Match background

Already assured of a top-two finish in Group D with two games to spare, Real Madrid CF will be looking to continue their exhilarating form against a GNK Dinamo Zagreb team who lie in bottom place with no points or goals.

- When the teams met at Stadion Maksimir on 14 September, a second-half strike from Ángel Di María was enough for Madrid to get their campaign off to a winning start – despite having Marcelo sent off with 17 minutes remaining. It came at the expense of a home team playing in their first UEFA Champions League group game since 1999.
- Two weeks later a potent attacking performance saw off the challenge of AFC Ajax, Madrid's 3-0 victory achieved through goals from Cristiano Ronaldo, Kaká and Karim Benzema. The back-to-back meetings with Olympique Lyonnais maintained their winning streak, a 4-0 success at the Santiago Bernabéu in which former Lyon striker Benzema opened the scoring preceding a 2-0 win at Stade de Gerland, Ronaldo getting both goals.
- Dinamo followed their matchday one reverse with a 2-0 defeat away by Lyon and then went down 2-0 and 4-0 when they faced Ajax home and away. They are the only one of the 32 teams in the group stage still to score.

Previous meetings

- The 14 September meeting was the first between the sides. Madrid's only previous experience of Croatian opposition was a 1984/85 UEFA Cup second round tie against HNK Rijeka. They won 3-0 at home to rescue the situation after losing 3-1 away.
- Two of Dinamo's three previous European ties against Spanish opposition had come against Madrid's city rivals Club Atlético de Madrid. The Zagreb side lost 4-0 away in the 1965/66 UEFA Cup Winners' Cup preliminary round, bowing out 5-0 on aggregate, and lost 1-0 away in the 1997/98 UEFA Cup third round which ensured a 2-1 aggregate loss.
- Dinamo's sole victory in seven matches against Liga sides, five of which they have lost, was a 2-0 home defeat of Villarreal CF in last season's UEFA Europa League group stage.

Team ties

- Tonel is a team-mate of Cristiano Ronaldo, Ricardo Carvalho, Fábio Coentrão and Pepe with Portugal.
- Xabi Alonso and Igor Bišćan played together in the Liverpool FC team that lifted the 2004/05 UEFA Champions League with a memorable final win against AC Milan.
- As a player, Dinamo coach Krunoslav Jurčić featured in two friendly internationals against Spain. His Croatia team lost 3-1 in Seville in May 1999 while the game in Split nine months later finished goalless.
- Jerko Leko came on as a late substitute for FC Dynamo Kyiv as they held Madrid to a 2-2 draw at home in the 2004/05 UEFA Champions League group stage.
- Leandro Cufre also faced Madrid in the same Group B campaign that season, the defender featuring in both games as AS Roma lost 4-2 away and 3-0 at home against the Merengues. He was also involved in the 2002/03 season as Roma succumbed 3-0 at home to the Spanish giants on matchday one, his debut in UEFA competition.
- Kaká struck the only goal as Brazil beat Croatia at Berlin's Olympiastadion in the 2006 FIFA World Cup group stage.
- Hamit Altıntop was in the Turkey team that beat Croatia on penalties to reach the UEFA EURO 2008 semi-finals; Josip Šimunić was in the Croatia side with Leko and Nikola Pokrivač unused substitutes.

- Madrid have won their last 11 matches in all competitions. Saturday's fixture was José Mourinho's 50th Liga game in charge of the club.
- Cristiano Ronaldo struck his 11th Liga hat-trick for Madrid, and fourth of the campaign, in a 7-1 home win against CA Osasuna on 6 November. He is one treble away from matching Ferenc Puskás's 12 for the club, but still has some distance to go to catch Alfredo Di Stéfano, who registered a record 22 league hat-tricks for the Merengues.
- Ronaldo, who scored a Liga record 40 goals in 2010/11, has found the net 24 times in as many games for club and country this season.
- By defeating Málaga CF 4-0 on 22 October, Madrid scored four goals or more for the fourth successive league game; the first time the feat has been achieved in the club's history.
- Madrid lost 5-4 on aggregate to FC Barcelona in August's Spanish Super Cup.
- The Copa del Rey holders begin their defence against third-tier SD Ponferradina on 13 and 21 December.

Injury news

- Ángel Di María is expected to be out for a month after injuring his left hamstring against Osasuna. Nuri Şahin (knee ligaments) made his Madrid debut in that game.
- Esteban Granero, an unused substitute on matchday four following a right foot problem, came on as a substitute in Valencia.
- Kaká (right calf) and Álvaro Arbeloa (left thigh) sat out the victory against Olympique Lyonnais, although the latter returned for the visit of Osasuna.
- Raúl Albiol, out since fracturing his left cheekbone while training with Spain on 9 October, made his comeback in Lyon.
- Marcelo (out since 26 October, left thigh) replaced Fábio Coentrão for the Valencia game. The latter returned from international duty carrying a left thigh injury.
- Ricardo Carvalho recovered from concussion to face AFC Ajax on matchday two but has since been out with a back problem.

International duty

- Following a goalless first leg, Ronaldo scored twice in the return as Portugal beat Bosnia and Herzegovina 6-2 in their UEFA EURO 2012 play-off.
- Hamit Altıntop featured in both legs of Turkey's 3-0 defeat by Croatia.
- Iker Casillas overtook Andoni Zubizarreta as Spain's most capped player when he made his 127th appearance for the national team in a 2-2 draw with Costa Rica on 15 November.
- On the same day, Mesut Özil was on target for Germany in a 3-0 defeat of the Netherlands.
- Raphaël Varane scored France's second goal in a 2-0 home win against Slovakia in 2013 UEFA European Under-21 Championship qualifying on 14 November.

Miscellaneous

- Ronaldo's double in the 2-0 victory against Lyon brought his goal tally for Madrid to 100.

- Before the Osasuna match Ronaldo received his ESM Golden Shoe award for last season. He is only the second Madrid player to have won the prize after Hugo Sánchez in 1989/90.
- On 10 November at a ceremony in Madrid, Casillas received a commemorative cap and medal from UEFA in honour of his century of international appearances.

- Krunoslav Jurčić's side kept their 11th clean sheet in the league this season. They have conceded just five goals in 15 top-flight games.
- Vida scored his maiden goal for Dinamo, his first effort since 14 April 2010 when he registered for NK Osijek at NK Inter Zaprešić.
- Fatos Beqiraj took his tally to eight goals in his last eight league appearances.
- Left-back Ibáñez has struck five goals in 13 league appearances this season; that is one more than he mustered in 63 top-flight outings in his first three campaigns at Dinamo.

Injury news

- Josip Šimunić has been ruled out of the Madrid trip with a calf injury that kept him out of the starting XI on Friday.
- Ivan Kelava missed Friday's game after hurting his left knee in training with Croatia during the international break. Šime Vrsaljko was also absent having suffered a hamstring injury on 5 November.
- Mehmed Alispahić was in the starting XI against Split on his return from a broken arm sustained in the 1-0 victory over HJK Helsinki in the UEFA Champions League third qualifying round on 3 August; Tonel was back in action after three games out with a left hamstring injury.
- Mathias Chago (back, May) and Igor Bišćan (left ankle, April) are yet to make appearances this season.

International duty

- Šimunić and Vida started both legs of Croatia's UEFA EURO 2012 play-off triumph over Turkey. Beqiraj featured in the return as Montenegro lost 3-0 on aggregate against the Czech Republic.

Head coach

Real Madrid CF: José Mourinho

Date of birth: 26 January 1963

Nationality: Portuguese

Coaching career: SL Benfica, UD Leiria, FC Porto, Chelsea FC, FC Internazionale Milano, Real Madrid CF

- A former teacher, Mourinho had spells working at Sporting Clube de Portugal, Porto and FC Barcelona as a coaching assistant in the 1990s.
- As coach, had a brief, nine-game stay at Benfica and a highly successful tenure at Leiria before really making his mark after his arrival at Porto in January 2002. In his first full season, 2002/03, Porto won the UEFA Cup and a domestic double. The next year they retained their league title and claimed the UEFA Champions League with a 3-0 defeat of AS Monaco FC in Gelsenkirchen.
- Joined Chelsea in 2004 and led the club to the League Cup and their first league championship for 50 years in his first season. Followed up with the league title again in 2006, and both the League Cup and FA Cup in 2007.
- Left Chelsea in September 2007 and stayed out of football until joining Inter in June 2008. In his first campaign the Nerazzurri retained their Serie A crown, a feat they repeated in 2009/10 when they also added the Coppa Italia and the UEFA Champions League crown, their first European Cup win since 1965.
- Victory at the Santiago Bernabéu was Mourinho's last act as Inter coach before joining Madrid on a four-year deal. His first season featured the club's first Copa del Rey victory in 18 years and a UEFA Champions League semi-final appearance.

GNK Dinamo Zagreb: Krunoslav Jurčić

Date of birth: 26 November 1969

Nationality: Croatian

Playing career: GNK Dinamo Zagreb (twice), NK Inter Zaprešić, NK Istra, KSK Beveren, Torino FC, UC Sampdoria, NK Slaven Belupo

Coaching career: NK Istra 1961, NK Zagreb (assistant), NK Slaven Belupo, GNK Dinamo Zagreb (twice), NK Lokomotiva

- Started his playing career with Dinamo Zagreb but big breakthrough came in 1991 when he joined Inter Zaprešić, with whom he won the 1992 Croatian Cup; then had a two-year spell with Istra, signing for Beveren in 1995.
- Spent a year in Belgium before rejoining Dinamo, where he won four successive league titles and the domestic double in 1997 and 1998; played in three games at the 1998 FIFA World Cup as Croatia finished third and made four appearances for Dinamo in the 1998/99 UEFA Champions League group stage.
- After a spell in Italy with Torino and Sampdoria, hung up his boots in 2004 following two seasons at Slaven Belupo; moved into coaching the following year with Istra, quickly gaining a reputation as a rising star.
- Had a stint as assistant to Miroslav Blažević – Croatia's coach in 1998 – at Zagreb before taking over at Slaven Belupo in 2007, leading the club to second place in the first division in 2007/08; in March 2009 again returned to Dinamo, winning that season's league title.
- Also won the Croatian Cup in 2008/09 and retained the league title the following season before leaving in May 2010; after a short spell at another Zagreb side, Lokomotiva, succeeded Vahid Halilhodžić to become Dinamo coach again in 2011, starting the next season by engineering a return to the UEFA Champions League group stage.

• Born in Cork in 1975, Alan Kelly is following a family tradition with both his father and grandfather having worked as referees in the League of Ireland. Turned professional in 2002 and was selected for that year's UEFA European Under-17 Championship, taking charge of four matches in Denmark including the semi-final between Spain and France.

• Kelly was awarded the Irish Cup final in 2003 having worked at the UEFA-CAF Meridian Cup earlier that year. Started 2003/04 with his first taste of the qualifying fixtures in the UEFA Champions League and UEFA Cup.

• Continued to feature regularly in both competitions, also appearing in the UEFA Intertoto Cup. Refereed one UEFA EURO 2008 qualifier, between Latvia and Iceland in October 2006.

• A fixture in the UEFA Cup by 2007/08, Kelly also took charge of three qualifying fixtures for the 2010 FIFA World Cup and was in the middle for the friendly between Spain and Argentina in November 2009.

• Given his second Irish Cup final the same month, Kelly started 2010/11 with his first taste of the UEFA Champions League proper as a referee when CFR 1907 Cluj met FC Basel 1893 on matchday one and ended it by refereeing the all-Ireland cup final between Shamrock Rovers FC and Dundalk FC.

Competition facts

UEFA Champions League: Group stage milestones

- Holders FC Barcelona have avoided becoming the first defending champions to fail to get through a group stage since the UEFA Champions League began. (This record, like the others, includes the seasons between 1999/2000 and 2002/03 that featured a second group stage).
- In 1992/93, Barcelona were the reigning European Champion Clubs' Cup holders and were beaten 4-3 on aggregate in the second round by PFC CSKA Moskva.
- No team has successfully defended the UEFA Champions League trophy with AC Milan (1989, 1990) the last club to win consecutive European Cups. Milan (1994, 1995), AFC Ajax (1995, 1996), Juventus (1996, 1997) and Manchester United (2008, 2009) have all returned to the UEFA Champions League final as holders only to lose.
- S.S. Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta became the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League in 2007/08 when he featured against Olympiacos FC on matchday one at the age of 43 years and 168 days. The record was previously held by Alessandro Costacurta, the AC Milan defender who played against AEK Athens FC in 2006/07 at the age of 40 years and 211 days. Ballotta was aged 43 years 252 days when he featured against Real Madrid CF on matchday six.
- Ryan Giggs is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 37 years and 289 days, in Manchester United's 1-1 draw at SL Benfica on 14 September 2011.
- Celestine Babayaro is the youngest player to have appeared in the UEFA Champions League. He was 16 years and 87 days when he started for RSC Anderlecht against FC Steaua București on 23 November 1994. He was then sent off in the 37th minute.
- Peter Ofori-Quaye is the youngest player to have scored in the UEFA Champions League, aged 17 years and 195 days. He found the net in Olympiacos's 5-1 defeat at Rosenborg BK on 1 October 1997.
- Barcelona and Manchester United FC have both finished as group winners on 12 occasions, one more than Real Madrid.
- Four teams have recorded six successive victories in a UEFA Champions League group stage: Milan (1992/93), Paris Saint-Germain FC (1994/95), FC Spartak Moskva (1995/96) and Barcelona (2002/03, first group stage).
- Twelve teams have gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without picking up a single point, including MŠK Žilina and FK Partizan in 2010/11. The other ten are: Maccabi Haifa FC and Debreceni VSC (2009/10), FC Dynamo Kyiv (2007/08), PFC Levski Sofia (2006/07), SK Rapid Wien (2005/06), Anderlecht (2004/05), Spartak Moskva and Bayer 04 Leverkusen (2002/03, first and second group stage respectively), Fenerbahçe SK (2001/02, first group stage) and 1. FC Košice (1997/98).
- Manchester United scored 20 goals in the 1998/99 group stage, more than any other side has managed. Barcelona scored 19 times in the 1999/2000 first group stage.
- MŠK Žilina conceded 19 goals in their six outings in 2010/11, equalling the record let in during a group stage set by Debrecen (2009/10), Dynamo Kyiv (2007/08) and Ferencvárosi TC in 1995/96.
- No team has ever gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without conceding a goal. Milan (1992/93), AFC Ajax (1995/96), Juventus (1996/97 and 2004/05), Chelsea FC (2005/06), Liverpool FC (2005/06), Villarreal CF (2005/06) and Manchester United (2010/11) all let in just one.
- Before their 3-1 win against Sporting Clube de Portugal on matchday six of the 2006/07 campaign, Spartak Moskva went 22 games without a victory in the competition, surpassing the unwanted record set by AEK Athens FC on matchday three of the same campaign.
- The lowest total for a team qualifying from the group stage is seven points. The first to do it, since three points for a win was introduced in 1995/96, were Legia Warszawa that same season before FC Dynamo Kyiv and Bayer 04 Leverkusen managed it in 1999/2000 and Liverpool in 2001/02. FC Lokomotiv Moskva and eventual finalists Juventus both progressed with seven points in 2002/03, a feat achieved by Rangers FC and SV Werder Bremen in 2005/06.
