Match background

An emphatic home win against Olympique Lyonnais on matchday three has left Real Madrid CF well clear at the top of Group D and the Spanish side are seeking to continue their domination of the section at Stade de Gerland.

- Madrid made it three wins out of three with a 4-0 success at the Santiago Bernabéu, former Lyon striker Karim Benzema opening the scoring to set his former side on the way to their heaviest UEFA Champions League defeat as Madrid opened up a five-point lead at the top of the table.
- These teams are meeting for the third successive season and have been paired together in four of the past six campaigns. In 2010/11 Madrid beat Lyon 4-1 on aggregate in the round of 16, drawing 1-1 away, but the previous year it was the French side who had the upper hand.

Previous meetings

- When the clubs played earlier this year in France, Benzema gave Madrid the lead 60 seconds after coming on as a substitute, Bafétimbi Gomis levelling seven minutes from time. In the Madrid return, goals from Marcelo, Benzema and Ángel Di María gave the hosts an emphatic 3-0 victory.

- The lineups at Stade de Gerland on 22 February 2011 were:

Lyon: Lloris, Cris, Lovren, Källström (Pjanić 77), Bastos (Briand 69), Réveillère, Gomis, Delgado (Pied 69), Cissokho, Toulalan, Gourcuff.

Madrid: Casillas, Carvalho, Pepe, Ramos, Ronaldo, Alonso, Arbeloa, Di María, Özil (Marcelo 75), Khedira (L. Diarra 68), Adebayor (Benzema 64).

- When the teams met at the same stage 12 months previously, Lyon's Jean Makoun scored the only goal of the first leg. A 1-1 draw in Madrid took Lyon through, Miralem Pjanić cancelling out Cristiano Ronaldo's early opener.
- The sides also played in the group stage in 2005/06 and 2006/07, Lyon winning both home games without conceding a goal and drawing twice in Spain.

Match background

- Lyon have made it through to the knockout phase in the past eight campaigns while Madrid ended a run of six successive last-16 eliminations when they reached last season's semi-finals.
- Lyon have twice lost to FC Bayern München in their last 20 home fixtures in the competition, including the play-off round, but are otherwise unbeaten, winning 11 and drawing seven of the other 18 games.
- In Madrid's 15 participations to date they have never once failed to make it through to the knockout rounds and in three of the last four seasons they have emerged as group winners. Away from home in the group stage they are on an eight-match unbeaten run of which six have been won, scoring 18 goals and conceding six.

Team ties

- As FC Porto coach in 2003/04, José Mourinho oversaw a 4-2 aggregate win against Lyon in the UEFA Champions League quarter-finals with a team including Ricardo Carvalho, who scored in the first leg. Anthony Réveillère played in both games for Lyon. Mourinho's side had beaten Olympique de Marseille in the group stage and then won the final 3-0 against AS Monaco FC. Overall Mourinho has won nine and lost only one of 12 meetings with French opposition.
- Benzema left Lyon for Madrid in 2009. Ligue 1's top scorer in 2007/08 with 20 goals, the striker made 112 league appearances and scored 43 times in five seasons for Lyon, winning four league titles.
- Kaká was in the AC Milan side that beat Lyon in the 2005/06 UEFA Champions League quarter-finals, while Ronaldo scored the only goal when Manchester United FC beat Lyon at home in the last 16 in 2007/08 to confirm a 2-1 aggregate success.
- Sami Khedira was in the VfB Stuttgart team beaten home and away by Lyon in the 2007/08 group stage.
- Kim Källström was a substitute in Sweden's 2-1 Group D loss to the Spain of Iker Casillas, Sergio Ramos and Raúl Albiol at UEFA EURO 2008.
- Raphaël Varane played against Lyon last season for RC Lens, losing 3-0 at Stade de Gerland on 10 April.
- Aly Cissokho faced Fábio Coentrão on two occasions in the 2008/09 season, firstly for Porto and then Vitória FC, while Coentrao was with SL Benfica. Both games ended in draws.

- Yoann Gourcuff scored his first goal of the season as Lyon extended their unbeaten home run to 24 games despite Mouhamadou Dabo being dismissed seven minutes after his half-time introduction. Their last loss at the Stade de Gerland was a 2-1 League Cup reverse by Paris Saint-Germain FC on 27 October 2010.
- With Rémy Vercoutre and Anthony Lopes out with long-term injuries, goalkeeper Jérémy Frick, 18, was on the bench.
- Rémi Garde's team have kept four clean sheets in 18 games in all competitions this season.
- Lyon lost 3-1 to LOSC Lille Métropole on 23 October despite taking the lead through Jimmy Briand.
- Briand scored again on 26 October as the Gones beat St-Etienne 2-1 in the French League Cup round of 16. Lyon will host Lille in the quarter-finals on 10 January.

Injury news

- Aly Cissokho was withdrawn at half-time on Saturday after picking up a hamstring injury. John Mensah was left out of the squad with a calf problem.
- Michel Bastos suffered a hamstring injury in last week's cup game and has been ruled out until mid-November.
- Second-choice keeper Vercoutre will be out of action until the new year after rupturing tendons in his right foot at home on 27 October. Lopes was ruled out for three months after undergoing surgery on a broken right fibula and torn ankle ligament on 29 September.
- Grenier returned from a torn hamstring on 15 October against AS Nancy-Lorraine, but was withdrawn before half-time and has not featured since.
- Jérémy Pied sustained a right ankle injury during a reserve game on 8 October.
- Lisandro (ankle, 27 August) remains on the sidelines, while Yannis Tafer has been out of action since breaking a foot at this summer's FIFA U-20 World Cup.

Miscellaneous

- Dejan Lovren is likely to be on duty on 11 and 15 November when Croatia face Turkey in the UEFA EURO 2012 play-offs.

- Madrid have won their last eight matches in all competitions.
- Karim Benzema, Kaká and Ángel Di María were on target as Madrid overcame Villarreal CF 3-0 on 26 October.
- Four days earlier they had beaten Málaga CF 4-0, scoring four goals or more for the fourth successive league game; the first time the feat has been achieved in the club's history.

- Against Málaga, Cristiano Ronaldo struck his 11th hat-trick for Madrid, his third of the campaign. Gonzalo Higuaín also has three trebles to his name this season for club and country, against RCD Espanyol (4-0), Chile (4-1) and Real Betis Balompíe (4-1).
- Iker Casillas moved ahead of Paco Gento and into fifth place on Madrid's all-time Liga list by making his 429th appearance against Villarreal. Raúl González leads on 550 games.
- Ronaldo, who scored a Liga record 40 goals in 2010/11, has found the net 16 times in 19 games for club and country this season. He is two goals shy of a century in Madrid colours.
- Madrid lost 5-4 on aggregate to FC Barcelona in August's Spanish Super Cup.
- The Copa del Rey holders begin their defence against SD Ponferradina on 13 and 21 December.

Injury news

- Esteban Granero missed the Villarreal and Real Sociedad games because of a right foot problem. Fábio Coentrão appeared as a late substitute against Villarreal having finished matchday three with a swollen left knee.
- Lassana Diarra, out since 15 October with a right thigh injury, made his comeback against Real Sociedad.
- On Monday Madrid said Kaká (bruised right calf muscle) and Álvaro Arbeloa (bruised left thigh) are carrying injuries.
- Raúl Albiol has not played since fracturing his left cheekbone while training with Spain on 9 October.
- Ricardo Carvalho recovered from concussion to face AFC Ajax on matchday two but has since been out with a back problem.
- Nuri Şahin (knee ligaments) is yet to appear for Madrid since joining from Borussia Dortmund in the summer.

Miscellaneous

- Hamit Altıntop (Turkey v Croatia) and Ronaldo (Portugal v Bosnia and Herzegovina) are likely to be on duty on 11 and 15 November in the UEFA EURO 2012 play-offs.

- Born in L'Arbresle in the Rhone – the same town as OL owner Jean-Michel Aulas – Garde joined local side Lyon aged 18. A slight but astute defensive midfielder, he worked his way up to the first team, with whom he won promotion to Ligue 1 in 1988/89.
- A first international cap followed in 1990 in France's friendly win against Kuwait, and Garde was subsequently included in Michel Platini's squad for the 1992 UEFA European Championship in Sweden, although he did not feature in any of Les Bleus' three games.
- Left Lyon in 1993 to join Strasbourg, where he spent three seasons, reaching the final of the Coupe de France – which the Alsace team lost to Paris Saint-Germain FC – in the second of those campaigns.
- Then opted to try his luck abroad as Arsène Wenger took him to Arsenal, where he spent three years and with whom he won the Premier League and the FA Cup in 1998 before a persistent knee injury forced him to hang up his boots a year later.
- Joined Lyon's technical staff in 2003, initially as a TV analyst, but filled a variety of roles before taking over as head of the club's academy in 2010/11. The following summer he succeeded Claude Puel as head coach, signing a one-year contract with the option for a further 12 months.

Real Madrid CF: José Mourinho

Date of birth: 26 January 1963

Nationality: Portuguese

Coaching career: SL Benfica, UD Leiria, FC Porto, Chelsea FC, FC Internazionale Milano, Real Madrid CF

- A former teacher, Mourinho had spells working at Sporting Clube de Portugal, Porto and FC Barcelona as a coaching assistant in the 1990s.
- As coach, had a brief, nine-game stay at Benfica and a highly successful tenure at Leiria before really making his mark after his arrival at Porto in January 2002. In his first full season, 2002/03, Porto won the UEFA Cup and a domestic double. The next year they retained their league title and claimed the UEFA Champions League with a 3-0 defeat of AS Monaco FC in Gelsenkirchen.
- Joined Chelsea in 2004 and led the club to the League Cup and their first league championship for 50 years in his first season. Followed up with the league title again in 2006, and both the League Cup and FA Cup in 2007.
- Left Chelsea in September 2007 and stayed out of football until joining Inter in June 2008. In his first campaign the Nerazzurri retained their Serie A crown, a feat they repeated in 2009/10 when they also added the Coppa Italia and the UEFA Champions League crown, their first European Cup win since 1965.
- Victory at the Santiago Bernabéu was Mourinho's last act as Inter coach before joining Madrid on a four-year deal. His first season featured the club's first Copa del Rey victory in 18 years and a UEFA Champions League semi-final appearance.

• Born in the Italian town of Mirandola in October 1971, Nicola Rizzoli is following in the footsteps of one of the most famous referees of recent years, Pierluigi Collina, who also started his career as part of the group of match officials based in Bologna.

• An architect by profession, Rizzoli was promoted to the refereeing lists for Serie A and B in 2001, making his top-flight debut the following year.

• His major breakthrough came in 2006/07 when he took charge of some of Serie A's most high-profile fixtures, including the game between AS Roma and FC Internazionale Milano and the derbies in Milan and Rome. By the end of that season he had become a regular presence as a fourth official in the UEFA Champions League and UEFA Cup.

• Rizzoli made his only refereeing appearance in UEFA EURO 2008 qualifying in the Netherlands-Slovenia match in October 2007 having received his FIFA badge earlier that year. Also in the middle for three 2010 FIFA World Cup qualifiers.

• He was selected in the UEFA Champions League proper for the first time at the start of 2008/09, taking charge of two games in that season's group stage. Rizzoli oversaw six more the following season, which concluded with him refereeing the first UEFA Europa League final in Hamburg having taken charge of the Coppa Italia showpiece a week earlier, and was in the middle for five matches in the 2010/11 UEFA Champions League.

Competition facts

UEFA Champions League: Group stage milestones

- Holders FC Barcelona are bidding to avoid becoming the first defending champions to fail to get through a group stage since the UEFA Champions League began. (This record, like the others, includes the seasons between 1999/2000 and 2002/03 that featured a second group stage).
- In 1992/93, Barcelona were the reigning European Champion Clubs' Cup holders and were beaten 4-3 on aggregate in the second round by PFC CSKA Moskva.
- No team has successfully defended the UEFA Champions League trophy with AC Milan (1989, 1990) the last club to win consecutive European Cups. Milan (1994, 1995), AFC Ajax (1995, 1996), Juventus (1996, 1997) and Manchester United (2008, 2009) have all returned to the UEFA Champions League final as holders only to lose.
- S.S. Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta became the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League in 2007/08 when he featured against Olympiacos FC on matchday one at the age of 43 years and 168 days. The record was previously held by Alessandro Costacurta, the AC Milan defender who played against AEK Athens FC in 2006/07 at the age of 40 years and 211 days. Ballotta was aged 43 years 252 days when he featured against Real Madrid CF on matchday six.
- Ryan Giggs is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 37 years and 289 days, in Manchester United's 1-1 draw at SL Benfica on 14 September 2011.
- Celestine Babayaro is the youngest player to have appeared in the UEFA Champions League. He was 16 years and 87 days when he started for RSC Anderlecht against FC Steaua București on 23 November 1994. He was then sent off in the 37th minute.
- Peter Ofori-Quaye is the youngest player to have scored in the UEFA Champions League, aged 17 years and 195 days. He found the net in Olympiacos's 5-1 defeat at Rosenborg BK on 1 October 1997.
- Barcelona and Manchester United FC have both finished as group winners on 12 occasions, one more than Real Madrid.
- Four teams have recorded six successive victories in a UEFA Champions League group stage: Milan (1992/93), Paris Saint-Germain FC (1994/95), FC Spartak Moskva (1995/96) and Barcelona (2002/03, first group stage).
- Twelve teams have gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without picking up a single point, including MŠK Žilina and FK Partizan in 2010/11. The other ten are: Maccabi Haifa FC and Debreceni VSC (2009/10), FC Dynamo Kyiv (2007/08), PFC Levski Sofia (2006/07), SK Rapid Wien (2005/06), Anderlecht (2004/05), Spartak Moskva and Bayer 04 Leverkusen (2002/03, first and second group stage respectively), Fenerbahçe SK (2001/02, first group stage) and 1. FC Košice (1997/98).
- Manchester United scored 20 goals in the 1998/99 group stage, more than any other side has managed. Barcelona scored 19 times in the 1999/2000 first group stage.
- MŠK Žilina conceded 19 goals in their six outings in 2010/11, equalling the record let in during a group stage set by Debrecen (2009/10), Dynamo Kyiv (2007/08) and Ferencvárosi TC in 1995/96.
- No team has ever gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without conceding a goal. Milan (1992/93), AFC Ajax (1995/96), Juventus (1996/97 and 2004/05), Chelsea FC (2005/06), Liverpool FC (2005/06), Villarreal CF (2005/06) and Manchester United (2010/11) all let in just one.
- Before their 3-1 win against Sporting Clube de Portugal on matchday six of the 2006/07 campaign, Spartak Moskva went 22 games without a victory in the competition, surpassing the unwanted record set by AEK Athens FC on matchday three of the same campaign.
- The lowest total for a team qualifying from the group stage is seven points. The first to do it, since three points for a win was introduced in 1995/96, were Legia Warszawa that same season before FC Dynamo Kyiv and Bayer 04 Leverkusen managed it in 1999/2000 and Liverpool in 2001/02. FC Lokomotiv Moskva and eventual finalists Juventus both progressed with seven points in 2002/03, a feat achieved by Rangers FC and SV Werder Bremen in 2005/06.
