Match background

Paris Saint-Germain and FC Barcelona meet for a third knockout contest in five seasons, with the French club looking to come out on top this time after defeat in the previous two.

Previous meetings

- The sides faced each other four times in 2014/15. In the group stage, Paris recorded a memorable 3-2 home victory with goals from David Luiz, Marco Verratti and Blaise Matuidi; Lionel Messi and Neymar found the net for Barcelona.
- The line-ups at the Parc des Princes on 30 September 2014 were:
Paris: Sirigu, Van der Wiel, Marquinhos, David Luiz, Maxwell, Verratti (Cabaye 71), Thiago Motta, Matuidi, Lucas (Bahebeck 90), Pastore (Chantôme 86), Cavani.
Barcelona: Ter Stegen, Alves (Sandro Ramírez 83), Mascherano, Mathieu, Alba, Rakitić (Xavi 69), Busquets, Iniesta, Pedro (El Haddadi 62), Messi, Neymar.
- When the teams met again on matchday six, the Catalan club secured top spot in Group F with a 3-1 home win, recovering from Zlatan Ibrahimović's opener thanks to Messi, Neymar and Luis Suárez.
- The sides were drawn together again in the quarter-finals when a 3-1 triumph at the Parc des Princes set up Barcelona's aggregate success. Neymar and two from Suárez did the damage; a Jérémy Mathieu own goal was all Paris managed.

- In Spain, two Neymar goals inside the first 34 minutes made sure for Barça.
- In the 2012/13 quarter-finals Barcelona beat Paris on away goals after two draws – 2-2 at Parc des Princes, 1-1 at the Camp Nou.
- The line-ups in Paris on 2 April 2013 were:

- The 1994/95 quarter-final went Paris's way, 3-2 on aggregate. A 1-1 draw in Spain was followed by a 2-1 home victory at the Parc des Princes, Raí and Vincent Guérin scoring in the last 18 minutes.
- Barça have won the last three fixtures between the clubs; before that they had triumphed in just one of six games, with three drawn. That success came in the 1997 UEFA Cup Winners' Cup final, with Ronaldo getting the only goal in Rotterdam. Luis Enrique played for Barcelona.

Match background

Paris

- The French champions have lost in the quarter-finals for the last four seasons. Last year Manchester City FC edged them out, a 2-2 draw in Paris setting the Premier League side up for a 3-2 aggregate success.
- The defeat by Barcelona in 2014/15 was only Paris's second in 13 matches against Spanish visitors. Their previous loss was 3-1 against RC Deportivo La Coruña in the 2000/01 second group stage.
- That Barça reverse was also their sole defeat in a run of 42 European home games since crashing 4-2 to Hapoel Tel-Aviv FC in the 2006/07 UEFA Cup group stage (W26 D15). They picked up five points at home in this season's group stage (W1 D2).
- Paris's home record against Spanish visitors reads W6 D5 L2; overall it is W10 D7 L9. They are without a win in the last five such encounters, home and away.

Barcelona

- The Blaugrana's record away to French sides is W4 D3 L3; overall it is W12 D5 L4. They have won two matches and drawn three on their last six visits to France.
- Luis Enrique's team clinched their 13th successive participation in the UEFA Champions League knockout phase by finishing top of Group C with a six-point advantage over Manchester City. They have reached the knockouts on their last 15 participations in the competition.

- Barcelona are aiming to reach the quarter-finals for a record tenth consecutive season. Last term they bowed out at that stage when they lost to Club Atlético de Madrid (2-1 h, 0-2 a). In the round of 16 they had beaten Arsenal FC 5-1 on aggregate (2-0 a, 3-1 h).

Coach and player links

- Lucas Digne was at Paris between 2013 and 2015, making 30 Ligue 1 appearances.
- As coach of UD Almería, Valencia CF and Sevilla FC, Unai Emery faced Barcelona 23 times in all competitions, losing 16, drawing six and winning only once: 2-1 with Sevilla in last season's Liga.
- Luis Enrique was in the Real Madrid CF side eliminated by Paris in both the 1992/93 UEFA Cup quarter-finals (3-1 h, 1-4 a) and the 1993/94 European Cup Winners' Cup quarter-finals (0-1 h, 1-1 a).
- Thiago Motta came through the Barcelona academy and made 96 Liga outings, scoring six goals. He claimed two Spanish titles and was an unused substitute for their 2006 UEFA Champions League final win against Arsenal.
- Maxwell played 57 Liga games for Barcelona (2009–12) and landed two league titles.
- Thiago Silva headed AC Milan's added-time equaliser in a 2-2 group stage draw at Barcelona in September 2011.
- Neymar, playing alongside Thiago Silva, scored in Brazil's 3-1 victory over Matuidi's France in a 2015 friendly.
- Alphonse Areola spent last season on loan at Villarreal and played in a 3-0 reverse to Barça in which Neymar struck twice and Suárez once.
- Ángel Di María played 16 times for Real Madrid against Barça between 2010 and 2014 (W5 D4 L7). He scored in a 2-1 win in the 2014 Copa del Rey final, and a 3-2 triumph in the 2012 Spanish Super Cup.
- Grzegorz Krychowiak played for Sevilla between 2014 and 2016, facing Barcelona five times (W1 D1 L3).
- Julian Draxler played against Marc-Andre ter Stegen six times for FC Schalke 04 in the Bundesliga (W2 D1 L3). He scored past his compatriot twice in the league and again in Schalke's 3-1 German Cup defeat on 21 December 2011.

Match facts

Paris

- Marquinhos is a booking away from a suspension; Thiago Motta serves a one-match ban.
- Paris have won 11 of their 14 games in all competitions, drawing two of them, since matchday six.
- Holders Paris will take on AS Monaco FC in the French League Cup final on 1 April.
- Emery's team have also made progress in the French Cup in 2017, defeating SC Bastia (7-0) and Stade Rennais FC (4-0). Paris will visit Ligue 2 side Chamois Niortais FC in the round of 16 on 1 March.
- Cavani moved above Pauleta into second place behind Zlatan Ibrahimović (156 goals) on Paris's all-time top scorers' list when he registered his 110th goal for the club, from the spot, in the 1-1 draw against Monaco on 29 January. He now has 114 goals.
- Draxler has scored four goals since joining Paris from VfL Wolfsburg on 3 January.

Barcelona

- Barcelona have lost just one of their last 22 matches in all competitions.
- Barça reached the final of the Copa del Rey, where they will play CD Alavés, for the fourth successive season by defeating Atlético 3-2 on aggregate in the last four.
- Suárez was on target against Atlético in the second leg of their Copa del Rey tie on 7 February but will miss the final along with Sergi Roberto after being sent off.
- When Suárez scores, Barcelona do not lose. The Uruguayan international has found the net in 70 matches out of the 128 he has featured in for the Blaugrana with a record of 65 wins and five draws.

- Aleix Vidal suffered a dislocated ankle during the 6-0 of Deportivo Alavés on Saturday which has ruled him out for the rest of the season.
- Mascherano injured his left hamstring in the second leg against Atlético and is expected to be out until the end of February.
- Rafinha is doubtful after breaking his nose versus Athletic Club on 4 February.

UEFA makes new donation of €100,000 to ICRC

UEFA will mark a decade of helping Afghan landmine victims on Wednesday, when Real Madrid defender Sergio Ramos presents a cheque for €100,000 to the International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC).

"I would like to pay tribute to the ICRC, who have been working relentlessly to help landmine victims, many of whom are children. Their programme in Afghanistan, which has been in place for several years, shows that football can offer real hope in challenging times," said UEFA President Aleksander Čeferin.

"I am glad that UEFA can help this cause, and that the sport we love can have a positive impact on the rehabilitation process of so many people in this troubled region," he added.

The donation supports the ICRC's physical rehabilitation programme for landmine victims and other people with disabilities in Afghanistan – providing artificial limbs, physiotherapy, vocational training and access to the rehabilitation centre's football team. About a third of patients are children.

Sergio Ramos will present the donation before his side's UEFA Champions League round of 16 first leg match against Napoli at the Santiago Bernabéu in Madrid on 15 February.

"The people benefiting from the ICRC programme in Afghanistan are an inspiration to us, as they set an example of how to approach life in a positive manner despite the problems that they face," the Real Madrid captain said.

Sergio Ramos was chosen to hand over the cheque after receiving the most votes in UEFA.com's Team of the Year, which was published in January, and added that it is "a privilege" to be "a source of motivation" to so many people.

"They don't stop dreaming, and they fight to make their dreams come true. As key figures in this sport, it's a true privilege for us footballers to be a source of motivation in their day-to-day lives, and to help them out," he said.

Over the course of a partnership lasting almost 20 years, UEFA has donated in excess of €3.5m to the ICRC to help disadvantaged people around the globe. Meanwhile, over 7 million votes were cast in selecting the UEFA.com users' Team of the Year 2016. More information on the award is available online at en.toty.uefa.com.

Coaching career: Lorca Deportiva CF, UD Almería, Valencia CF, FC Spartak Moskva, Sevilla FC, Paris Saint-Germain

- The son and grandson of famous goalkeepers, Unai Emery took his first steps as a footballer in the youth ranks at Real Sociedad, where he played as a left-sided midfielder. Failed to reach the first team but carved out a career in the lower leagues with Toledo, Ferrol, Leganés and Lorca before being forced to retire at 33 having suffered a knee injury.
- He was immediately offered the chance to coach Lorca – the club with whom he had ended his playing career – and took them up to the second division in his first season in charge, 2004/05. After coming close to taking Lorca into the Spanish top flight the following season, was appointed by Almería ahead of 2006/07 and duly won promotion to the Liga.
- Almería shone among the Spanish elite, finishing the season in eighth place while their manager's reputation soared, earning him a call to replace Ronald Koeman at Valencia, whom he guided to third place in the Liga in both 2009/10 and 2010/11.
- Repeated the third-place finish in 2011/12 but stepped down at the end of the campaign, agreeing a two-year contract to take charge of Spartak in May 2012 but lasted only till that November.
- Swiftly returned to Spain, and Sevilla, who he led to the 2013/14 UEFA Europa League final victory against SL Benfica via a semi-final defeat of Valencia. Repeated the trick a year later, Sevilla seeing off FC Dnipro Dnipropetrovsk in Warsaw to retain the trophy, before an unprecedented hat-trick with 2016's defeat of Liverpool FC in Basel. That was Emery's last hurrah at Sevilla; he left to join Paris on a two-year deal that June.

Luis Enrique

Date of birth: 8 May 1970

Playing career: Real Sporting de Gijón, Real Madrid CF, FC Barcelona

Coaching career: FC Barcelona B, AS Roma, RC Celta de Vigo, FC Barcelona

- Known for his versatility, Luis Enrique spent the bulk of his playing career with Spain's two most successful clubs having started out at hometown side Sporting Gijón.
- Won the Liga and Copa del Rey with Madrid and Barcelona – whom he surprisingly joined on a free transfer from the Merengues in 1996 – and the UEFA Cup Winners' Cup and UEFA Super Cup at the Camp Nou, where he played under, among others, Sir Bobby Robson, Louis van Gaal and Frank Rijkaard.
- A scorer of 12 goals in 57 appearances for Spain and an Olympic gold medallist on home soil in 1992, Enrique moved into coaching with Barcelona B in 2008, succeeding his former Azulgrana team-mate Josep Guardiola.
- Appointed coach of Roma in June 2011 but held the post for just one season after a disappointing campaign. Resurfaced at Celta in summer 2013, leading the Galician side to a ninth-place finish in the Liga in his only season in charge.
- Left in May 2014 and was soon announced as Gerardo Martino's replacement at Barcelona on a two-year contract. After a challenging first half of the season, 17 wins from 19 league games helped secured a Liga title with the Copa del Rey and UEFA Champions League following as Luis Enrique emulated Guardiola in winning the treble in his first season in charge, adding another league and cup double in 2015/16.

Competition facts

UEFA Champions League knockout stage: Did you know?

- Teams have overturned a first-leg deficit to go through 36 times, including Real Madrid CF and Club Atlético de Madrid in the 2015/16 quarter-finals. Only twice – AFC Ajax's defeat of Panathinaikos FC in the 1995/96 semi-finals and FC Internazionale Milano's victory against Bayern in the 2010/11 round of 16 – has a side progressed after a home first-leg loss.
- The biggest losing margin a side has overhauled was achieved by RC Deportivo La Coruña in the 2003/04 quarter-finals when they went down 4-1 at AC Milan but won 4-0 at home.
- Twenty-seven ties have been decided on away goals, including eight where the triumphant team lost the first leg.
- In all, 27 ties have required extra time. Eleven have been settled by extra time alone: four quarter-finals, five round of 16 encounters – including Bayern-Juventus in 2015/16 – the 2007/08 semi-final between Chelsea and Liverpool FC, and the 2013/14 final.
- Sixteen ties have gone to penalties, including seven finals – 1996, 2001, 2003, 2005, 2008, 2012 and 2016. The first two-legged tie decided on spot kicks was PSV Eindhoven's 4-2 victory over Olympique Lyonnais on 13 April 2005 after a 2-2 aggregate draw.
- The 2015/16 round of 16 tie between Club Atlético de Madrid and PSV was the first to finish goalless after two legs. Thirteen have finished 1-0 on aggregate, most recently Real Madrid CF's defeat of Manchester City FC in the 2015/16 semi-finals.
- Real Madrid won 6-1 at FC Schalke 04 in the 2013/14 round of 16, equalling the knockout phase record for the biggest first-leg lead – Bayern's 5-0 success at Sporting Clube de Portugal in the 2008/09 round of 16. Bayern eventually went through 12-1 after a 7-1 stroll in the home second leg; that tie also featured more goals (13) over its two legs than any UEFA Champions League knockout tie.
- Bayern hold the record for the largest margin of victory in a UEFA Champions League knockout match having beaten both FC Basel 1893 (2011/12) and FC Shakhtar Donetsk (2014/15) 7-0 in the round of 16 second leg.
- Clarence Seedorf is the only player to lift the European Cup with three clubs (Ajax 1995, Real Madrid 1998, Milan 2003, 2007). Bob Paisley (Liverpool 1977, 1978, 1981) was the first coach to win three times, a feat Carlo Ancelotti (Milan 2003, 2007, Real Madrid 2014) replicated.
- In 2014 Ancelotti also became the fifth coach to win the trophy with two clubs; Ottmar Hitzfeld (Borussia Dortmund 1997, Bayern 2001), Ernst Happel (Feyenoord 1970, Hamburger SV 1983), José Mourinho (FC Porto 2004, Internazionale 2010) and Jupp Heynckes (Real Madrid 1998, Bayern 2013) had previously achieved the feat.
- No team has successfully defended the UEFA Champions League trophy, with Milan (1989, 1990) the last club to pick up consecutive European Champion Clubs' Cups. Milan (1994, 1995), Ajax (1995, 1996), Juventus (1996, 1997) and Manchester United FC (2008, 2009) have all returned to the final as holders only to lose.
- Only two sides have ever won the UEFA Champions League on home soil: Dortmund (1997, final in Munich) and Juventus (1996, final in Rome). Manchester United lost the 2011 final in London and 12 months later Bayern were beaten in the showpiece in their own stadium, the Fußball Arena München.

UEFA Champions League: Did you know?

- Lionel Messi became the first player to score five goals in a match in FC Barcelona's 7-1 triumph against Bayer 04 Leverkusen on 7 March 2012, a feat reproduced by FC Shakhtar Donetsk's Luiz Adriano at FC BATE Borisov on 21 October 2014. Eleven more players, also including Messi, have scored four times in a game, most recently Cristiano Ronaldo for Real Madrid on matchday six in 2015/16.
- Cristiano Ronaldo set a new record for a UEFA Champions League stage with 11 goals in 2015/16, eclipsing his own mark of nine goals in 2013/14, which Luiz Adriano matched in 2014/15. Lionel Messi got ten goals in 2016/17; Zlatan Ibrahimović (2013/14), Ruud van Nistelrooy (2004/05), Filippo Inzaghi and Hernán Crespo (both 2002/03) managed eight.
- Messi's hat-trick on matchday three of the 2016/17 competition was his seventh in the competition – two more than Ronaldo.
- SS Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta is the oldest player to compete at this level, having been aged 43 years and 252 days when he figured against Madrid on matchday six of the 2007/08 edition.
- Francesco Totti is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 38 years and 59 days, in AS Roma's 1-1 draw at PFC CSKA Moskva on 25 November 2014. Ryan Giggs (37 years and 290 days) was the previous record holder.

- Celestine Babayaro is the youngest player to have appeared – he was 16 years and 87 days when he started for RSC Anderlecht against FC Steaua Bucureşti on 23 November 1994. He was sent off in the 37th minute.
- Peter Ofori-Quaye is the youngest player to have scored, aged 17 years and 195 days, in Olympiacos FC's 5-1 reverse at Rosenborg BK on 1 October 1997.
