Match background

Real Madrid CF launch their bid to extend their winning UEFA Champions League run into the knockout rounds with an away tie against PFC CSKA Moskva.

- Although the nine-time European champions won all six group fixtures, CSKA will draw inspiration from a record against Spanish opponents which shows no defeats in a total of five games, home and away.
- At this stage two years ago CSKA put out another Spanish team, Sevilla FC, with a 2-1 away win thanks to goals from Tomáš Necid and Keisuke Honda. The home game had ended 1-1, Mark González scoring CSKA's equaliser.

Match background

- These teams have never met before but CSKA will be eyeing revenge on José Mourinho, whose FC Internazionale Milano team prevailed in their 2009/10 quarter-finals on their way to lifting the trophy. It was the furthest the Moscow club have progressed in the competition but they lost both legs 1-0.
- Before the Sevilla tie, the Army Men had only faced two opponents from Spain, beating RC Deportivo La Coruña 3-0 in the 2008/09 UEFA Cup group stage in Moscow. One of the most memorable results in the club's history came in the 1992/93 second round, six months after FC Barcelona had lifted the European Champion Clubs' Cup for the first time, when CSKA beat them 3-2 at the Camp Nou for a 4-3 aggregate success.
- Madrid have finished as winners on their last two visits to Russia, beating FC Zenit St Petersburg 2-1 in the 2008/09 group stage and FC Lokomotiv Moskva 1-0 in the 2002/03 second group stage. Madrid had recorded three draws and four losses, including three in succession, in Russia before that Lokomotiv victory.
- CSKA owe their place in the last 16 to their form on their travels, particularly a 2-1 matchday six win at Inter which took the Russian side from fourth to second place in Group B. In contrast they suffered home defeats by Inter and LOSC Lille Métropole but beat Trabzonspor AŞ 3-0.
- Madrid scored 19 goals in the group, conceding only two. Their goal remained unbreached in three away games, winning 1-0 at GNK Dinamo Zagreb, 2-0 at Olympique Lyonnais and 3-0 at AFC Ajax.
- Madrid became only the fifth side – after AC Milan (1992/93), Paris Saint-Germain FC (1994/95), FC Spartak Moskva (1995/96) and FC Barcelona (2002/03) – to win all six games in a UEFA Champions League group stage. Milan, in the final, and Spartak both lost in the next round; PSG won their two-legged quarter-final and Barcelona won their next three games in the second group stage.

Team ties

- Igor Akinfeev, Sergei Ignashevich plus Aleksei and Vasili Berezutski all played for Russia against a Spain team featuring Sergio Ramos, Xabi Alonso and Iker Casillas at UEFA EURO 2008. The teams met twice, Spain winning 4-1 in the opening group fixture and then 3-0 in the semi-finals en route to their final defeat of Germany.
- Cristiano Ronaldo and Ricardo Carvalho helped Portugal beat Russia 2-0 at UEFA EURO 2004 with Evgeni Aldonin on the losing team and Akinfeev an unused substitute.
- Ronaldo scored twice in Portugal's 7-1 FIFA World Cup qualifying defeat of Russia in Lisbon in October 2004. Carvalho, Ignashevich and Aldonin also started the game with Akinfeev remaining on the bench. All five players started the return in Moscow in September 2005 which ended scoreless, the Berezutski brothers also playing.
- Mourinho also met CSKA in the 2004/05 group stage, his first season at Chelsea FC. With Carvalho among their ranks, the London club won 2-0 at home and 1-0 away.
- In the six Spanish Liga games he played against Madrid, Mark González appeared on the winning side just once, scoring the decisive goal as Real Betis Balompié came from behind to win 2-1 at home in 2008. He also got the equaliser in Real Sociedad de Fútbol's 1-1 draw at the Santiago Bernabéu in 2006.
- Kaká played for Brazil in a friendly international against Russia in Moscow in March 2006 which the visitors won 1-0. Akinfeev, Ignashevich, Aldonin and the Berezutskis all appeared for the hosts.

Latest domestic information

- The Russian winter break started at the end of November and finishes on 3 March when second-placed CSKA face Premier-Liga leaders FC Zenit St Petersburg.

- The Premier-Liga has split in two for the second stage of this 18-month transitional championship, with the top eight playing each other twice – a process that began on 18 November. While past Russian seasons followed the calendar year, from 2012/13 the competition will run from summer to summer.

- CSKA returned to work on 10 January. They had training camps in Murcia (11-24 January) and Marbella (27 January to 10 February) in Spain – finishing fifth at the eight-team invitational Marbella Cup after losing to Chinese champions Guangzhou FC – and in Kadriye, Turkey (13-18 February).

Injury news

- Tomáš Necid (torn knee ligaments, out since 10 June) and Zoran Tošić (knee, 3 November) have returned to fitness.
- Viktor Vasin, yet to make his competitive debut after suffering a cruciate ligament injury following his arrival at CSKA at the start of 2011, was an unused substitute in each of the last eight games before the winter break.
- Igor Akinfeev (torn knee ligaments, out since 28 August), Keisuke Honda (knee, 18 November) and Mark González (hip, 30 April) all remain sidelined. Aleksandrs Cauņa underwent surgery on 19 January after breaking his toe.

Miscellaneous

- CSKA are expecting around 72,000 spectators for the visit of Madrid, which would be the club's record attendance at the Stadion Luzhniki. The previous highest crowd was 65,000 for the game against FC Spartak Moskva on 2 September 2007.
- Doumbia made group stage appearances against Sudan and Angola as Ivory Coast finished runners-up at the Africa Cup of Nations.
- Chidi Odiah's contract was terminated by mutual consent on 16 February.

- Madrid have conceded twice; the best defensive record in the competition. They have had 56 shots on goal and been caught offside 27 times, both more than any other side in the last 16 ahead of the first legs.

Latest domestic information

- **Saturday 18 February: Real Madrid CF 4-0 Real Racing Club (Ronaldo 6, Benzema 45+1 89, Di María 73)** Casillas; Ramos, Pepe (Carvalho 76), Varane, Marcelo; Özil (Di María 63), Granero (Khedira 71), Alonso, Kaká, Ronaldo; Benzema
- Ángel Di María scored on his first appearance of 2012 as José Mourinho's side, shorn of the suspended Álvaro Arbeloa, claimed an eighth successive Liga win. Racing had Domingo Cisma sent off on 39 minutes.
- Madrid have won 27 of their last 30 games in all competitions, finding the net in every match during that run.
- Karim Benzema has scored eight goals in 2012 to take his tally to 58 in all competitions since joining Madrid. That is seven more than the club's next highest French-born goalscorer, Zinédine Zidane.
- Cristiano Ronaldo has scored 41 times in 40 games for club and country this season. He has also converted 23 successive spot kicks for the club since failing against UD Almería on 5 December 2009.
- Ronaldo struck his 13th Liga hat-trick for Madrid, and sixth of the campaign, in a 4-2 home win against Levante UD on 12 February. It took him past Ferenc Puskás's tally of 12 for the club, but he has some distance to go to catch Alfredo Di Stéfano, who registered a record 22 league trebles for the Merengues.
- Madrid scored 67 goals in the first half of their Liga campaign, eclipsing the record set by FC Barcelona (61) last term. Ronaldo contributed 23, taking him past César Rodríguez's Liga record of 22 for Barcelona in 1950/51.
- Iker Casillas has moved to fourth in the list of all-time appearances for Madrid, overtaking Fernando Hierro (601 games) in the 3-1 win against Real Zaragoza on 28 January. Only Raúl González (741), Manuel Sanchís (711) and Santillana (645) now lie ahead of the goalkeeper.
- Madrid's club-record equalling run of 15 successive wins ended with a 3-1 home defeat by Barcelona on 10 December. They responded with a run of seven victories before another home loss to the Catalan giants (2-1) in the Copa del Rey quarter-final first leg; a 2-2 second-leg draw ended their cup defence.
- The 2-2 draw also halted Madrid's club record 11-match winning run away from home, though Mourinho's side remain undefeated on their travels for 14 games.

Injury news

- Di María (torn thigh, out since 30 December) and Marcelo (hamstring, 28 January) returned to action on Saturday, although the former has been ruled out of the CSKA trip with muscular bruising picked up against Racing.
- Lassana Diarra was a late withdrawal against Racing because of a back problem.
- Hamit Altintop has been sidelined with a torn calf since 8 February.
- Ricardo Carvalho made his first appearance since 27 September on 18 January after recovering from strained knee ligaments. Sami Khedira returned to action after a month out with an ankle injury on 12 February.

Head coach

Coaching career: FC Olimpia Volgograd, FC Uralan Elista, FC Moskva, PFC Krylya Sovetov Samara, PFC CSKA Moskva

- Started playing career as a goalkeeper with Volgograd regional team Zvezda Gorodishche, but suffered a severe injury after falling from a tree and was forced to hang up his gloves after just 13 matches.
- Began coaching career in youth football at Olimpia Volgograd. From 2002 to 2004 he worked at Uralan Elista where he was promoted to head coach following the club's top-flight relegation.
- Took the reins at Moskva reserves in 2004 and replaced Valeri Petrakov as the club's head coach the following summer. Under Slutski, Moskva finished fifth in 2005 and sixth in 2006 before attaining a record-high fourth position in 2007.
- After a spell at Krylya, guiding them into Europe, he signed a three-year contract with CSKA Moskva in October 2009, replacing Juande Ramos. That December he led CSKA to the UEFA Champions League knockout stages for the first time before quarter-final elimination by FC Internazionale Milano.
- Twelve months later CSKA's UEFA Europa League campaign was similarly ended by the eventual winners, FC Porto, but May brought consolation in the form of the Russian Cup – Slutski's first major trophy.

Real Madrid CF: José Mourinho

Coaching career: SL Benfica, UD Leiria, FC Porto, Chelsea FC, FC Internazionale Milano, Real Madrid CF

- A former teacher, Mourinho had spells working at Sporting Clube de Portugal, Porto and FC Barcelona as a coaching assistant in the 1990s.
- As coach, had a brief, nine-game stay at Benfica and a highly successful tenure at Leiria before really making his mark after his arrival at Porto in January 2002. In his first full season, 2002/03, Porto won the UEFA Cup and a domestic double. The next year they retained their league title and claimed the UEFA Champions League with a 3-0 defeat of AS Monaco FC in Gelsenkirchen.
- Joined Chelsea in 2004 and led the club to the League Cup and their first league championship for 50 years in his first season. Followed up with the league title again in 2006, and both the League Cup and FA Cup in 2007.
- Left Chelsea in September 2007 and stayed out of football until joining Inter in June 2008. In his first campaign the Nerazzurri retained their Serie A crown, a feat they repeated in 2009/10 when they also added the Coppa Italia and the UEFA Champions League crown, their first European Cup win since 1965.
- Victory at the Santiago Bernabéu was Mourinho's last act as Inter coach before joining Madrid on a four-year deal. His first season featured the club's first Copa del Rey victory in 18 years and a UEFA Champions League semi-final appearance.

- Björn Kuipers is following in the family trade as he continues to work his way up the refereeing ladder, with his father having also acted as an official in the Netherlands.
- Kuipers Jr earned his FIFA badge aged 33, in 2006 – the year he took charge of the UEFA European Under-17 Championship final between the Czech Republic and Russia. He stepped up to work as a fourth official in both the UEFA Champions League and UEFA Cup during the season that followed.
- A fourth official for four matches at the 2007 UEFA European Under-21 Championship, Kuipers – who lives in the Dutch town of Oldenzaal with his wife and daughter, works as a supermarket director and counts mountain biking among his hobbies – held the same role in five qualifying games for UEFA EURO 2008.
- He was appointed as referee for four 2008/09 UEFA Cup fixtures, and was back at the U21 tournament as a referee in 2009, taking charge of four matches in Sweden including Germany's 4-0 final defeat of England.
- Became a UEFA Champions League regular the following season, overseeing five matches in the competition proper finishing with the round of 16 first leg between VfB Stuttgart and holders FC Barcelona. Continued his rise in 2010/11, overseeing the UEFA Europa League semi-final first leg involving FC Porto and Villarreal CF, and started the following season by taking charge of the UEFA Super Cup in Monaco.

Competition facts

UEFA Champions League knockout stage: Did you know?

- Teams have recovered from a first-leg deficit to go through on 24 occasions although only twice – AFC Ajax's defeat of Panathinaikos FC in the 1995/96 semi-finals and FC Internazionale Milano's win against FC Bayern München in the 2010/11 round of 16 – has a side progressed after a home first-leg loss. The biggest losing margin a side has overturned was achieved by RC Deportivo La Coruña in the 2003/04 quarter-finals when they lost 4-1 at AC Milan but won 4-0 at home.
- Twenty ties have been decided on the away goals rule, including six where the triumphant team lost the first leg.
- FC Bayern München hold the record for the biggest first-leg lead with a 5-0 success at Sporting Clube de Portugal in the 2008/09 first knockout round, eventually going through 12-1 after a 7-1 home victory in the second leg. Those two games also featured more goals (13) over its two legs than any previous UEFA Champions League knockout tie.
- Ten ties have gone to penalties, including the game between Arsenal FC and AS Roma in the 2008/09 round of 16. Five of these were finals – 1996, 2001, 2003, 2005 and 2008. The first two-legged tie decided on spot-kicks was PSV Eindhoven's 4-2 win against Olympique Lyonnais on 13 April 2005 after a 2-2 aggregate draw.
- In all, 17 ties have required extra time. So far seven have been decided by extra time alone: four quarter-finals, two first knockout round encounters and the 2007/08 semi-final between Chelsea FC and Liverpool FC.
- There has never been a knockout tie ending goalless after two legs. Ten have finished 1-0 on aggregate, most recently Tottenham Hotspur FC's narrow victory against AC Milan in the 2010/11 round of 16.
- Clarence Seedorf is the only player to win the European Cup with three clubs (AFC Ajax 1995, Real Madrid CF 1998, AC Milan 2003, 2007). Liverpool's Bob Paisley (1977, 1978, 1981) is the only coach to win three times.
- Ottmar Hitzfeld (Borussia Dortmund 1997, Bayern 2001), Ernst Happel (Feyenoord 1970, Hamburger SV 1983) and José Mourinho (FC Porto 2004, FC Internazionale Milano 2010) are the only coaches to win the trophy with two clubs.
- No team has successfully defended the UEFA Champions League trophy with AC Milan (1989, 1990) the last club to win consecutive European Champion Clubs' Cups. Milan (1994, 1995), AFC Ajax (1995, 1996), Juventus (1996, 1997) and Manchester United (2008, 2009) have all returned to the final as holders only to lose.
- Only two teams have ever won the UEFA Champions League on home soil: Borussia Dortmund (1997, final in Munich) and Juventus (1996, final in Rome), while Manchester United FC lost the 2011 final in London. Five teams won Champion Clubs' Cup finals on home soil: Real Madrid CF (1957), FC Internazionale Milano (1965), Manchester United FC (1968), AFC Ajax (1972) and Liverpool FC (1978), while Stade de Reims Champagne (1956), AS Roma (1984) and FC Barcelona (1986) all lost finals in their own country.

UEFA Champions League: Did you know?

- S.S. Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta is the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League having been aged 43 years 252 days when he featured against Real Madrid CF on Matchday 6 of the 2007/08 edition.
- Ryan Giggs is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 37 years and 148 days, in Manchester United's 2-0 win at FC Schalke 04 on 26 April 2011.
- Celestine Babayaro is the youngest player to have appeared. He was 16 years and 87 days when he started for RSC Anderlecht against FC Steaua Bucureşti on 23 November 1994. He was sent off in the 37th minute.
