 1994. He was then sent off in the 37th minute.

Barcelona and Manchester United have both finished as group winners on 11 occasions, one more than Milan and Real Madrid.

Four teams have recorded six successive victories in a UEFA Champions League group stage: Milan (1992/93), Paris Saint-Germain FC (1994/95), FC Spartak Moskva (1995/96) and Barcelona (2002/03, first group stage).

Ten teams have gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without picking up a single point, including Maccabi Haifa FC and Debreceni VSC in 2009/10. The other eight are: FC Dynamo Kyiv (2007/08), PFC Levski Sofia (2006/07), SK Rapid Wien (2005/06), RSC Anderlecht (2004/05), FC Spartak Moskva and Bayer 04 Leverkusen (2002/03, first and second group stage respectively), Fenerbahçe SK (2001/02, first group stage) and 1. FC Košice (1997/98).

Manchester United scored 20 goals in the 1998/99 group stage, more than any other side has managed. Barcelona scored 19 times in the 1999/2000 first group stage.

Debrecen conceded 19 goals in their six outings in 2009/10, equalling the record let in during a group stage set by Dynamo Kyiv (2007/08) and Ferencvárosi TC in 1995/96.

No team has ever gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without conceding a goal. Milan (1992/93), AFC Ajax (1995/96), Juventus (1996/97 and 2004/05), Chelsea FC (2005/06), Liverpool FC (2005/06) and Villarreal CF (2005/06) all let in just one.

Before their 3-1 win against Sporting Clube de Portugal on Matchday 6 of the 2006/07 campaign, FC Spartak Moskva went 22 games without a victory in the competition, surpassing the unwanted record set by AEK Athens FC on Matchday 3 of the same campaign.

The lowest total for a team qualifying from the group stage is seven points. The first to do it, since three points for a win was introduced in 1995/96, were Legia Warszawa that same season before FC Dynamo Kyiv and Bayer Leverkusen managed it in 1999/2000 and Liverpool in 2001/02. FC Lokomotiv Moskva and eventual finalists Juventus both progressed with seven points in 2002/03, a feat achieved by Rangers FC and Werder Bremen in 2005/06.
