## Match background

Two of European football's most illustrious names come together as Ajax – in the UEFA Champions League quarter-finals for the first time in 16 years – welcome Juventus to Amsterdam.

- Both teams produced memorable second-leg comebacks in the round of 16. Ajax overturned a 2-1 home defeat by Real Madrid to oust the holders with a remarkable 4-1 success at the Santiago Bernabéu and reach their first quarter-final since 2002/03; Juve, meanwhile, were in trouble after a 2-0 first-leg loss at Atlético Madrid but recovered with a 3-0 victory back in Turin thanks to Cristiano Ronaldo's hat-trick.
- While Juve are looking to reach a third semi-final in five seasons, Ajax have not made it to the last four since 1996/97, when their campaign was ended by Juve – the team who had also beaten them in the previous season's final.

### Previous meetings

- Ajax have won only two of their 12 European fixtures against Juventus, and none since 1974. Juve are unbeaten in their last nine games against the Dutch club, winning five of the last six.
- The teams have met in two European Cup finals; Ajax beat Juve 1-0 in Belgrade in 1973 thanks to Johnny Rep's early goal, but Juve turned the tables in Rome 23 years later. Fabrizio Ravanelli gave Juve an early lead but Jari Litmanen levelled before the break for Ajax, who were bidding to become the first team to retain the UEFA Champions League having beaten AC Milan in the final 12 months earlier; instead Juve were 4-2 winners on penalties.
- Juve have won all four of the teams' two-legged contests, most recently prevailing 2-1 in the Amsterdam first leg of their 2009/10 UEFA Europa League round of 32 tie and progressing after a goalless draw in Turin.
- The Bianconeri have won their last three away games in Amsterdam, including both in the UEFA Champions League – 1-0 in the 2004/05 group stage and 2-1 in the 1996/97 semi-final, setting up a 6-2 aggregate triumph. Juventus were defeated 1-0 in Amsterdam, however, by Real Madrid in the 1998 UEFA Champions League final.

- The 1969 defeat by Benfica is Ajax's only home loss in a European Cup quarter-final; their record otherwise is W6 D5.
- The Dutch club were without a win in seven UEFA Champions League knockout phase fixtures (D2 L5), since a 3-2 victory at Atlético Madrid in the 1996/97 quarter-final second leg that completed a 4-3 aggregate success, before their win at Real Madrid in the last round.
- Ajax have not won any of their last six home UEFA Champions League knockout phase matches (D3 L3), most recently beating Borussia Dortmund 1-0 in the 1995/96 quarter-final second leg (3-0 aggregate).
- The Amsterdammers have lost only one of their 14 European matches in 2018/19 (W8 D5) – the first-leg defeat against Madrid. They won their first five home games this season before a 3-3 draw against Bayern München on matchday six and the loss to Madrid.
- Ajax are the sole side still involved who came through qualifying. The other 15 teams who reached the knockout rounds all entered the competition at the group stage.
- Ajax are looking for their first win in nine matches against visitors from Serie A. The last time they beat an Italian side in Amsterdam was in December 2002, a 2-1 success against Roma in the UEFA Champions League second group stage.
- The Dutch club have not played Italian opposition since drawing home (1-1) and away (0-0) against AC Milan in the

2013/14 UEFA Champions League group stage – extending their unbeaten run against Serie A sides to five matches (W1 D4) since that 2010 loss to Juventus.

- Ajax's record in two-legged ties against Italian clubs is W5 L7; they have lost three of the last four.

- Twelve months ago Juve's hopes looked to have been ended by a 3-0 home defeat against Real Madrid in the first leg, but a remarkable fightback in Spain levelled the tie on aggregate – only for Ronaldo's penalty, deep into added time, to finally end their challenge.

- Juve's record in two-legged ties against Dutch clubs is W4 L1.

- Juventus won their first two away games in this season's competition, at Valencia (2-0) and Manchester United (1-0), but have lost the last two – 2-1 at Young Boys on matchday six, although they still finished first in Group H, and 2-0 at Atlético in the round of 16 first leg.

- That defeat in Switzerland ended Juve's five-match winning run in UEFA Champions League away matches.

- Juve are unbeaten in six matches against Eredivisie clubs (W4 D2), since a 2-0 loss at Feyenoord in the 1997/98 UEFA Champions League group stage. Three of their five defeats against Dutch teams have come in the Netherlands.

- Winners in 1985 and 1996, Juventus have played in nine European Cup finals – losing a record seven, including all of their last five.

### Links and trivia

- Current general director Edwin van der Sar was Ajax's goalkeeper in the 1996 UEFA Champions League final against Juventus, Daley Blind's father Danny captaining the side.

- Van der Sar played for Juventus between 1999 and 2001, and was a team-mate of Cristiano Ronaldo at Manchester United between 2005 and 2009.

- Daley Blind made his Netherlands debut in a 1-1 friendly draw against Italy on 6 February 2013 in the Johan Cruyff ArenA; Andrea Barzagli was in the visiting line-up.

- Ronaldo scored the only goal as Portugal defeated Hakim Ziyech's Morocco in the 2018 FIFA World Cup group stage.

- Has played in Italy:

Klaas-Jan Huntelaar (AC Milan 2009–10)

- Huntelaar came on for the final five minutes of Milan's 3-0 win against Juventus in January 2010. He worked under current Juve boss Massimiliano Allegri for two months at Milan before departing for Schalke in August 2010.

- Ajax assistant coach Aron Winter played in Italy between 1992 and 1999, spending four seasons with Lazio and three with Internazionale. His record against Juve was W4 D3 L8.

- In 1992/93 Allegri – then a Pescara player – scored home and away against Winter's Lazio, who nevertheless won both games.

## Latest news

### Ajax

- Ajax have won nine of their last ten games in all competitions, the exception a 1-0 Eredivisie loss at AZ Alkmaar on 17 March. They won 4-1 at Willem II on Saturday.
- The 2-1 first-leg loss against Real Madrid is Ajax's sole home defeat in 23 games this season in all competitions (W19 D3).
- David Neres has scored six goals in his last seven Ajax matches.
- Dušan Tadić has scored in Ajax's last four home Eredivisie games, six goals in total.
- Noussair Mazraoui and André Onana have both extended their Ajax contracts until 2022.
- Matthijs de Ligt headed his first goal for the Netherlands in a 2-3 home loss against Germany in UEFA EURO 2020 qualifying on 24 March, a match that was played at Ajax's Johan Cruyff ArenA.
- David Neres made his Brazil debut in a 3-1 friendly win away to the Czech Republic on 26 March, setting up the second goal.
- Dušan Tadić has 13 goals in his last 15 Eredivisie matches and 17 in his last 21 in all competitions.
- On 27 February Ajax reached the Dutch Cup final with a 3-0 win at Feyenoord. They will play Willem II in the final, also in Rotterdam, on 5 May.

### Juventus

- Five days after reaching the UEFA Champions League quarter-finals, Juventus suffered a first Serie A defeat of the season, going down 2-0 at Genoa. They have won all three games since, coming from behind to beat AC Milan 2-1 at home on Saturday, and have 27 victories in 31 league fixtures in 2018/19. With 84 points and seven games to play, Juve are on track to beat their own record (102 points in 2013/14).
- The loss at Genoa was Juve's first league reverse since the 1-0 home defeat against Napoli on 22 April 2018. It was Juve's first away league defeat since a 3-2 defeat at Sampdoria on 19 November 2017.
- The loss at Genoa was also the first time that Juve failed to score in Serie A since a goalless draw against Roma on 13 May 2018.
- Moise Kean, who has scored in Juve's last three matches including the winner against Milan, has seven goals in his last eight games for club and country.
- On 23 March, Kean became the first player born after 2000 to score for Italy, finding the net against Finland (2-0) aged 19 years 23 days to become the Azzurri's second youngest goalscorer after Bruno Nicolè in 1958 (18 years 258 days). Kean scored again three days later as Italy defeated Liechtenstein 6-0.
- Cristiano Ronaldo went off 30 minutes into Portugal's 1-1 UEFA EURO 2020 qualifying draw with Serbia on 25 March with a right thigh injury and has not played since.
- Goalkeeper Mattia Perin had to withdraw from the Italy camp with a shoulder injury and is yet to return to action.
- Paulo Dybala missed the games against Empoli (1-0) and Cagliari (2-0) with a calf injury; he returned to score Juve's first goal against Milan from the penalty spot.
- Leonardo Spinazzola suffered a right knee injury against Empoli and missed the Cagliari game, returning against Milan. Martín Cáceres went off after 61 minutes against Cagliari with a thigh injury and missed the weekend win.
- Douglas Costa has not played since 2 February after suffering a recurrence of a thigh injury just before the second leg against Atlético.
- Andrea Barzagli has been out since the 4-1 win over Udinese on 8 March when he suffered a calf injury.
- Sami Khedira underwent heart surgery in February and replaced Emre Can in the first half against Milan, his first appearance since 15 February; Can was taken off with a sprained ankle.
- Daniele Rugani (2023) and Mario Mandžukić (2021) have agreed contract extensions.
- Juan Cuadrado was removed from Juve's UEFA Champions League squad after undergoing surgery on his left knee on 28 December.



- On 16 January Juventus won the Italian Super Cup, beating AC Milan 1-0 thanks to a Ronaldo goal.
- Juve's hopes of a fifth consecutive double were ended when they lost 3-0 to Atalanta in the quarter-finals on 30 January.

- Born in Haaksbergen in the east Netherlands close to Enschede, Ten Hag's early days were spent with local club Bon Boys before a move to the youth department of Twente, where he made his professional debut aged 19 in December 1989.
- A defensive midfielder and defender, he then spent two seasons with De Graafschap, winning promotion to Eredivisie in his first, before returning to Twente for two years. Ten Hag moved on to single-season stays at both RKC Waalwijk and Utrecht, and then returned to Twente again in 1996, this time for good.
- Reached the last 16 of the 1997/98 UEFA Cup, losing to Auxerre, and in 2001 he won his only silverware with the club, Fred Rutten's team beating PSV Eindhoven on penalties in the Dutch Cup final with Ten Hag as captain.
- After ending his playing career in 2002 he became head of Twente's youth department, also working as assistant coach for several years, alongside Rutten from 2006/07. Followed the head coach to PSV in 2009, serving as his assistant for three seasons.
- Took his first post as head coach at Go Ahead Eagles, winning promotion to the Dutch top flight in his 2012/13 debut season, before moving on to Bayern München's second team, winning the Regionalliga title in 2014 and working with Josep Guardiola. Took over at Utrecht in summer 2015, winning the Rinus Michels award as the Netherlands' coach of the year 12 months later. Succeeded Marcel Keizer at Ajax in December 2017, leading the club to second place in the Eredivisie at the end of that campaign and into the UEFA Champions League group stage for the first time in four years.

### Massimiliano Allegri

---

**Coaching career:** Aglianese, SPAL, Grosseto, Sassuolo, Cagliari, AC Milan, Juventus

- A creative attacking midfielder, Allegri started out in his native Tuscany with Cuiopelli and then Livorno, his hometown club. First appeared in Serie A for Pisa against Milan in 1988/89 but played only twice that season before heading back to Livorno.
- Returned to Serie A after helping Pescara win promotion in 1992. The following term he scored 12 goals under Giovanni Galeone, the coach Allegri still considers his mentor. After leaving Pescara in 1993, had spells at Cagliari, Perugia, Padova and Napoli before hanging up his boots back in Tuscany with fourth division Aglianese in 2003.
- Moved straight into coaching at Aglianese, prior to taking charge at SPAL and Grosseto. In November 2008 he won the Panchina d'Oro (golden bench) as the third division's best coach having led Sassuolo to promotion.
- Had earlier been appointed by Cagliari whom he led to ninth place in 2009, winning the Panchina d'Oro again, this time as Serie A's best coach. A bad run of results the following season prompted Allegri's dismissal on 13 April 2010 – although he had already done enough to earn a two-year contract at Milan.
- Allegri's first season at San Siro ended with his new club winning the Scudetto for the first time since 2004. Dismissed in January 2014 with Milan 11th in Serie A, that summer he was appointed to succeed Antonio Conte at Juventus. Allegri won the Scudetto and the Coppa Italia with Juventus in his first season, also taking his side to the final of the UEFA Champions League, and added further domestic doubles in 2015/16, 2016/17 – when they again reached the UEFA Champions League final – and 2017/18.

### UEFA Champions League: Did you know?

#### Overall records

- In 2016/17 Real Madrid became the first team to successfully defend the UEFA Champions League trophy, with AC Milan (1989, 1990) the previous club to win consecutive European Cups. Milan (1994, 1995), Ajax (1995, 1996), Juventus (1996, 1997) and Manchester United (2008, 2009) have all returned to the UEFA Champions League final as holders only to lose.
- Real Madrid then made it three wins in a row in 2017/18, becoming the fourth club to win three or more successive titles in European Cup history, and the first to do it twice.
- Only two teams have ever won the UEFA Champions League on home soil: Borussia Dortmund (1997, final in Munich) and Juventus (1996, final in Rome), while Manchester United lost the 2011 final in London and 12 months later Bayern were beaten in the showpiece in their own stadium, the Fußball Arena München.

#### Knockout stage

- Real Madrid have qualified for the UEFA Champions League knockout phase a record 23 times, including 22 in succession. They have also played a competition-high 97 knockout phase matches – ahead of Bayern München (91) and Barcelona (88).
- Teams have overturned a first-leg deficit to go through 46 times, including Porto and Juventus in the 2018/19 round of 16. Before this season, only twice – Ajax's defeat of Panathinaikos in the 1995/96 semi-finals and Internazionale's victory against Bayern in the 2010/11 round of 16 – had a side progressed after a home first-leg loss; however, Ajax again (against Real Madrid) and Manchester United (against Paris Saint-Germain) both achieved the feat in the 2018/19 round of 16.
- The biggest losing margin a side has overhauled was achieved by Barcelona against Paris Saint-Germain in the 2016/17 last 16, when they lost 4-0 away but progressed thanks to a 6-1 home success. That eclipsed the previous record held by Deportivo La Coruña in the 2003/04 quarter-finals, when they went down 4-1 at AC Milan but won 4-0 at home; Roma equalled that margin in last season's quarter-finals, turning round a 4-1 first-leg loss at Barcelona with a 3-0 home success.
- Thirty-one ties have been decided on away goals, including 12 where the triumphant team lost the first leg. Bayern and Monaco have benefited from the away goals rule five times – more than any other club – whereas Internazionale have been eliminated by that method a record four times.
- In all, 29 ties have required extra time. Thirteen have been settled by extra time alone: six round of 16 encounters including Porto-Roma this season, five quarter-finals, the 2007/08 semi-final between Chelsea and Liverpool, and the 2013/14 final between Real Madrid and Atlético Madrid.
- Sixteen ties have gone to penalties, including seven finals – 1996, 2001, 2003, 2005, 2008, 2012 and 2016. The first two-legged tie decided on spot kicks was PSV Eindhoven's 4-2 victory over Lyon on 13 April 2005 after a 2-2 aggregate draw, still the only quarter-final to go to penalties. Bayern, Chelsea and Atlético Madrid have all appeared in three shoot-outs, sharing the competition record, with Bayern, Atlético and Liverpool having won the most (two apiece).
- The 2015/16 round of 16 tie between Atlético Madrid and PSV was the first to finish goalless after two legs. Thirteen have finished 1-0 on aggregate, most recently Real Madrid's defeat of Manchester City in the 2015/16 semi-finals.
- Liverpool (versus Porto) and Bayern (versus Beşiktaş) both won 5-0 in the 2017/18 round of 16, equalling the knockout phase record for the biggest first-leg lead – Real Madrid's 6-1 victory at Schalke in 2013/14 and Bayern's 5-0 success at Sporting CP in 2008/09, both also in the round of 16.
- Bayern eventually beat Sporting by a record aggregate margin of 12-1 after a 7-1 stroll in the home second leg; that tie also featured more goals (13) over its two legs than any UEFA Champions League knockout tie until it was equalled by Liverpool's 7-6 aggregate win against Roma in the 2017/18 semi-final.
- Bayern and Manchester City jointly hold the record for the largest margin of victory in a UEFA Champions League knockout match. Bayern beat both Basel (2011/12) and Shakhtar Donetsk (2014/15) 7-0 in the round of 16 second leg, while City beat Schalke by the same scoreline at the same stage of the 2018/19 competition.
- A record five clubs from England participated in the 2017/18 knockout phase. England has also provided four clubs on seven other occasions – as has Spain four times and Germany twice. England is the only nation to have provided four quarter-finalists in a season, 2018/19 being the third occasion after 2007/08 and 2008/09.
- There have been 200 UEFA Champions League quarter-finalists. Spain has provided the largest number (49),

followed by England (43), with Germany and Italy level in third place on 29 apiece. Exactly three quarters of the teams reaching the last eight have therefore come from those four nations, with 12 others having provided the rest.

- In 2018/19 Barcelona reached a record 12th successive European Cup quarter-final.
- Barça and Bayern have both reached 17 UEFA Champions League quarter-finals, one more than Real Madrid.
- The biggest European Cup quarter-final victory was Real Madrid's 8-0 first-leg defeat of Sevilla in 1957/58.
- Manchester United's 7-1 win against Roma in 2006/07 is the biggest victory in a UEFA Champions League quarter-final match. Bayern beat Porto 6-1 in 2014/15, Barcelona have twice won 5-1, against Chelsea after extra time (1999/2000) and Shakhtar Donetsk (2010/11), while there have been four 4-0 victories.
- Chelsea-Liverpool in 2008/09 featured 12 goals over the two legs, a quarter-final record.
- Clarence Seedorf is the only player to lift the European Cup with three clubs (Ajax 1995, Real Madrid 1998, Milan 2003, 2007). Bob Paisley (Liverpool 1977, 1978, 1981) was the first coach to win three times, a feat Carlo Ancelotti (Milan 2003, 2007, Real Madrid 2014) and Zinédine Zidane (2016, 2017, 2018) have replicated.
- In 2014 Ancelotti also became the fifth coach to win the trophy with two clubs; Ottmar Hitzfeld (Borussia Dortmund 1997, Bayern 2001), Ernst Happel (Feyenoord 1970, Hamburg 1983), José Mourinho (Porto 2004, Internazionale 2010) and Jupp Heynckes (Real Madrid 1998, Bayern 2013) had previously achieved the feat.

### Goalscoring records

- Lionel Messi became the first player to score five goals in a match in Barcelona's 7-1 win against Bayer Leverkusen on 7 March 2012, a feat matched by Shakhtar Donetsk's Luiz Adriano at BATE Borisov on 21 October 2014. Eleven more players, also including Messi, have scored four times in a game, most recently Cristiano Ronaldo for Real Madrid on matchday six in 2015/16.
- Cristiano Ronaldo set a new record for a UEFA Champions League group stage with 11 goals in 2015/16, eclipsing his own mark of nine in 2013/14, which Luiz Adriano matched in 2014/15 and Ronaldo himself equalled in 2017/18. Lionel Messi got ten goals in 2016/17; Zlatan Ibrahimović (2013/14), Ruud van Nistelrooy (2004/05), Filippo Inzaghi, Hernán Crespo (both 2002/03) and Robert Lewandowski (2018/19) managed eight.
- Messi's hat-trick against PSV Eindhoven on matchday one of the 2018/19 competition was his eighth in the competition, a mark Ronaldo matched against Atlético Madrid in the round of 16 second leg.

### Oldest and youngest players

- Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta is the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League having featured against Real Madrid on matchday six in 2007/08 aged 43 years and 252 days. Alessandro Costacurta is the oldest outfield player; the Milan defender was 40 years and 211 days when he played against AEK Athens in 2006/07.
- Francesco Totti is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 38 years and 59 days, in Roma's 1-1 draw at CSKA Moskva on 25 November 2014. Ryan Giggs (37 years 290 days) was the previous record holder.
- Celestine Babayaro is the youngest player to have appeared; he was 16 years and 87 days when he started for Anderlecht against Steaua București on 23 November 1994. He was sent off in the 37th minute.
- Peter Ofori-Quaye is the youngest player to have scored in the UEFA Champions League, aged 17 years and 195 days. He found the net in Olympiacos's 5-1 defeat at Rosenborg on 1 October 1997.
