## Match background

---

Real Madrid CF won all six of their group games and looked on course for a seventh victory in the first leg of their round of 16 tie at PFC CSKA Moskva only to be pegged back at the last.

- Cristiano Ronaldo's 28th-minute strike in Moscow gave Madrid the lead, but CSKA debutant Pontus Wernbloom levelled with the final kick of the game to stretch the Russian side's unbeaten record against Spanish sides to six games, home and away.
- At this stage two years ago CSKA put out another Spanish team, Sevilla FC, with a 2-1 away win thanks to goals from Tomáš Necid and Keisuke Honda. The home game had again ended 1-1, Mark González scoring CSKA's equaliser.

### Match background

- Ahead of the first meeting between these teams on Spanish soil, Madrid have lost just one of the nine home fixtures against Russian opponents, going down 3-1 to FC Spartak Moskva in the 1990/91 European Champion Clubs' Cup quarter-final. They won seven of the other eight games.
- José Mourinho's team scored 13 goals in winning all their home matches in Group D, conceding only two, and became only the fifth side to win all six games in a UEFA Champions League group stage.
- Madrid have won all but one of the 21 previous UEFA competition ties in which they earned a first-leg away draw; the sole blemish came in that 1990/91 tie with Spartak, when they drew 0-0 away.
- The Spanish side have therefore won all nine of the ties in which they drew 1-1 away in the first leg, most recently against Olympique Lyonnais in last season's round of 16.
- Mourinho's FC Internazionale Milano team prevailed 1-0 home and away against CSKA in their 2009/10 quarter-final on their way to lifting the trophy. It was the furthest the Moscow club have progressed in the competition.
- Before the Sevilla game CSKA had only faced two opponents from Spain, beating RC Deportivo La Coruña 3-0 in the 2008/09 UEFA Cup group stage in Moscow. One of their most memorable results came in their first visit to Spain in the 1992/93 UEFA Champions League second round, six months after FC Barcelona had lifted the trophy for the first time, when CSKA beat them 3-2 at the Camp Nou for a 4-3 aggregate win.
- The 2004/05 UEFA Cup winners owed their place in the last 16 to their form on their travels, particularly a 2-1 matchday six win at Inter which took CSKA from last to second place in Group B. They drew at LOSC Lille Métropole (2-2) and Trabzonspor AŞ (0-0).
- Those triumphs against Barcelona and Sevilla are the only times CSKA have drawn at home in the first leg of a UEFA competition tie and gone through to the next stage; they lost the other three ties.

### Team ties

- Igor Akinfeev, Sergei Ignashevich and Vasili Berezutski all played for Russia against a Spain team featuring Sergio Ramos, Xabi Alonso and Iker Casillas at UEFA EURO 2008. Spain won 4-1 in the opening group fixture and then 3-0 in the semi-finals.
- Ronaldo and Ricardo Carvalho helped Portugal beat Russia 2-0 at UEFA EURO 2004 with Evgeni Aldonin on the losing team.
- Ronaldo scored twice in a 7-1 FIFA World Cup qualifying defeat of Russia in Lisbon in October 2004. Carvalho, Ignashevich and Aldonin all started; all four started the return in Moscow in September 2005 which ended 0-0, Akinfeev and the Berezutski brothers also playing.
- Mourinho met CSKA in the 2004/05 group stage, his first season at Chelsea FC. The London club, including Carvalho, won 2-0 at home and 1-0 away.
- In six Liga encounters against Madrid, González appeared on the winning side just once, scoring the decisive goal as Real Betis Balompíe came from behind to win 2-1 at home in 2008. He also got Real Sociedad de Fútbol's equaliser in a 1-1 draw at the Santiago Bernabéu in 2006.
- Kaká played for Brazil in a friendly international against Russia in Moscow in March 2006 which the visitors won 1-0. Akinfeev, Ignashevich, Aldonin and the Berezutskis all appeared for the hosts.

- Madrid have conceded three goals, the best defensive record in the competition. They have had 63 shots on goal and been caught offside 33 times, both more than any other side in the last 16 going into the first legs.
- Xabi Alonso's next yellow card will incur a suspension.

#### Latest domestic information

- Madrid recorded a tenth successive away victory in the Liga at the Estadio Benito Villamarín, establishing a new club record. The previous best of nine consecutive away wins was set in 2009/10.
- Cristiano Ronaldo took his tally to 46 goals in 45 games for club and country this season as José Mourinho's side claimed an 11th successive Liga win.
- Madrid have won 30 of their last 34 games in all competitions, finding the net in every match during that run.
- Ronaldo has scored in each of Madrid's last six games, nine goals in all. He has also converted 23 successive spot kicks for the club since failing against UD Almería on 5 December 2009.
- Ronaldo has struck 13 Liga hat-tricks for Madrid – six this season. That is one more than Ferenc Puskás's tally for the club, but he has some distance to go to match the record of Alfredo Di Stéfano (22).
- Sami Khedira scored his first Liga goal in 42 attempts on 4 March as Madrid beat RCD Espanyol 5-0; Los Merengues' fifth successive home win in all competitions.
- Madrid scored 67 goals in the first half of their Liga campaign, eclipsing the record set by FC Barcelona (61) last term. Ronaldo contributed 23, taking him past César Rodríguez's Liga record of 22 for Barcelona in 1950/51.
- Iker Casillas has moved to fourth in the list of all-time appearances for Madrid, overtaking Fernando Hierro (601 games) in the 3-1 win against Real Zaragoza on 28 January. Only Raúl González (741), Manuel Sanchís (711) and Santillana (645) now lie ahead of the goalkeeper, who has now played 609 times for the club.
- Madrid claimed a club record of 11 successive away wins before a 2-2 Copa del Rey draw with Barcelona on 25 January – having lost the quarter-final first-leg 2-1, the result ended Mourinho's side's defence.

#### Injury news

- Karim Benzema, out since the first leg at CSKA on 21 February having come off early in the first half with an adductor problem, was a late substitute on Saturday.
- Lassana Diarra, who missed the first leg with a back injury, has been an unused substitute for Madrid's last two games.
- Fábio Coentrão has been out since tearing his adductors playing in Portugal's 0-0 draw with Poland on 29 February, a game in which he was replaced midway through the first half.
- Ángel Di María has not featured since 18 February, when his comeback from a thigh injury that had kept him out since 30 December was cut short by a relapse.
- Hamit Altıntop has been absent with a torn calf since 8 February.

- CSKA, without the suspended Alan Dzagoev, were left without a win in five league games after an equaliser from their former midfielder, Igor Semshov.
- Seydou Doumbia's goal was his first in eight outings for club and country in 2012; last year he scored 34 goals in 43 games.
- Leonid Slutski's side have won just six of their last 24 outings in all competitions.
- The Army Men resumed their domestic campaign after a three-month winter break on 3 March, twice coming from behind to earn a 2-2 draw with Premier-Liga leaders FC Zenit St Petersburg. Ahmed Musa marked his first league appearance for the club with a goal; his 90th-minute replacement, Kim In-Sung, made his CSKA debut.
- The Premier-Liga has split in two for the second stage of this 18-month transitional championship, with the top eight playing each other twice – a process that began on 18 November. While past Russian seasons followed the calendar year, from 2012/13 the competition will run from summer to summer.
- CSKA have lost just two of their last 23 away games in all competitions, winning ten and drawing 11.

### **Injury news**

- Keisuke Honda's appearance in the first leg against Madrid was only his second since August because of a knee problem. He suffered a thigh injury during the Zenit draw but started on Friday, setting up Doumbia's goal.
- Aleksandrs Cauņa was an unused substitute on Friday, returning to the fray after breaking his toe in January.
- Igor Akinfeev (torn knee ligaments, out since 28 August) and Mark González (hip, 30 April) remain sidelined.

- A crowd of 70,000 watched the first leg against Madrid; the club's record attendance at the Stadion Luzhniki.
- Doumbia made two group stage appearances as Ivory Coast finished runners-up at the Africa Cup of Nations.

## Head coach

---

### Real Madrid CF: José Mourinho

**Date of birth:** 26 January 1963

**Nationality:** Portuguese

**Coaching career:** SL Benfica, UD Leiria, FC Porto, Chelsea FC, FC Internazionale Milano, Real Madrid CF

- A former teacher, Mourinho had spells working at Sporting Clube de Portugal, Porto and FC Barcelona as a coaching assistant in the 1990s.
- As coach, had a brief, nine-game stay at Benfica and a highly successful tenure at Leiria before really making his mark after his arrival at Porto in January 2002. In his first full season, 2002/03, Porto won the UEFA Cup and a domestic double. The next year they retained their league title and claimed the UEFA Champions League with a 3-0 defeat of AS Monaco FC in Gelsenkirchen.
- Joined Chelsea in 2004 and led the club to the League Cup and their first league championship for 50 years in his first season. Followed up with the league title again in 2006, and both the League Cup and FA Cup in 2007.
- Left Chelsea in September 2007 and stayed out of football until joining Inter in June 2008. In his first campaign the Nerazzurri retained their Serie A crown, a feat they repeated in 2009/10 when they also added the Coppa Italia and the UEFA Champions League crown, their first European Cup win since 1965.
- Victory at the Santiago Bernabéu was Mourinho's last act as Inter coach before joining Madrid on a four-year deal. His first season featured the club's first Copa del Rey victory in 18 years and a UEFA Champions League semi-final appearance.

- Started playing career as a goalkeeper with Volgograd regional team Zvezda Gorodishche, but suffered a severe injury after falling from a tree and was forced to hang up his gloves after just 13 matches.
- Began coaching career in youth football at Olimpia Volgograd. From 2002 to 2004 he worked at Uralan Elista where he was promoted to head coach following the club's top-flight relegation.
- Took the reins at Moskva reserves in 2004 and replaced Valeri Petrakov as the club's head coach the following summer. Under Slutski, Moskva finished fifth in 2005 and sixth in 2006 before attaining a record-high fourth position in 2007.
- After a spell at Krylya, guiding them into Europe, he signed a three-year contract with CSKA Moskva in October 2009, replacing Juande Ramos. That December he led CSKA to the UEFA Champions League knockout stages for the first time before quarter-final elimination by FC Internazionale Milano.
- Twelve months later CSKA's UEFA Europa League campaign was similarly ended by the eventual winners, FC Porto, but May brought consolation in the form of the Russian Cup – Slutski's first major trophy.

## Competition facts

---

### UEFA Champions League knockout stage: Did you know?

- Teams have recovered from a first-leg deficit to go through on 26 occasions, including SL Benfica and APOEL FC in this season's round of 16, although only twice – AFC Ajax's defeat of Panathinaikos FC in the 1995/96 semi-finals and FC Internazionale Milano's win against FC Bayern München in the 2010/11 round of 16 – has a side progressed after a home first-leg loss. The biggest losing margin a side has overturned was achieved by RC Deportivo La Coruña in the 2003/04 quarter-finals when they lost 4-1 at AC Milan but won 4-0 at home.
- Twenty ties have been decided on the away goals rule, including six where the triumphant team lost the first leg.
- FC Bayern München hold the record for the biggest first-leg lead with a 5-0 success at Sporting Clube de Portugal in the 2008/09 first knockout round, eventually going through 12-1 after a 7-1 home victory in the second leg. Those two games also featured more goals (13) over its two legs than any previous UEFA Champions League knockout tie.
- Eleven ties have gone to penalties, including the game between APOEL FC and Olympique Lyonnais in the 2011/12 round of 16. Five of these were finals – 1996, 2001, 2003, 2005 and 2008. The first two-legged tie decided on spot kicks was PSV Eindhoven's 4-2 win against Lyon on 13 April 2005 after a 2-2 aggregate draw.
- In all, 18 ties have required extra time. Seven have been decided by extra time alone: four quarter-finals, two round of 16 encounters and the 2007/08 semi-final between Chelsea FC and Liverpool FC.
- There has never been a knockout tie ending goalless after two legs. Ten have finished 1-0 on aggregate, most recently Tottenham Hotspur FC's narrow victory against AC Milan in the 2010/11 round of 16.
- Clarence Seedorf is the only player to win the European Cup with three clubs (AFC Ajax 1995, Real Madrid CF 1998, AC Milan 2003, 2007). Liverpool's Bob Paisley (1977, 1978, 1981) is the only coach to win three times.
- Ottmar Hitzfeld (Borussia Dortmund 1997, Bayern 2001), Ernst Happel (Feyenoord 1970, Hamburger SV 1983) and José Mourinho (FC Porto 2004, FC Internazionale Milano 2010) are the only coaches to win the trophy with two clubs.
- No team has successfully defended the UEFA Champions League trophy with AC Milan (1989, 1990) the last club to win consecutive European Champion Clubs' Cups. Milan (1994, 1995), AFC Ajax (1995, 1996), Juventus (1996, 1997) and Manchester United (2008, 2009) have all returned to the final as holders only to lose.
- Only two teams have ever won the UEFA Champions League on home soil: Borussia Dortmund (1997, final in Munich) and Juventus (1996, final in Rome), while Manchester United FC lost the 2011 final in London. Five teams won Champion Clubs' Cup finals on home soil: Real Madrid CF (1957), FC Internazionale Milano (1965), Manchester United FC (1968), AFC Ajax (1972) and Liverpool FC (1978), while Stade de Reims Champagne (1956), AS Roma (1984) and FC Barcelona (1986) all lost finals in their own country.

### UEFA Champions League: Did you know?

- Lionel Messi became the first player to score five goals in a UEFA Champions League match in FC Barcelona's 7-1 win against Bayer 04 Leverkusen on 7 March 2012. Seven players, including Messi, had previously scored four times in a game, most recently Olympique Lyonnais' Bafétimbi Gomis on matchday six this season.
- S.S. Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta is the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League having been aged 43 years 252 days when he featured against Real Madrid CF on matchday six of the 2007/08 edition.
- Ryan Giggs is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 37 years and 148 days, in Manchester United's 2-0 win at FC Schalke 04 on 26 April 2011.
- Celestine Babayaro is the youngest player to have appeared. He was 16 years and 87 days when he started for RSC Anderlecht against FC Steaua Bucureşti on 23 November 1994. He was sent off in the 37th minute.
