Match background

Manchester City's first UEFA Champions League final pits them against domestic rivals Chelsea, who are in the decider for the third time and looking to add to their 2012 triumph.

- This is the sides' first European meeting in 50 years, but both have already endured plenty of UEFA Champions League heartache at the hands of Premier League sides, City being eliminated by domestic rivals in 2018 and 2019 while Chelsea's first final appearance ended in defeat by familiar foes.
- This is the third all-English UEFA Champions League final, Chelsea having been involved in the first, when they lost on penalties to Manchester United in Moscow in 2008. Two years ago, Liverpool beat Tottenham Hotspur in Madrid.
- There have been seven previous UEFA Champions League finals between clubs from the same country, all since 2000. Real Madrid were victorious in all-Spanish affairs in 2000 (Valencia), 2014 and 2016 (both Atlético de Madrid) while AC Milan beat fellow Italian side Juventus on penalties in 2003 and Bayern München overcame Borussia Dortmund in the 2013 all-German final.
- City are the ninth English club to appear in a European Cup final, more than any other country; Italy and Germany are next on the list with six each.
- This final will now be held at the Estádio do Dragão in Porto, the venue for City's goalless draw against the local side in the group stage – the only game they have failed to win in this season's competition – and where Chelsea have won only once in four attempts.
- City and Chelsea have both conceded just four goals en route to this final, the lowest total for the two finalists since Barcelona (four goals against) took on Arsenal (two) in the 2006 decider. Neither side have conceded more than once in a UEFA Champions League game in 2020/21.

Final pedigree

Manchester City

- City are the 42nd club to reach the European Cup final, and the third newcomers in successive seasons after Tottenham in 2019 and Paris Saint-Germain in 2020. They are the 21st team to reach the UEFA Champions League final.
- City could become the 23rd side to win the European Cup, and the first new name on the trophy since Chelsea's 2012 triumph.
- This is City's second European final. They beat Polish club Górnik Zabrze 2-1 at Vienna's Prater Stadion in the 1969/70 European Cup Winners' Cup final.
- Josep Guardiola, a winner with Barcelona in 2009 and 2011, could become the sixth coach to win the European Cup with two different clubs, after Ernst Happel (Feyenoord 1970, Hamburg 1983), Ottmar Hitzfeld (Borussia Dortmund 1997, Bayern München 2001), José Mourinho (Porto 2004, Internazionale 2010), Jupp Heynckes (Real Madrid 1998, Bayern 2013) and Carlo Ancelotti (AC Milan 2003, 2007, Real Madrid 2014).
- İlkay Gündoğan is the only member of the City squad who has previously played in the UEFA Champions League final. Having scored Dortmund's goal from the penalty spot in their 2-1 defeat by Bayern in 2013, he could become the fourth player to find the net for different clubs in the European Cup final. Velibor Vasović (Partizan 1966, Ajax 1969), Cristiano Ronaldo (Manchester United 2008, Real Madrid 2014, 2017) and Mario Mandžukić (Bayern 2013, Juventus 2017) have all previously managed it.

Chelsea

- This is Chelsea's third UEFA Champions League final, with both previous matches decided by penalties (W1 L1):
2008 Manchester United L 1-1 (aet, 5-6 pens), Moscow
2012 Bayern München W 1-1 (aet, 4-3 pens), Munich
- Thomas Tuchel led Paris Saint-Germain to last season's final, where they were beaten 1-0 by Bayern in Lisbon; he is the first man to take two different clubs to the European Cup final in successive seasons.
- Thiago Silva was captain of the Paris side that lost in last season's final; he is the only Chelsea player to have appeared in the UEFA Champions League decider.
- Mateo Kovačić was an unused substitute in Real Madrid's final wins in 2017 and 2018; he also made eight appearances in their victorious 2015/16 campaign, but missed out on the matchday squad for the final.
- In addition to their two UEFA Champions League appearances, Chelsea were also victorious in the UEFA Cup Winners' Cup finals in 1971 (2-1 replay vs Real Madrid) and 1998 (1-0 vs Stuttgart) and the UEFA Europa League finals in 2013 (2-1 vs Benfica) and 2019 (4-1 vs Arsenal). They also won the UEFA Super Cup in 1998, but lost the match in 2012, 2013 and 2019, the latter a defeat by Liverpool on penalties after a 2-2 draw in Istanbul.

Previous meetings

- The sides have met in one previous UEFA club competition tie, in the 1970/71 European Cup Winners' Cup semi-finals. Chelsea won 1-0 in both legs against holders City, Derek Smethurst scoring the only goal of the Stamford Bridge first leg in the 46th minute, before a 43rd-minute Ron Healey own goal earned the visitors victory at City's former home Maine Road. Chelsea went on to succeed their fellow English side as competition winners, beating Real Madrid after a final replay.
- This is the clubs' fourth match of the season, with Chelsea having won two of the previous three, including a 2-1 victory at the City of Manchester Stadium on 8 May at the end of the week in which both teams reached this final. Marcos Alonso scored an added-time winner, Hakim Ziyech (63) having cancelled out Raheem Sterling's 44th-minute opener; Sergio Agüero also had a penalty saved by Edouard Mendy as City were denied the win that would have clinched the Premier League title.
- Tuchel's side also beat City in the FA Cup semi-final at Wembley on 17 April, Ziyech scoring the only goal ten minutes into the second half.
- Guardiola's side had run out 3-1 winners at Stamford Bridge in the Premier League on 3 January thanks to first-half goals from Gündoğan (18), Phil Foden (21) and Kevin De Bruyne (34); Callum Hudson-Odoi's 90th-minute consolation was all a Chelsea side managed by Frank Lampard could manage.
- Overall, Chelsea have recorded 68 wins against City, who have won 58 of the clubs' past meetings with 40 draws. Chelsea have been triumphant in three of the last four games between the teams.
- The clubs met in the 2018/19 English League Cup final, with City prevailing 4-3 on penalties after a goalless draw at Wembley. Gündoğan, Agüero, Bernardo Silva and Sterling all converted in the shoot-out for City, with César Azpilicueta, Emerson and Eden Hazard doing likewise for Chelsea; however, although Leroy Sané had his penalty saved by Kepa, Jorginho's kick was saved by Ederson and David Luiz hit the post for Chelsea.
- The teams have contested only one other cup final, the inaugural Full Members' Cup – a competition for clubs in England's top two divisions – in 1985/86. Chelsea were 5-4 winners at Wembley, David Speedie scoring a hat-trick and Colin Lee twice.

Form guide

Manchester City

- Aside from their matches against Chelsea in 1971, City have met English opponents only twice in UEFA competition, on each occasion in the UEFA Champions League quarter-finals, and lost both ties on aggregate. They were beaten 3-0 away and 2-1 at home by Liverpool in 2017/18, Gabriel Jesus scoring their only goal, before an away goals defeat by Tottenham the following season. City lost 1-0 away and bowed out despite Sterling scoring twice and Bernardo Silva and Agüero once each to secure a 4-3 second-leg victory.
- That home win against Spurs is therefore City's only victory in their six European matches against English clubs (L5).
- City scored three goals in each of their first three Group C victories this season, beating Porto (3-1), Marseille and Olympiacos (both 3-0) before a 1-0 win in Greece on Matchday 4 secured progress. A goalless draw in Porto in their penultimate fixture confirmed City in first place before a closing 3-0 win at home to Marseille.
- Guardiola's side then beat Borussia Mönchengladbach 2-0 twice in the round of 16, with both games played in Budapest, before defeating Dortmund 2-1 home and away in the quarter-finals. They overcame last season's runners-up Paris in the last four (2-1 a, 2-0 h) to make it seven successive victories – the first English club to achieve that in the European Cup.
- City are also the first English club to win 11 matches in a European Cup campaign. They are one victory away from equalling Real Madrid's competition record of 12, set in their victorious 2001/02 campaign.
- The goal scored by Dortmund's Marco Reus in the 84th minute of the quarter-final first leg ended City's run without conceding a UEFA Champions League goal at 790 minutes, since Luis Díaz's 14th-minute opener for Porto on Matchday 1. The record for the competition, set by Arsenal in 2005/06, is 995 minutes, with City now second in the all-time rankings having moved above Juventus (690 minutes).
- City finished second in the 2019/20 Premier League and bowed out of the UEFA Champions League at the quarter-final stage for the third season running, going down 3-1 against Lyon in their one-off tie in Lisbon. They had finished first in their group with 14 points (W4 D2) before seeing off Real Madrid in the last 16, winning 2-1 away and at home against the 13-time European champions.
- This is the Cityzens' tenth UEFA Champions League campaign; they have been involved every season since 2011/12.
- City have scored 60 goals in their last 25 UEFA Champions League matches; over the last three seasons their

record is W24 D4 L3 with 76 goals scored and 25 conceded.

- The Matchday 5 draw at Porto made City's record in Portugal W1 D2 L1; that was their second game at the Dragão, the first having ended in a 2-1 victory against Porto in the 2011/12 UEFA Europa League round of 32 thanks to an 85th-minute Agüero winner.
- City's record in two UEFA penalty shoot-outs is W2 L0:

Chelsea

- This is Chelsea's fourth European final against an English club. After losing to Manchester United in the 2008 UEFA Champions League, they were 4-1 victors against Arsenal in the 2019 UEFA Europa League but lost that year's UEFA Super Cup to Liverpool 5-4 on penalties.
- Chelsea's record against English clubs in Europe is W7 D8 L4. The 2019 defeat of Arsenal is their only victory in their last five matches (D2 L2), although overall they have won five of their ten knockout ties.
- This season, Chelsea made smooth progress through Group E, winning all three away games and dropping points only in their first and last fixtures, at home to Sevilla (0-0) and Krasnodar (1-1) respectively. Rennes were beaten 3-0 at Stamford Bridge and on their travels the English club picked up maximum points at Krasnodar (4-0), Rennes (2-1) and Sevilla (4-0); the latter result made sure of first place in the section, Olivier Giroud becoming the first Chelsea player to score four times in a European Cup match – and at 34 years 63 days the oldest hat-trick scorer in UEFA Champions League history.
- With Tuchel having replaced Frank Lampard as head coach, Chelsea then eased past Atlético de Madrid in the round of 16, winning 1-0 in Bucharest before a 2-0 home victory, and held off Porto in the last eight (2-0 a, 0-1 h) with both matches played in Seville. Chelsea then got the better of Real Madrid in the semi-finals (1-1 a, 2-0 h).
- Fourth in the Premier League in 2019/20, this is Chelsea's 17th venture into the UEFA Champions League and a third in four years. The exception came in 2018/19, when they won the UEFA Europa League under Maurizio Sarri.
- Last season Lampard's side recovered from a Matchday 1 defeat at home to Valencia (0-1) to progress as Group H runners-up with 11 points, finishing behind the Spanish side on head-to-head record, before losing to eventual champions Bayern (0-3 h, 1-4 a) in the last 16.
- This season's eight victories have made it 11 wins in Chelsea's last 19 UEFA Champions League matches (D5 L3).
- Mendy has kept eight clean sheets in 11 UEFA Champions League matches this season, the most in a campaign by a goalkeeper for an English side in the competition's history – one more than Manchester City's Ederson.
- This is Chelsea's fifth game at the Dragão, where their record is W1 D1 L2, the most recent visit to both the city and the country ending in a 2-1 defeat by Porto in the 2015/16 UEFA Champions League group stage. The Blues' record in Portugal is W3 D1 L2.
- Chelsea's record in six UEFA penalty shoot-outs is W2 L4:

Links and trivia

- Tuchel had never beaten Guardiola as a coach before taking charge of Chelsea. His record against the Spaniard with Mainz and Dortmund was D2 L3 with two goals scored and 11 conceded. The most recent meeting before Tuchel's two wins against City this season came in the 2015/16 German Cup final, Bayern winning on penalties after a goalless draw in what was Guardiola's last match in charge prior to taking over at City.
- De Bruyne signed for Chelsea from Genk in January 2012, completing the rest of that season with the Belgian club before moving to London. However, he made only nine appearances for Chelsea in all competitions – three of them coming in the UEFA Champions League group stage in autumn 2013 – spending 2012/13 on loan with Werder Bremen before returning to Germany to join Wolfsburg in a permanent switch in January 2014.
- Chelsea reserve goalkeeper Willy Caballero made 48 appearances for City over three seasons between 2014 and 2017. He saved three penalties in the shoot-out victory against Liverpool in the 2015/16 English League Cup final, his sole silverware in Manchester.
- Nathan Aké joined Chelsea in 2010 but made only 17 appearances for the club in all competitions before joining

Bournemouth in a permanent switch in 2017. He was an unused substitute in Chelsea's wins in the 2012/13 UEFA Europa League final and 2014/15 English League Cup final, and was also on the bench for the FA Cup final loss to Arsenal in 2017.

- Mahrez and Kanté were team-mates in the Leicester side that claimed the Premier League title in 2015/16, Kanté's sole season with the club; he played in 37 of the 38 league matches, while Mahrez scored 17 goals in his 37 Premier League appearances that season.

- Tuchel was Gündoğan's head coach at Dortmund in 2015/16.

- Foden and Hudson-Odoi were team-mates in the England side that won the 2017 FIFA U-17 World Cup in India.

- Steffen or Puljić could become the first American to appear in a European Cup final.

Latest news

Manchester City

- City's next win in the UEFA Champions League, group stage to final, will be their 50th.

- Kevin De Bruyne has played 49 games in the UEFA Champions League, group stage to final.

- Ederson made his 50th appearance in UEFA club competition in the semi-final second leg.

- City have lost two of their four games since beating Paris in the semi-final second leg, 2-1 at home to Chelsea on 8 May and 3-2 at Brighton ten days later, a game in which they led 2-0 but played for 80 minutes with ten men following João Cancelo's early red card.

- Josep Guardiola's side rounded off their Premier League campaign with a 5-0 home win against Everton on 23 May, their third win by that scoreline this season. Sergio Agüero, making his final appearance at the City of Manchester Stadium in a City shirt, came off the bench to score twice, as he had done on his City debut at home to Swansea on 15 August 2011.

- City finished on 86 points in the Premier League, 12 ahead of second-placed Manchester United, to claim their third league title in four seasons and seventh in total.

- The defeat at Brighton ended City's record run of 20 successive away victories in all competitions, which surpassed the previous record for an English top-flight team of 11 they set themselves between May and November 2017.

- City have lost five of their last 19 games in all competitions (W14), making it just five losses in 47 fixtures (W39 D3); they have not drawn a match since 15 December, 1-1 at home to West Bromwich Albion, a run of 40 games (W35 L5).

- Agüero's double against Everton made it four league goals this season, all in his last five appearances. It is his lowest total for a campaign since 2004/05, when he scored five times in the league for Argentinian side Independiente.

- Agüero has scored 184 Premier League goals for City, setting a new competition record for most goals scored for a single club.

- On 29 March it was confirmed Agüero will leave City when his contract expires this summer. The Argentinian, who joined in 2011, is the club's record goalscorer with 260 goals in 389 appearances.

- De Bruyne opened the scoring against Everton, his tenth club goal of the season in all competitions. He was the seventh City player to reach double figures for the campaign, after İlkay Gündoğan (17), Phil Foden (16), Riyad

Mahrez, Raheem Sterling and Gabriel Jesus (all 14) and Ferran Torres (13).

- Gündoğan has scored 11 goals in 19 Premier League appearances in 2021.
- On 25 April City claimed the English League Cup for the fourth year in a row – and the sixth time in eight seasons – thanks to Aymeric Laporte's late goal in the final against Tottenham at Wembley that secured a 1-0 victory.
- On 17 April, Josep Guardiola's side were beaten 1-0 by Chelsea in the FA Cup semi-finals, ending their bid for an unprecedented quadruple.
- De Bruyne, who was included in the UEFA.com fans' Men's Team of the Year 2020, was sidelined between 4 and 23 May with muscular problems.
- Rúben Dias was voted Footballer of the Year by England's football writers earlier this month.

Chelsea

- This is Chelsea's 69th match in the UEFA Champions League knockout phase, taking them above Manchester United and Juventus (both 68). Only Real Madrid (105), Bayern (100) and Barcelona (97) have played more.
- Mason Mount's goal in the semi-final second leg was Chelsea's 300th in the UEFA Champions League, group stage to final.
- Chelsea have won exactly half of their UEFA Champions League matches, group stage to final, recording 88 victories in 176 games.
- Jorginho's next appearance in UEFA club competition will be his 50th.
- Chelsea have lost three of their five games since the semi-final second leg, following up their Premier League win at City on 8 May with two defeats in their last three league matches, at home to Arsenal on 12 May (0-1) and at Aston Villa on the final day of the season (1-2).
- Despite those losses, the Blues still finished fourth in the Premier League with 67 points, the same position as last season having picked up one point more.
- Chelsea are the first club since Everton in 1910/11 to finish in the top four in the English top flight despite having no player reach double figures for league goals.
- Chelsea also lost 1-0 to Leicester in the FA Cup final at Wembley on 15 May; it was their fourth final appearance in five seasons and their third defeat.
- The semi-final second leg against Real Madrid was Chelsea's 13th clean sheet in 17 games, and 18th in 24, and crowned a run of five shut-outs in six matches. They have not kept a clean sheet in any of the five games since.
- Chelsea kept 11 clean sheets in their first 15 Premier League matches under Thomas Tuchel but none in the last four.
- Chelsea were unbeaten in 15 games (W11 D4) before a 5-2 defeat at home to West Brom on 3 April that was their first loss under Tuchel. Including that game, their subsequent record is W8 D2 L5.
- Tuchel's record since succeeding Frank Lampard as head coach on 26 January is now W18 D6 L5. His 14-match unbeaten start surpassed Luiz Felipe Scolari's previous club best of 12.
- Jorginho's penalty in a 2-1 home win against Leicester on 18 May was his seventh goal in this season's Premier League, all from the spot, equalling the record of Liverpool's James Milner in 2016/17 of most goals exclusively from penalties in a Premier League campaign. He ended the season as Chelsea's top Premier League scorer.
- Edouard Mendy has kept 25 clean sheets in his 43 Chelsea appearances in all competitions including 15 in his last 24.
- Mendy had to be replaced in the defeat at Villa on 23 May having suffered a rib injury.
- N'Golo Kanté was substituted in the win against Leicester with a thigh problem and sat out the defeat at Villa.
- Mateo Kovačić was out between 10 April and 18 May with a thigh injury.

UEFA Champions League: Did you know?

Overall records

- In 2016/17 Real Madrid became the first team to successfully defend the UEFA Champions League trophy, with AC Milan (1989, 1990) the previous club to win consecutive European Cups. Milan (1994, 1995), Ajax (1995, 1996), Juventus (1996, 1997) and Manchester United (2008, 2009) have all returned to the UEFA Champions League final as holders only to lose.
- Real Madrid's 2018 triumph made them the first team to win three successive European Cups twice. The Spanish side won the first five editions of the tournament, between 1956 and 1960; Ajax (1971–73) and Bayern München (1974–76) have also lifted the trophy three years in a row.
- Only two teams have ever won the UEFA Champions League on home soil: Borussia Dortmund (1997, final in Munich) and Juventus (1996, final in Rome), while Manchester United lost the 2011 final in London and 12 months later Bayern were beaten in the showpiece in their own stadium, the Fußball Arena München.

UEFA Champions League final: Did you know?

- Spain are the most successful nation with 11 triumphs, six more than Italy. Spain's wins – 1998, 2000, 2002, 2006, 2009, 2011, 2014, 2015, 2016, 2017 and 2018 – came from 16 final dates while Italy were victorious in 1994, 1996, 2003, 2007 and 2010 from their 13 appearances. England emerged victorious in 1999, 2005, 2008, 2012 and 2019, and were losing finalists in 2006, 2007, 2008, 2009, 2011, 2018 and 2019 while Germany were winners in 1997, 2001, 2013 and 2020 and runners-up in 1999, 2002, 2010, 2012 and 2013.
- Real Madrid made their seventh appearance in 2018, a new UEFA Champions League record and surpassing the mark of AC Milan and Juventus. Madrid (1998, 2000, 2002, 2014, 2016, 2017, 2018) have seven final victories, three more than Barcelona (2006, 2009, 2011, 2015) with Milan on three (1994, 2003, 2007).
- Spain have the most appearances per nation in all-time European Cup finals with 29, one more than Italy; Spain has 18 wins from those 29 final appearances while Italy has recorded 12 victories and 16 defeats. England has 13 wins from 22 final appearances, with Germany on 18 appearances (eight wins), Portugal nine (four wins) and the Netherlands eight (six wins).
- There have been seven previous finals between teams from the same country. In 2000 Real Madrid beat Valencia 3-0 at the Stade de France; three years later Milan defeated Juventus on penalties at Old Trafford; in 2008 Manchester United overcame Chelsea in Moscow, also on spot kicks; in 2013 Bayern München beat Borussia Dortmund 2-1 at Wembley. Then in 2014, Real Madrid overcame Atlético de Madrid 4-1 after extra time in Lisbon in the first European final between teams from the same city, and again beat their neighbours, this time on penalties, in Milan two years later. In 2019, Liverpool beat Tottenham 2-0 in Madrid.
- In the previous 28 UEFA Champions League finals, there have been 21 outright wins and seven matches decided on shoot-outs. A total of 77 goals have been scored with the most common results being 2-1 and 1-1, which have each happened on five occasions; four finals have finished 3-1 and 1-0, and three 2-0.
- Seventeen European Cup finals have gone to extra time, most recently the 2016 decider. The finals of 1958, 1968, 1970, 1992 and 2014 were decided in the additional period, while the 1974 showpiece between Bayern and Atlético de Madrid ended 1-1 after 120 minutes with Bayern winning a replay. The other 11 finals were settled by a penalty shoot-out after extra time: in 1984, 1986, 1988, 1991, 1996, 2001, 2003, 2005, 2008, 2012 and 2016, when Real Madrid defeated Atlético 5-3 in the shoot-out after a 1-1 draw.
- Milan's 4-0 win against Barcelona in the 1994 final remains the biggest winning margin in a UEFA Champions League final and the Rossoneri were also involved in the highest scoring showpiece when they shared six goals with Liverpool in 2005 before penalties. In terms of the European Cup, Madrid's 7-3 defeat of Eintracht Frankfurt in 1960 remains the most impressive while Bayern (1974 replay v Atlético) and Milan (1989 v Steaua Bucureşti) also recorded 4-0 successes.
- No player has scored a hat-trick in a UEFA Champions League final. Daniele Massaro (Milan 1994), Karl-Heinz Riedle (Borussia Dortmund 1997), Hernán Crespo (Milan 2005), Filippo Inzaghi (Milan 2007), Diego Milito (Internazionale 2010), Cristiano Ronaldo (Real Madrid 2017) and Gareth Bale (Real Madrid 2018) all struck twice. In European Cup terms, Ferenc Puskás scored four goals in Madrid's 7-3 defeat of Eintracht Frankfurt in 1960, when Alfredo Di Stéfano found the net three times; Puskás scored another final hat-trick, on the losing side for Madrid against Benfica in 1962, with Pierino Prati (Milan 1969) the only other player to have managed a final hat-trick.
- In 2017, Cristiano Ronaldo became the first player to find the net in three UEFA Champions League finals, having previously scored for Manchester United in 2008 and Real Madrid in 2014. Raúl González (Madrid 2000, 2002), Samuel Eto'o (Barcelona 2006, 2009), Lionel Messi (Barcelona 2009, 2011), Sergio Ramos (Real Madrid 2014, 2016),

Mario Mandžukić (Bayern München 2013, Juventus 2017) and Gareth Bale (Real Madrid 2014, 2018) have scored in two UEFA Champions League finals – members of an exclusive club of 20 players to have found the net in more than one European Cup showpiece. Di Stéfano and Puskás lead the list having each scored seven goals in the final for Madrid.

- Paolo Maldini's goal for AC Milan 51 seconds into the 2005 decider against Liverpool is the fastest in a UEFA Champions League final.
- Jens Lehmann (Arsenal 2006), Didier Drogba (Chelsea 2008) and Juan Cuadrado (Juventus 2017) are the only players to be sent off in a European Cup final.
- Clarence Seedorf is the only player to lift the European Cup with three clubs (Ajax 1995, Real Madrid 1998, Milan 2003, 2007). Bob Paisley (Liverpool 1977, 1978, 1981) was the first coach to win three times, a feat Carlo Ancelotti (Milan 2003, 2007, Real Madrid 2014) and Zinédine Zidane (Real Madrid 2016, 2017, 2018) have both replicated.
- In 2014 Ancelotti also became the fifth coach to win the trophy with two clubs; Ernst Happel (Feyenoord 1970, Hamburg 1983), Ottmar Hitzfeld (Borussia Dortmund 1997, Bayern 2001), José Mourinho (Porto 2004, Internazionale 2010) and Jupp Heynckes (Real Madrid 1998, Bayern 2013) had previously achieved the feat.
- Seven people have won the trophy as both a player and a coach: Miguel Muñoz (Real Madrid 1956, 1957 (player); Real Madrid 1960, 1966 (coach)); Giovanni Trapattoni (AC Milan 1963, 1969; Juventus 1985); Johan Cruyff (Ajax 1971, 1972, 1973; Barcelona 1992); Carlo Ancelotti (AC Milan 1989, 1990; AC Milan 2003, 2007, Real Madrid 2014); Frank Rijkaard (AC Milan 1989, 1990, Ajax 1995; Barcelona 2006); Josep Guardiola (Barcelona 1992; Barcelona 2009, 2011); Zinédine Zidane (Real Madrid 2002; Real Madrid 2016, 2017, 2018).

Goalscoring records

- Lionel Messi became the first player to score five goals in a match in Barcelona's 7-1 win against Bayer Leverkusen on 7 March 2012, a feat matched by Shakhtar Donetsk's Luiz Adriano at BATE Borisov on 21 October 2014. Fourteen more players, also including Messi and Robert Lewandowski twice, have scored four times in a game, most recently Olivier Giroud for Chelsea at Sevilla in the 2020/21 group stage. That was the fourth quadruple in succession to be scored away from home after Bayern's Serge Gnabry and Lewandowski (group stage v Tottenham and Crvena zvezda respectively) and Josip Iličić (Atalanta v Valencia, round of 16 second leg) all achieved the feat in 2019/20.
- Cristiano Ronaldo has scored 67 goals in the UEFA Champions League knockout rounds, more than any other player. Messi is second on 47 goals, ahead of Lewandowski (26), Thomas Müller (24), Karim Benzema (20) and Raúl González and Andriy Shevchenko (both 18).
- Messi's hat-trick against PSV Eindhoven on Matchday 1 of the 2018/19 competition was his eighth in the competition, a mark Ronaldo matched against Atlético de Madrid in that season's round of 16 second leg.

Oldest and youngest players

- Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta is the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League having featured against Real Madrid on Matchday 6 in 2007/08 aged 43 years 252 days. Alessandro Costacurta is the oldest outfield player; the Milan defender was 40 years and 211 days when he played against AEK Athens in 2006/07.
- Francesco Totti is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 38 years 59 days, in Roma's 1-1 draw at CSKA Moskva on 25 November 2014. Ryan Giggs (37 years 290 days) was the previous record holder.
- Youssoufa Moukoko is the youngest player to have appeared, aged 16 years 18 days for Borussia Dortmund at Zenit on 8 December 2020. He replaced Celestine Babayaro, who was 16 years 87 days when he started for Anderlecht against Steaua București on 23 November 1994; Babayaro was sent off in the 37th minute.
- Ansu Fati's winner for Barcelona at Inter on Matchday 6 in 2019/20 made him the youngest goalscorer in UEFA Champions League history, at the age of 17 years 40 days. He eclipsed the previous record of Olympiacos's Peter Ofori-Quaye (17 years 195 days) that had lasted since 1 October 1997.
