Match background

The third round of UEFA Champions League fixtures brings together the two sides who have made the best start to the campaign in Group D and who know each other very well having met in each of the past two seasons. The teams have been paired together in four of the past six campaigns.

- Real Madrid CF beat Olympique Lyonnais 4-1 on aggregate in the round of 16 in 2010/11 but the previous year it was the French side who had the upper hand.
- This time round the Spanish giants have maximum points having started with a 1-0 victory at GNK Dinamo Zagreb thanks to Ángel Di María's 53rd-minute strike.
- Two weeks later a potent attacking performance saw off the challenge of AFC Ajax, a 3-0 victory coming courtesy of goals from Cristiano Ronaldo, Kaká and Karim Benzema.
- Lyon gained a goalless draw in Amsterdam against AFC Ajax before first-half goals from Bafétimbi Gomis and Bakary Koné at home to Dinamo earned Rémi Garde a first group stage victory as Lyon coach.

Previous meetings

- When the teams met earlier this year in Madrid, goals from Marcelo, Benzema and Di María gave the hosts an emphatic 3-0 second-leg victory after the first match had ended 1-1. In France Benzema, the former Lyon striker, gave his team the lead 60 seconds after coming on as a substitute, Gomis levelling seven minutes from time.
- The lineups at Santiago Bernabéu on 16 March 2011 were:
Madrid: Casillas, Ramos, Carvalho, Pepe, Marcelo, Alonso, Khedira, Di María (Granero 78), Özil, Ronaldo (Adebayor 74), Benzema (L Diarra 84).
Lyon: Lloris, Cris, Lovren, Réveillère, Cissokho, Källström, Toulalan, Gourcuff (Pied 69), Briand (Gomis 46), López, Delgado (Pjanić 80).
- That game was the first time Madrid had got the better of Lyon, their three previous home games all ending in draws. When the teams met at the same stage 12 months previously, Jean Makoun gave the French side the edge after their home leg. A 1-1 draw in the return took Lyon through, Miralem Pjanić cancelling out Ronaldo's early opener.
- The sides also played in the group stage in 2005/06 and 2006/07, Lyon winning both home games and drawing twice in Spain.

Match background

- The Merengues ended a run of six successive last-16 eliminations when they reached last season's semi-finals, where they lost 3-1 on aggregate to FC Barcelona. In their 15 UEFA Champions League participations they have never failed to reach the knockout rounds.
- Progress to the round of 16 last season maintained a pattern for Lyon who have made it through to the knockout stage in each of the past eight campaigns.

Team ties

- As FC Porto coach in 2003/04, José Mourinho oversaw a 4-2 aggregate win against Lyon in the UEFA Champions League quarter-finals with a team including Ricardo Carvalho. Mourinho's side had beaten Olympique de Marseille in the group stage and then won the final 3-0 against AS Monaco FC. Overall Mourinho has won eight and lost only one of 11 meetings with French opposition.
- This tie pits Benzema against his old club for the third time since his switch to Madrid in 2009. Ligue 1's top scorer in 2007/08 with 20 goals, Benzema made 112 league appearances and scored 43 times in five seasons for Lyon, winning four league titles.
- Kaká was in the AC Milan side that beat Lyon in the 2005/06 UEFA Champions League quarter-finals, while Ronaldo scored the only goal when Manchester United FC beat Lyon at home in the last 16 in 2007/08 to confirm a 2-1 aggregate success.
- Sami Khedira was in the VfB Stuttgart team beaten home and away by Lyon in the 2007/08 group stage.
- Kim Källström was a substitute in Sweden's 2-1 Group D loss to the Spain of Iker Casillas, Sergio Ramos and Raúl Albiol at UEFA EURO 2008.
- Raphaël Varane played against Lyon last season for RC Lens, losing 3-0 at Stade de Gerland on 10 April.
- Aly Cissokho faced Fábio Coentrão on two occasions in the 2008/09 season, firstly for Porto and then Vitória FC, while Coentrao was with SL Benfica. Both games ended in draws.

- The Spanish team are one of four sides still to concede a goal in the group stage.
- José Mourinho has completed a three-game suspension; Marcelo is also back from a ban after his matchday one red card.

- Gonzalo Higuaín registered his second successive Liga hat-trick and third in four matches this month following three-goal hauls in Madrid's 4-0 victory at RCD Espanyol on 2 October and for Argentina in their 4-1 2014 FIFA World Cup qualifying win against Chile five days later.
- Madrid have scored 24 goals in seven Liga games this season, eight more than they managed at the same stage last term.
- Ronaldo, who scored a Liga record 40 goals in 2010/11, has found the net 13 times in 15 games for club and country this season. His appearance against Betis was his 100th for the Merengues.
- Ronaldo scored a hat-trick as the Merengues began their Liga campaign with a 6-0 victory at Real Zaragoza on 28 August, the best ever opening-day win by an away team in Spain's top division.
- Madrid lost 5-4 on aggregate to FC Barcelona in August's Spanish Super Cup.
- The Copa del Rey holders begin the defence of their title against SD Ponferradina on 13 and 21 December.

Injury news

- Raúl Albiol missed the Betis game having fractured his left cheekbone during training with Spain last week.
- Pepe (left thigh) and Fábio Coentrão (left calf), injured at Levante UD on 18 September, returned against Betis.
- Karim Benzema was an unused substitute on his comeback from a torn groin suffered at home to AFC Ajax.
- Ricardo Carvalho recovered from concussion to face Ajax but has since been out with a back problem.
- Nuri Şahin (knee ligaments) is yet to appear for Madrid since joining from Borussia Dortmund in the summer.

International duty

- Xabi Alonso struck his 11th international goal in Spain's 2-0 win against the Czech Republic in their penultimate UEFA EURO 2012 qualifier on 7 October.
- Iker Casillas captained the Roja on his 125th international appearance and is one shy of Andoni Zubizarreta's all-time Spanish record.
- Sami Khedira's Germany inflicted a 3-1 defeat on Turkey on the same night, and the midfielder again featured four days later, setting up Mesut Özil to score the opener in a 3-1 win against Belgium.
- Hamit Altıntop was in the Turkey side that lost to Germany, though a 1-0 victory over Azerbaijan sealed a play-off place; they will face Croatia next month.
- Ronaldo scored a late free-kick as Portugal lost 2-1 to Denmark on 11 October and missed out on an automatic UEFA EURO 2012 finals berth. They face Bosnia and Herzegovina in next month's play-offs.
- Higuaín's second hat-trick in a week helped Argentina open their World Cup qualifying campaign with a 4-1 win against Chile on 7 October. He also started the 1-0 loss to Venezuela four days later.
- Marcelo's second international goal earned Brazil a 2-1 friendly win Mexico on 11 October.

- Michel Bastos scored either side of setting up Bafétimbi Gomis as Lyon returned to winning ways in Ligue 1.
- Rémy Vercoutre started in place of Hugo Lloris, who was taken ill on Saturday morning with a stomach bug, and saved André Luiz's late penalty. Fourth-choice goalkeeper Jérémy Frick was on the bench.
- Lyon extended their unbeaten home run to 23 games, since a 2-1 League Cup defeat by Paris Saint-Germain FC on 27 October 2010.
- Lyon's league haul of 20 points from ten games is a marked improvement on their tally of 12 at the same stage last term.
- Lyon surrendered top spot in Ligue 1 when they lost 2-0 to PSG on 2 October. The Gones had risen to the French summit for the first time in almost two years with a 2-0 victory over champions Olympique de Marseille on 18 September.
- Rémi Garde's team have kept three clean sheets in 14 games in all competitions this season.
- Lyon will face rivals FC Saint-Étienne in the French League Cup round of 16 on 26 October.

Injury news

- Clément Grenier (torn hamstring, out since 27 September), Cris (hamstring, 15 August), Ederson (knee ligament, 16 July) and Yoann Gourcuff, who had not played this season because of an ankle injury, all featured against Nancy. Grenier's comeback was cut short, however, as he was withdrawn before half-time.
- Jérémy Pied sustained a right ankle injury during a reserve game on 8 October.
- Anthony Lopes was ruled out for three months after undergoing surgery on a broken right fibula and ankle ligament tear on 29 September.
- Lisandro (ankle, 27 August) remains on the sidelines, while Yannis Tafer has been out of action since breaking his foot at this summer's FIFA U-20 World Cup.

International duty

- Lloris was captain as France beat Albania 3-0 and drew 1-1 with Bosnia and Herzegovina to qualify for UEFA EURO 2012. Anthony Réveillère came off the bench to score against Albania, a game Gomis started.
- Kim Källström's free-kick opened the scoring for Sweden in their 3-2 win against the Netherlands, a result which sealed a finals place as best runners-up.
- Dejan Lovren played as Croatia beat Latvia 2-0 on 11 October to set up a play-off against Turkey.

Miscellaneous

- Lloris, Bastos, Grenier and Maxime Gonalons have all signed new contracts since matchday two.

- A former teacher, Mourinho had spells working at Sporting Clube de Portugal, Porto and FC Barcelona as a coaching assistant in the 1990s.
- As coach, had a brief, nine-game stay at Benfica and a highly successful tenure at Leiria before really making his mark after his arrival at Porto in January 2002. In his first full season, 2002/03, Porto won the UEFA Cup and a domestic double. The next year they retained their league title and claimed the UEFA Champions League with a 3-0 defeat of AS Monaco FC in Gelsenkirchen.
- Joined Chelsea in 2004 and led the club to the League Cup and their first league championship for 50 years in his first season. Followed up with the league title again in 2006, and both the League Cup and FA Cup in 2007.
- Left Chelsea in September 2007 and stayed out of football until joining Inter in June 2008. In his first campaign the Nerazzurri retained their Serie A crown, a feat they repeated in 2009/10 when they also added the Coppa Italia and the UEFA Champions League crown, their first European Cup win since 1965.
- Victory at the Santiago Bernabéu was Mourinho's last act as Inter coach before joining Madrid on a four-year deal. His first season featured the club's first Copa del Rey victory in 18 years and a UEFA Champions League semi-final appearance.

Olympique Lyonnais: Rémi Garde

- Born in L'Arbresle in the Rhone – the same town as OL owner Jean-Michel Aulas – Garde joined local side Lyon aged 18. A slight but astute defensive midfielder, he worked his way up to the first team, with whom he won promotion to Ligue 1 in 1988/89.
- A first international cap followed in 1990 in France's friendly win against Kuwait, and Garde was subsequently included in Michel Platini's squad for the 1992 UEFA European Championship in Sweden, although he did not feature in any of Les Bleus' three games.
- Left Lyon in 1993 to join Strasbourg, where he spent three seasons, reaching the final of the Coupe de France – which the Alsace team lost to Paris Saint-Germain FC – in the second of those campaigns.
- Then opted to try his luck abroad as Arsène Wenger took him to Arsenal, where he spent three years and with whom he won the Premier League and the FA Cup in 1998 before a persistent knee injury forced him to hang up his boots a year later.
- Joined Lyon's technical staff in 2003, initially as a TV analyst, but filled a variety of roles before taking over as head of the club's academy in 2010/11. The following summer he succeeded Claude Puel as head coach, signing a one-year contract with the option for a further 12 months.

- Oversaw Fulham's second-leg win against Hamburger SV in the 2009/10 UEFA Europa League semi-finals, one of seven matches he refereed in total in the competition that season. Çakır took charge of three group stage matches in the 2010/11 UEFA Champions League and was selected for the 2011 FIFA U-20 World Cup, when he was in the middle for the France-Portugal semi-final.

Competition facts

UEFA Champions League: Group stage milestones

- Holders FC Barcelona are bidding to avoid becoming the first defending champions to fail to get through a group stage since the UEFA Champions League began. (This record, like the others, includes the seasons between 1999/2000 and 2002/03 that featured a second group stage).
- In 1992/93, Barcelona were the reigning European Champion Clubs' Cup holders and were beaten 4-3 on aggregate in the second round by PFC CSKA Moskva.
- No team has successfully defended the UEFA Champions League trophy with AC Milan (1989, 1990) the last club to win consecutive European Cups. Milan (1994, 1995), AFC Ajax (1995, 1996), Juventus (1996, 1997) and Manchester United (2008, 2009) have all returned to the UEFA Champions League final as holders only to lose.
- S.S. Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta became the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League in 2007/08 when he featured against Olympiacos FC on matchday one at the age of 43 years and 168 days. The record was previously held by Alessandro Costacurta, the AC Milan defender who played against AEK Athens FC in 2006/07 at the age of 40 years and 211 days. Ballotta was aged 43 years 252 days when he featured against Real Madrid CF on matchday six.
- Ryan Giggs is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 37 years and 289 days, in Manchester United's 11 draw at SL Benfica on 14 September 2011.
- Celestine Babayaro is the youngest player to have appeared in the UEFA Champions League. He was 16 years and 87 days when he started for RSC Anderlecht against FC Steaua București on 23 November 1994. He was then sent off in the 37th minute.
- Peter Ofori-Quaye is the youngest player to have scored in the UEFA Champions League, aged 17 years and 195 days. He found the net in Olympiacos's 5-1 defeat at Rosenborg BK on 1 October 1997.
- Barcelona and Manchester United FC have both finished as group winners on 12 occasions, one more than Real Madrid.
- Four teams have recorded six successive victories in a UEFA Champions League group stage: Milan (1992/93), Paris Saint-Germain FC (1994/95), FC Spartak Moskva (1995/96) and Barcelona (2002/03, first group stage).
- Twelve teams have gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without picking up a single point, including MŠK Žilina and FK Partizan in 2010/11. The other ten are: Maccabi Haifa FC and Debreceni VSC (2009/10), FC Dynamo Kyiv (2007/08), PFC Levski Sofia (2006/07), SK Rapid Wien (2005/06), Anderlecht (2004/05), Spartak Moskva and Bayer 04 Leverkusen (2002/03, first and second group stage respectively), Fenerbahçe SK (2001/02, first group stage) and 1. FC Košice (1997/98).
- Manchester United scored 20 goals in the 1998/99 group stage, more than any other side has managed. Barcelona scored 19 times in the 1999/2000 first group stage.
- MŠK Žilina conceded 19 goals in their six outings in 2010/11, equalling the record let in during a group stage set by Debrecen (2009/10), Dynamo Kyiv (2007/08) and Ferencvárosi TC in 1995/96.
- No team has ever gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without conceding a goal. Milan (1992/93), AFC Ajax (1995/96), Juventus (1996/97 and 2004/05), Chelsea FC (2005/06), Liverpool FC (2005/06), Villarreal CF (2005/06) and Manchester United (2010/11) all let in just one.
- Before their 3-1 win against Sporting Clube de Portugal on matchday six of the 2006/07 campaign, Spartak Moskva went 22 games without a victory in the competition, surpassing the unwanted record set by AEK Athens FC on matchday three of the same campaign.
- The lowest total for a team qualifying from the group stage is seven points. The first to do it, since three points for a win was introduced in 1995/96, were Legia Warszawa that same season before FC Dynamo Kyiv and Bayer 04 Leverkusen managed it in 1999/2000 and Liverpool in 2001/02. FC Lokomotiv Moskva and eventual finalists Juventus both progressed with seven points in 2002/03, a feat achieved by Rangers FC and SV Werder Bremen in 2005/06.
