Match background

Leipzig's first foray into the UEFA Champions League knockout rounds has set up a quarter-final against seasoned campaigners Atlético de Madrid at the Estádio José Alvalade in Lisbon.

- This is the first meeting between the sides and, while Leipzig are taking part in a UEFA knockout tie for only the ninth time, Atlético, who are in their sixth UEFA Champions League quarter-final, can draw on a wealth of experience having reached the final twice in the last seven seasons.

Form guide

Leipzig

- Not only is this Leipzig's first European Cup quarter-final and their first meeting with Atlético – it is their first official game against Spanish opposition.
- This is Leipzig's second trip to Lisbon in 2019/20 having won 2-1 at Benfica on Matchday 1.
- Leipzig finished three points clear at the top of Group G, picking up seven of their 11 points on their travels thanks to that win at Benfica and a 2-0 success at Zenit before they let slip a two-goal lead to draw 2-2 at Lyon on Matchday 6. At home they bounced back from losing 2-0 to eventual section runners-up Lyon by defeating Zenit 2-1 and drawing 2-2 with Benfica in their penultimate game to secure progress.
- Julian Nagelsmann's side then despatched Tottenham 4-0 on aggregate in the round of 16 (1-0 a, 3-0 h) in their first UEFA Champions League knockout tie.
- Aside from the win at Benfica earlier this season, the German club's only other visit to Portugal ended in a 3-1 reverse at Porto in the 2017/18 UEFA Champions League group stage, only their second European away fixture.
- Leipzig have won seven of their 14 UEFA Champions League fixtures (D3 L4).
- Leipzig's record outside Germany in this season's competition is W3 D1; they had previously won only three of their 12 European away matches (D4 L5).
- Third in the Bundesliga in 2018/19 and German Cup finalists, this is Leipzig's third European campaign, and only their 33rd match. In 2017/18 they became the first team to make their European debut in the UEFA Champions League group stage, picking up seven points to finish third in a section including Beşiktaş, Porto and Monaco. They went on to reach the UEFA Europa League quarter-finals before losing to Marseille.
- Leipzig's record in knockout European ties is W6 L1, their 2017/18 loss to Marseille the sole defeat (1-0 h, 2-5 a). That is also their only previous quarter-final.
- Leipzig have yet to feature in a UEFA penalty shoot-out.

Atlético

- Atlético are in the European Cup quarter-finals for the tenth time, and the fifth time in seven seasons. They have won three of their last four quarter-finals.
- Atlético finished with ten points in this season's group stage, six behind Juventus. Having fought back from two goals down to draw with Juve on Matchday 1, Atlético then won 2-0 at Lokomotiv Moskva and 1-0 at home to Bayer Leverkusen only to lose 2-1 in Germany and 1-0 at Juve; a 2-0 defeat of Lokomotiv in Madrid on Matchday 6 nevertheless earned second place.
- Diego Simeone's side then ousted holders Liverpool in the round of 16, following up a 1-0 home win with a 3-2 success after extra time at Anfield.
- Second in Spain in 2018/19, this is Atlético's tenth UEFA Champions League campaign and their eighth appearance in the knockout stages.
- Atleti also finished second in their section in 2018/19 and bowed out in the round of 16 after succumbing to a

Juventus fightback (2-0 h, 0-3 a).

- The success at Liverpool was only Atlético's second win in their last 12 matches away from their home stadium in the UEFA Champions League knockout rounds (D3 L7).
- Atlético have lost just five of their last 17 European fixtures outside Madrid, winning seven, although four of those defeats have come in their last seven matches (W2 D1).
- Despite defeats on Matchdays 4 and 5 this season, Atlético have lost only five of their last 30 matches in continental competition (W19 D6).
- Atlético's overall record against German clubs is W21 D7 L16, although this season's loss at Leverkusen made it five defeats in their last six matches against Bundesliga clubs outside Spain.
- Los Colchoneros have won their last eight knockout ties against German sides, most recently against Leverkusen in the 2016/17 UEFA Champions League round of 16 (4-2 a, 0-0 h). Their last aggregate defeat came against Dynamo Dresden in the 1979/80 UEFA Cup first round (1-2 h, 0-3 a).
- The Spanish side last visited the Estádio José Alvalade in the quarter-finals of their victorious UEFA Europa League campaign in 2017/18, going through thanks to a 2-0 home first-leg win against Sporting CP despite a 1-0 reverse in Lisbon. That was their second game at the José Alvalade, following a 2-2 draw against Sporting in the 2009/10 UEFA Europa League round of 16 second leg, a tie Atlético won on away goals after a scoreless first game; the Spanish side also went on to lift the trophy that season.
- That 2018 defeat by Sporting made Atlético's record in Portugal W3 D2 L5. The three victories have come in their last five visits, including a 2-1 success at Benfica on Matchday 6 of the 2015/16 UEFA Champions League in which Saúl Ñíguez opened the scoring.
- Atlético lost 4-1 after extra time to city rivals Real Madrid in the 2014 UEFA Champions League final at Lisbon's Estádio do Sport Lisboa e Benfica; their record in the city overall is W1 D1 L2.
- The Rojiblancos have reached two UEFA Champions League and three UEFA Europa League finals in the last ten seasons.

Felipe also played both games for Porto.
- Christopher Nkunku scored in Paris Saint-Germain's 3-2 friendly win against Atlético in 2018.

Latest news

Leipzig

- Leipzig finished the 2019/20 Bundesliga season in third position, earning a place in next season's UEFA Champions League to make it three appearances in the competition in four campaigns.
- Since football in Germany restarted in mid-May, Julian Nagelsmann's team have recorded four wins, four draws and only one defeat – a 2-0 home loss against Borussia Dortmund on 20 June.
- Leipzig returned to training on 22 July and drew 1-1 against Wolfsburg in their only friendly ahead of the Atlético match. Patrik Schick was on target with a penalty.
- Marcel Halstenberg missed the Wolfsburg game with a back problem.

- Ibrahima Konaté underwent hip surgery on 24 July.
- On 8 July Leipzig signed Salzburg striker Hee-Chan Hwang, who has agreed a five-year contract, and defender Benjamin Henrichs, who joins on a one-year loan from Monaco. Neither player is eligible for the remainder of this season's UEFA Champions League.
- Timo Werner, who scored 34 goals in 45 competitive games for Leipzig in 2019/20 including four in the UEFA Champions League, has left the club to join Chelsea. Hannes Wolf will spend 2020/21 on loan at Borussia Mönchengladbach.

Atlético

- Jan Oblak made his 50th appearance in the UEFA Champions League, group stage to final, in the round of 16 second leg.
- Atlético finished third in the 2019/20 Liga standings on 70 points, 17 points behind champions Real Madrid and 12 adrift of second-placed Barcelona.
- Diego Simeone's side have not lost since football resumed in Spain, winning seven and drawing four of their last 11 matches.
- That extended Atlético's unbeaten sequence in all competitions to 18 games (W11 D7), since a 1-0 Liga defeat at Real Madrid on 1 February. That was also the last match in which they failed to score.
- Los Colchoneros have kept six clean sheets in their last ten outings, conceding only five goals in that sequence.
- Álvaro Morata was Atlético's top scorer in the 2019/20 Liga with 12 goals; he was the only player from the club to reach double figures.
- Atlético suffered a 2-1 extra-time elimination at third division side Cultural Leonesa in the last 32 of the Copa del Rey on 23 January.
- Šime Vrsaljko has been sidelined by a knee injury since 3 June; his last appearance came in the round of 16 second leg at Liverpool on 11 March.

Official UEFA Champions League Man of the Match award introduced

UEFA will give out an official Man of the Match award after every UEFA Champions League knockout stage game to recognise the top performers in Europe's top club competition. UEFA Technical Observers at each UEFA Champions League game from the round of 16 on will decide who deserves the Man of the Match, with an official award being handed to the successful players after full-time in recognition of their roles in decisive moments, tactical maturity, creativity and inspiration, exceptional skill and fair play.

- Nagelsmann's playing career began at Issing before a move to Augsburg's youth academy. From 2002 he represented 1860 München for five seasons, starting off in the youth side before being promoted to the second team.
- Injury prevented him from making a single appearance in 2006/07, so he returned to Augsburg, where he picked up a serious knee injury and was forced to retire in 2007 aged just 20 having never played a competitive first-team game.
- Nagelsmann, who has a degree in sports and applied coaching, swiftly took up a post in Augsburg's youth coaching set-up under Thomas Tuchel before two years in charge of 1860's Under-17 side.
- His association with Hoffenheim began in 2010 and he led the club's Under-19s to the league title in 2013/14, his first season. Succeeded Huub Stevens as first-team coach in February 2016, aged just 28 – the youngest coach in Bundesliga history – and guided the club away from the Bundesliga relegation zone by the end of that campaign.
- Took Hoffenheim to a fourth-placed finish in 2016/17 although their subsequent UEFA Champions League adventure lasted only one tie, Liverpool eliminating them in the play-offs. Another strong Bundesliga season was rewarded with third place and on 21 June 2018 it was announced that Nagelsmann would leave Hoffenheim at the end of 2018/19 to take over as coach of RB Leipzig; before departing he oversaw Hoffenheim's debut UEFA Champions League group campaign and a ninth-placed Bundesliga finish.

Diego Simeone

Date of birth: 28 April 1970

Nationality: Argentinian

Playing career: Vélez Sarsfield, Pisa, Sevilla, Atlético Madrid (twice), Internazionale Milano, Lazio, Racing Club

Coaching career: Racing Club (twice), Estudiantes, River Plate, San Lorenzo, Catania, Atlético Madrid

- Launched career as a combative midfielder with Vélez Sarsfield and was a full Argentinian international at 18, making debut in a July 1988 friendly against Australia; went on to play in three FIFA World Cups and retired as Argentina's most-capped player (106 appearances, 11 goals). Moved to Italy in 1990 to join Pisa; two years later he left for Sevilla, where he played under Argentina's 1986 World Cup-winning coach Carlos Bilardo and – for one season – alongside Diego Maradona.
- Joined Atlético in 1994 and won the Spanish domestic double in his second season, his first major club honours to add to two Copa América titles (1991 and 1993) plus the 1992 FIFA Confederations Cup with Argentina.
- Enjoyed further success after returning to Italy, winning the UEFA Cup with Inter, plus a Serie A and Coppa Italia double in his debut campaign with Lazio (1999/2000). After four years in Rome, he returned to Madrid for a second spell with Atlético before ending his playing career in Argentina with Racing Club.
- Started coaching career with Racing Club and won Argentinian titles with Estudiantes (2006 Apertura) and River Plate (2008 Clausura); brief spells at San Lorenzo, Italian club Catania and Racing (again) preceded his appointment in December 2011 at Atlético.
- Led Atlético to victory in the 2012 UEFA Europa League final against Athletic Club and to a Copa del Rey final triumph over Real Madrid in 2013. A year later, Atlético held off Barcelona and Madrid to win their first league title since 1996, although they lost to Madrid in the UEFA Champions League final. Took Atlético to another UEFA Champions League final in 2016, which they again lost to Madrid, but collected more silverware two years later with another UEFA Europa League triumph and followed up by finally getting the better of Madrid in Europe with victory in the UEFA Super Cup.

Competition facts

UEFA Champions League: Did you know?

Overall records

- In 2016/17 Real Madrid became the first team to successfully defend the UEFA Champions League trophy, with AC Milan (1989, 1990) the previous club to win consecutive European Cups. Milan (1994, 1995), Ajax (1995, 1996), Juventus (1996, 1997) and Manchester United (2008, 2009) have all returned to the UEFA Champions League final as holders only to lose.
- Real Madrid then made it three wins in a row in 2017/18, becoming the fourth club to win three or more successive titles in European Cup history, and the first to do it twice.
- Only two teams have ever won the UEFA Champions League on home soil: Borussia Dortmund (1997, final in Munich) and Juventus (1996, final in Rome), while Manchester United lost the 2011 final in London and 12 months later Bayern were beaten in the showpiece in their own stadium, the Fußball Arena München.

Knockout stage

- In 2019/20 Real Madrid qualified for the UEFA Champions League knockout phase for a record 24th time, including 23 in succession. They have also played a competition-high 99 knockout phase matches – ahead of Barcelona (94) and Bayern München (93).
- In all, 30 ties have required extra time. Fourteen have been settled by extra time alone: six round of 16 encounters including Atlético-Liverpool in 2019/20, five quarter-finals, the 2007/08 semi-final between Chelsea and Liverpool, and the 2013/14 final between Real Madrid and Atlético Madrid.
- Sixteen ties have gone to penalties, including seven finals – 1996, 2001, 2003, 2005, 2008, 2012 and 2016. The first two-legged tie decided on spot kicks was PSV Eindhoven's 4-2 victory over Lyon on 13 April 2005 after a 2-2 aggregate draw, still the only quarter-final to go to penalties. Bayern, Chelsea and Atlético Madrid have all appeared in three shoot-outs, sharing the competition record, with Bayern, Atlético and Liverpool having won the most (two apiece).
- There have been 208 UEFA Champions League quarter-finalists. Spain has provided the largest number (51), followed by England (44), with Germany in third place on 31. Twelve other countries have provided teams for the last eight.
- In 2019/20 Barcelona reached a record 13th successive European Cup quarter-final.
- Barça and Bayern have both reached 18 UEFA Champions League quarter-finals, two more than Real Madrid.
- The biggest European Cup quarter-final victory was Real Madrid's 8-0 first-leg defeat of Sevilla in 1957/58
- Manchester United's 7-1 win against Roma in 2006/07 is the biggest victory in a UEFA Champions League quarter-final match. Bayern beat Porto 6-1 in 2014/15, Barcelona have twice won 5-1, against Chelsea after extra time (1999/2000) and Shakhtar Donetsk (2010/11), while there have been four 4-0 victories.
- Bayern and Manchester City jointly hold the record for the largest margin of victory in a UEFA Champions League knockout match. Bayern beat both Basel (2011/12) and Shakhtar Donetsk (2014/15) 7-0 in the round of 16 second leg, while City beat Schalke by the same scoreline at the same stage of the 2018/19 competition.
- A record five clubs from England participated in the 2017/18 knockout phase. Including 2019/20, England has also provided four clubs on eight other occasions – as has Spain five times and Germany twice. England is the only nation to have provided four quarter-finalists in a season, 2018/19 being the third occasion after 2007/08 and 2008/09.
- There are four clubs from two nations in the round of 16 for only the third time in 2019/20. England and Spain both had four apiece in 2008/09, and there were four each from England and Germany in 2013/14.
- Clarence Seedorf is the only player to have lifted the European Cup with three clubs (Ajax 1995, Real Madrid 1998, Milan 2003, 2007). Bob Paisley (Liverpool 1977, 1978, 1981) was the first coach to win it three times, a feat Carlo Ancelotti (Milan 2003, 2007, Real Madrid 2014) and Zinedine Zidane (2016, 2017, 2018) have replicated.
- In 2014 Ancelotti also became the fifth coach to win the trophy with two clubs; Ottmar Hitzfeld (Borussia Dortmund 1997, Bayern 2001), Ernst Happel (Feyenoord 1970, Hamburg 1983), José Mourinho (Porto 2004, Internazionale 2010) and Jupp Heynckes (Real Madrid 1998, Bayern 2013) had previously achieved the feat.

Goalscoring records

- Lionel Messi became the first player to score five goals in a match in Barcelona's 7-1 win against Bayer Leverkusen on 7 March 2012, a feat matched by Shakhtar Donetsk's Luiz Adriano at BATE Borisov on 21 October 2014. Fourteen more players, also including Messi, have scored four times in a game, including two Bayern players, Serge Gnabry

and Robert Lewandowski, in this season's group fixtures at Tottenham Hotspur and Crvena zvezda respectively, plus Atalanta's Josip Iličić at Valencia in the round of 16 second leg.

- Cristiano Ronaldo set a new record for a UEFA Champions League group stage with 11 goals in 2015/16, eclipsing his own mark of nine in 2013/14, which Luiz Adriano matched in 2014/15 and Ronaldo himself equalled in 2017/18. Messi got ten goals in 2016/17, as did Lewandowski this season; Zlatan Ibrahimović (2013/14), Ruud van Nistelrooy (2004/05), Filippo Inzaghi, Hernán Crespo (both 2002/03), Lewandowski (2018/19) and Erling Braut Haaland (2019/20) all managed eight.
- Messi's hat-trick against PSV Eindhoven on Matchday 1 of the 2018/19 competition was his eighth in the competition, a mark Ronaldo matched against Atlético Madrid in that season's round of 16 second leg.

Oldest and youngest players

- Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta is the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League having featured against Real Madrid on Matchday 6 in 2007/08 aged 43 years and 252 days. Alessandro Costacurta is the oldest outfield player; the Milan defender was 40 years and 211 days when he played against AEK Athens in 2006/07.
- Francesco Totti is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 38 years and 59 days, in Roma's 1-1 draw at CSKA Moskva on 25 November 2014. Ryan Giggs (37 years 290 days) was the previous record holder.
- Celestine Babayaro is the youngest player to have appeared; he was 16 years and 87 days when he started for Anderlecht against Steaua Bucureşti on 23 November 1994. He was sent off in the 37th minute.
- Ansu Fati's winner for Barcelona at Inter on Matchday 6 in 2019/20 made him the youngest goalscorer in UEFA Champions League history, at the age of 17 years 40 days. He eclipsed the previous record of Olympiacos's Peter Ofori-Quaye (17 years 195 days) that had lasted since 1 October 1997.
