Match background

Fifteen months on from their epic UEFA Champions League final, FC Bayern München and Chelsea FC meet at Prague's Stadion Eden in the UEFA Super Cup.

- Chelsea stunned Bayern with a dramatic penalty shoot-out victory in the German club's own stadium last May, Didier Drogba – who had cancelled out Thomas Müller's 83rd-minute opener – converting the winning spot kick to take the European Cup to Stamford Bridge for the first time.
- Bayern came back to become only the second club – after AC Milan (1993, 1994) – to win the European Cup 12 months after losing in the final. Goals from Mario Mandžukić (60) and Arjen Robben (89) earned a fifth triumph as a thrilling final against Borussia Dortmund at Wembley ended 2-1.
- Chelsea also left it late, Branislav Ivanović's towering header three minutes into added time settling the UEFA Europa League final against SL Benfica at the Amsterdam ArenA. The Blues became only the third club – after Juventus, AFC Ajax and Bayern – to win all three major European club competitions.
- Both clubs have suffered UEFA Super Cup disappointment; Chelsea, winners in 1998, were overrun by Club Atlético de Madrid in Monaco 12 months ago while Bayern lost in 1975 (v FC Dynamo Kyiv), 1976 (RSC Anderlecht) and 2001 (Liverpool FC). No other team has finished runners-up three times without winning the trophy.
- The match provides a sub-plot in the teams' new coaches; Bayern's Josep Guardiola and José Mourinho of Chelsea know each other well from their time in charge of FC Barcelona and Real Madrid CF respectively.

Previous meetings

• In the 2012 UEFA Champions League final, Müller's late header had seemingly given Jupp Heynckes' Bayern victory, but five minutes later Drogba headed an equaliser for a Chelsea team managed by Roberto Di Matteo. Former Blues winger Robben had an extra-time penalty saved by Petr Čech and there was more spot-kick misery for Bayern in the shoot-out, despite Juan Mata's miss; Čech saved from Ivica Olić and Bastian Schweinsteiger, leaving Drogba to convert the decisive kick and give Chelsea a 4-3 penalty triumph.

• Bayern and Chelsea met in the 2004/05 UEFA Champions League quarter-finals, Mourinho's Blues prevailing 6-5 on aggregate against Felix Magath's Bayern.

• Chelsea won the first leg 4-2 at home. After Joe Cole's opener (4), Chelsea responded to Schweinsteiger's equaliser (52) through Frank Lampard (60, 70) and Drogba (80). Bayern's Michael Ballack (90) completed the scoring.

• Lampard (30) and Drogba (80) struck again in the second leg, either side of a Claudio Pizarro (65) goal. Bayern won 3-2 on the night through late goals from Paolo Guerrero (90) and Mehmet Scholl (90+5) but went out on aggregate.

• Bayern are making their fourth UEFA Super Cup appearance. They have lost all three previous finals:

1975: 0-3 aggregate v FC Dynamo Kyiv (0-1 home, 0-2 away)

1976: 3-5 aggregate v RSC Anderlecht (2-1 home, 1-4 away)

2001: 2-3 v Liverpool FC

• Chelsea beat Real Madrid on their UEFA Super Cup debut in Monaco in 1998, Gus Poyet scoring the only goal. They fared less well on their second appearance against Madrid's city rivals Atlético, going down 4-1 with Falcao hitting a first-half hat-trick; Gary Cahill (75) got the sole reply after Miranda had made it 4-0.

- The Chelsea team to face Atlético on 31 August 2012 was: Čech, Ivanović, Cahill, Luiz, Cole (Bertrand 90), Mikel, Lampard, Ramires (Oscar 46), Hazard, Mata (Sturridge 81), Torres.
- Including those defeats by Chelsea and Liverpool in Monaco, Bayern have met English opposition on five occasions in UEFA club competition finals, winning one and losing four. The other contests were:
1975: 2-0 v Leeds United AFC, European Cup final (Paris)
1982: 0-1 v Aston Villa FC, European Cup final (Rotterdam)
1999: 1-2 v Manchester United FC, UEFA Champions League final (Barcelona)
- Bayern's overall record against English clubs is W14 D13 L11 F55 A47. Most recently, they met Arsenal FC in the 2012/13 UEFA Champions League round of 16, winning 3-1 away and progressing on away goals despite a 2-0 home defeat.
- The contest with Bayern in Munich is the most recent of Chelsea's 14 games against Bundesliga clubs; their record is W7 D3 L4 F19 A11.
- The Premier League club won the 1998 UEFA Cup Winners' Cup against VfB Stuttgart, Gianfranco Zola scoring the only goal.
- Overall in UEFA competition there have been 12 Anglo-German finals and only two German winners.

- A UEFA Super Cup winner with Barcelona in 2009 and 2011, Guardiola could become the first coach to win the competition three times. He is currently level on two victories with Sir Alex Ferguson (Aberdeen FC 1983, Manchester United 1991), Carlo Ancelotti (Milan 2002, 2007), Louis van Gaal (Ajax 1995, Barcelona 1997) and Arrigo Sacchi (Milan 1989, 1990).

Team ties

- Guardiola and Mourinho met 11 times as coach of Barcelona and Madrid, Guardiola recording five wins to Mourinho's two. Barça were 5-0 victors at the Camp Nou in their teams' first meeting on 29 November 2010, beat Madrid in that season's UEFA Champions League semi-finals and won the 2011/12 Spanish Super Cup; Madrid won the 2011 Copa del Rey final and triumphed 2-1 at the Camp Nou in the last Guardiola-Mourinho fixture.
- Mourinho's FC Internazionale Milano eliminated Barcelona 3-2 on aggregate in the 2009/10 UEFA Champions League semi-finals.
- Robben played for Chelsea from 2004 to 2007, winning two league titles and one FA Cup. He scored 15 goals in 67 league games for the London club.
- André Schürrle, who joined Chelsea in the summer, scored 18 goals in 65 Bundesliga appearances for Bayer 04 Leverkusen. He moved from 1. FSV Mainz 05, where he scored 19 goals in 66 league games, in 2011, and recorded four wins and three defeats in his seven league games against Bayern for both clubs. He was a team-mate of Bayern's Jan Kirchhoff at Mainz.
- Kevin De Bruyne spent 2012/13 on loan at SV Werder Bremen, suffering two defeats against Bayern. He did score in Munich, but Bremen lost 6-1.
- Manuel Neuer, Philipp Lahm, Jérôme Boateng, Schweinsteiger and Müller were in the Germany side that beat an England side including John Terry, Ashley Cole and Lampard 4-1 in the 2010 FIFA World Cup round of 16.
- Fernando Torres hit Spain's UEFA EURO 2008 final winner against the Germany of Lahm and Schweinsteiger.
- Torres was also a late substitute in the Spain team – with Mata an unused replacement – that beat Germany by the same 1-0 scoreline in the 2010 World Cup semi-finals. Neuer, Boateng, Lahm, Schweinsteiger and substitute Kroos featured for Germany.
- In his solitary season at Manchester City, Boateng made his debut as a late substitute in a 1-0 home win against

Chelsea in September 2010.

- One of Daniel Van Buyten's six appearances on loan at Manchester City in the second half of the 2003/04 season was a 1-0 home loss to Chelsea.
- David Luiz, Ramires and Oscar play alongside Dante with Brazil. Javi Martínez is a Spain team-mate of Torres, Mata and César Azpilicueta while Van Buyten, Eden Hazard and Romelu Lukaku all play for Belgium.

Match facts

Bayern

- Josep Guardiola, who succeeded Jupp Heynckes on a three-year deal during the summer, suffered defeat in his first competitive outing as Bayern boss as Borussia Dortmund won the German Super Cup 4-2 on 27 July.
- The Munich side have won four out of five since, a 5-0 German Cup first round triumph at fourth division side BSV Schwarz-Weiss Rehden on 5 August – featuring a Thomas Müller hat-trick – preceding three Bundesliga victories and Tuesday's 1-1 draw with SC Freiburg.
- Thiago Alcántara was ruled out for seven weeks after suffering ankle ligament damage on his first Bayern start on Saturday, a 2-0 win against 1. FC Nürnberg. Mario Götze made his debut in the same game.
- Franck Ribéry scored his 53rd Bundesliga goal against Nürnberg, though his first with his head, in a match that also brought Philipp Lahm's first yellow card in the German top flight since 11 February 2012.
- Bayern have already missed two penalties this season, through Müller (v VfL Borussia Mönchengladbach) and David Alaba (v Nürnberg). Alaba did convert from the spot a minute after Müller's miss against Mönchengladbach.
- Bayern have won 32 of their last 36 matches in all competitions.
- Bayern won 46 of their 54 games in all competitions last season; they have won four out of six this.
- Bayern won 12 out of 12 pre-season friendlies, including the notable scalps of FC Barcelona (2-0, 24 July) and Manchester City FC (2-1, 1 August).
- Ribéry signed a two-year contract extension during the summer, tying himself to the club until June 2017, while Claudio Pizarro agreed a deal for this season.
- Bayern broke or equalled 30 Bundesliga records in 2012/13, among them most points (91), biggest winning margin (25 points), best goal difference (+80), clean sheets (21) and most wins (29). They sealed their 23rd German title on 6 April with a record six games remaining and made it a domestic double by beating VfB Stuttgart on 1 June in the German Cup final, the 16th time they have won it.
- Toni Kroos is fit having missed the end of last season with an adductor injury suffered on 2 April.
- Holger Badstuber has been out with ruptured knee ligaments since 1 December.

Chelsea

- Chelsea ended 2012/13 a season-best ten games unbeaten and have extended that sequence to 13 this term as victories at home to promoted Hull City AFC (2-0) and Aston Villa FC (2-1) preceded a 0-0 draw at Manchester United FC. José Mourinho is now unbeaten at Stamford Bridge in 62 Premier League fixtures.
- On Monday, Chelsea became the first side to draw 0-0 at Old Trafford in the Premier League since May 2009.
- Frank Lampard was involved on his club's opening day of the Premier League season for a record 18th occasion, scoring in the 2-0 win against Hull.
- Mourinho returned to Chelsea on a four-year deal on 3 June, a fortnight after departing Real Madrid CF with mutual consent. His first three-year spell at Stamford Bridge ended in September 2007.
- Chelsea won six of their seven pre-season friendlies in south-east Asia and the United States, including victories over FC Internazionale Milano (2-0, 1 August), AC Milan (2-0, 4 August) and AS Roma (2-1, 11 August). The sole exception came on 7 August, a 3-1 loss to Real Madrid.
- David Luiz has not played this season because of a hamstring injury.
- Defender Nathan Aké, 18, signed a new five-year contract in August.

- Known as 'Pep', he came up through Barcelona's youth ranks to win six Spanish Liga titles, one European Champion Clubs' Cup, a UEFA Cup Winners' Cup and two Copa del Rey trophies from 1990 to 2001. Also had spells with Brescia, Fabio Capello's Roma, Al-Ahly in Doha and Mexico's Dorados de Sinola before ending his playing career in 2006.
- Won 40 caps and Olympic footballing gold with Spain in 1992, but missed the 1998 and 2002 FIFA World Cup tournaments through injury.
- Having coached Barcelona's B team, he took charge of the senior side in 2008 and won the UEFA Champions League, Spanish Liga and Copa del Rey in his first season in charge. In the process he became the sixth man to have lifted the European Cup as player and coach.
- That was just the beginning of a glorious four-season spell which yielded 14 trophies in all. In his second campaign, Guardiola steered Barcelona to a second Liga title as well as the Spanish and UEFA Super Cups and the FIFA Club World Cup. Even more success followed in 2010/11 as Barcelona completed a hat-trick of Spanish titles and, for the second time under Guardiola, got the better of Manchester United FC in the UEFA Champions League final.
- In his final season, 2011/12, Guardiola's team won the UEFA Super Cup and FIFA Club World Cup once more before signing off his reign with a second Copa del Rey triumph. After a year's break from football, Guardiola took charge of Bayern in June 2013, replacing Juup Heynckes at the helm.

Chelsea FC: José Mourinho

Date of birth: 26 January 1963

Nationality: Portuguese

Coaching career: SL Benfica, UD Leiria, FC Porto, Chelsea FC (twice), FC Internazionale Milano, Real Madrid CF

- A former teacher, Mourinho had spells working at Sporting Clube de Portugal, Porto and FC Barcelona as a coaching assistant in the 1990s.
- As coach, had a brief, nine-game stay at Benfica and a highly successful tenure at Leiria before really making his mark after arriving at Porto in January 2002. In his first full season, 2002/03, Porto won the UEFA Cup and a domestic double. The next year they retained their league title and claimed the UEFA Champions League with a 3-0 defeat of AS Monaco FC in Gelsenkirchen.
- Joined Chelsea in 2004 and led the club to the League Cup and their first league championship for 50 years in his first season. Followed up with the league title again in 2006, and both the League Cup and FA Cup in 2007 but left the club that September.
- Joined Inter in June 2008 and in his first campaign retained the Serie A crown, a feat the Nerazzurri repeated in 2009/10 when they also added the Coppa Italia and the UEFA Champions League title, their first European crown since 1965.
- Victory at the Santiago Bernabéu was Mourinho's last act as Inter coach before joining Madrid on a four-year deal. His first season featured the club's first Copa del Rey victory in 18 years and his second brought the Liga title; also led Madrid to three successive UEFA Champions League semi-finals he equalled Sir Alex Ferguson's record of seven last-four appearances before returning to Chelsea at the start of June 2013.

- Jonas Eriksson started out as a referee in 1994, making his top-flight debut in his native Sweden six years later and first appearing in UEFA competition as the fourth official in September 2001.
- The following summer he took charge of three games at the UEFA European Under-17 Championship and was fourth official as Switzerland beat France in the final.
- A former sales director who became a full-time referee at the start of 2011, Eriksson's star continued to rise as he earned his FIFA badge in 2002 and featured at the 2003 UEFA-CAF Meridian Cup, subsequently making regular appearances across UEFA competitions as a fourth official.
- Eriksson, who lists music and travelling among his hobbies and is based in Sigtuna, oversaw three games at the 2006 UEFA European Under-19 Championship and took charge of two UEFA EURO 2008 qualifiers.
- Made his UEFA Champions League group stage debut as a referee in December 2008 for the matchday six meeting between Real Madrid CF and FC Zenit. Has since become a regular in that and the UEFA Europa League and in the middle for two group matches at UEFA EURO 2012. Oversaw six UEFA Champions League and three UEFA Europa League matches in 2012/13, starting the next campaign by being appointed for the UEFA Super Cup in Prague.

Venue guide

The near 21,000-capacity Stadion Eden is located close to central Prague, in the suburb of Vrsovice. The newest arena in the Czech Republic offers spectators, who are seated close to the playing surface throughout, a stunning viewing experience. The venue, completed in May 2008, replaced the old Slavia Stadium famous for its main wooden stand dating back to the early 1950s.

Stadion Eden is home to SK Slavia Praha, who celebrated their 120th anniversary in 2012. While Slavia have hosted the likes of LOSC Lille, Hamburger SV and Valencia CF in European competition, the biggest continental matches held here have involved domestic rivals FC Viktoria Plzeň, who played AC Milan and FC Barcelona in their maiden UEFA Champions League campaign of 2011/12. Lionel Messi scored a hat-trick when Barça triumphed 4-0 in Prague on matchday four.

The construction of Stadion Eden, where the Czech national team have played three games to date, as a multi-purpose complex started in October 2006 with a ceremonial 'knocking' on the foundation stone. In the opening match, on 7 May 2008, Slavia faced Oxford University AFC, the club's first-ever English opponents in 1899.

The multistorey stadium, built on a site which took its name from a large amusement park called Eden, borders Slavia's training ground and includes 45 VIP boxes, a hotel, restaurants, office space and a fan shop. It has also staged concerts, with Metallica one of the first bands to appear shortly after its inauguration.

There are plenty of delights elsewhere in Prague to enchant supporters. Those wishing to embark on a sightseeing tour may wish to begin at the majestic Prague Castle, former residence of Czech kings and current seat of the president, and continue on to the famous Charles Bridge, commissioned by Emperor Charles IV in 1357.

The Old Town Hall boasts a medieval astronomical clock containing wooden apostle figures which parade on the hour. St Nicolas Church, Týn's Church, Lesser Town, Jewish Town and Loreta are also worth perusing.

Those who have visited the historical centre may like to take in Prague Zoo, in Troja, and the nearby Baroque chateau, or climb Petřín hill, which offers stunning vistas of the city from a small-scale replica of the Eiffel Tower. No trip to Prague would be complete without tasting the local beer, renowned among the best in the world, or sampling Czech delicacies such as pork, cabbage and dumplings (vepřo, knedlo, zelo) or sirloin steak (svíčková).

Getting there

By air – Václav Havel Airport Prague is 30km, or a half-hour taxi ride, from Stadion Eden. There is a regular bus service to Dejvická and Letňany underground stations, from where you can travel to Strašnická, the nearest stop to Stadion Eden.

By train – Main Station (Hlavní nádraží) houses an underground stop which offers the easiest connection to Strašnická.

By public transport – The Prague underground system presents a fast and reliable service. Travelling to Strašnická and taking tram No22 or 7 for a three-stop journey to Stadion Eden is preferred by many fans.

By road – Prague is well-connected to all neighbouring countries. When coming from Jižní Spojka, take the exit to Vrsovice and continue to U Slavie, the street on which Stadion Eden is situated.

Most finalists (by country): 18

Spain holds the record for the number of times their teams have participated in the competition with 18 (FC Barcelona 8, Real Madrid CF 3, Valencia CF 2, Sevilla FC 2, Club Atlético de Madrid 2, Real Zaragoza 1).

England have had 14 (Liverpool FC 5, Manchester United FC 3, Nottingham Forest FC 2, Chelsea FC 2, Arsenal FC 1, Aston Villa FC 1), one more than Italy (AC Milan 7, Juventus 2, FC Internazionale Milano 1, Parma FC 1, S.S. Lazio 1, UC Sampdoria 1).

Most victories (by country): 10

Spanish teams have recorded the most victories with ten (FC Barcelona 4, Valencia CF 2, Club Atlético de Madrid 2, Real Madrid CF 1 Sevilla FC 1), one more than Italy and three more than England.

Fastest goal: 5

The fastest goal scored in the UEFA Super Cup came in the 1987 decider when Rui Barros struck the only goal of the first leg after five minutes for FC Porto away to AFC Ajax. Porto won the return leg by the same margin to win 2-0 on aggregate.

Most victories (by club): 5

AC Milan lead the way with five victories in the competition (1989, 1990, 1994, 2003 and 2007), with FC Barcelona and Liverpool FC two behind.

Extra-time victors: 4

Four competitions have required extra time to decide the winner, Parma AC (1993, 2-1 versus AC Milan), Galatasaray SK (2000, 2-1 golden goal victory versus Real Madrid CF), Liverpool FC (2005, 3-1 versus PFC CSKA Moskva) and FC Barcelona (2009, 1-0 versus FC Shakhtar Donetsk).

Finals involving teams from the same country: 3

Before the all-Spanish affair between FC Barcelona and Sevilla FC in 2006, Italian sides had competed against each other in two finals with AC Milan defeating UC Sampdoria 3-1 on aggregate in the 1990 competition. Milan were involved in the decider three years later against Parma AC, but on this occasion the Rossoneri ended on the losing side, 2-1.

Hat-tricks: 2

Falcao (2012, Club Atlético de Madrid v Chelsea FC) and Terry McDermott (1977, Liverpool FC v Hamburger SV, second leg) are the only players to have scored three times in one UEFA Super Cup match. McDermott's hat-trick was the quicker, coming in a 17-minute spell either side of the interval.

Penalty shoot-outs: 0

The UEFA Super Cup has never had a penalty shoot-out to determine the winner of the competition.

Fastest goal: 6

For single-match finals since 1998, Falcao's sixth-minute opener for Atlético in 2012 is the quickest goal.

Most yellow cards: 7

Stefano Farina of Italy issued seven yellow cards in the 2006 UEFA Super Cup, equalling the seven given out by Austrian match official Günther Benkö in the 2000 UEFA Super Cup in which Galatasaray SK defeated Real Madrid CF 2-1.

Most goals by a team: 4

Club Atlético de Madrid became the first team to score four times in a one-off final with their 2012 defeat of Chelsea FC; Liverpool FC (2001, 2005), Real Madrid CF (2002), Sevilla FC (2006) and AC Milan (2007) all managed three goals.

Widest margin of victory: 3

Atlético's 2012 win matched Sevilla FC's three-goal defeat of FC Barcelona in 2006.

Lowest total of goals: 1

There have been four 1-0 results. The first two finals ended with single-goal victories for Chelsea FC in 1998 and S.S. Lazio in 1999 against Real Madrid CF and Manchester United FC respectively. The other wins by a solitary goal came in 2003 when Andriy Shevchenko's tenth-minute goal for AC Milan accounted for FC Porto before Pedro Rodríguez's 115th-minute winner for FC Barcelona against FC Shakhtar Donetsk in 2009.

Own goals in a final: 1

The only own goal scored in a UEFA Super Cup final in Monaco came from Feyenoord's Patrick Paauwe 15 minutes into his team's 3-1 defeat by Real Madrid CF in 2002.

Red cards: 3

Manchester United FC midfielder Paul Scholes became the first player to be sent off in the history of the competition against FC Zenit in 2008. FC Porto's Rolando and Fredy Guarín were both sent off in 2011.

Scoreless draws: 0

No scoreless draws after 120 minutes have been recorded in the competition.

Competition history

The UEFA Super Cup was not staged in three seasons since its 1973 inception. In 1974, following political problems, FC Bayern München of the Federal Republic of Germany did not play 1. FC Magdeburg of the German Democratic Republic. Then in 1981, Liverpool FC and FC Dinamo Tbilisi failed to find a date to contest the competition. Following the Heysel tragedy on 29 May 1985, Juventus and Everton FC did not play the 1985 UEFA Super Cup.

European Cup winners: 18

Of the 37 previous editions of the UEFA Super Cup, the team who won the European Cup have triumphed on 18 occasions, most recently FC Barcelona in 2011. Since the UEFA Cup winners began to take part in 2000 following the disbanding of the UEFA Cup Winners' Cup, seven of the 12 events have been won by the team who lifted the UEFA Cup/UEFA Europa League the previous season.
